





2022 ANNUAL REPORT TABLE OF CONTENT

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It was with relief and optimism that we returned to an almost normal year of racing in 2022 after two years of disruption due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Activity on all five continents and across all our disciplines meant we could work more serenely towards further developing our sport. As we prepared for upcoming major events, we also reinforced the important role of the bicycle in tackling climate change, improving health and wellbeing, and promoting the values of the Olympic Movement.

When I was first elected President of the UCI in 2017, I quickly developed a comprehensive Agenda 2022 which contained 300 objectives reflecting my ambitions for our sport. More than 90% of those objectives had been meet by 2022, the result of commitment and hard work from cycling's different stakeholders. Nevertheless, our sport must continue to evolve, which is why we have now established an Agenda 2030, available in nine languages, to guide our sport over the next eight years.

DEVELOPING OUR SPORT TOGETHER

Development is a major part of the Agenda 2030, not only the development of competitive cycling, its different disciplines and its status within the Olympic Movement, but also the development of our sport among people of all ages, backgrounds and physical abilities. The bicycle is a multi-facetted tool which must be exploited to a maximum to ensure cycling becomes the sport of the 21st century. The Covid-19 pandemic saw a considerable rise in popularity for the bicycle, and we are building on this momentum.

To do so, we will work closely with our National Federations, which now number 202 after the affiliation of our latest member, the Bhutan Cycling Federation, in 2022. It is our aim to affiliate the remaining non-members in the years to come. Together we will reinforce the universality of cycling.

INNOVATIVE FORMATS TO INCREASE APPEAL

Innovation is another important chapter of the Agenda 2030 as we strive to make our competitions even more attractive so we can conquer new fans.

We made considerable progress in this vein in 2022. Following the successful new format for our UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup and the innovative UCI Track Champions League, we signed a partnership with Warner Bros. Discovery to revamp the UCI World Cup for mountain bike. In 2023, enduro (EDR), E-enduro (E-EDR) and cross-country marathon (XCM) will benefit from UCI World Cup status alongside cross-country (XC) and downhill (DHI), bringing all major mountain bike formats together in one calendar.

The Elite field featured some of cycling's great names, including many who have already starred in several disciplines, such as Dutchman Mathieu Van der Poel and France's Pauline Ferrand-Prévot, the latter adding to her already extensive collection of rainbow jerseys thanks to her Women Elite Victory in Veneto.

We also continued to innovate when it comes to virtual cycling, moving the UCI Cycling Esports World Championships to a new February date to coincide with the peak of the virtual cycling season, and introducing a new and even more attractive format of three short, explosive elimination races.

In cyclo-cross, following a successful team relay test event at the 2022 UCI Cyclo-cross World Championships in Fayetteville, Arkansas (USA), the new format was included on the programme of the 2023 UCI World Championships for the discipline.

NATIONAL FEDERATIONS AT THE HEART OF SOLIDARITY ACTIONS

After achieving virtually all our solidarity objectives of the Agenda 2022, we have set more ambitious targets in the latest roadmap which again places our National Federations at the centre of our actions. We will reinforce our support of our National Federations and Continental Federations in order to optimise our solidarity actions.

Our work in this area continued in 2022, a year that marked the 20th anniversary of one of the key tools in our actions, the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC). Although we were all terribly saddened by the sudden death of our UCI WCC Director Vincent Jacquet shortly before the anniversary celebrations, we took it upon ourselves to honour his name and, as he would have wished, look to the future with optimism.

In 2022, we reformed the concept of our UCI WCC satellite centres with a two-tiered system, and opened two new UCI WCC Continental Development Satellites at the end of the year in Couva (Trinidad and Tobago) and Bromont (Canada).

Solidarity funds have been increased and are allocated either to the World Cycling Centre or to Continental Confederations and National Federations. We will continue our efforts by further increasing these solidarity funds in the future.

TACKLING CLIMATE CHANGE

When it comes to sustainability, the Agenda 2030 is very clear. We face a huge climate challenge and must ensure we contribute to combatting climate change, both at our events and our UCI headquarters.

We will be carbon neutral by 2030 and reduce our emissions by 50%.

After publishing our UCI Sustainability Guidelines and Sustainability Targets in 2021, we developed a UCI Climate Action Charter in 2022. UCI WorldTeams, UCI Women's WorldTeams, National Federations and major event organisers were among the 80 founding signatories, making a public commitment to reducing cycling's environmental impact.

In parallel we are developing a climate action training course for stakeholders that will be implemented in 2023.



KEEPING OUR SPORT CLEAN, SAFE AND FAIR

We owe it to our sport to protect athletes and promote equal opportunities, two of the main aims of the Agenda 2030's integrity chapter. We must make sure that doping, technological fraud and race manipulation have no place in cycling and that our athletes can be assured of a safe environment and level playing field in competitions. We launched our new Cycling Integrity brand to ensure our sport remains clean, safe and fair. This new initiative, and the involvement of more athletes in UCI policies will go along way to strengthening cycling's integrity.

UPHOLDING OLYMPIC VALUES

The final chapter of the Agenda 2030 is devoted to governance and our will to uphold the Olympic values – in particular of peace and friendship between peoples - in all aspects of our work.

These values have never been more important than in the last year since the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. From the outset of the conflict, the UCI has supported Ukraine, its athletes, and the Ukrainian Cycling Federation, welcoming refugee athletes to its headquarters in Aigle and providing



them with material and financial assistance. At the same time, the UCI supports the Olympic Movement's principles which include political neutrality, non-discrimination based on an individual's nationality, as well as unification and peace through sport. A Resolution unanimously adopted by the UCI Management Committee is in line with these principles, agreeing that Russian and Belarusian athletes and officials – who comply with strict conditions and respect the Olympic Charter and values – should not be stigmatised.

The Olympic values of promoting peace and friendship again came to the fore in October with the staging of the Women's Road Championships of Afghanistan, starting and finishing at our headquarters in Aigle. After leading and participating in evacuation operations in 2021, in collaboration with our partners we were able to stage these national championships for Afghan women who are now settled in Switzerland and different countries. Fifty women participated in this unprecedented and very moving event in October 2022.



MAJOR UPCOMING EVENTS

Two major events will be upon us before we know it, the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships and the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.

As a member of the International Olympic Committee with French nationality, I have the pleasure of sitting on the Paris 2024 Organising Committee, and I can confirm that we it will be a fantastic event with accessible competition venues and amazing backdrops. On top of that, the joint efforts of the IOC and Paris 2024, mean the Olympic Games will be carbon neutral.

Cycling has also been confirmed on the programme of the Los Angeles 2028 Olympics, and we will do our utmost to ensure we continue with at least five disciplines. Olympic Games are a great asset for sport and for our athletes around the world, notably thanks to the revenues which we invest entirely into the UCI World Cycling Centre, solidarity and development projects for our National Federations.

Now let me come to the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships which will take place in Glasgow and across Scotland in August. Preparations have accelerated for this inaugural event, which will feature 13 of our UCI World Championships over 11 days and see nearly 10,000 athletes compete for more than 200 rainbow jerseys. We are entering the final stretch before this unprecedented event, which will take place every four years, the year preceding the Summer Olympic Games. It is our clear objective to see all of our 202 National Federations in Scotland for this historic moment for cycling.

The second edition of the UCI Cycling World Championships have already been awarded, and will take place in the Haute-Savoie region of France. This was approved by the last UCI Congress in Wollongong, Australia, in September.



THE NEXT FIVE YEARS

We also awarded 11 UCI World Championships, giving us a clear five-year vision in almost all disciplines. The prospects are exciting, for example for the road: after our UCI Cycling World Championships in Glasgow and across Scotland next year, we can look forward to the combined UCI Road and Para-cycling Road World Championships in Zurich (Switzerland) in 2024, our first ever UCI Road World Championships to be held on the African continent, in Kigali (Rwanda) in 2025, a return to the American continent (Montreal, Canada) for the first time in 11 years in 2026 before the next combined UCI Cycling World Championships in Haute-Savoie in 2027.

I know we can rise to all the wonderful challenges that await, thanks to the unfailing support of my Director General Amina Lanaya, the entire UCI Management Committee and the staff of the UCI and UCI WCC. My sincere thanks go to them all as well as to all our National

Federations and Continental Confederations, that work so hard to develop our sport in all regions of the world. Together, we will continue to achieve great things.



INTERVIEW WITH THE UCI DIRECTOR GENERAL





Let's start with a very general question: how do you see the role of Director General of the UCI, a position you have held since September 2017?

Amina Lanaya: My role essentially involves ensuring that the vision of our President David Lappartient, a vision that is outlined in the UCI's Agenda 2022 and its Agenda 2030, is brought to life. To this end, I am happy to be able to count on very competent and passionate colleagues, and it is my responsibility to make sure that they have the best possible conditions so that, together, we can achieve the goals that have been set. While this mandate is very clear, I am nonetheless delighted to

be offered the possibility to bring my beliefs and my sensitivity to the institution, so as to push forward the issues that are particularly close to my heart and that are also considered crucial by our President, his Management Committee, and our National Federations and Continental Confederations. These issues, which include the cause of women, integrity and sustainable development, are fundamental for cycling itself, but also, of course, go above and beyond cycling.

Promoting women has been a priority subject for the UCI for several years. Is there anything new in this area?

Amina Lanava: We have indeed accomplished a great deal of work in terms of promoting women over the past few years, both at the sporting and governance levels. Thanks to the measures put in place, the number of women who are active within UCI bodies - the Management Committee and the Commissions - and also within those of the Continental Confederations has increased to an unprecedented extent. Much progress has also been made in terms of sport: women's road cycling, for example, has become significantly more professional with the creation of an increasingly publicised first division of races - the UCI Women's WorldTour - and teams -UCI Women's WorldTeams - in which the riders enjoy working conditions that are finally worthy, and even, in more and more cases, very favourable. On this basis, women's cycling has seen its development accelerate, with the arrival of new top-tier races and the appearance of new stars. The gap between women's cycling and men's cycling is undoubtedly closing. This progress is important, as it is the basis for the growth that is yet to come in the sector, growth that will be significant.

