When James presented at the 2019 Academy Awards, he demonstrated the possible trajectory of a TIFF Rising Star.

TIFF Rising Stars

TIFF Rising Stars empowers eight charismatic, promising young artists who are poised for international success. They learn professional and business skills, enabling them to take charge of their careers, while their talent is showcased against the backdrop of the Toronto International Film Festival.

It's no surprise that Rising Stars from past years are featuring in some of this Festival's most highly anticipated films: Sarah Gadon (2011) will appear in Semi Chellas' *American Woman*. Connor Jessup (2012) will be appearing in Calvin Thomas and Yonah Lewis' *White Lie*. Cara Gee (2013) will be appearing in Anna Maguire's short *It's Nothing*, and Deragh Campbell (2015) will be starring in the Platform selection *Anne at 13,000 ft*, directed by Kazik Radwanski. From the 2016 cohort, Grace Glowicki stars in Harry Cepka's *Raf*, while Sophie Nelisse will be featured in Aisling Chin-Yee's *The Rest of Us*. From Rising Stars 2017, Jessie Buckley appears alongside Renée Zellweger in Rupert Goold's biopic *Judy*. Lastly, from Rising Stars 2018, Jess Salgueiro appears in Karen Moore's short *Volcano*, and Devery Jacobs returns in Jeff Barnaby's *Blood Quantum*.

TIFF Filmmaker Lab

Each year, the Lab brings together outstanding creators from around the world, deepening their understanding of the industry and empowering them to move forward with their projects.

Since its inception, the Lab has supported hundreds of filmmakers to further their artistry and craft.

Renowned cinematic voices join the participants to provide inspiration, encouragement, and guidance. This year's mentorship is led by four distinguished Governors: producer Cassian Elwes (*Mudbound*), acting coach Miranda Harcourt, writer-director Patricia Rozema (*Mouthpiece*), and director Lulu Wang (*The Farewell*).

Filmmaker Lab has helped develop the careers of many creators, including Heather Young (*Murmur*), Jeff Barnaby (*Blood Quantum*), Semi Chellas (*American Woman*), Daniel Cockburn (*God's Nightmares*), and Renuka Jeyapalan (*Life Support*).

Filmmaker Lab is made possible through the support of Telefilm Canada, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, the Hollywood Foreign Press Association, and the Slaight Family Foundation. All female participants are generously supported by the RBC Female Creator Initiative.

Her first feature film, *Tigre*, had its World Premiere at TIFF in 2017. She is currently working on her second feature film, *The Cottage*, in which a middle-class family finds a body during their summer vacation.

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Charlie Tyrell

Charlie Tyrell is a Toronto-based filmmaker who works in a hybrid style that often combines live-action footage with stop-motion and 2D animation. His most recent documentary short, *My Dead Dad's Porno Tapes* (18), premiered at Sundance and won awards for best documentary short at the Canadian Screen Awards and SXSW. The film was also shortlisted for the 2019 Academy Awards and was selected for TIFF's Canada's Top Ten series.

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Maya Vitkova-Kosev

Maya Vitkova-Kosev's debut film, *Viktoria* (14), was the first Bulgarian feature in competition at Sundance. The film won 10 awards and was named one of the best films of 2016 by *The New Yorker*. Vitkova-Kosev is currently working on her second feature film, *Afrika*, which was developed at the Sundance Institute's Screenwriters Lab in 2018 and won the Krzysztof Kieslowski ScripTeast Award for the best Eastern European script at Cannes the same year.



Charles Williams

Charles Williams is a filmmaker born and raised in Victoria, Australia. His films have screened at over 150 festivals, including TIFF, Cannes, Clermont-Ferrand, SXSW, Telluride, Busan, and Melbourne. Karen Chapman

Karen Chapman is an award-winning filmmaker and an alum of Emily Carr University, the Banff Centre, and the CaribbeanTales Incubator, where she won best pitch. In 2018, Playback named her one of five filmmakers to watch and she completed the Canadian Film Centre's Directors' Lab. In 2019. her film Lessons Injustice (17) won Best Screenplay at the Women in Film & Television - Toronto Showcase and she received support from the Harold Greenberg Fund for her film Esequibo Rapture. Currently, Chapman is preparing to shoot her first feature film, Village Keeper, through Telefilm Canada's Talent Fund. She is also a participant in the 2019 TIFF Filmmaker Lab

Telefilm Canada's PITCH THIS!

