WELCOME LETTER

2018 was a year of great change. With streaming platforms on the rise, the ever-increasing quality of primetime television, and the evolutionary state of the traditional cinema experience, audiences had more choice than ever. Yet, there remains an appetite for dynamic storytelling, diverse perspectives, and transformative experiences. With these myriad options available to our audiences, TIFF recognizes the opportunity to explore new ways of engaging with art and culture.

In the first year of our five-year strategic plan, we turned our focus towards growing our community — targeting more people, more often, and with more impact. We expanded our focus to include under-represented creators, artists, and media, and these initiatives have become a driving force, revealing a windfall of incredible new talent, voices, and cinematic successes.

Our Festival remains an essential destination where audiences, media, and industry find the best films of the year, discover new directions in cinema, and learn about the art and business of film. This year's 43rd edition showcased 138 major world premieres, marked the revitalization of the Gala Presentation programme through the superb transformation of the Roy Thomson Hall venue, and represented an incredible 83 countries throughout the lineup.

More than 20,000 people united in person and online for our Share Her Journey Rally on Festival Street, signalling growing support for our five-year campaign that champions women in front of and behind the camera. Our diversity and inclusion efforts also culminated in TIFF's inaugural Media Inclusion Initiative, aimed at diversifying our accredited media and re-examining how the voices empowered to speak about film shape the greater industry.

We bid farewell to Piers Handling after 36 outstanding years at TIFF — 25 of those as Director and CEO. During this time, our organization has become an institution of international renown, and the path Piers has carved will continue to support and embolden Canadian and international filmmakers.



Comfort programme has brought inclusive art-making workshops, screenings, and filmmaker conversations to hospitals and peer-run groups with a focus on mental health. The programme engages young and emerging creators as guests and gives audiences a platform to connect with artists in an intimate setting, to gain insight into their work, and to see themselves as artists.

Filmmaker Sofia Bohdanowicz (*Maison du bonheur, Veslemøy's* Song) led a series of art-making workshops at several of our partner hospitals, where participants spliced dried leaves and flowers directly onto 35mm film to create a short film that magnifies and celebrates the beauty of small, everyday objects.

Contributing more than 92,000 service hours this year, TIFF Volunteers are champions of our mission to transform the way people see the world through film. We salute their generosity and steadfast support year-round at TIFF Bell Lightbox, at the TIFF Next Wave Film Festival, and, of course, during the Festival.

Our Seniors' Film Fridays programme, funded in part by the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Program, establishes new partners within the community by hosting off-site and in-house screenings. This year, we expanded our programme by doubling the number of off-site screenings and welcoming more community partners. Seniors' Film Fridays supports TIFF's commitment to redressing barriers that individuals may face when accessing our year-round programming at TIFF Bell Lightbox. Facilitated by Volunteer Docents, it gives Volunteers the opportunity to take an active role in creating one-of-a-kind experiences for their peers through our programming, allowing them to see first-hand how special their contributions are to the organization.



2018 was the inaugural year of our Media Inclusion Initiative, which supported almost 200 underrepresented journalists in covering the Festival as accredited media. Research shows the majority of film critics are white men, with low representation among people of colour, women, members of the LGBTQ+ community, and people needing accessibility support. The support we were able to offer meant that there were more diverse critics watching and reviewing films.

We know TIFF functions as only one piece of a complex ecosystem and a changing media landscape. Access is the first step to bringing new voices to the table. We thank and acknowledge our generous donors and industry partners who helped to make this initiative a reality, including TIFF's Share Her Journey campaign, Annapurna Pictures, Aurora, Netflix, Rotten Tomatoes, Twentieth Century Fox, Willaim Morris Endeavor, and the RBC Female Creators Initiative.

This was also the first year we asked journalists to volunteer information about how they identify, to ensure we can measure our progress. This data will provide a strong foundation to work from in years to come and will play a critical role in advancing our commitment to diversity and inclusion.

2018 was a banner year for Canadian film. After debuting at the Festival. ANTHROPOCENE: The Human Epoch, the latest work from Jennifer Baichwal, Edward Burtynsky, and Nick de Pencier, went on to become one of TIFF's most successful New Releases. screening at TIFF Bell Lightbox for several months. The film also won the Toronto Film Critics Association's Rogers Best Canadian Film Award.