In 2022, we had the first edition of the Tour de France Femmes. This is no coincidence: the creation of this race, whole-heartedly and actively desired by the UCI, is clear proof of the degree of maturity achieved by women's road cycling. We should, of course, commend the work of the event organiser, Amaury Sport Organisation (ASO), and recognise its strong commitment to professional cyclists.

However, ASO would certainly not have organised such an event had its leaders not believed that the moment had come, that the event was going to meet with genuine popular success, and that there were high expectations. On the occasion of this first edition, it was in all likelihood the first time that some of the public had ever followed a women's road cycling race, whether on the side of the road, on television or via social media. The majority of the athletes had been dreaming of experiencing this moment since their childhood, without being certain that it would ever happen. So, to be able to say that their dreams have come true and that the public is asking for more fills us with pride. The riders richly deserve it!

We also have to report some news about UCI events themselves. The existence of women's competitions in the UCI World Championships of our different disciplines has been a reality for a longer time and, today, the prize monies for women and men are identical. But there are new developments here too: during the 2022 UCI Road World Championships in Wollongong, Australia, a title of UCI World Champion was awarded for the first time in the Women's Under-23 category for the road race and the individual time trial. Starting in 2025 in Rwanda, separate races will be organised for this category. Moreover, and this is a first too, the Women Elite and Men Elite competed in the UCI Worlds time trial on the same route and over an identical distance on the same day.

INTERVIEW WITH THE UCI DIRECTOR GENERAL



In 2022, the UCI launched a programme entitled "Cycling Integrity". What is this?

Amina Lanaya: The UCI's commitment to integrity in the sport is nothing new: we were, for example, pioneers in the field of anti-doping, with the introduction of the athlete's biological passport, after cycling had, it is true, greatly suffered from this scourge, and we developed innovative dissuasive measures - mobile X-ray units, magnetic tablets, backscatter cameras, etc. - to discourage any attempt at technological fraud.

What is new, however, is that we carried out a comprehensive consideration of the different areas

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in which we wanted to intercede in order to merit, more than ever, our reputation as a sport with integrity. We therefore decided to invest more resources in that field. The launch of the "Cycling Integrity" programme, which brings together all our actions devoted to promoting and strengthening integrity in cycling at all levels - athletes, entourage and competitions - is the result of this willingness to do even better. The programme's goals are focused around three pillars: "Clean cycling", "Safe cycling" and "Fair cycling". Cycling must be clean to ensure the fairness of

competitions and protect the health of athletes; it must be safe, because every member of the cycling family, rider or not, should be able to operate in an environment free of harassment and other abuses, where they feel respected; and it must be fair, because any attempt at fraud, whether technological or through the manipulation of competitions, undermines the meaning of the sport.


To ensure that these principles are respected, we now have both a UCI Integrity Commission and a unit dedicated to this fundamental issue within the UCI. Our commission, which is tasked with proposing an integrity policy, is presided over by Anne Gripper, a figure with unanimously recognised integrity who had been in charge of the UCI's anti-doping programme for four years and had contributed to the creation of the Cycling Anti-Doping Foundation (CADF). As for our integrity unit, it ensures the implementation of preventive

measures intended to limit risks and protect our sport and all the people involved. If, despite these preventive measures, something were to happen, it ensures that actions are taken: managing anti-doping results, collecting information existing reporting platforms, dealing with suspicions of abuse and collaborating closely with

I just mentioned the reporting platforms. In fact, witnesses or victims of abuse now have access to secure channels to report unacceptable behaviour or conduct. We are promoting

the REVEAL reporting platform, managed by the International Testing Agency (ITA), on which everyone is invited to share their concerns about doping, and the UCI SpeakUp reporting platform, developed by our Federation, where it is possible to report any act of harassment or manipulation. Everyone has a role to play to guarantee respect and fair play in our sport, and we have developed tools to encourage them to do so.

programme, we have developed a framework entitled Working United, which aims to offer UCI employees a working environment that respects the highest ethical standards. The measures put in place include: the development and implementation of a policy to protect personal integrity and to prevent conflict and all forms of harassment and discrimination; the completion of a Job Stress Analysis survey to identify stress factors and remedy them as far as possible; the introduction of a Confidential Counsellor, an external contact person enabling staff members to report their concerns to obtain help; and the implementation of a flexible working policy - including the possibility of remote working within certain limits - aiming to provide a better balance between a demanding professional life and a fulfilling private life, particularly with regard to family.

Integrity in all its forms, notably in terms of governance, can be found at the heart of the UCI's activities and its operation. Today, our initiatives in this area are widely recognised. I can give you a few examples.


Our Federation had obtained EDGE Certification the international reference standard for the

the first international sports federation to obtain this level of certification.

When it comes to good governance, the Association of Summer Olympic International Federations (ASOIF) ranked the UCI second (out of 33) in its "Fourth Review of International Federation Governance" for the 2021-2022 period. The UCI obtained 185 points out of a maximum 200. The principles taken into consideration were transparency, integrity, democracy, development and solidarity, and control mechanisms.

Furthermore, in terms of the fight against doping, the results of an audit conducted by the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) and published at the beginning of 2022 confirmed the strength of the UCI's anti-doping programme. This audit, carried out around a year after the official transfer of our operational anti-doping activities from the CADF to the ITA, praised the quality of the UCI's operations in the fields of governance, budgeting and reporting, intelligence and investigations, education, the Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE) programme, results management and data protection.

UCI DIRECTOR GENERAL



Amina Lanaya: In terms of the UCI itself, we installed some 400 photovoltaic panels on the roof of our head office in Aigle, Switzerland. The energy produced by these panels is around 175,000 kWh per year, which represents over 35% of the building's consumption. In parallel, all the lights in the velodrome and the gym have been replaced; the use of LED technology has not only improved the quality of lighting and saved money (around 20,000 Swiss francs per year), but above all made significant energy savings. In the same vein, we have installed six electric charging terminals on the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC)'s

car park for employees who have an electric car. These initiatives are part of our Sustainability Targets. One of the targets we have set is to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from UCI and UCI WCC operations so as to achieve carbon neutrality, with a 45% reduction of absolute emissions, by 2030 compared with the reference year 2019. Our calendar to achieve the targets began in 2021, and we will continue our efforts over the coming years and regularly communicate the progress made.

In 2022, we developed a UCI Climate Action Charter. The signatories of this document – of which there are around a hundred so far, including UCI WorldTeams and UCI Women's WorldTeams, National Federations and major event organisers such as ASO, RCS Sports and Flanders Classics – are, for example, committing to measuring and reporting their emissions according to internationally recognised standards, and to taking

tangible measures to reduce their waste production and energy demand. The UCI Climate Action Charter is an important step before obligations in terms of sustainability are formalised over the coming years, in collaboration with our stakeholders, in accordance with the UCI's Agenda 2030 and in line with the ongoing work to reform professional cycling and update the UCI Regulations, contractual requirements and organisation

Alongside this type of measure, we have continued to promote initiatives to encourage and help all cycling's stakeholders move towards greater sustainability, particularly through the

distribution of our Sustainability Guidelines, the expansion of our network of cities and regions being awarded the UCI Bike City and UCI Bike Region labels, and the organisation of our annual UCI Mobility and Bike City Forum – whose 2022 edition was held in Denmark. We also collaborate with a growing number of organisations around the world — such as the World Health Organization (WHO), the European Cyclists' Federation (ECF), the European Commission, the United Nations and PeopleForBikes — on campaigns promoting active mobility, road safety and health.

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Amina Lanaya: There is no doubt that the UCI Cycling World Championships, which will bring together 13 separate UCI World Championships in Glasgow and across Scotland from 3 to 13 August, will not only be a high point of 2023, it will be a historic event. At the UCI, we are all working incredibly hard with the local organising committee to ensure that this event, of which this will be the very first edition, is a resounding success. There are countless challenges in order to achieve this, but together we will succeed.

In conclusion, I would like to express my thanks to the stakeholders of cycling, with whom I had the pleasure, along with UCI colleagues, to work throughout 2022. We have continued to push

forward our sport, and the years ahead promise to be no less intense but just as exciting, if not more so. The Agenda 2030 gives us a clear and very motivating idea of what we are aiming for, and together with our partners, this forms the basis of our daily commitment.

cycling. It develops and oversees cycling in all its forms and for all people worldwide, regardless of their age, physical ability or background. The UCI represents, to sporting and public institutions alike, the interests of 202 National Federations, five Continental Confederations, more than 1,500 professional riders, a million licensed competitors, millions of cycling enthusiasts and two billion bicycle users all over the world.

Its main missions - in collaboration with its members and partners - are as follows:

to manage and promote cycling as a competitive sport in the 10 disciplines under its aegis: road, track, mountain bike, BMX Racing, BMX Freestyle, cyclocross, trials, indoor cycling, cycling esports and gravel

- series (for example UCI WorldTour and UCI Women's WorldTour), for all disciplines
- to offer cyclists from the five continents the possibility to access the highest level thanks to solidarity programmes and an international network of training and education centres
- to encourage the development of cycling as a healthy leisure activity and a sustainable means of transport
- to guarantee the integrity of cycling (governance, sport, sustainable development and equity, including gender equality, an area in which the UCI is a pioneer in the sporting world).



The UCI aims to shape the future of cycling by inspiring more people to ride bicycles, by making the sport more attractive, by contributing to the wellbeing of the world's population, and by promoting sustainable development. In order to achieve this, the UCI has developed four values which drive our global objectives.

- Passion. We work with enthusiasm and are proud to contribute to the promotion and development of cycling. We are committed to sharing our passion for the sport with as many people as possible.
- Unity. We strive to integrate all stakeholders worldwide in the preparation and implementation of major decisions, to build the cycling of tomorrow in a concerted and coherent manner. We are attentive and take the responsibility to encourage the implementation of any initiative that could be of benefit at a global level.
- **Excellence.** We never rest on our laurels but show initiative on a daily basis to help cycling progress and to increase its worldwide promotion.
- Integrity. We respect the principles of good governance and are constantly working to strengthen them. All our activities are carried out according to rigorous ethical standards that emphasise the importance of transparency, trustworthiness and the promotion of our values.