One of the most anticipated and popular Industry events during the Festival, Telefilm Canada's PITCH THIS! returns for its 20th edition this year. Six teams of Canadian filmmakers have six minutes to pitch their feature-film idea to a live audience of industry experts and a jury of film professionals. The winning team takes home \$15,000 to help bring their project one step closer to production.

Pat Mills' *Don't Talk to Irene* (2017), Molly McGlynn's *Mary Goes Round* (2017), and Juan Andrés Arango Garcia's *X500* (2016) are just three examples of projects that were pitched at this event and went on to completion.

When a video of a six-year-old Romanian art prodigy goes viral on the internet, Mihai is sent to evaluate the girl's production — meaning he has to return to his home country for the first time in 30 years.

La Cercanía

Jorge Thielen Armand, Rodrigo Michelangeli

When Oana's father falls gravely ill in Venezuela, she breaks a 15-year exile in Canada to return home and visit her family one last time. But when she reconnects with Sofia, her estranged half-sister, Oana must commit to helping Sofia transition into adulthood amid the devastation caused by the economic crisis.

Neverman

Rodrigo Barriuso, Kyah Green

When dementia begins to progress, a transgender woman living with Alzheimer's at a transphobic nursing home finds herself mentally regressing to a time before her transition. As the complexities of gender identity resurface, her sense of self becomes an emotional battlefield that she will have to defend and uphold.

Paying For It

Kristy Neville, Natalie Urquhart, Sook-Yin Lee

After his longtime girlfriend begins sleeping with another man, a painfully introverted cartoonist begins sleeping with prostitutes, to the disapproval of his friends and former lover. *Paying For It* is an unconventional romantic comedy about a modern man's search for love and connection.

What Night Taught Her

Lauren Grant, Lisa Rideout, Ashley Cooper

An intimate look inside Canada's first sex workers' rights organization and the people who run it. Delving into the ups and downs of three outreach workers' lives, the film reveals the harsh realities of a job that can mean the difference between life or death.

Worst Team Ever

Kat Jayme, Michael Grand, James Brown

This 80- to 90-minute documentary tells the unfortunate story of what happened to the Vancouver Grizzlies, Canada's other NBA team — gone, but far from forgotten — who just might have been the worst professional sports franchise in history.

TIFF Writers' Studio

Our intensive one-week programme provides space for 10 Canadian screenwriters to consolidate their skills, exchange ideas, and discuss challenges in a collaborative and artistic environment. This year's candidates developed their screenplays with expert support from international script consultants:

Lindsay MacKay

Lindsay MacKay is a writer and director. Her debut feature, *Wet Bum* (14), premiered at TIFF and was a finalist in the American Zoetrope Screenplay Contest. She is a graduate of the directing program at the American Film Institute, where she won the Franklin J. Schaffner and Richard P. Rogers Spirit of Excellence Awards for her thesis film, *Clear Blue*, which also won the College Television Award. Her work has screened worldwide, including at TIFF, SXSW, AFI FEST, and Camerimage.

Mersea

Meredith, a mythical siren, was condemned to live in a rapidly aging human body after breaking the rules of the ocean by saving the life of a drowning child. When the boy returns 15 years later, the two are irresistibly drawn into a dangerous relationship.



Lina Roessler

Lina Roessler is a writer, director, and actor. She recently completed an MFA in film production at York University. Her short-film credits include *The Vow* (14), *Winter* (15), *Mustard Seed* (17), and *Shell of a Dead One*, which is currently in development. She is an alum of the 2017 TIFF Talent Lab and the 2018 edition of Berlinale Talents. Her feature screenplay, *The Rescuer*, was a quarterfinalist in the 2018 Slamdance Screenplay Competition. Roessler is now in pre-production for her first feature film, *Best Sellers*, starring Michael Caine and produced by Cassian Elwes.

