Welcome note from Cameron Bailey, CEO, TIFF



Shasha Nakhai had a great year in 2022. *Scarborough*, her debut feature co-directed with Rich Williamson, swept the Canadian Screen Awards, winning eight prizes including Best Picture and Best Direction. This groundbreaking film is part of a cultural wave taking the energy and stories of an under-served Toronto suburb to the world.

Shasha previously had a short film named to Canada's Top Ten, selected by TIFF, in 2016. She was a part of TIFF's Talent Accelerator program in 2019, and won TIFF's Changemaker Award presented by The Shawn Mendes Foundation for *Scarborough* at the film's 2021 Festival premiere. *Scarborough* went on to have a successful theatrical release at TIFF Bell Lightbox and across the country on Film Circuit in 2022. As she's grown as an artist, TIFF has been there to support her.

Storytellers like Shasha kept us motivated through the tough years of the pandemic, and inspired us in 2022 as we assembled a new senior team to lead our efforts in bringing creators, audiences, and supporters back together.

Our 2022-24 Strategic Plan launched in January 2022 with four main goals: boosting our year-round audience engagement, planning for the film festival of the future, revitalizing TIFF Bell Lightbox, and building the thriving organization necessary to succeed in this work. By December 2022, we had already made significant progress towards each of these goals.

New, free Member access to Cinematheque screenings grew our Membership and increased year-round attendance. Our Under-25 Pass brought in a dynamic, younger audience, with 60% of our total audience in the 18-34 age range. We mapped out a new plan to revitalize the 3rd floor of the Lightbox, with work now underway. We did the necessary research to make our Festival an even better platform for the business of film. And we brought TIFF's first ever head of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion on board.

The goal was to re-engage audiences, artists, stakeholders, and staff in 2022. We're proud of what the team has accomplished.

SUMMER OF SEOUL

TIFF Cinematheque's major summer series in July and August show-cased New Korean Cinema auteurs and recent acclaimed films by emerging women filmmakers. The series launched with an opening night celebration of Korean food, art, live music, and a rare in-cinema screening of the first two episodes of the classic K-drama *Winter Sonata*. Comprising 15 feature films, the series included a spotlight on filmmaker Park Chan-wook's early work; Bora Kim's successful coming-of-age debut *House of Hummingbird*; Lee Chang-dong's acclaimed *Burning*; a panel discussion on the origins of the Korean Wave with University of Toronto professor Dr. Michelle Cho, film critic and podcaster Carolyn Hinds, and PhD student Grayson Lee; and an extended introduction of Hong Sang-soo's *Tale of Cinema*, with a book signing of his monograph on the film by author and New York Film Festival Artistic Director Dennis Lim.

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ASPECT RATIO: INDIGENOUS ACTORS BEYOND THE EXPECTED

JOAN MICKLIN SILVER: ONE MORE PROBLEM

In collaboration with critic and programmer Adam Piron, and shown during Indigenous Heritage Month, this programming explored what it means for Native American and Native Hawaiian performers to be in ethnically nondescript roles, as opposed to characters who are expected to explain or perform various interpretations of Indigeneity, or are relegated to secondary or bit roles. Highlights included Cherokee actor Wes Studi in Michael Mann's *Heat*, Kainai/Blackfeet/Nimiipuu actor Lily Gladstone's role in Kelly Reichardt's *Certain Women*, and Piron's video essay on the history of Indigenous performers in cinema.

This Cinematheque series championing the hidden gems of an under-acknowledged woman creator featured writer-director Joan Micklin Silver, who was a bankable art-house favourite throughout the '70s and '80s. Silver's films earned millions at the box office, garnering Academy Award and WGA nominations and launching the careers of icons such as Carol Kane and Jeff Goldblum. In addition to the film that solidified her legacy in the history of independent filmmaking, the self-released Yiddish masterpiece *Hester Street*, the series featured the famously re-released director's cut of *Chilly Scenes of Winter* and her crossover hit *Crossing Delancey*.