OVERVIEW

With the addition of gravel in 2022, the UCI now governs 10 cycling disciplines. Five of these are featured on the Olympic Games programme (road, track, mountain bike, BMX Racing and BMX Freestyle), two in the Paralympic Games (road and track) and four in the Youth Olympic Games (road, mountain bike, BMX Racing and BMX Freestyle).

MOUNTAIN BIKE

This discipline includes cross-country and downhill competitions, which are held in the countryside and in the mountains. These two families bring together various formats and specialities, in particular cross-country Olympic - including E-mountain bike -, short track, marathon and eliminator for the former, downhill, four-cross, enduro and snow bike for the latter, without forgetting pump track.



Whether it is a one-day race or a stage race, a road race with a bunch start or a time trial (individual or team) in which the riders start at regular intervals, road cycling is a discipline in which, as the name suggests, everything takes place outdoors on the roads. Para-cyclists also race on the road.



TRACK

This discipline, which is practised on indoor or outdoor velodromes (banked, oval tracks), is divided into speed and endurance events, for both individuals and teams. The athletes use fixed-gear bicycles without brakes. Para-cyclists also race on the track.

BMX RACING

BMX Racing is practised indoors or outdoors on 350- to 400-metre tracks alternating bumps, banked turns and flat sections. These tracks can accommodate up to eight riders, who take off from a ramp five or eight metres high. Their bikes are equipped with 20-inch wheels.



BMX FREESTYLE

Difficulty, originality and style are the key factors in BMX Freestyle, which has two specialities on the UCI International Calendar: Park, where riders are judged on the tricks they perform on different modules, and Flatland, where tricks are performed on flat ground.



ABOUT THE UCI OUR DISCIPLINES



CYCLO-CROSS

Cyclo-cross races are mainly held in autumn and winter and last about an hour. Riders must negotiate several laps of a technical circuit combining different types of terrain (road, paths, grass, sand, etc.) and dotted with obstacles that require them to change pace or even carry their bikes for short distances.

CYCLING ESPORTS

Thanks to connected home trainers and dedicated software, this recent discipline allows cyclists from all over the world to challenge each other from their homes or training centres, in a virtual environment where each competitor is represented by an avatar.





TRIALS

Competitors must show balance, explosiveness and composure on their bikes to score as many points as possible over a course made up of sections of obstacles (natural or artificial), without putting their foot down or coming into contact with the ground other than with the rubber of the tyres.



This discipline combines two specialities: artistic cycling, in which individuals, pairs or teams of four are judged on five-minute programmes comprising a series of tricks set to music; and cycle-ball, matches in which two teams of two players compete against each other to try to score as many goals as possible.



GRAVEL

Gravel is a discipline that combines elements of road and mountain bike and involves riding mainly on unpaved roads (including gravel surfaces, forest roads, farm roads and cobblestones). Gravel events are mass participation races - one day or several stages with a bunch start. All types of bikes - with the exception of electrically assisted bikes are allowed.





All riders, irrespective of where they come from or the level of resources available in their country, should have the opportunity to fulfil their potential, at national or international level. To ensure this is the case, the UCI has a vast solidarity programme linked to its high-level training and education centre, the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC) in Aigle, Switzerland.

Opened in 2002, the UCI WCC occupies a central place in our Federation's global cycling development strategy. Each year, it welcomes

around 300 promising young athletes and people attending training courses in cycling's different professions. In addition, UCI WCC Continental Development Satellites are strategically situated on different continents to ensure our sport develops in all regions. The UCI WCC and its satellites work closely on talent detection, as well as the training of athletes, coaches and mechanics.

Moreover, bikes, cycling equipment and clothing are regularly shipped to National Federations requiring help with equipping their national athletes.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT: The promotion of environmental and social sustainability

The UCI's Cycling for All and Sustainability programmes are in line with the Agenda 2030, which aims to further increase cycling's positive impact on both the environment and society. This is undertaken by promoting the bicycle as a green, healthy and accessible transport mode, and by working to make cycling one of the world's most sustainable sports.

The UCI's advocacy initiatives include the awarding of the UCI Bike City Label, the organisation of the annual UCI Mobility & Bike City Forum, the provision of practical resources for the cycling family, and the

establishment of several influential international partnerships to create a unified voice regarding the importance of active mobility.

To reduce the sport's climate footprint, the UCI is also working with cycling stakeholders on the implementation of its sustainability strategy. This includes supporting all signatories of the UCI's Climate Action Charter, all of whom have undertaken eight key commitments, including to measure and report emissions to internationally recognised standards and to take concrete actions to reduce waste and energy demand.

OVERVIEW FROM THE UCI SPORTS DIRECTOR

INTRODUCTION

2022 was momentous for the UCI Sports Department as cycling continued to expand and develop in all areas. Of note was the preparation for the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships, the introduction and development of new disciplines, the adoption of innovative technology, and advancements when it comes to rider safety.

In line with the Agenda 2022 and the commitment to provide maximum visibility for athletes and National Federations, the UCI awarded almost all its UCI World Championships up until 2027.

2023 UCI CYCLING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The UCI placed a great deal of focus on the preparation of the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships in Glasgow and across Scotland. As the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships is a multi-discipline and multi-venue event modelled on the Olympic Games, each National Federation is appointing a Chef de Mission for the event, who will be the main contact for the UCI. This presents a significant challenge for both the UCI and participating National Federations as they will need to adjust their approach for the successful delivery of the event.

The management of the accreditation system is one of the key priorities, which requires a review in order to accommodate multiple accesses to the 13 different UCI World Championships that will take place simultaneously. This process is being carried out in collaboration with our partner Wings, with whom the contract will be extended until 2028.

Another important aspect of the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships is the update of the UCI online registration system. This system needs to be modified to handle simultaneous registrations across all disciplines, as well as the management of mass event registrations.

The harmonisation and coordination of requests from external partners such as the European Broadcast Union (EBU), Swiss Timing, the International Testing Agency (ITA) etc., is also crucial to the success of the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships. The UCI Sports Department worked closely with these partners to ensure a seamless experience for all.

Finally, the update of the UCI DataRide platform is necessary following the latest UCI Regulation changes and the specific needs for the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships.

NEW DISCIPLINES

The range of disciplines governed by the Federation grew with the introduction of gravel. For the discipline's first year of integration into the UCI, a dedicated UCI Gravel World Series comprised qualifier events around the world, followed by the first UCI Gravel World Championships, in Veneto (Italy).

In addition, test events for snow bike showcased the UCI's commitment to constantly evolving and expanding its offer within the world of cycling.


EQUIPMENT AND TECHNOLOGY

The UCI Sports Department has continued to invest in cutting-edge technology and equipment to ensure the highest levels of safety, fairness and transparency at our competitions.

The UCI Innovation Unit started an Olympic Track Equipment Registration Process for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, using handheld 3D scanners and permeability technologies to verify equipment. They will also implement an Equipment Registration Process for the 2023 Tour de France and Tour de France Femmes avec Zwift.

The UCI acquired a second Video Assistance Referee (VAR) van, custom-made by a specialized company, which is used at UCI WorldTour and UCI Women's WorldTour races, the UCI Road World Championships, and several UCI ProSeries races. The second VAR van will enable the UCI to provide better coverage and support during races, ensuring that the level of service and quality are maintained at a high standard.

Meanwhile, in the fight against technological fraud, the new portable backscatter technology proved its worth at the 2022 UCI Road World Championships in Wollongong, Australia: the small and light devices were much easier to transport to the other side of the world than the traditional, more bulky X-ray equipment.





The UCI continued to work on rider safety in 2022, with particular emphasis on road, BMX Racing and mountain bike.


At road events, a total of 123 incidents were recorded in the UCI Race Incident Database. The most frequent incidents were caused by rider behaviour, sprint situations, and sections of the course with cobbles and climbs. To further improve the database, the UCI has created a development roadmap with Ghent University to add more functionality and maturity to the system, including linking it to existing UCI data and services, providing access to riders, teams, and race organsisers, and developing automatic crash detection through accelerometer sensor data.

The UCI also worked on a project to understand the injury rates in BMX Racing and mountain bike. The UCI is collecting data from both a medical and technical perspective to create a foundation for improvements in safety features. On a technical side, the UCI Sports Department has already purchased specially designed hardware that is used in Autosport (Formula 1, NASCAR, Moto GP).

The UCI has completed the development of an online Track National Commissaires course to provide further training opportunities for National Federations. Support from the UCI Solidarity Fund enabled 23 National Federations to access the online courses in 2022, with the Commissaires Unit managing the training process. The UCI also organised a Trials UCI International Commissaires course in Wadowice, Poland, in conjunction with the UCI Trials World Youth Games. Commissaires from different countries participated and will increase the current pool by 30%. A Track Elite National Commissaires course was held in Cairo, Egypt, in October, during the 2022 Arab Track Championships.

Moreover, the UCI is conducting an internal analysis of their Commissaires to evaluate their knowledge, technical, and interpersonal skills. The first discipline to experiment with this evaluation will be road, and the aim is to have the evaluation tool ready by the 2024 season.





This discipline flourished in 2022 with the number of registered events and UCI Teams exceeding pre-Covid-19 levels. Continuing this momentum, an eight-year partnership was signed between the UCI and Warner Bros. Discovery for the organisation and the promotion of the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup from 2023. This season-long series will now include cross-country Olympic, cross-country short track, cross-country marathon, downhill, enduro and E-enduro. There will also be increased screen time for the downhill competitions.

BMX FREESTYLE

As this Olympic discipline continues to develop worldwide, the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC) organised a UCI BMX Freestyle camp in Aigle, Switzerland, for the first time. The four days of theory classes and practical sessions on the UCI WCC's BMX Freestyle Park facility took place in August and saw the participation of coaches, athletes, and national judges from Switzerland, Malaysia, Italy, Belgium, the United States, and Ukraine. Participants were brought up to date with the discipline's latest developments and main judging principles.

The introduction of the Under 23 categories at the UCI BMX Racing World Championships in Nantes, France, was a welcome development for the discipline in 2022. In addition, the racing format already in place at the UCI BMX Racing World Cup with a Last Chance Qualifier round – was introduced at the discipline's UCI World Championships.