The Rescuer

When her father and sister are killed by a drunk driver, nine-year-old Meredith thinks she caused their deaths via a magic spell. Seeking redemption, she "rescues" her next-door neighbour, who has epilepsy, and they head out of town on an adventure, trying to find a place for themselves in the world.



Katie McMillan

Katie McMillan is a Toronto-based screenwriter and director with an interest in social justice and the politics of representation. Her writing is informed by years of advocacy for female artists and artists with disabilities through her work with Women in View and Tangled Art + Disability. Her writing credits include the short films *Imposter* (16), *Worst. Day. EVER*. (16), and *Easy Girl* (16), which she co-directed. She is the winner of the 2017 Telefilm Canada's PITCH THIS! competition and is currently in development on three feature films.

You Are Here

When she discovers her fiancé cheating on her only weeks before their wedding, 30-year-old Kristin Kellerman makes the first spontaneous decision of her life and embarks on a 2,000-mile cycling odyssey to Tijuana to prove her independence.



Sharon Lewis

Sharon Lewis is a director working across television, film, and theatre. She is currently adapting her 1994 play *sistahs* into a feature film. Her first feature was the award-winning afrofuturist film *Brown Girl Begins* (17), which has been broadcast on HBO Canada and won awards internationally. Her short films *Ritch* (06) and *Chains* (09) have been sold and broadcast on such networks as BET, HBO, and CBC. She has directed over 100 hours of popular television, and is currently completing her feature doc for the CBC on the first Black gay conductor in Canada.

Sistahs

A woman dying from cancer tells her feuding sister, lover, and best friend to bring a special ingredient to a ceremonial meal that will either cure her or decide the future of her 12-year-old daughter.

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Sophie Goyette

Sophie Goyette is a writer and filmmaker. Her films have screened in competition at Sundance, Locarno, and TIFF and have earned a total of 13 prizes. Her credits include the short films *La ronde* (11) and *Le futur proche* (12), and the feature *Mes nuits feront écho* (17), which won the Bright Future Award at Rotterdam.

Les Lauréats

Shaken by her mother's recent death, high-achieving cello student Marie Léveillé-Wawrzyn looks back at her family line, marked by a violent past. At the crossroads of her destructive impulses and her artistic passion, Marie must learn to open up and fight to see human nature as it can be.



Melanie Jones

Melanie Jones is the writer and director of over a dozen award-winning short films that have played at festivals around the world. Her first feature, *FSM* (15), premiered at the Whistler Film Festival and had a theatrical release in Vancouver. She is an alum of Women in the Director's Chair, the From Our Dark Side incubator program, Crazy 8s, and the Reykjavik Talent Lab. Her most recent short film, *Shuttlecock* (18), won a Golden Sheaf Award and continues to garner nominations and awards on the festival circuit.

Switchback

A woman must tap her most primal instincts to keep herself and her boyfriend alive after he is seriously injured during an off-season hike. As difficult terrain, bad weather, and a persistent and menacing wolf continue to threaten their survival, she is forced to make a terrible choice that will change her forever.



Maria Camila Arias

Maria Camila Arias is a Colombian Canadian screenwriter. She wrote *Birds of Passage* (18), which played at TIFF and was shortlisted for Best Foreign Language Film at the 91st Academy Awards. She was the main writer and executive producer of the feature film *Candelaria* (17), which was awarded the GdA Director's Award at Venice Days. She also works as a story editor for several production companies and was part of the writing team for a Netflix fiction series. She teaches screenwriting at a university in Colombia.

Magnificent Desolation

In the 1970s, after the Apollo missions, a depressed astronaut goes to Bolivia's salt desert to search for a blinding light he saw from space. Instead, he meets a shaman. Their unlikely friendship allows the tormented man to finally let go of his anguish.