CRONENBERG: CRIMES OF THE PAST

Following its North American premiere, visionary Canadian filmmaker David Cronenberg's recent *Crimes of the Future* premiered at TIFF Bell Lightbox on June 3, setting the stage for this four-film TIFF Cinematheque series spotlighting Cronenberg's earlier work. The series featured screenings of *Videodrome* (1983), *Dead Ringers* (1988), *eXistenZ* (1999), and two screenings of *Crash* (1996). For an immersive experience into his body of work, several objects and props from the David Cronenberg permanent collection in TIFF's Film Reference Library were displayed to visitors in TIFF's public spaces. Some of the objects on display included the Meta Flesh Pod and Umby Cord from *eXistenZ*, Rosanna Arquette's full-body brace from *Crash*, surgical tools from *Dead Ringers*, and the Accumicon Spectacular Optometry International Helmet from *Videodrome*.



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CANADIAN FILM

TIFF continued to provide a platform for homegrown talent and stories year-round with the return of Canada's Top Ten in December 2022, and at the 2022 Toronto International Film Festival.

TIFF 2022 saw the debut features from Canadian filmmakers Miryam Charles, Chandler Levack, Luis De Filippis, Joseph Amenta, Kelly Fyffe-Marshall, and Gail Maurice. The Festival lineup was anchored by world premieres from Canada's most established filmmakers, including Clement Virgo, Stéphane Lafleur, Hubert Davis, and Anthony Shim's sophomore feature *Riceboy Sleeps*, which took home the Platform Prize and went on to win multiple awards at international festivals following TIFF 2022. These homegrown filmmakers thrilled audiences, drawing recognition on the festival circuit and picking up distribution along the way.



FILM PRESERVATION

The Film Reference Library (FRL) at TIFF continued to be the go-to free destination for film lovers. The FRL collection includes thousands of books, movies, research files, and scripts, plus an extensive archive from major industry players of Canadian cinema.



In 2022, the Film Reference Library focused its efforts on key film processing projects and expanding in-person offerings by:

- → Maintaining a rotating display of archival artifacts in high-visibility locations within TIFF Bell Lightbox to coincide with key programming dates, including the North American Premiere of *Crimes of the Future* by David Cronenberg and the *Make it Fashion* Cinematheque programme.
- → Supporting a growing demand for Canadian content through film loans both in Canada and internationally. TIFF Cinematheque screened 24 films from our TIFF Screening Collection, and we supported more than 24 international loans this year.
- → Working closely with TIFF Technical Production Services to resume the multi-year Film Acquisition Project, which involves the inspection, re-housing, and preservation of prints donated by Mongrel Media, eOne Entertainment, Criterion, and NBC Universal. This bolsters our growing caché of projection prints eligible for programming by the TIFF Cinematheque team, as well as fellow international archives.

In 2021, TIFF became a partner of the Telefilm Digitization Project, supporting the curation, digitization and preservation of seminal Canadian feature films. The project connects partner film organizations across Canada to complete the digitization of 10 to 12 films. In 2022, TIFF completed the digitization and screenings of Loyalties (1986) directed by Anne Wheeler, The TIFF Preludes (2001) by various directors, Tales From the Gimli Hospital (1988) directed by Guy Maddin, and Secret Ballot (2001) directed by Babak Payami. TIFF committed to using the remaining Telefilm funds to complete the digitization and screening of Mariages (2001), directed by Catherine Martin, in 2023.

In 2022, the FRL awarded Cléo Sallis-Parchet the **Jeffrey and Sandra Lyons Canadian Film Scholarship**. The goal of the scholarship is to encourage the development of academic contributions related to Canadian cinema through the use of the Film Reference Library collection.

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SHARE HER JOURNEY



Now a permanent TIFF initiative, Share Her Journey's cycle of impact supports women and non-binary creators at four key stages: inspiration, skills and network development, project development, and programming and amplification.