After two years' absence due to the Covid-19 pandemic, there was a welcome return of the UCI BMX Racing Challenge and Masters categories which saw the participation of 2884 men, boys, women and girls from 40 nations.

TRIALS

The discipline saw a return to normal after two years severely affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. The UCI Trials World Cup comprised two rounds, and the UCI Trials World Championships reintegrated the UCI Urban Cycling World Championships, held in Abu Dhabi (UAE) in November. The 2022 UCI Trials World Youth Games were back for the first time since 2019, gathering the best Under-16 riders from 16 countries in Wadowice, Poland.



The UCI Cyclo-cross World Championships were held in Fayetteville, Arkansas, only the second time they have taken place in the United States. A team relay test event was organised with a view to incorporating it into the UCI World Championships programme from 2023.

The new-look UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup, organised by Flanders Classics, came into its own after a first edition (2020-2021) severely impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

GRAVEL

For its first year integrated into the UCI, the gravel discipline confirmed its worldwide popularity with riders of all ages and abilities.

The UCI Gravel World Series, comprising 12 rounds in countries on four continents, enabled athletes to qualify for the first UCI Gravel World Championships in Veneto, Italy. These inaugural UCI World Championships gave amateur riders the chance to compete in the same event as top international athletes. France's Pauline Ferrand-Prévot and Belgian Gianni Vermeersch are the historical first Elite UCI World Champions for gravel.

Following a highly successful second edition of the UCI Cycling Esports World Championships, in November 2022, the IOC announced that the Olympic Esports Week (formerly known as the Olympic Virtual Series) will be held in Singapore from 22 to 25 June 2023. The festival will present the finest of virtual sports over the course of four days. Once again, the UCI and IOC will join forces with Zwift to showcase the best in cycling esports. The centrepiece of this partnership will be a series of brief races staged in Singapore.

INDOOR CYCLING

The discipline continued its globalisation and international exposure in 2022. For the first time, Great Britain entered athletes in the cycle-ball competition at the UCI Indoor Cycling World Championships, held in Ghent, Belgium. The British team ranked 11th and gained valuable experience for the upcoming years. The event was live streamed on Twitch and broadcast by the UCI on its YouTube channel.











AT A GLANCE


The overall number of UCI Teams registered for the 2022 season remained strong. At UCI WorldTour level, 18 UCI WorldTeams saw their licence renewed for the last season of the 2020-2022 period, while 14 UCI Women's WorldTeams were registered for the season. The increase of five UCI Women's WorldTeams compared to 2021 continues the positive growth trend in women's cycling seen during the last years.

In addition, 16 UCI ProTeams, 177 UCI Continental Teams and 49 UCI Women's Continental Teams were registered by the UCI.

The total number of individual riders registered with UCI Teams reached 4,291. This represents an increase of 8.8% compared to the 2021 season. The 2022 season also saw an average number of riders registered per

team of 30 for UCI WorldTeams, 14 for UCI Women's WorldTeams and 25 for UCI ProTeams. Meanwhile, the average riders count for UCI Continental Teams and UCI Women's Continental Teams increased to 13 riders (12 in 2021).

The UCI Road World Championships were organised in Australia for the second time, 12 years after they had been held in Melbourne and Geelong. For the first time in history, the event saw rainbow jerseys awarded for the Women Under 23 road race and individual time trial, marking a significant milestone for gender equity within the sport. Separate races for this category will be introduced in 2025 at the UCI Road World Championships in Kigali, Rwanda.

WOLLONGONG NSW - AUSTRALIA



The 2022 UCI Road World Championships were held in Wollongong, Australia, from 18 to 25 September, with the participation of 642 riders representing 70 countries. The competition was a celebration of cycling, with outstanding performances from athletes of all categories.


Eleven races took place over the seven days of competition, with 18 UCI World titles up for grabs.

For the first time in the event's history, the Women Elite individual time trial was held on the same day and over the same course and distance as the Men Elite individual time trial. Indeed, it was the women who opened race proceedings at the 2022 UCI Road World Championships, racing their individual time trial in the morning of the first day of competition, followed by the men in the afternoon. Four months after breaking the UCI Hour Record timed by Tissot, Ellen Van Dijk (NED) earned her second consecutive title in the Women Elite individual time trial, while Vittoria Guazzini (ITA) claimed the first ever rainbow jersey awarded in the Women Under 23 category. Men Elite victory went to Norway's Tobias Foss.

The team time trial mixed relay was also an exciting event, with 16 teams covering a total distance of 28.2 km. Switzerland emerged as the winner, beating Italy by 2.92 seconds and Australia by 38.40 seconds, cycling at an average speed of over 50 km/h.


The road races were the highlight of the second half of the week, with another first title awarded in the Women Under 23 category, this time to Niamh Fisher-Black (NZL). Other notable results in the road races were that of Annemiek van Vleuten (NED) who soloed to Women Elite victory despite suffering an elbow fracture just days earlier in a fall during the team time trial mixed relay. Great Britain's Zoe Bäckstedt completed a double in the Women Junior category, claiming road race gold after securing the rainbow jersey in the individual time trial. Remco Evenepoel dominated the final race of the event to give Belgium its first gold medal in the Men Elite category in 10 years.


MEN/WOMEN PARTICIPATION

UCI WORLDTOUR



The 2022 UCI WorldTour calendar comprised 31 events – the three Grands Tours, nine other stage-races and 19 one-day races. The ongoing effects of the Covid-19 pandemic resulted in the cancellation of four competitions, hence the opening of the season moved to 20 February with the UAE Tour and concluded on 8 October with Il Lombardia, in Italy.


Tadej Pogačar (UAE Team Emirates) was once again crowned the king of Individual UCI World Ranking. The Slovenian opened the 2022 account by winning the UAE Tour (United Arab Emirates) and Tirreno-Adriatico (Italy) for the second consecutive year. Thereafter his focus moved to the famous Spring Classics where he rode an aggressive Milano-Sanremo (Italy) and Ronde van Vlaanderen - Tour des Flandres (Belgium), finishing in the top-five of both races. A solid second place in the general classification at the Tour de France – in addition to three stage wins – consolidated his lead. He closed out the season taking wins at the Grand Prix Cycliste de

Montréal (Canada) and another consecutive win at II Lombardia (Italy).

His many achievements throughout the season, most notably on the roads of the UCI WorldTour, allowed the UAE Team Emirates rider to once again take the reins of the individual UCI World Ranking, ahead of Belgian superstars Wout van Aert (Jumbo-Visma) winner, among other victories, of three stages and the green points jersey at the 2023 Tour France and Remco Evenepoel (Quick-Step Alpha Vinyl Team) whose main wins were the road race at the 2022 UCI Road World Championships and the general classification of the Vuelta Ciclista a España.

Jumbo-Visma came out on top of the UCI World Ranking for teams. The Dutch squad took a total of 48 victories (across all classes of race) to reclaim the title they had won in 2020. UAE Team Emirates finished in second place, and Ineos Grenadiers third. Belgium again dominated the UCI World Ranking for nations, ahead of Spain and France.



UCI WOMEN'S WORLDTOUR



With 23 events on the calendar, the UCI Women's WorldTour (WWT) returned to normality following the numerous race cancellations of previous years due to the Covid-19 pandemic. A total of 194 riders were registered across the 14 UCI Women's WorldTeams, compared to 119 (for nine UCI Women's WorldTeams) in 2021.

The season opened with the Strade Bianche (Italy) in March and closed with the first edition of the Tour de Romandie for women (Switzerland) in October.


However, the biggest highlight of the year was no doubt the inaugural edition of the Tour de France Femmes avec Zwift. This milestone event captured the hearts of the international sporting community and gained the attention of the international press, inspiring millions of sports enthusiasts following the race roadside and on television.

Dutch rider Annemiek van Vleuten became the first winner of this historic event in a season where she


demonstrated the depth of her physical endurance and experience. She became the first woman in history to not only win three Grand Tours in the same year, but also the road race of the UCI Road World Championships. The Movistar Team Women rider again won the UCI Women's WorldTour Individual Ranking with a total of 3,589 points, ahead of Trek Segafredo's Elisa Longo Borghini, of Italy, with 2,710 points and Team SD Worx rider Demi Vollering, of the Netherlands (2,681 points).

These three riders were not the only stars of the season, as highlighted by the UCI Women's WorldTour Team Ranking, won once again by Team SD Worx. The Dutch squad won a total of 11 UCI WWT races, highlighted by the Belgian Lotte Kopecky's win at Strade Bianche, the Swiss Marlen Reusser's stage win at the Tour de France Femmes avec Zwift and the South African Ashleigh Moolman-Pasio's overall victory at the Tour de Romandie Femmes, in front of none other than Van Vleuten.

NO STOPPING THE DUTCH IN FRANCE

Dutchwomen Marianne Vos and Annemiek van Vleuten are uncontestably two of the biggest names in women's cycling. They proved it once again at the inaugural Tour de France Femmes avec Zwift, winning five of the eight stages between them. Taking the yellow jersey after sprinting to victory on stage two, Vos remained in yellow until the sixth stage, which she also won. The final two stages saw Van Vleuten take the reins: she inherited the leader's jersey thanks to her victory in stage seven and ensured her overall victory with another stage win on the following day's final stage.

Marianne Vos won the points classification.

UCI GRAN FONDO WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



The 2022 UCI Gran Fondo World Championships took place in Trento, Italy, from 15 to 18 of September. The team relay kicked off the event on Friday, followed by the individual time trials on Saturday.

Sunday was the highlight with the road races attracting more than 2,000 riders from 60 countries.


The Gran Fondo participants (Men 19-59 years old and Women 19-49 years old) finished a distance of 143.8 km and an elevation of 3,900 metres. The Medio Fondo (Men 60+ years old and Women 50+ years old) raced two-thirds of the identical course with a distance of 86.8 km and an elevation of 2,218 metres.

All riders were taken up to the summit of the giant Monte Bondone, two and a half climbs for the Gran Fondo participants and once for the Medio Fondo riders.


The road races will no doubt be remembered for the breathtaking view of the city and of the Alps but also as one of the toughest of recent editions. The beautiful weather, cool in the morning but warmer with the sun later in the day under the bright blue sky made it a memorable day for all participants.