Geoff Redknap

Geoff Redknap's special makeup effects artistry has spanned projects from *The X-Files* (93–18) to *Deadpool* (16) and *Deadpool 2* (18). He attended the NSI's Drama Prize program, where he wrote and directed the awardwinning short film *The Auburn Hills Breakdown* (08). He also attended the NSI's Features First program with *Hangfire* (then known as *Heaven's Door*), which was a finalist in the 2012 Austin Film Festival Screenplay Competition. He wrote and directed the feature film *The Unseen* (16), which premiered at Fantasia in Montreal. He is represented by Zero Gravity Management.

Extraction

A company creates a technology that allows the rich to have traumatic experiences, extracted and processed by contracted surrogates. When one Ingester takes on a "bad" job, troubling visions drive him on a dangerous journey to rescue a mysterious woman and ultimately confront the company — which is known for making problems disappear.



Connor Gaston

Connor Gaston is an award-winning filmmaker from to Victoria, BC. His work has screened at top film festivals, including TIFF. His first feature film, *The Devout* (15), earned him five Leo Awards, took home the BC Emerging Filmmaker Award at the Vancouver International Film Festival, and was nominated for the 2017 John Dunning Discovery Award at the Canadian Screen Awards. His screenplays have trended on the Black List and earned finalist spots at the Nicholl Fellowship, which landed him American representation. He is a recent alumnus of the Canadian Film Centre and the TIFF Talent Lab.

Alice in the Wall

A grief-stricken filmmaker, obsessed with capturing truth on camera, constructs a small room inside her home in order to film the couple that's moving in — all in the hope of making a "real" movie.



Faisal Lutchmedial

Faisal Lutchmedial is currently a writer on the third season of the TV drama *Ransom* (2017–). He began his professional writing career in 2012 when he won the Writers Guild of Canada Bell Media Diverse Screenwriters Program. He also served as a story editor for the fourth season of *The Listener* (2009–14). He wrote, directed, and acted in the short *Useless Things* (09), which won the WGC English Script Prize at the Festival du nouveau cinéma in Montreal. He also wrote and directed the short drama *Mr. Crab* (12), which aired nationally on CBC's Short Film Faceoff.

Joanne Sarazen is a screenwriter, playwright, and alumna of the Canadian Film Centre's 2017 Writers' Lab. Her first feature-length screenplay, *Tammy's Always Dying*, makes its World Premiere at TIFF 2019. Produced by Jessica Adams and directed by Amy Jo Johnson, the film stars Felicity Huffman, Anastasia Phillips, Clark Johnson, and Lauren Holly. As a playwright, Sarazen's work has been produced in Montreal, Toronto, and Banff. She was the recipient of the MainLine Theatre's Next Stage Award, and has earned several nominations for her work in the Montreal Fringe Festivals.

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Tracey Deer

Tracey Deer is a Mohawk filmmaker. She served as co-creator, director, and co-showrunner on the acclaimed dramedy *Mohawk Girls* (10–17), which was nominated four years in a row at the Canadian Screen Awards. She has worked with the CBC, the NFB, and numerous independent production companies in both documentary and fiction. In 2016, she won the Birks Diamond Tribute Award at TIFF. She is an executive producer on the TV series *Anne with an E* (17–). She has multiple projects in development, including a documentary with the NFB about the practicalities of achieving reconciliation and forgiveness, and two features: *Beans* and *Inner City Girl*.



Meredith Vuchnich

Meredith Vuchnich is an award-winning screenwriter whose work spans genres and is celebrated for its richness of emotion, depth of character, and sense of humour. She co-wrote the feature-film screenplay *Beans*, which goes into production in August 2019. Her television credits include *Train 48* (03–05), *ReGenesis* (04–08), *Godiva's* (05–06), and *Remedy* (14–15). She has developed projects with CBC, CTV, Corus/Global, and YTV. She was nominated for a Gemini Award in 2008 for her work on *ReGenesis*. She is a graduate of the Canadian Film Centre's TV writing programme and has an MA in theatre from Northwestern University.
