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MESSAGE FROM THE UCI PRESIDENT

2026 will mark the return of the UCI Road World Championships – the flagship annual sporting event of the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI) – to the American continent, 11 years after they were held in Richmond, in the United States, and 23 years after their last appearance in Canada, in Hamilton.

It is worth remembering that Montréal has previously hosted the UCI Road World Championships. In 1974, the city welcomed the first edition of the event to take place outside Europe, when Belgium's Eddy Merckx and France's Geneviève Gambillon claimed victory in the road races.

It is a great pleasure for both the UCI and the global cycling community to return to a Canadian metropolis that has, over the years, established itself as a prominent destination for international cycling. 

GENERAL MAP






MEN ELITE ROAD RACE

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HOW TO REACH MONTRÉAL, CANADA



BY PLANE

You'll certainly appreciate that YUL Montréal-Trudeau International Airport is located just 12 miles (20 km) from downtown. Upon arrival, you'll find everything you need, including tourist information and various options for making your way to the heart of the city: car rentals, limousine, taxi service and Uber, as well as airport shuttles.

The 747 Express bus operates 24/7/365 and will get you to one of the nine downtown stops in 40 to 60 minutes (depending on traffic).



BY TRAIN

The VIA Rail network connects many major cities to Montréal, and it is by far the easiest way to access downtown. You can choose from 17 daily departures from the Gare centrale, which also gives you access to the Bonaventure metro station, taxi, car sharing, bus, BIXI bike rentals and the Underground Pedestrian Network. You can bring your bike on certain VIA Rail trains too. If you are coming from the United States, the Amtrak trains usually offer daily departures from many American cities to downtown Montréal.



BY CAR

Coming to Montréal by car is made easier by the various highways and bridges leading right into the city centre. Did you know that Montréal is an island and it's just 75 kilometres (46 miles) from the U.S. Border and right on the Trans-Canada Highway? Depending on your point of origin, you may take one of the major bridges—Champlain, Jacques-Cartier or Victoria—or the Louis-Hippolyte-La Fontaine bridge-tunnel to head downtown. Canada uses the metric system, so speeds are indicated in kilometres (100 km/h = 62 mph) and gas is sold in litres (3 3/4 litres = 1 US gallon). Keep in mind that you can't turn right on red in Montréal or use a hand-held cell phone while driving.



BY BUS

If you are planning a trip by bus, rest assured that many American and Canadian operators come to Montréal. You will arrive directly downtown at the Montréal Bus Central Station, which is also connected to the Underground Pedestrian Network via the Berri-UQAM metro station.

GETTING AROUND MONTRÉAL WITH EASE

In Montréal, getting from one place to another is simple and efficient with many different modes of transportation at your disposal. Most attractions, hotels, meeting spots and sports venues are located centrally and in close proximity to transportation, making walking, biking or using public transit extra convenient.

A LITTLE PLANNING GOES A LONG WAY

For a seamless Montréal experience, you can plan ahead by checking the [Mobility Montréal website](#). Mobility Montréal is a one-stop shop that not only provides detailed info regarding road closures and construction, but is also your portal for getting information about using the subway (or the metro, as it's called in Montréal), taking the bus, light rail transport (the [REM](#)), car-sharing, [BIXI bike](#) rentals and more.

BY PUBLIC TRANSPORT

The [STM](#) (Société de transport de Montréal) is the city's public transit agency, offering a safe, clean and dependable network. The metro (subway) system is clean, safe and fast, with just four lines connecting the downtown centre to most of Montréal's many attractions, shopping areas, entertainment districts, sports facilities, major tourist sites, bus stops and train stations. The metro operates daily from 5:30 a.m. to 1:00 a.m. (1:30 a.m. on Saturdays), with an average wait time of eight minutes and three minutes during rush hour. Connecting buses run frequently and often late into the night.

Of particular note to visitors, the STM's handy and inexpensive [747 bus](#) makes frequent trips between YUL Montréal-Trudeau International Airport and the city's core, making several stops throughout the downtown area. Public transportation is an affordable way to get around Montréal.

The [Réseau express métropolitain](#) (REM) is a light rail transit system connecting Brossard Station on the South Shore to Gare Centrale in the heart of downtown Montréal. Operating 20 hours a day, 7 days a week, the REM is fully electric and automated, allowing passengers to enjoy a unique view from the front or back of the train, particularly when crossing the Samuel De Champlain Bridge, which offers a breathtaking view of Montréal's skyline.

BY CAR

Renting a vehicle is easy at [YUL Montréal-Trudeau International Airport](#), which is an approximately 30-minute drive from downtown. Several major car rental companies have [counters](#) at the airport as well as outlets downtown. It's a good idea to book ahead to ensure availability. A valid driver's license will be required, and if yours isn't in French or English, an international permit is highly recommended. It's also advised that you acquaint yourself with some of the [road regulations and tips for driving in Montréal](#).