The 2022 UCI Gran Fondo World Series comprised 24 rounds across 23 countries in five continents. An increase in the number of athletes since the Covid-19 pandemic was highlighted at the Tour de Brisbane in Australia, Tour of Cambridge in Great Britain and the Maraton Franja BTC City in Slovenia, with each of these events attracting an impressive number of over 6,000 athletes.

The goal for the series is to promote high-level competition for Masters and Amateurs, as well as the globalisation of "cycling for all". In that sense the series achieved its goal and continues to expand.


The Series attracts former star riders from all over the planet. A prime example is Granfondo Ezaro, hosted in Spain with its iconic course along the Costa da Morte, the rough coastline in Galicia in the utter most west point of the European continent. The event has attracted former international top stars, such as Indurain, Chiappucci, Rominger, Zulle, Beloki, Pereiro and Casero. Being able to race alongside renowned athletes is certainly a part of the attraction for all participants.

The best riders in each age category at each event qualified for the 2022 UCI Gran Fondo World Championships.

UCI CYCLING ESPORTS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



After the successful inaugural edition of the UCI Cycling Esports World Championships in December 2020, the second edition was moved to a new February date to coincide with the peak of the virtual cycling season. The UCI again partnered with Zwift to deliver the 2022 UCI Cycling Esports World Championships, which were held on 26 February on the demanding Knickerbocker route in Zwift's virtual New York world.

More than 150 riders from 25 nations battled it out to become UCI World Champion. There were equal rider allocations, race distances, TV time, and prize money for both the men's and women's races. To ensure a level playing field, the UCI and Zwift partnered with Wahoo to provide every participant with a new Wahoo Kickr V5 direct drive smart trainer.

The women's competition was a race of attrition from the start. In the end, it was Loes Adegeest

(NED) who showed her superiority with a decisive acceleration at 200m to go to take the UCI World title ahead of Sweden's Cecilia Hansen (2nd) and Great Britain's Zoe Langham.


The men's race started hard and fast, forcing many of the pre-race favourites to come to the front early on. However, it was the Australian duo of Jay Vine and Freddy Ovett who took the gold and silver medals, with defending UCI World Champion Jason Osborne (GER) finishing third.


A new initiative for the 2022 edition was the opportunity for any Zwift community rider to qualify to represent their country. In November 2021, the UCI and Zwift organised five continental qualifiers (Oceania, Asia, Europe, Africa, and America), with the top five riders of each being added to their country's national team for the 2022 UCI Cycling Esports World Championships.




AT A GLANCE

2022 was the sole transition year between Olympic cycles, falling between the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games - postponed to 2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic -, and the beginning of the qualification pathway - in 2023 - for the next Summer Olympics in Paris 2024.


Several events in 2022 served as a testing ground for major upcoming competitions: the first round of the 2022 Tissot UCI Track Nations Cup was held at the Sir Chris Hoy Velodrome in Glasgow, Scotland (Great Britain), which will also host the track cycling events at the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships.

Meanwhile, Cali (Colombia) hosted the last round of the same series the year before welcoming the 2023 UCI Junior Track World Championships. Finally, the UCI World Championships for track and paracycling track were held in quick succession in Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines (France), the track cycling venue for the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

After a disrupted inaugural year, the UCI Track Champions League was in full swing with back-to-back rounds in four venues, including an extraordinary finish in London.


From 12 to 16 October, the best track cyclists in the world met at the Vélodrome National in Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines, near Paris (France), to battle for the coveted rainbow jersey. After hosting the 2021 edition of the UCI Track World Championships in Roubaix, the Fédération Française de Cyclisme (FFC) delivered an event that saw an increase in the number of nations and participants compared to the previous year.


This was thanks in part to the lifting of many Covid-19 restrictions globally, and also to the imminent start of the qualification period for the 2024 Olympic Games. The Vélodrome National was the theatre of exciting races in an electric atmosphere. Fans turned up in droves to watch the action, cheer on the riders, and get a foretaste of what they can expect at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.


Germany broke the Women's team sprint world record, which they had established the year before in Roubaix. They went faster by 0.097sec in Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines. Another world record came in the Men's individual pursuit, where Italian Filippo Ganna became the first rider to break the 4-minute barrier at sea level (3'59"636). His feat came only six days after setting a new UCI Hour Record timed by Tissot (56.792km), extending the previous world mark by 1.244m.


The delegation from the Netherlands topped the medal standings, taking home 10 medals, including four titles of UCI World Champion: in the Men's sprint, keirin, points race and 1km time trial. The Dutch were nevertheless deprived of the Men's team sprint rainbow jersey, which they had won four consecutive years (2018-2021), before losing it to Australia in 2022.





The 47th UCI Junior Track World Championships were held in Tel Aviv, Israel, from 23 to 27 August. The Israel Cycling Federation hosted the event at the Sylvan Adams National Velodrome, which had been inaugurated in 2018 on the occasion of the start of the Giro d'Italia in Israel. These UCI Junior Track World Championships were the first UCI World Championships to be held in Israel.


Of the 40 nations represented, 18 took medals home. Germany topped the medals table with 12 medals, of which four - including three gold - were won by Germany's Clara Schneider: in the sprint, keirin and team sprint. She won silver in the 500m time trial.

These UCI Junior Track World Championships also saw Great Britain's Zoe Bäckstedt win a rainbow jersey in a third cycling discipline. She claimed the title in the Madison (with Grace Lister) after previously conquering titles on the road in 2020 (Flanders, Belgium) and in cyclo-cross (Fayetteville, Arkansas, USA) in early 2022.

UCI TRACK CHAMPIONS LEAGUE



The second edition of the UCI Track Champions League kicked off in Mallorca (Spain) on 12 November and concluded with a double header in London (Great Britain) on 3 December, in front of an ecstatic crowd in the sold-out Lee Valley VeloPark. In between, the League stopped over in Berlin (Germany) and Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines (France).


The athletes in the 2022 UCI Track Champions League had 60 UCI World Championship titles between them as well as 28 Olympic medals. Of the 72 riders competing, 39 were making their debut in the League. Twenty different riders claimed victories, including newcomers such as Chloe Moran (Australia), and Mathias Guillemette (Canada).

Racing was exciting throughout the 2022 season, with close battles for the leaders' jerseys until the very end. In the Sprint League, the newly crowned women's sprint UCI World Champion Mathilde Gros


(FRA) secured the win with 13 points over Canadian Kelsey Mitchell, Olympic Champion in the sprint. In the men's competition, fans were treated to a fierce series-long battle between Australian Matthew Richardson and 11-time UCI World Champion Harrie Lavreysen from the Netherlands. Only in the very last race, did Richardson manage to take the title from defending winner Lavreysen.

The Endurance League saw American Jennifer Valente hold on to the leader's jersey all season, successfully defending her title despite close battles with Great Britain's Katie Archibald. Competition in the men's Endurance League could not have been closer between Switzerland's Claudio Imhof and Spain's Sebastián Mora: the two men started the final round with an equal number of points at the top of the leaderboard and ended the night with 125 points each. However, it was Imhof who claimed the title thanks to finishing ahead of Mora in the evening's final race, the elimination race.




AT A GLANCE

2022 saw a return to the full schedule of UCI para-cycling events. UCI Para-cycling World Championships were competed across track and road, and the UCI Para-cycling Road World Cup was back in force with three rounds. In addition, 92 events were registered on the UCI Para-cycling International Calendar, the second-highest number of all time. The qualification pathway for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games began: of the

total 220 slots available for Paris 2024, a maximum of 75 could already be earned by nations in 2022.

The UCI provided seven classification opportunities around the world, classifying 235 athletes. In another positive sign of recovery after the Covid-19 pandemic, the UCI was able to host a full in-person classification panel at the 2022 UCI Para-cycling Track World Championships, for the first time since January 2020.








UCI PARA-CYCLING ROAD WORLD CUP





The 2022 UCI Para-cycling Road World Cup returned with a full three rounds after most stopovers were cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The 2022 series stopped over in Ostend (Belgium) and Elzach (Germany) in May with the final round taking place in Québec City (Canada) in August.

Ostend, a city that has hosted multiple rounds of the UCI Para-cycling Road World Cup in previous years, was the theatre of the first major international paracycling competition since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic. In total, 368 athletes from 39 nations were on site to compete.


Not to be outdone, the week after Ostend the UCI ParacyclingRoadWorldCupmovedtoElzach,whereenthusiasm was just as high: 327 athletes from 38 nations took part in the event which featured a rare hill-climb time trial.


Finally, round three of the 2022 UCI Para-cycling Road World Cup took place in Québec City, where 27 overall UCI Para-cycling Road World Cup winners were crowned. The final round - featuring 248 athletes from 38 nations – also served as a warm-up for the 2022 UCI Para-cycling Road World Championships taking place the following week.


In total, 500 individual athletes from 46 nations took part in the 2022 UCI Para-cycling Road World Cup, the second highest participation in the history of the series. The number of requests for classification was the highest ever, and the UCI was able to provide physical impairment classification at all three events, plus visual impairment classification at the first round in Ostend.

UCI PARA-CYCLING TRACK WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



The UCI Para-cycling Track World Championships (20-23 October) made a welcome return to the UCI Para-cycling International Calendar after their cancellation in 2021 due to the Covid-19 Pandemic. The 2022 edition was held at the Vélodrome National in Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines (France) one week after the Tissot UCI Track World Championships at the same venue, which will also host the para-cycling track events at the Paris 2024 Paralympics. A total of 174 athletes competed over four days, with a new record number of 38 participating nations, including Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan for the first time. Great Britain finished at the top of the medal table, confirming their strength as a track cycling nation. Of their 28 total medals, an amazing 20 were gold. Team GB was followed in the medal table by Australia (19 medals including seven gold) and France (17 medals including six gold).


An incredible 11 new world records – six of them in the flying 200 metres - were set by nine different athletes from six countries: Canada, Great Britain, France, the Netherlands, Spain and Switzerland.









Record numbers of registered events and UCI Mountain Bike Teams in 2022 demonstrated the good health and growth of the discipline.

To continue on the theme of records, the number of UCI Mountain Bike Teams that registered in 2022 was another: 151 compared to between 109 and 119 the previous years.