Other highlights included soldout screenings of two titles in TIFF Cinematheque's Canadian Open Vault programme: the Toronto premiere of *Boozecan*, Nicholas Campbell's 1994 debut about underground Toronto nightlife, and Strange Machines: The Films of Phillip Barker, with Atom Egoyan and David Thewlis in attendance.

MDFF and Cinema Scope again partnered with TIFF for another busy year of screenings by independent Canadian filmmakers, offering up a slate that included Maison du bonheur by Toronto Film Critics Association nominee Sofia Bohdanowicz.

In the Canadian features lineup at TIFF. 40% of the titles were directed or co-directed by women - including Sgaawaay K'uuna (Edge of the Knife), the first feature shot in the endangered Haida language. The lineup also featured a number of genre titles, such as Adam Stein and Zach Lipovsky's Freaks, a micro-budget fantasy film that was picked up by American distributor Well Go.

The stellar talent that Canadian filmmakers and projects drew from abroad are a clear indication that the industry is thriving. Among the high-profile guests appearing onscreen and on stage were Kyle MacLachlan and Maria Bello (Keith Behrman's Giant Little Ones), Alexander Skarsgård, Jesse Eisenberg, and Salma Hayek (Kim Nguyen's The Hummingbird Project), and Kit Harington, Thandie Newton, and Susan Sarandon (Xavier Dolan's The Death and Life of John F. Donovan).

2018 fut une année charnière pour le cinéma canadien. Après sa première au festival. ANTHROPOCÈNE : L'époque humaine, la dernière œuvre de Jennifer Baichwal, Edward Burtynsky et Nick de Pencier, est devenue l'une des nouveautés les plus populaires présentées par le TIFF au TIFF Bell Lightbox pendant plusieurs mois. Le film a aussi remporté le Prix Rogers du Meilleur film canadien présenté par l'Association des critiques de films de Toronto.

Parmi les moments culminants, mentionnons aussi les projections à guichets fermés de deux titres de la série « Canadian Open Vault » de la Cinémathèque du TIFF : la première à Toronto de *Boozecan* (1994), premier film de Nicholas Campbell portant sur la vie nocturne underground torontoise; et Strange Machines : The Films of Phillip Barker, en présence d'Atom Egoyan et David Thewlis.

MDFF et Cinema Scope ont à nouveau fait équipe avec le TIFF pour offrir une semaine chargée de projections de films créés par des cinéastes canadien.ne.s indépendant.e.s. L'éventail d'œuvres comprenait Maison du bonheur de Sofia Bohdanowicz, mise en nomination par l'Association des critiques de films de Toronto.

Parmi les longs métrages canadiens présentés au TIFF, 40 % des titres ont été réalisés ou coréalisés par des femmes, y compris Sgaawaay K'uuna (Edge of the Knife), le premier long métrage tourné en haïda, une langue menacée. Maintaining its position as the largest publicly attended film festival, the Toronto International Film Festival boasted 254 features and 88 short films from over 80 countries in its 2018 edition, and welcomed over 800 guests. Audiences were dazzled by stars on the red carpet, discovered the next generation of director heavyweights, and were exposed to the vast forms of the filmmaking craft.

The Festival lineup comprised 35% female filmmakers, with nearly half of the selection featuring a female lead.

> Garnering critical acclaim after its world premiere at TIFF, Peter Farrelly's *Green Book* was chosen as this year's Grolsch People's Choice Award winner, as voted by Festival audience members. And, in addition to the remarkable content inside the theatres, King Street was transformed into a pedestrian promenade with interactive film and partner activations, live music, and nightly film screenings.

Diverse protagonists and captivating narratives were at the heart of the 21st and final edition of the TIFF Kids International Film Festival. Bringing global stories to TIFF's youngest film lovers, this year's selection was the most inclusive to date, with over 100 films from over 40 countries that explored themes of resilience, self-discovery, and belonging. The festival opened with the beautifully animated *White Fang*, directed by Academy Award-winning TIFF Kids alumnus Alexandre Espigares, and closed with Festival alumna Dorothée van den Berghe's new film Rosie & Moussa. We also celebrated the 30th anniversary of Who Framed Roger Rabbit with a special pancake-and-waffles breakfast, and we hosted a variety of free, hands-on family-friendly activities, including our largest-ever green screen!