More than two-thirds (69%) of TIFF's 2022 Talent Development participants were women or non-binary, and 73% said the **skills and networking** support they received would propel their careers forward. These programmes helped **develop exciting new projects** from women creators, like Share Her Journey ambassador Carol Nguyen. Carol is developing her first feature film with the support of TIFF Talent Accelerator (generously supported by the RBC Women Creators Initiative) and TIFF Filmmaker Lab, after her last short, *Nanitic*, took TIFF 2022 by storm, nabbing both the IMDb Pro Short Cuts Share Her Journey Award and a coveted spot in Canada's Top Ten.

TIFF **amplified** the successes of women like Michelle Yeoh, winner of the Share Her Journey Groundbreaker Award presented by BVLGARI at the TIFF 2022 Tribute Gala, who went on to make history as the first Asian woman to win Best Actress at the 2023 Oscars.

TIFF continues to strive for gender-diverse lineups in our film **programming**, with 99 films at TIFF 2022 (and nearly half of the prize-winning films) directed or co-directed by women — that's 14% more than in 2017, the year TIFF launched Share Her Journey. To quote 2019 Tribute Award winner Meryl Streep, TIFF is "moving the needle by intention" thanks to our Share Her Journey donors and supporters.



Now in its second year, TIFF's Every Story campaign is promoting equity, diversity, inclusion, and belonging in film with three key strategies: by **challenging the status quo, celebrating diversity,** and **creating opportunities** for equity-deserving creators. To transform the way we see the world through film, every story needs to be told. Thanks to the passion and commitment of Every Story supporters, we're getting there — one story at a time.

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VIOLA DESMOND CINEMA

On November 8, 2022 — 76 years after Viola Desmond challenged anti-Black racism by refusing to leave the segregated "whites-only" section of the Roseland Theatre in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia — TIFF launched the Viola Desmond Cinema campaign.



TIFF is naming its largest cinema the Viola Desmond Cinema, in honour of Viola's courage and her sister Wanda Robson's advocacy to commemorate her legacy. The Viola Desmond Cinema will serve as a reminder of the history of discrimination in film in Canada, the progress we have made thanks to women like Viola and Wanda, and the work that remains to be done. Proceeds from the five-year, \$2-million Viola Desmond Cinema campaign will support a suite of annual initiatives to:

Support Black women in film through special programming and talks by showcasing films and creators and by providing access to industry, media, and talent development opportunities;

Boost audience diversification by offering community and youth-focused film programming at no cost; and

Commemorate Viola's trailblazing role in making space for Black voices through storytelling, programming, activations, and displays.

Working closely with TIFF donors and community partners, TIFF intends not only to commemorate Viola and Wanda, but to ensure that the programming and audiences at the new Viola Desmond Cinema and throughout TIFF Bell Lightbox reflect their shared legacy.

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TALKS, SUBSCRIPTIONS, & SPECIAL EVENTS

The year 2022 marked a successful return to in-person presentations of advance screenings and subscription series at TIFF Bell Lightbox.

Audiences were treated to special screenings of highly anticipated new films such as Sarah Polley's *Women Talking*, as well as the HBO series *Winning Time* and *House of the Dragon*.

In Conversation With... guests included Academy Award-winning costume designer Ruth E. Carter; Grammy Award-winning singer, songwriter, and director Taylor Swift; Academy Award-winning actors Viola Davis and Eddie Redmayne; award-winning filmmakers Gina Prince-Bythewood, Damien Chazelle, and Sarah Polley; and Korean superstars Lee Jung-jae and Jung Woo-sung.

Reel Talk was successfully transformed into a hybrid series, with subscribers joining us in-person and on digital TIFF Bell Lightbox for screenings of Best International Picture contenders such as *Utama* and *Last Film Show*, while Secret Movie Club has become a coveted launch pad for new independent films such as *Everything Everywhere All at Once*, *After Yang*, and *Bones and All*.