2022 MOUNTAIN BIKE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

LES GETS FRANCE



The 2022 UCI Mountain Bike World Championships took place between 24 and 28 August in Les Gets, France. The event returned to France for the first time since 2004, when they were also held in Les Gets. Already a popular and appreciated venue 18 years previously, the resort in the Haute-Savoie department again pulled out all the stops. Amazing races, great performances and records, as well as a large and enthusiastic public all contributed to the stunning success of the competitions. A record 58 nations entered at least one athlete, and the medals were distributed to riders from 15 different countries.

Les Gets 2022 included the fast and dynamic cross-country short track (XCC) competitions that had been introduced to the programme the previous year. The thrilling, high-speed races – won by Pauline Ferrand-Prévot (FRA) and New Zealand's Sam Gaze –, confirmed that this format more than deserves its place at the UCI Mountain Bike World Championships.

The highlight for the enthusiastic crowd was the French 1-2-3 in the Men Elite downhill (DHI) competition on day three. Loïc Bruni, Amaury Pierron and Loris Vergier provoked a mass celebration thanks to their gold, silver and bronze medals that were celebrated well into the night by their fans.

Indeed, the French enjoyed a fantastic "home" event by topping the medal table with five gold -including two for Ferrand-Prévot, who won a fourth Women Elite cross-country Olympic (XCO) title two days after being crowned in the XCC -, four silver and three bronze.

France was followed in the medal table by Switzerland (four gold, five silver, four bronze), which also boasted repeat wins: a seventh title in the cross-country team relay (XCR) and a record-breaking 10th title in the Men Elite XCO for Nino Schurter.



UCI MOUNTAIN BIKE MARATHON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS





The 2022 UCI Mountain Bike Marathon World Championships took place on 17 September in Haderslev, Denmark, which turned on early autumnal sunshine for the world's best riders. The course was designed to be as natural as possible, with flowing singletrack sections and few manmade technical interventions. The organisers had promised a fast pace and the athletes duly delivered.

As is the tradition, the UCI Mountain Bike Marathon World Championships were one of the final cross-country (XC) UCI mountain bike events of the year. This means specialists from the different XC formats - cross-country marathon (XCM), cross-country Olympic (XCO) and cross-country short track (XCC) - are able to compete without jeopardizing their season. Riders with UCI World, Olympic and Commonwealth titles were in the mix, aiming for glory over the challenging courses of 87km for women and 120km for the men.


The winners in Denmark had already been awarded rainbow jerseys just a few weeks earlier in much

shorter formats. Indeed, the unstoppable Pauline Ferrand-Prévot claimed her third mountain bike UCI World title of the year after those for XCC and XCO, while Sam Gaze added the XCM title to his XCC title won in Les Gets.


The global popularity and density of talent in XCM was demonstrated by the range of nations represented in Haderslev: 139 men from 33 nations and 50 women from 21 countries, with athletes from nations as diverse as Lesotho, Costa Rica, Namibia and New Zealand alongside many European nations. The six medals up for grabs in Haderslev went to riders from six different nations.

From next year, when XCM racing will be integrated into the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup, the top 20 men and 20 women of each XCM round will qualify for the UCI Mountain Bike Marathon World Championships, as will the top 80 men and top 80 women of the individual UCI XCM Ranking.






Nineteen qualifying events had been held in 16 countries around the world, starting in Bariloche (Argentina) in March and concluding in Santiago on 18 November, on the eve of the UCI World Championships.

Christa Von Niederhäusern (SUI) and Niels Bensink (NED) survived through a relentless series of races - that included timed flying laps followed by a knock-out qualifying round, 1/8 finals, quarter-finals and semi-finals - to make the final cut and ultimately claim their hard-earned rainbow jerseys.

MERCEDES-BENZ UCI MOUNTAIN BIKE WORLD CUP



The 2022 Mercedes-Benz UCI Mountain Bike World Cup comprised eleven rounds in eleven countries between March and September. Cross-country Olympic (XCO) riders competed in nine events, while downhill (DHI) specialists had eight rounds in which to rack up points for the final standing.

For the first time since its introduction into the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup in 2018, cross-country short track (XCC) was organised as a standalone competition with its own overall UCI World Cup standing. All XCC rounds were fast and exciting, with the overall titles going to Alessandra Keller (SUI) and Alan Hatherly (RSA).


In view of the success of XCC at the Mercedes-Benz UCI Mountain Bike World Cup, the UCI has decided to add separate events for the Men Under 23 and Women Under 23 categories from 2023. These will be added to the programme of each round hosting XCC competitions, with an overall UCI World Cup standing for XCC to be calculated for each of the two new categories.

The overall Elite winners of the 2022 Mercedes-Benz UCI Mountain Bike World Cup for XCO and DHI were decided at the final round in Val di Sole (Italy), held the week after the 2022 UCI Mountain Bike World Championships. Alessandra Keller (SUI) added the XCO overall title to her XCC title, while Nino Schurter (SUI) took a record 8th overall XCO win. The overall Elite downhill winners were Camille Balanche (SUI), winner of three rounds, and Amaury Pierron (FRA) who racked up four victories of the season.







The 2022 UCI E-Mountain Bike Cross-country World Cup spanned six months (April - October) and featured eleven rounds in six venues. Like last year, each venue hosted two rounds on consecutive days, with the exception of Barcelona (Spain), host of the 11th and final round on 15 October.


The women's overall classification was claimed by Swiss rider Nicole Göldi who took her first win at one of the rounds in Monghidoro (Bologna, Italy) then secured double victories in Charade/Clermont-Ferrand (Belgium) and Costa Brava-Girona (Spain).

The trend from 2021 repeated itself in the men's competition, with Frenchman Jérôme Gilloux and Switzerland's Joris Ryf topping the overall ranking. This year Gilloux had sealed the deal before the final three races in Spain, and despite his absence due to illness at the final round in Barcelona, his overall title was assured.

UCI GRAVEL WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



The first edition of the UCI Gravel World Championships was held on October 8 and 9 in Veneto, Italy with 556 riders competing for the rainbow jersey in their respective age category.

In the magnificent setting of the Veneto region, the best amateur cyclists who had qualified during one of the 11 events of the UCI Gravel World Series, lined up alongside athletes competing in the Elite race such as Pauline Ferrand-Prévot, Gianni Vermeersch, Mathieu Van der Poel and Peter Sagan.


The races (140km, 166km or 194km depending on the age and category) all started in Vicenza, leading riders to the finish in the breathtaking city of Cittadella, located in the province of Padua, famous for being the only walled city in all of Europe to have a medieval Ronda Walkway. The course consisted of unpaved, hard gravel, cobbles, hard surface and asphalt with an elevation between 700 and 800 metres.


Gianni Vermeersch (BEL) took the first Men Elite title in the UCI Gravel World Championships. Chasing behind were Daniel Oss (ITA) and Mathieu Van der Poel (NED) who claimed second and third respectively. The Women Elite title went to France's Pauline Ferrand-Prévot.


With the booming rise in the discipline, we expect to see a rise in the number of participants over the coming years.





The Trek UCI Gravel World Series was introduced in 2022, with the Philippines hosting the inaugural event in Bongabon city on 2 April with 375 riders. The course was 83% gravel with a challenging climb in the first 5km. With much excitement, the series continued for a further 11 races in 11 cities, over four continents (Asia, Oceania, Europe and America). The long-awaited gravel races attracted over 5,000 riders from over 40 nations. The overall number was lower than anticipated but the feedback from the riders, as well as the organisers, was very positive. A huge jump in participation levels is therefore expected for 2023.

The courses for each event were unique, and featured open gravel, tarmac roads, forest and agricultural roads. Race routes varied from the flat fast gravel and challenging hills of La Monsterrato (Italy) to the superb Seven race, made up of 96% gravel through the Australian outback. The first European qualifier, Wish One Gravel Race, in France, attracted pro riders from UCI ProTeam TotalEnergies Niki Terpstra and Geoffrey Soupe, adding to the excitement of the race. The series drew to a close with the Hutchinson Ranxo Gravel in Spain, taking riders over the longest distance of the series: 166km with not far off 2000m elevation.

In comparison to the UCI Gran Fondo World Series, the UCI Gravel World Series also caters to Elite riders, who made up 60% of the 19-34 age group. The best riders in each category at each event qualified for the 2022 UCI Gravel World Championships.








pushed throughout the season in a bid to top the UCI BMX Racing World Cup standings. Meanwhile, the purpose-built 450 metre BMX Racing track in Nantes, France, proved fast for the riders competing in the 2023 UCI BMX Racing World Championships, with races being completed in 30 seconds.

NANTES FRANCE



The UCI BMX Racing World Championships were held at the Parc des Expositions, Nantes (France) and attracted in excess of 3000 athletes thanks to the return of the UCI BMX Racing Challenge and Masters categories. Spectators flocked to the venue every day to watch the action.


UCI World Championship categories benefitted from innovation in 2022, not least with the introduction of Under 23 categories for both men and women. In addition, a new racing format (replacing the format of 3 motos) saw riders from the first round who did not qualify directly for the next phase of competition move to a Last Chance Qualifier round. Already in place at the UCI BMX Racing World Cup, the new format better showcases the discipline and its introduction at the UCI Worlds provides uniformity at main UCI events.

Camille Maire, the only French Women Elite rider in the final, was supported by an ecstatic crowd. All eight riders took the first jump together, but 2012 and 2013 Junior UCI World Champion Felicia Stancil (USA) took the lead into the first corner and remained in front until the end, finishing ahead of UCI World Cycling Centre's Zoé Claessens, of Switzerland.


In the Men Elite final, half the starting gate was wearing the French National team jersey: firm favourite Sylvain Andre in lane 1, Arthur Pilard, Joris Daudet and Eddy Clerte. A collision between Australia's Izaac Kennedy and Pilard at the first jump reduced the field to six riders, from which Simon Marguart (SUI) took the lead in the second straight and held on to the finish. It was the second year running that a UCI World Cycling Centre rider was crowned UCI World Champion, after Niek Kimmann (NED) in 2021.


Léo Garoyan (FRA) and Malene Sørensen (DEN) are the first ever Under-23 UCI World Champions for BMX Racing, while the Junior titles went to Julian Bijsterbosch (NED) - who had qualified from the Last Chance Qualifier - and Léa Brindjonc (FRA).