Parking downtown is predominantly in public parking lots or metered parking spaces. Outside the downtown core, residential areas usually have free, albeit limited, on-street parking. Useful information regarding the price and location of available metered parking spots can be found on the [Agence de mobilité durable's website](#). You can also download the [Mobicité app](#) to pay parking meter fees remotely.

BY BIKE

Come experience Montréal like a local by hopping on a bike this spring, summer and fall. Montréal is famous for having over 1,000 kilometres of bike paths and bike lanes, making it one of the most bike friendly cities in North America, as named by the Copenhagen Index. The city's ever-expanding bike system, credited with inspiring other major cities around the world to build more bike paths, encourage awareness of cyclists and do it all in style, makes it a breeze to discover neighbourhoods, get to and from events, and see the city sights.

Its world-class BIXI bike-sharing service ([download free app](#)) features easy-to-access bike stations sprinkled liberally throughout the city, alongside high-quality bike rentals and tours. Go your own way by renting bikes, bringing your own or trying out Montréal's BIXI system.

Montréal is also notable for its walkability, with many interesting neighbourhoods and popular attractions within easy reach of each other by foot, making it a great way to explore the city at your own pace.

BY FOOT

Whether you're walking through the Old Port, Chinatown, Little Italy or the Plateau-Mont-Royal, you'll be in good local company – Montréalers love to walk. In fact, this safe, healthy and budget-wise mode of transportation is one of the best ways to see the city's lively neighbourhoods, day and night. From architecture to public art to stylish locals, there's a lot to see in Montréal! When the weather isn't inviting, you can still get your exercise by walking through the Underground Pedestrian Network. This practical network includes 33 kilometres of walkways with 2,000 shops, restaurants and services. It connects to some 40 performance venues, theatres and cinemas, not to mention many hotels, attractions and museums.

TAXIS AND RIDE-HAILING SERVICES

In Montréal, taxis are easy to identify thanks to the illuminated "TAXI" sign on the roof and I.D. number on the vehicle's body. Availability is good, especially downtown, at the central train station and at the arrival's terminal at the airport. You can call one of the numerous taxi companies, hail one on the street or book through an app. Fares are regulated and calculated by meter, and you can pay in cash or by card; many drivers also accept app-based payments.

For ride hailing or sharing, Uber and Lyft are must-haves. Just download the app, create an account and add a payment method. The app shows the estimated price and waiting time before pickup. Finally, for brief trips, [Communauto](#) offers self-service vehicles at affordable rates — perfect for getting around the city.

VISA PROCESS

PASSPORTS

The Government of Canada requires that travellers to Canada hold a valid passport. Consult [Visit Canada](#) for the most up-to-date information concerning passport regulations.

ALL FOREIGN NATIONALS MUST HAVE AN eTA OR A VISA TO ENTER CANADA, DEPENDING ON THEIR COUNTRY OF ORIGIN.

Please follow the steps below to apply for an eTA or a VISA:

1. Determine whether you need an eTA or a VISA.

2. After checking if you need an eTA or a VISA, please apply for the document you need. It depends on the country of origin.

The eTA is valid for 5 years and costs 7\$ CAD
 - b. [Application for a VISA](#)
The VISA must be renewed every year. It costs 100\$ CAD (if biometric data is needed, the fee is an additional 85\$ CAD).

Processing times for visa applications vary depending on the visa office and the time of year. It is recommended to apply as early as possible before the departure date to ensure you receive your visa in time for the start of the event.

Since 2018, Immigration Canada has required citizens of several countries to provide biometric data (fingerprints) as part of their visa application, which may extend processing times. To facilitate repeated travel to Canada, visitor visa applicants only need to provide their biometric data once every ten years.

- Exact travel dates to Canada
- Country of residence / full home address
- Copy of the applicant's passport
- Role/occupation (e.g., rider, coach, mechanic, journalist, photographer, etc.)

VEHICLES ALLOCATED TO NATIONAL FEDERATIONS

A limited supply of team cars will be provided to the National Federations on the same basis as during previous UCI Road World Championships. These cars will be assigned to the top-ranked National Federations according to the number of riders in their delegation. Information on the allocation of these vehicles to the National Federations, the location of the collection of the vehicles and the deposit will be detailed in the Technical Guide of the 2026 UCI Road World Championships which will be published mid-July.

All drivers representing National Federations in the race convoy at UCI Road World Championships must have a UCI Licence issued by a National Federation and are obliged to respect the UCI Regulations as well as the Guidelines for vehicle circulation in the race convoy. The UCI Licence must include the necessary third-party liability insurance in case of material damage or bodily injury to others, which must be valid in all countries where the licence-holder is susceptible of exercising his function.