Despite the closure of cinemas in January and February, TIFF's 2022 New Releases had an exceptionally strong return to cinema, with a 3.3% increase in gross revenue over the same September through December period in 2019.

The Tamil film **Ponniyin Selvan: I** was TIFF's most notable New Release in 2022 and TIFF's third highest-grossing New Release film in the building's history, with a gross of more than \$270,000 during its eight-week run.

In the lead-up to the Academy Awards®, TIFF Bell Lightbox gave Toronto audiences a chance to see all 2023 Academy Award International Feature Film nominees on the big screen.

Throughout the year, TIFF welcomed more than 50 in-cinema guests to talk to audiences about their films, including Baz Luhrmann, Austin Butler, and Olivia DeJonge for *Elvis*; Sarah Polley, Sheila McCarthy, Luc Montpellier, and Chris Donaldson for *Women Talking*; Shasha Nakhai, Rich Williamson, and Catherine Hernandez for *Scarborough*; Terence Davies for *Benediction*; Ali Abbasi for *Holy Spider*; Chase Joynt for *Framing Agnes*; and Joanna Hogg for *The Eternal Daughter*.

In 2022, TIFF cultivated relationships with 50 community partners to increase access to the Festival and welcome new audiences at TIFF Bell Lightbox. TIFF distributed 1,000 tickets to equity-deserving communities through the Reel Magic program supported by Sun Life. TIFF also launched a new access program, Visa Sharing the Screen, which welcomed individuals from 2SLGBTQ+ communities to the World Premiere of *Bros* and hosted Sanaa Lathan for an intimate talk with BIPOC creators.

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Viola Desmond Day brought TIFF and several partners together to animate the building with a full day of programming inspired by Viola Desmond and Wanda Robson's legacy, including artist activations by Black Artists' Network in Dialogue (BAND) and Vintage Black Canada, a screening of *When Morning Comes*, and a panel featuring representatives from the Black Screen Office, Black Women Film! Canada, and OYA Black Arts Coalition.

The walkable Festival footprint, with the addition of the Royal Alexandra Theatre, highlighted a commitment to an accessible and sustainable film going experience. Guests and audiences had a front-row seat to the in-person Festival glamour with enhanced red carpets; Festival Street, which turned King Street into a buzz of interactive film activations; live music performances and outdoor film screenings; and stars from major World Premieres such as Steven Spielberg's *The* Fabelmans, marking the director's first TIFF appearance and ultimately earning the People's Choice Award along with critical acclaim.

TIFF NEXT WAVE

Returning for its 11th edition, the 2022 TIFF Next Wave Film Festival welcomed young audiences back to celebrate the future of cinema.

The three-day festival kicked off with the Opening Night Battle of the Scores competition, a live showdown of young film and music talent with audiences coming out to cheer on their favourite bands. More than 250 people filled the cinema for the Opening Night Film, Slash/ Back from Igaluit-raised director Nyla Innuksuk. With 10 Official Selection films, the energy and excitement of Opening Night continued all weekend long. The festival also featured a special In Conversation With... Maitreyi Ramakrishnan, a Nostalgia Ultra-themed movie marathon with four throwback favourite films, a full-day of industry workshops and talks tailored exclusively for young creators, and a lineup of 11 short films made by young and emerging filmmakers from across Canada.

With a mandate to elevate young voices in film, and in partnership with The Shawn Mendes Foundation, the Next Wave Committee selected the recipient of the Changemaker Award at the 2022 Toronto International Film Festival. The award was presented to Something You Said Last Night, directed by Luis De Filippis.

Since its inception in 2018, the TIFF Media Inclusion Initiative has worked to achieve both a more balanced, equitable, and diverse press corps, and to remove the tangible and intangible barriers that challenge under-represented press wishing to cover the Toronto International Film Festival.