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The inaugual Micki Moore Residency for female Canadian feature-film screenwriters was awarded to Nikki Saltz. One of the challenges of being an emerging female screenwriter is finding time to work on scripts. By participating in this 10-week programme, Saltz is able to dedicate time to her writing, access mentorship from TIFF's programming teams and expert guests, and network with industry peers at exclusive events.

The Heggie Family Speaker Series also presented a number of sessions to spark conversation around the importance of gender equity in the industry, including Dr. Stacy L. Smith's keynote at the TIFF Industry Conference on diversity in film criticism. With the support of the RBC Female Creator Initiative, we also launched the Producer Accelerator programme.




Thanks to the support of a generous donor, American Sign Language (ASL) translation was made available for our Share Her Journey Rally and our In Conversation With... events, and was available on-demand for our Industry programming. Live closed-captioning was also available for our Festival press conferences on the TIFF Talks YouTube channel.

Assisted Listening is available in-cinema for all live and programmed sound in these venues: TIFF Bell Lightbox, Ryerson University, the Elgin and Winter Garden Theatre Centre, Roy Thomson Hall, the Visa Screening Room at the Princess of Wales Theatre, the Art Gallery of Ontario, and the Glenn Gould Studio.

TIFF has also actively encouraged filmmakers to provide accessible formats of their films where possible.

As a result, more audience members will be engaged, entertained, and empowered by the stories TIFF brings to the screen in 2019. We will continue this journey with key partners, whom we would like to thank for their support and guidance.







Cinema is an art form with endless possibilities. Our curatorial choices are based on a deep respect for, and profound belief in, the medium, its creators, and its viewers. Nothing inspires us more than creating a space where audiences can experience, enjoy, and discuss the best world and Canadian cinema, in the most engaging presentations possible.

In 2018, Theatrical Programming proudly presented 85 New Releases. Of these films, 52% were foreign-language titles, 15% were Canadian, 32% were directed by women, 22% were offered with closed-captioning, and 19% were offered with descriptive sound.

Highlights included: an exclusive world-premiere run of Alfonso Cuarón's ROMA in 70mm; the national exclusive of ROMA in 4K Dolby Atmos; *Phantom Thread* in 70mm; and 2001: A Space Odyssey in 70mm. Jennifer Baichwal, Nicholas de Pencier, and Edward Burtynsky's ANTHROPOCENE: The Human Epoch was also an enormous success.

This year, 28 New Release guest events were held, reaching an audience of more than 6, 700. Highlights included Jeanne Beker on The Gospel According to André, Debra Granik on Leave No Trace, and Alfonso Cuarón on ROMA.

ARTISTIC EXCELLENCE

RADICAL EMPATHY:

THE FILMS OF AGNÈS VARDA

Programmed by the editorial board of the Toronto-based feminist film publication *cléo journal*, TIFF presented a comprehensive retrospective on the legendary Left Bank filmmaker, celebrating the director's singularly empathic auteurist vision, DIY ethos, and inventive documentary–narrative hybrid style.

Building on and contextualizing the success of her TIFF 2017 Official Selection Faces Places, the series elevated Varda's invaluable contributions within often male-dominated cinematic landscapes. Several screenings featured introductions and onstage conversations with members of the cléo team and other craft-focused women in the Toronto film industry, including Le Bonheur (1965) with director Sofia Bohdanowicz, Vagabond (1985) with director Lina Rodriguez, and Faces Places with cléo founding editor Kiva Reardon.

BERGMAN 100:

THE INGMAR BERGMAN CENTENARY

TIFF participated in the worldwide centenary celebration of the revered Swedish master with this retrospective packed with classics. rarities, and recent restorations. A smash hit in London and New York before landing in Toronto, this exhaustive overview of Bergman's cinema featured 46 of his films including dozens of rare, archival 35mm prints — ranging from his most renowned titles, like *Cries* and Whispers (1972) and Wild Strawberries (1957) to his largely underseen and underappreciated earlier works.

The retrospective included weeklong theatrical runs of his widely influential films The Seventh Seal (1957) and Persona (1966), both screening from 35mm prints courtesy of the TIFF Film Reference Library's own collection. The series also featured special guest appearances, including an introduction to Shame (1968) by key Bergman collaborator Liv Ullmann — who also joined us for a rousing In Conversation With... event and a small retrospective of her own directorial work - an inviting lecture and recital by scholar and classical pianist Anyssa Neumann, and a lecture by writer, programmer, and "persona swap" theorist Miriam Bale.