Drivers are required to have an in-depth knowledge of cycle racing and its regulations and have the experience and ability to anticipate a wide range of race situations. It is a responsibility of the National Federation to ensure that their drivers have the required experience to drive in the race convoy at UCI Road World Championships.

Drivers remain responsible for their driving; if they fail to observe the regulations, they face significant financial penalties as well as suspensions of their UCI Licence (as a driver and any other role they may have). The sanctions related to driving in the race convoy are defined by Articles 2.2.038 and subsequent of the UCI Regulations.



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RADIO FREQUENCIES

All radio frequencies used during the 2026 UCI Road World Championships in Montréal must be registered with the government of Canada. All licensees (including those from foreign countries) must operate in accordance with the [Canadian Table of Frequency Allocations](#) when in Canada. For most users, this means that mobile radio communications must be conducted in the 450-470 MHz or 138-174 MHz bands.

It is the responsibility of each organisation to request this authorization. The use of any radio frequency without prior approval may result in sanctions.

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CUSTOMS AND LOGISTICS

TEMPORARY IMPORTATION OF EQUIPMENT INTO CANADA

All temporary imports of equipment into Canada must be declared to the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA). For more information, please refer to [CBSA's D8-1-1, Administration of Temporary Importation \(Tariff Item Number 9993.00.00\) Regulations](#).

This process is completed through the [CARM portal](#) (Customs Assessment and Revenue Management).

EQUIPMENT TRANSPORT: RULES BY SHIPMENT TYPE

An important distinction applies:

- **Equipment travelling with an individual** (e.g., one or two bikes): no CARM declaration required (to be confirmed depending on the case).
- **Team or bulk shipments** (team equipment, logistics, technical material, etc.): a CARM declaration is mandatory.

USING A CUSTOMS BROKER

We strongly recommend working with a **customs broker** to facilitate the temporary importation of goods into Canada.

A broker can:

- handle communication with the CBSA;
- prepare and submit all required documentation;
- ensure proper clearance of goods upon arrival;
- organise the return shipment after the event.

The LOC will be able to provide recommended customs brokers and freight forwarding companies to help you with the custom clearance or the shipping of your equipment.

PLEASE NOTE

- Processing times may vary depending on the nature of the shipment and the time of year.
- We recommend starting the planning process of any shipment **at least 8 to 12 weeks in advance**.

TEAM DOCTORS

MEDICAL INSURANCE

All members of National Federations, including staff, athletes, and delegates, must ensure they have appropriate insurance(s) for illness and bodily injury before traveling to the event. The UCI and the Organising Committee do not provide any insurance coverage for attending the event.

In case medical treatment is required in a health centre or hospital, whether following an incident in a race or not, an insurance certificate and/or a down payment may be required*. In case a member of staff, an athlete or delegate fails to provide adequate insurance coverage, the cost for the treatment will be billed to the respective National Federation. If necessary to ensure necessary treatment is provided, the UCI reserves the right to pay for the treatment and demand reimbursement from the National Federation. The UCI may also refuse participation of athletes and/or staff members who do not hold adequate insurance.

To ensure adequate coverage, your insurance(s) for bodily injury and illness must:

- Take effect as soon as you leave your home country or place of residence.
- Be recognized by main referral hospitals in Montréal (list in the General Information section).
- Cover medical treatment in Canada.
- Include medical evacuation and treatment within Canada.
- Cover repatriation to your home country or place of residence.

For those in need of additional coverage, international travel insurance providers or Canadian private health insurance providers offer packages that include medical treatment within Canada, medical evacuation and treatment in North America, and repatriation to the home country or place of residence.

*Please note that Canada has a public healthcare system for residents, but medical services for non-residents, including emergency care, are extremely expensive and must be covered by private insurance.



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TEMPORARY MEDICAL PRACTICE IN CANADA

Scope of practice

Team doctors accompanying National Federations to the event are authorized to provide medical care **exclusively to members of their own delegation** (athletes and team staff).

All official medical coverage for the event is provided by the Local Organizing Committee, through a fully staffed medical system, including physicians, paramedics, nurses, and emergency response resources. This medical system is available at all times, throughout training sessions, competitions, and official event activities.

In the event that urgent care, hospital treatment, advanced diagnostics, or specialist intervention is required, patients will be managed or referred through the official event medical services, which maintain direct access to local hospitals and emergency resources.

Team doctors and health professionals accompanying athletes may refer at any time to the local event medical team for clinical support, assessment, escalation of care, or coordination with the local healthcare system.

Regulatory framework

In Canada, the practice of medicine is regulated at the provincial level. In Québec, medical practice falls under the authority of the Collège des médecins du Québec (CMQ).