This initiative provides additional support and specialized programming for new members of the press identifying as under-represented. In 2022, 62 Members of the accredited media corps participated in the Media Inclusion Initiative. Countries represented by participants included Canada, United States, United Kingdom, Norway, Mexico, Australia. Sweden. India. and Iran.

In 2022, TIFF regrew the Membership community and welcomed our most loyal audience back to cinemas after more than two long years away. At the heart of this growth was a goal to make TIFF Membership more accessible to a wider audience, and ultimately encourage more film lovers to grow their passion at TIFF Bell Lightbox. TIFF Members are the best film community in the world.

TIFF made tickets to Cinematheque screenings free for Members for the first time in its 33-year history. With this new offering, TIFF further opened up access for Toronto's film community to enjoy its ambitious and thought-provoking programming of essentials, retrospectives, regional spotlights, new restorations, rare archival prints, and more.

Some of other exciting Membership initiatives included providing an exceptional in-person Festival experience; removing barriers to participation through the Under-25 Free Pass and community outreach; and numerous supporter-exclusive events, which delivered the best of the TIFF experience year-round, including red-carpet premieres of New Releases such as *Elvis* and *Crimes of the Future*.

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SPACES

TIFF launched a new Public Spaces portfolio dedicated to dynamically boosting the TIFF Bell Lightbox year-round environment through innovative programming partnerships, installations, and artist activations that animate the building and attract new audiences. TIFF presented five free public art exhibitions in the atrium, including partnerships with the Asian Arts and Culture Trust, Black Artists' Network in Dialogue (BAND), and the Toronto Palestine Film Festival.

City of Toronto events like Doors Open and Nuit Blanche brought new audiences to the building for guided tours and an animation/AR installation (*Between a Rock and a Hard Place* by Haneen Dalla-Ali), respectively. TIFF Cinematheque's Summer of Seoul jumped off the screen with artist activations in the atrium, including a mural by Jieun Kim (a.k.a. June) and a live improvisational set by electronic musician and DJ Korea Town Acid. We closed out the year with a runway show, party, and art exhibit co-created with Fashion Art Toronto to kick off TIFF's *Make it Fashion* series, celebrating BIPOC and 2SLGBTQ+ designers who draw inspiration from genre, performance, and cinema.

In 2022, TIFF CEO Cameron Bailey announced that seasoned industry executives Beth Janson and Anita Lee had been appointed to the roles of Chief Operating Officer and Chief Programming Officer, respectively. As Chief Operating Officer, Janson has been responsible for developing and implementing operational plans and key enterprise-wide initiatives to ensure the sustainability and long-term success of TIFF.

As TIFF's Chief Programming Officer, Lee serves as TIFF's primary programming strategist and is responsible for devising and delivering an audience-focused, strategically cohesive, and financially sustainable programming framework in line with TIFF's mission and strategy.

As the Vice President of People & Culture, John-Greenwood oversees People & Culture components of TIFF's three-year strategic plan and goals.

As the Vice President of Partnerships, Burks is responsible for driving financial sustainability; competitive advantage; and expansion in Canadian and global markets through business development, partnerships, and revenue strategy.

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TALENT DEVELOPMENT & INDUSTRY INITIATIVES

TIFF Industry brought programming, talent development, and business opportunities for the global film industry back to an in-person format in 2022. We welcomed 4,400+ professionals year-round, as well as during the Festival, to our talks and business activities, while an additional 100 TIFF Talent Development participants and alumni took part in our highly impactful and specialized labs, residencies, accelerator programmes, and alumni sessions.

The Micki Moore Resident alumnae received tailored, one-on-one mentorship on their feature project from a noted Canadian producer.

The TIFF-NBCUniversal Development Mentorships and Alumni DEI Focus Group

As part of a partnership with NBCU, a select group of TIFF Talent alumni participated in a DEI focus group, whose findings were shared internally and with NBCU, and took part in one-on-one meetings with NBCU development executives.