UCI BMX RACING WORLD CUP

The 2022 UCI BMX Racing World Cup opened in May at the Glasgow BMX Centre, which will also host the BMX Racing at the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships being held in Glasgow and across Scotland. The following month, rounds 3 & 4 were held at the Netherlands' Olympic Training Centre Papendal, home of Olympic Champion Niek Kimmann. The final 4 rounds were staged in the Colombian capital of Bogotá, at the Carlos Ramirez BMX Park, on two back-to-back weekends in September and October.

The Under 23 categories, introduced in 2021, provided close and spectacular racing, with rider numbers equalling those of the Elite fields.

After opening round wins by Diego Arboleda (COL), Jeremy Rencurel (FRA), Sylvain Andre (FRA) and Romain Mahieu (FRA) the Men Elite category was wide open. The overall winner would be decided in Bogotá. This set the scene for fast and competitive racing to close out the series. After 7 rounds, Sylvain Andre had the series won, which even a fall and only 7th place in the final could not upset.


Record holder for the most UCI World Cup wins, Laura Smulders (NED) started the season with back-to-back wins in Glasgow, followed by victories in rounds 6 & 7, extending her record of wins to an impressive 27 by the close of 2022.


It was Sylvain Andre's second UCI BMX Racing World Cup overall title (after 2017) and a fifth overall victory for Laura Smulders (after back to back wins from 2016 to 2019). UCI World Champion Léo Garoyan (FRA) and Latvia's Veronika Stūriška took the series wins in the Men Under 23 and Women Under 23 categories respectively.


In addition, Joris Daudet (FRA), Smulders, Zoé Claessens (SUI), Garoyan and Stūriška received awards for winning two UCI World Cup rounds in the same weekend.

The TV production over the past two years has been undertaken by Olympic Channel. For the 2023-2024 season, the UCI has taken the TV Production inhouse and will manage the TV Production and Rights to the UCI BMX Racing World Cup. This will provide the UCI with additional distribution possibilities and the use of all footage for the promotion of the UCI BMX Racing World Cup and BMX Racing in general. This is viewed as a positive step in growing the reach and following of BMX Racing.








AT A GLANCE

It was a return to normal for BMX Freestyle in 2022 after two years severely impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. With the help of National Federations, 60 events in countries on four continents - America, Asia, Europe and Oceania - were registered on the UCI BMX Freestyle International Calendar.

The Olympic qualification period for Paris 2024 began on 1st November, meaning the 2022 UCI Urban Cycling World Championships (9-13 November) were particularly important for the BMX Freestyle Park athletes. Meanwhile qualification was ongoing for the inaugural UCI Cycling World Championships being held in Glasgow and across Scotland in August 2023.

UCI URBAN CYCLING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS - BMX FREESTYLE



The 2022 UCI Urban Cycling World Championships again gathered the world's best specialists of BMX Freestyle (Park & Flatland) and trials. In 2021, the event had featured only BMX Freestyle due to the Covid-19 pandemic, which had also forced their cancellation in 2020.


Held from 9 to 13 November, the UCI Urban Cycling World Championships were hosted in Abu Dhabi (United Arab Emirates) for the first time and will return to the same venue in 2024.

Japan made a strong impression in the BMX Freestyle competitions, winning five of the 12

available medals (including two gold) thanks to Rim Nakamura's domination in the Men's Park, a clean sweep of the Men's Flatland podium (1st Moto Sasaki; 2nd Masato Ito and 3rd Kio Hayakawa) and bronze in the Women's Flatland (Kirara Nakagawa). These results are in no small part due to Japan's BMX Freestyle Flatland schools in several cities which are producing talented young riders.

Also of note was the fourth Women's Park title for American Hannah Roberts after victories in 2017, 2019, 2021.

UCI BMX FREESTYLE WORLD CUP



After two years' absence, the UCI BMX Freestyle World Cup returned in 2022 with three rounds: one for Park and Flatland and two for Park only. The globalisation and popularity of the discipline came to the fore with new nations making their mark on the competition, and two venues hosting a round for the first time.

The atmosphere in Montpellier, in the south of France, was electric for the season-opener. In total, 600,000 people flocked to the venue over the five days of competition. Julia Preuss (GER) won the women's Flatland while Japan ruled the men's Flatland: the top four riders were all from the land of the rising sun, with Kio Hayakawa taking the win.

Rim Nakamura continued the Japanese party in Montpellier when he took the BMX Freestyle Park win, while Lizsurley Villegas Serna signed the women's victory for Colombia.

The Belgian capital of Brussels hosted a round of the UCI BMX Freestyle World Cup (Park) for the first


time, organising a fantastic competition in a giant park, much to the delight of spectators who had a bird's-eye view from the adjacent hill.


Victories went to Anthony Jeanjean (FRA) and women's 2021 UCI World Champion Hannah Roberts (USA).


Following a successful and popular competition, Brussels returns to the calendar in 2023.

After two second places, the reigning men's Olympic Champion Logan Martin pulled out all the stops to take a home victory – and the overall UCI World Cup win - in another new venue, Gold Coast. It was the first time in the history of the UCI BMX Freestyle World Cup that an event was held in Australia. The location Down Under obviously suited the Chinese delegation, which was represented by four women in the final and took first and second place with Jiaqi Sun and Huimin Zhou. An injured Roberts managed third place to nevertheless claim the overall UCI World Cup win.






AT A GLANCE

The UCI Trials International Calendar included two rounds of the UCI Trials World Cup, the UCI Urban Cycling World Championships and a return of the UCI Trials World Youth Games after two years' absence due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The competition format based on an accumulation of points across the sections - introduced at the UCI Trials World Championships in 2017 and rolled out over all UCI World Cup rounds two years later - will be implemented at all events on the UCI Trials International Calendar, including National Championships, from 2023.




The UCI World Championships for the spectacular trials discipline were able to reintegrate the UCI Urban Cycling World Championships alongside BMX Freestyle in 2022 after two years' disruption due to the Covid-19 pandemic: cancellation in 2020 and held as a standalone event in 2021.


More than 100 riders from 22 nations lined up in Abu Dhabi (United Arab Emirates) from 9 to 13 November to compete for the rainbow jerseys in the trials competitions. Germany's Nina Reichenbach (Women Elite) and British rider Jack Carthy (Men Elite 26") both claimed impressive fifth rainbow jerseys in their respective categories, but it was nevertheless Spain that topped the medals table with three UCI World titles: in the team event, the Men Elite 20" with Eloi Palau and the Men Junior 26" with Diego Garrués. The remaining gold medal up for grabs (Men Junior 20") went to France with Robin Berchiatti.


It is worth noting that while the same athletes have dominated the Men Elite 26" and Women Elite competitions in recent years, the Men Elite 20" has seen a different UCI World Champion crowned at each of the last five editions: Abel Mustieles (ESP) in 2017, Thomas Pechhacker (AUT) in 2018, Dominik Oswald (GER) in 2019, Borja Conejos (ESP) in 2021 and Eloi Palau in 2022.








ATHLETE PARTICIPATION PER CONTINENT


A total of 137 riders from 19 countries participated across the two rounds of the 2022 UCI Trials World Cup.


Nine months after hosting the 2021 UCI Trials World Championships, the city of Vic (Spain) again became the epicentre of this exciting discipline when it provided the stage for the first round of the 2022 UCI Trials World Cup (27-29 May). Three months later, eight weeks after Copenhagen had hosted the Grand Depart of the Tour de France, the Danish capital again welcomed the world's finest riders, this time for the trials discipline at the second and final round of the UCI Trials World Cup (26-28 August).

Outright victories with two wins out of two went to Spain's Borja Conejos (Men Elite 20") and Great Britain's Jack Carthy (Men Elite 26"). Spain's Vera Báron took the Women's title thanks to her win in Copenhagen after 2nd place in Vic.


The 2022 UCI Trials World Cup saw top performances from both seasoned athletes and rookies: At the age of 37, Frenchman Vincent Hermance finished 3rd overall in the Men Elite 26" while at less than half his age, 16-year-old Hilda Andersson (SWE) finished on the third step of the Women Elite overall UCI Trials World Cup. Other young guns to look out for in the future are Finland's Niilo Stenvall (Men 20") and Spain's Daniel Cegarra (Men 26") who, at the age of 17, gave their elders a run for their money and made the finals in Copenhagen.




The UCI Trials World Youth Games returned in 2022 after their cancellation in 2020 and 2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. It was the fourth time that Poland hosted this annual event, which traditionally reveals the stars of the future.

Wadowice again showcased the amazing talent of the very best under-16 athletes across two categories for girls and four for boys. In total, 164 riders from 16 countries took to the purpose-built course - rocks, railway sleepers, concrete pipes and logs - in Wadowice's John Paul II Square.

Nine countries won medals, with Spain at the top of the medals table: five golds - including in the team event -, three silver and two bronze. France and Germany were the other nations to win gold, with the latter also claiming a bronze medal. The other medals were shared between hosts Poland, Japan, Czech Republic, Belgium, Italy and Slovakia.



CYCLO-CROSS OVERVIEW & STATISTICS



After two seasons disrupted by the Covid-19 pandemic, the UCI Cyclo-cross International Calendar and the number of registered UCI Teams began a return to normal in 2022.


The UCI World Championships for cyclo-cross took place in the USA for the 2nd time in the event's history: nine years after Louisville 2013, the event was held in Fayetteville, Arkansas, in 2022. Junior racing was back after a restricted

racing programme in 2021 due to the pandemic. A team relay test event was also held with a view to inclusion in the official programme in 2023.

The last three rounds of a highly successful 2021-2022 UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup took place in January 2022. The beginning of the 2022-2023 UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup saw 11 of the 14 rounds organised almost every week-end from October to December.

WALMART UCI CYCLO-CROSS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



The 2022 Walmart UCI Cyclo-cross World Championships took place in Fayetteville, Arkansas (United States of America), on 29-30 January. Junior racing returned to the programme and the public was out in force, signalling a welcome return to normal after 2021, when the event was organised in Ostend (Belgium) with a restricted programme and behind closed doors due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Under the patronage of the Walton Foundation, the 2022 edition saw racing at a venue specifically built for the competition. The sunny, mild, dry weather set the scene for high-speed races, in stark contrast to the UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup round organised three and a half months earlier at the same venue, where the muddy conditions had made racing extremely physical.