For international sporting events, physicians accompanying their athletes and providing care solely within their delegation are generally considered to be acting in a supporting and advisory medical role, rather than engaging in unrestricted medical practice within the Québec healthcare system.

Under this framework:

- A full Québec medical licence is not required, provided that
 - medical acts are limited to members of the physician's own delegation,
 - no remuneration is received from a Québec-based entity, and
 - no care is provided to the general public or to individuals outside their own delegation.
- All team doctors must:
 - Hold valid professional licensure in their country of origin
 - Carry professional liability insurance covering medical activities performed in Canada
 - Ensure that their insurance includes coverage for sports medicine activities abroad

The Organizing Committee and the UCI do not provide professional liability coverage for team doctors.

HEALTH/MEDICAL SUPPLIES

IMPORTANT: It is your responsibility to comply with Canadian laws regarding the transport and use of medications.

To import medications for the 2026 UCI Road World Championships in Montréal, it is important to follow the procedure outlined below. This process must be completed well in advance of the event, at least 2 months prior to your arrival in Canada.

1. Your team doctor must submit a request by email (hpbc-pcpsf@hc-sc.gc.ca). When submitting the request, please specify whether you would like the documents in French or English.
2. The Border Health Products Compliance Unit will respond and provide the necessary forms. It is essential to carefully follow the instructions when completing the request.
3. Return the completed forms to the same [email address](#). The Unit will review the request, assign a tracking number, and notify you of their decision. If approved, they will communicate with the relevant border post.

For any questions regarding this procedure, you can contact the Unit directly via [email](#).

When shipping or transporting the product, it must meet one of the following conditions:

- Be in the packaging from the hospital or pharmacy that issued it;
- Be in its original packaging;
- Bear the original label clearly indicating the product name and contents.





In this section, technical information about the radio systems that will be in operation is requested:

- **Number of fixed or base stations**
A fixed or base station is installed in a dedicated location, usually connected to an outdoor antenna that will not be moved during operation (e.g., a repeater).
- **Number of mobile and handheld units**
A mobile or portable station is installed in a vehicle or carried by a person, respectively. The mobile station is typically attached to the vehicle throughout its operation, while the portable station, small in size and similar to a walkie-talkie, can be shared between several individuals.



- **System type** (*Simplex / Duplex / Tx or Rx only*)
 - **Simplex** - This is a system using a single frequency to establish communication between radio devices. The radio devices speak directly to each other, taking turns.
 - **Duplex** - This is the type of system in which two frequencies are assigned to radio devices, which usually requires the use of a repeater (fixed station) to communicate.
 - **TX or RX only** - For this type of system, information is either transmitted from a transmitting station or received at a receiver (e.g., a paging or telemetry system).

- **Radio frequency range**

This is the frequency range in which your device operates. The assigned frequency will be selected within the specified range (e.g., a UHF radio device will operate between 450 and 470 MHz in Canada). This information can be found on your device's technical datasheet. If you can't find this information, this field can remain empty if you specify the radio model (below).

- **Number of desired frequency**

The number of frequencies may vary depending on the number of vehicles in your team, the number of radio devices available, or other parameters. A team with one driver on the track may request only one frequency, while a team with three drivers on the track simultaneously may want three frequencies to communicate with each of them separately. Due to the high number of users during large events, the number of frequencies authorized will be kept to a minimum to allow for proper use. No spare frequencies will be authorized unless legitimate reasons are provided.

- **Preferred frequencies** (*optional*)

Here, you can indicate your preferred frequencies, such as frequencies authorized in the past or frequencies currently programmed in your radio devices. We will try to prioritize the assignment of these frequencies as much as possible; however, if another licensee has already received them, other frequencies will be assigned to you. The frequencies listed on your radio licence must match those in your radio devices, which means you will need to reprogram your radio devices if your preferred frequencies are not selected. Frequency selection is based on a first-come, first-served basis.

- **Power**

This is the operating power of your device. During large events, the maximum permitted power is typically 5W for most devices.

- **Emission bandwidth**

This is the spectral occupancy emitted and received by your device. This value will influence the selected frequency, but for most cases, the value will be 12.5 kHz. Like the radio frequency range, this information can be found on your device's technical datasheet. If you can't find this information, this field can remain empty if you specify the radio model (below).

- **Radio model**

The model(s) of radio devices used by the licence holder (e.g., Motorola BPR40, Kenwood NX-300, Vertex VX-261, Hytera BD502U, etc.). This information is essential if certain technical parameters mentioned above are missing. In most cases, this information is found directly on the device, otherwise it is possible to provide us with the IC approval number which is located on the back of your radio device, under the battery. If you're unsure of your radio model, you can attach photos of your device and the sticker under the battery in your licence application email to help us identify it.
