LACKING TREES? **CALL IN MEN OF THE TREES!** Charles Ivin (KBCB)

Last August my wife, Jenny, and I enjoyed the experience of travelling from Perth to Adelaide on the Indian-Pacific train. Looking through our gold class sleeper window, we were enthralled on the next morning to see 'the beauty and the splendour' of the Nullarbor Plain rolling by.



'Nullarbor', comes from the Latin: 'absence of trees'. Although the sun highlights fascinating colours over this great

flat land, the vegetation in the area is primarily low saltbush and blue bush scrub and often, only poor grasses, reddish limestone soil and rock debris. Apparently, this huge plain was formed from a former shallow seabed.

About two-thirds across the world record 478 kilometres straight-section of railway line on this plain we arrived at the very small outback town of Cook. It used to be populated with two hundred people but now is virtually abandoned with only four people living there.

Behind the station, we were attracted to a huge rock in the form of an obelisk. A plaque near its top reads:

'MEN OF THE TREES 60th Anniversary July 22nd 1982. 5 members each from Adelaide and Perth brought 600 donated trees to plant around the town with Cook school children to celebrate The Year of the Tree and initiate the Greening of Australia.'

There you are... Men Of The Trees will take on the challenge to plant trees nearly ANYWHERE!

Now back in Brisbane, we noted that our handout, 'Cook -Self Guided Walk' stated that, 'In 2006, one thousand trees were planted... Some trees survived and now stand as some of the tallest trees in the Nullarbor, providing natural shade from the harsh desert sun.'

Although this suggests that at l e a s t t w o energetic waves of planting took place, the area and number of trees remaining is now rather small. It's evident that the privatisation



of the railway operation in recent times has reduced staff to only a few people remaining at Cook. Sadly, it's unlikely anyone will be able to have time and resources to maintain these wonderful trees within Cook.

KNOW THINE ENEMY Cobbler's Pegs

Also known as Farmers Friend, Pitchforks or Sticky Beak, this annual that can grow to two metres high flowers throughout the year. It is found in disturbed areas exposed to full sun.



The leaves are opposite and divided into 3-5 lance-shaped segments with serrated edges. Bright green whilst young, leaves can develop tinges of red and brown on maturity. Flowers that can range from white through to yellow appear all year.

It's prolific black seeds are slender and 1cm long and have two barbed awns borne in a globular head; they attach easily to clothing, hair, fur ... as Peter Amabile knows only too well.

MEET THE PLANTERS Genevieve O'Brien.

We all love Genevieve O'Brien. Not only is she a regular planter, committed and a good worker, but she reduces the average age of the planters considerably ... to about 40! It really is nice to have some energetic young planters.

This can be a problem, of course, when one is interviewing somebody young and a question about music preferences brings forth answers like "Green Day" and other groups of which I have never heard. And we don't watch the same TV programmes either. I show my age by loving *The Golden Girls* and the blank look on her face makes me realize that that series had virtually finished before she was born.

There was a feature on TV about trees being planted to honour the victims of the Shopping Centre massacre in Nairobi. 67 trees were planted in memory of the 67 people shot dead by the gunmen. A time of healing for those whose loss is till so recent.

"It's amazing what they've done" said Nairobi resident, Rapul Metul Shah. "We're so humbled, we're so honoured to be here. Tree planting is such a noble cause and through this, Metil and all the others who were victimized are going to live with us forever".

So perhaps, at last, governments are beginning to acknowledge that this debilitating disease *is* in Australia and

this may be promising in terms of research.

If any of you would like to forward Louise the locations of the areas where you, or people you know, believe they may have contracted Lyme Disease from tick bites, she would forward these locations through to Biosecurity QLD.

Communicable Diseases Network Australia established a Clinical Advisory Committee on Lyme Disease earlier this year and the above research can be used to inform this national committee.