The TIFF-Monterrey Filmmaker Lab Initiative

As part of a partnership with Tecnológico de Monterrey in Mexico, TIFF Industry brought the Filmmaker Lab programme to a group of young filmmakers alongside two TIFF Talent alumni.

Children of Men Script-to-Screen Workshop LED BY Christina Lazaridi

At this in-depth, in-cinema screenwriting workshop, Academy Award—nominated screenwriter Christina Lazaridi guided the participants through the evolution of an early script draft to a finished film, using the 2006 dystopian thriller *Children of Men* by Alfonso Cuarón as a case study.

Our collective programming included 98 events with a total of 223 guest speakers, moderators, and mentors. Some notable guests included Park Chan-wook, Cliff Curtis, Clea DuVall, Werner Herzog, Deepa Mehta, Cristian Mungiu, Tyler Perry, Felicia Pride, S.S. Rajamouli, Hillary Rodham Clinton, Bird Runningwater, Clement Virgo, and Kevin Williamson. Pivotal conversations took place on narrative sovereignty, filming under wartime conditions, the future of exhibition, the importance of new voices in comedy, and pathways from shorts to features.

The CHANEL Women Writers' Network continued its year-round digital mentorship talks and peer-to-peer script feedback sessions for a second year in 2022, adding another four members upon their completion of Writers' Studio in March, with the stakeholders at CHANEL providing the end-of-year feedback that the network is being noted as a successful model for talent development initiatives by the CHANEL global team.

Writers' Studio

A collaborative five-day intensive screenwriting lab for eight Canadian and international screenwriters to consolidate skills, exchange ideas, and develop scripts.

Filmmaker Lab

A five-day professional development experience during the Festival for 20 Canadian and international filmmakers, with peer-to-peer and professional mentorship and guest speaker sessions with internationally acclaimed filmmakers.

Rising Stars

A showcase of new Canadian and international acting talent, with mentorship and networking opportunities for the eight participants over three days, as well as during the Festival.

Two new one-day programmes were also launched at the 2022 Festival



Series Accelerator

A one-day mentorship intensive, presented by Canada Media Fund, offering tailored training for four Canadian series-creator teams from underrepresented communities to refine their pitches and develop a business plan for their projects.

The CHANEL Women Writers' Network Micro Talent Summit

A one-day professional development opportunity in which the four women and non-binary participants of that year's Writers' Studio receive mentorship and guidance from leading industry experts.

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For all Talent Development programmes, TIFF has maintained its commitment to ensuring at least 50% of selected participants are women or non-binary creators, and at least 50% are BIPOC creators.

Two other year-round Talent Development programmes taking place during the year were aimed at Canadian feature-film screenwriters



The Micki Moore Residency (2018–2022), which provides a monetary award, office space in TIFF Bell Lightbox, and professional script consulting and mentorship to a woman Canadian screenwriter.

The TIFF-CBC Films Screenwriter Award (2017–present), which provides a monetary award, as well as professional script consulting and mentorship, to a Canadian screenwriter who is from an equity-deserving community, is a woman, and/or is a person with a disability.

The fellowships, awards, and mentorship provided to Talent Development participants have been instrumental in the development of each of their careers and feature film projects. Tracey Deer and Meredith Vuchnich's project, Beans, directed by Deer, which won the TIFF–CBC Films Screenwriter Award in 2019, had its world premiere at the 2020 Toronto International Film Festival; and Molly McGlynn's project, Bloody Hell, also directed by McGlynn, which was selected for the Micki Moore Residency in 2020, had its world premiere at the 2023 SXSW Film & TV Festival.

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Our platform's ability to engage with audiences 365 days a year resonated with our valued group of 65 corporate and strategic partners. Looking ahead, we'll aim to diversify our partnership portfolio across regions and industries. We believe this will bring even greater financial sustainability to TIFF, create unique competitive advantages, and improve our already best-in-class service to partners.


David Perlmutter

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