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CLOSE ENCOUNTERS:

THE CINEMA OF STEVEN SPIELBERG

This holiday season, TIFF Cinematheque presented its firstever retrospective on the celebrated filmmaker who redefined American popular cinema. *Close Encounters:* The Cinema of Steven Spielberg showcased the many classics that cemented the director's status as a living legend, including Jaws (1975), Close Encounters of the Third Kind (1977), E.T.: The Extra-Terrestrial (1982), and Jurassic Park (1993).

The series also provided audiences with a rare opportunity to experience a marathon presentation of Spielberg's beloved Indiana Jones films, and highlighted films that Spielberg produced as well as inspired, including audience favourites Poltergeist (1982), Back to the Future (1985), and The Goonies (1985).

SUMMER IN JAPAN

In partnership with The Japan Foundation, TIFF Cinematheque continued its tradition of presenting films from abroad with *Summer in Japan*. The series saw incredible success with sold-out presentations of films from some of Japan's most celebrated auteurs, such as Kenji Mizoguchi, Yasujiro Ozu, Akira Kurosawa, and Mikio Naruse. The programme also highlighted the work of lesser-known filmmakers whose talents deserve greater renown, among them Yuzo Kawashima and Yasuzo Masumura.

FUNNY GIRL:

THE FILMS OF ELAINE MAY


This retrospective devoted to multi-talented writer, actor, and director Elaine May was the first ever in Toronto. Having garnered fame early on in her career through her comedic pairing with future director Mike Nichols, May would go on to be one of a handful of women working in Hollywood as a writer and director in the 1970s, while facing considerable challenges from within and outside the studio system. This comprehensive retrospective included her four directorial efforts. as well as several films that she worked on as a screenwriter.

Higher Learning aims to create a bridge to the film industry for emerging creators. This year we partnered with Black Youth Pathway 2 Industry and facilitated four days of intensive learning and networkbuilding opportunities for Black youth looking to build a career in the industry. Participants engaged with screenings and sessions related to cataloguing audio-visual materials, visual research, and storytelling.

We also partnered with Sheridan College to organize a two-day conference, Next Gen: Catalyst for Change in Canadian Storytelling, which explored how best to support the next generation of Canadian storytellers. Overall, 330 young creators and educators participated in sessions about diverse and authentic storytelling. breaking into the creative screen industries, inclusive film sets, and media education.





The seventh annual TIFF Next Wave Festival welcomed under-25s to free screenings of old favourites like Bring It On (2000) and Paris is Burning (1991), as well as newer releases such as Thoroughbreds (2016) and Love, Simon (2017). The action-packed weekend included an exclusive In Conversation With... Amandla Stenberg; the return of the Young Creators Co-Lab, a full day of programming uniquely tailored to youth interested in exploring the world of film and filmmaking; the 24-Hour Film Challenge; and the always rocking Battle of the Scores competition. The festival is curated by the TIFF Next Wave Committee, a voluntary advisory team made up of 12 young people from high schools across the Greater Toronto Area who are dedicated to bringing quality film programming and film-related events to young film lovers across the city.

The Film Reference Library (FRL) is a research destination whose collections saw 3.600+ lovers and creators of cinema this year. The Library acquires and catalogues an extensive collection of research and archival resources that are available for free to the public, either via tiff.net/library or in person at **TIFF Bell Lightbox.**

To preserve and increase access to Festival history, Library staff catalogued and digitized 14,878 colour photographic slides representing TIFF red carpets and special events from 1982 to 1998.

This year, the FRL acquired archival materials from Piers Handling, Charlotte Mickie, Triptych Media, and Rob Brooks. We also catalogued 11 Special Collections, including a new collection from Toronto experimental filmmaker Mike Hoolboom, and received accruals from Richard Kerr, Atom Egoyan, and David Cronenberg.

Annual events to highlight collections and share our love of Canadian cinema heritage included: three Wiki Edit-A-Thons inviting patrons to create or expand Wikipedia entries on Canadian cinema; Culture Days; and Doors Open Toronto, which had 731 visitors in 2018.