In total, 18,200 spectators flocked to the venue to watch the rainbow jersey battles.


The format of the team relay test event - held the day before the official UCI World Championships - had to be adapted at the last minute when almost 10% of the registered riders were unable to travel to the


event due to illness or Covid-19 travel restrictions. To ensure nations could still field a team, the UCI reduced the number of riders per team from six to four. Victory went to Italy, followed by hosts USA and

The Netherlands dominated the individual races, winning two gold medals, four silver and two bronze. Of particular note was the sprint between their two Women Elite stars Lucinda Brand and Marianne Vos, the latter finally taking a record 8th UCI World title in the discipline. Dutch women also dominated the Under 23 race, making a clean sweep of the podium with Puck Pieterse, Shirin Van Anrooij and Fem Van Empel. Meanwhile Belgium achieved a 1-2-3 in the Men Under 23 category (Joran Wyseure, Emiel Verstringe, Thibau Nys).


Great Britain's Tom Pidcock put on a one man show to become the first British Elite UCI Cyclo-cross World Champion, while fellow Briton Zoe Bäckstedt stole the show in the Women Junior category, adding another rainbow jersey to those already won in road and track. Switzerland's Jan Christen was victorious in the Men Junior category.

UCI CYCLO-CROSS WORLD CUP



2022 saw UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup racing back in full after the Covid-19 pandemic had disrupted the first season (2020-2021) organised by Flanders Classics.

The three final rounds of the 2021-2022 UCI Cyclocross World Cup took place in January 2022, shortly before the Walmart UCI Cyclo-cross World Championships that marked the end of the season.

Of the 14 rounds of the 2022-2023 UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup, 11 were staged between October and December 2022, all organised without Covid-19 restrictions and enjoying massive public presence. The round scheduled in London (Great Britain) was replaced by Dublin, the first time a round of the series was organised in the Irish city. Other newcomers to the UCI World Cup calendar were Maasmechelen (Belgium) and Beekse Bergen (Netherlands).


Eli Iserbyt (BEL) and Fem Van Empel (NED) dominated the early season in the Men Elite and


Women Elite competitions with respectively three and four consecutive victories. Both athletes were then challenged by their compatriots: Belgians Laurens Sweeck and Michael Vanthourenhout took the next victories in the Men Elite racing while Dutchwomen Puck Pieterse and Shirin Van Anrooij interrupted Van Empel's winning streak in the Women Elite.


The end of November saw the return of the three big cyclo-cross names, Wout van Aert (BEL), Mathieu Van der Poel (NED) and Tom Pidcock (GBR). This led to epic battles that attracted more and more spectators and media.

The youth categories were organised at two of the five rounds in October and were dominated by Belgian Thibau Nys who took both wins in the Men Under 23 races and the Netherlands' Lauren Molengraaf who did the same in the Women Junior category. New talents Léo Bisiaux (FRA) and Guus Van Den Eijnden (NED) took one Men Junior victory each.



AT A GLANCE

Of the 48 events registered on the 2022 UCI Indoor Cycling International Calendar, only two had to be cancelled, despite the ongoing impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. This once again highlights the efforts of the organisers and athletes to ensure a full and successful season.

Members of the newly formed UCI Indoor Cycling Commission began their work together and the commission was able to meet in person for the first time at the 2022 UCI Indoor Cycling World Championships in Ghent, Belgium.

UCI INDOOR CYCLING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



The 2022 UCI Indoor Cycling World Championships were held in Ghent, Belgium, from 4 to 6 November. The competitions took place in the Topsporthal Vlandeeren, which is usually used as an athletics hall. The event benefited from an experienced local organising committee which had already hosted the 2018 edition of the World Championships.

Athletes from 22 countries participated, with Great Britain entering athletes in the cycle-ball competition for the first time. The action was live-streamed on Twitch and broadcast by the UCI on its Youtube channel.


After their upset win in 2021, Germans Bernd and Gerhard Mlady were unable to successfully defend their rainbow jersey in Ghent. The gold medal went back to the now eight-time UCI World Champion


Patrick Schnetzer (AUT) with his new partner Stefan Feurstein, who will be wearing the rainbow jersey for the first time in his career.


The Czech Republic retains its place in Group A after beating Japan in the relegation match. Consequently, in 2023 the Group A will comprise teams from Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, the Czech Republic and Switzerland.

The programme for artistic cycling comprised five categories: Single Men, Single Women, Pair Open, Pair Women and ACT4 Open. In total, 155 athletes from 22 nations (from Asia, Europe, north and south America) performed over the three days of artistic cycling competition. Female athletes accounted for 52% of the total participants.






ARTISTIC CYCLING WORLD CUP

After a reduced number of rounds in 2020 and 2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic the UCI Artistic Cycling World Cup was back to its usual three rounds and a Final in 2022.

The first round took place in Komárno (Slovakia) on 2 April, followed by rounds in Schiltigheim (France) on 9 July and Ebermannstadt (Germany) on 6 August.

Unfortunately, the Asian National Federations was unable to send its athletes to any of the rounds of the UCI Artistic Cycling World Cup due to ongoing quarantine regulations upon return to their home

countries. However, the number of participating National Federations increased, reaching 17, an alltime high since the beginning of the series.

The Final was held in Erlenbach (Germany) on 29 October. Scheduled only one week prior to the UCI Indoor Cycling World Championships, it was a good preparation for the athletes. A side event was organised for all athletes who had not qualified but were going to participate in the UCI Worlds. The event benefited from an experienced local organising committee which had already hosted the Final of the UCI Artistic Cycling World Cup in 2019.




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

The UCI Solidarity Programme, in its fifth year, continued to grow and develop strongly with a record number of applications received.

More funds and resources have been allocated to the programme than ever before, with an increase

in the number of bikes donated, educational courses delivered, and funding provided to the National Federations.



DNGRESS

RELATIONS WITH NATIONAL FEDERATIONS AND CONTINENTAL CONFEDERATIONS

The lifting of restrictions in the context of the Covid-19 pandemic allowed the UCI to meet with representatives of Continental Confederations and National Federations in person. In parallel, tools developed to deliver education courses online in previous years, these have continued to be utilised. Significant cost reductions from innovations have enabled greater reinvestment in the UCI Solidarity Programme, supporting National Federations and Continental Confederations in their long-term endeavours.

Daily support and guidance were provided National Federations and Continental Confederations by e-mail, videoconferencing, messaging and in person throughout 2022 on a variety of topics, such as visa support for the 2022 UCI Road World Championships, the UCI Solidarity Programme, enquiries related to interference issues within National Federations and to irregularities during elective general assemblies, affiliation

fees, certification of affiliation, general financial enquiries, UCI DataRide and the UCI extranet. The UCI also advised National Federations wishing to elaborate a bespoke strategy for the development of cycling within their institution, country and continent.

Between March and May, four of the five Continental Confederations held their Congress with UCI representation at each. As the Confédération Africaine de Cyclisme (CAC) holds its Congress every two years, it did not take place in 2022.

On 6 March, the Union Européenne de Cyclisme (UEC) delivered its event in Odense, Denmark. On 27 March, Dushanbe, Tajijistan, hosted the Asian Cycling Confederation (ACC). The Oceania Cycling Confederation Congress, on 9 April, was organised in Brisbane, Australia. Finally, on 16 May, the Confederación Panamericana de Ciclismo (COPACI) Congress was held in San Juan, Argentina.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS



2022 UCI CONGRESS

The UCI Congress is the annual gathering of the UCI affiliated member National Federations and the UCI's largest institutional event. The 191st edition of the event took place in Wollongong, in Australia, during the 2022 UCI Road World Championships. The UCI Congress brought together 166 representatives of 69 of the UCI's member National Federations. For the fourth time, National Federations classified in groups 3 and 4 benefited from the UCI's support to attend the event with the provision of five nights' accommodation. The event was livestreamed on the UCI's YouTube channel.

One new member joined the UCI at its 2022 Congress, which approved the affiliation of the Bhutan Cycling Federation, bringing the total of UCI affiliated National Federations to 202.

The Congress awarded the UCI Merit, a distinction rewarding those who have made a remarkable contribution to cycling, to Ms Tracy Gaudry (AUS), UCI first female Vice-President and two-time Olympian, to Tony Mitchell (NZL), President of the Oceania Cycling Confederation and President of the UCI Cycling for all and Sustainable Cycling Commission, to Mr Mohammed Ben El Mahi (MAR), member of the UCI Management Committee and President of the UCI Para-cycling Commission, to Ms Anna Meares (AUS), two-time Olympic Champion and 11-time UCI World Champion and posthumously to Mr Vincent Jacquet (FRA), former UCI Director of International Relations, Development and the UCI World Cycling Centre.






UCI NEWSLETTER

The UCI Newsletter is the main channel of communication to provide National Federations and the global cycling family with key information. All editions are accessible on the UCI website and via the National Federations' extranet. The UCI Newsletter is distributed to 3,475 subscribers, including National Federations, riders, teams, event organisers and Commissaires, among others.

In 2022, 16 editions of the UCI Newsletter were published (in English and French). These included 12 monthly editions and four special editions, namely three special editions on regulations changes approved by the Management Committee and a special edition on the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships.


UCI SOLIDARITY PROJECT SUPPORT

Of the UCI's 202 affiliated National Federations, those classified in groups 3 and 4 are in greatest need of support and represent 73% of the members for which the UCI Solidarity Programme provides support.

Through the four key areas of the Solidarity Programme — education, equipment, funding for special projects and athlete development - the UCI aims to increase the autonomy and independence of the less developed National Federations as well as the Continental Confederations by providing

them with support and guidance during the implementation of their projects.

By the end of 2022, 159 of a record 193 projects approved by the UCI Management Committee and implemented by the UCI and the UCI WCC had been completed. Some other projects were carried over to the first three months of 2023 to give National Federations and Continental Confederations the opportunity to complete projects not finalised in 2022.



2022 UCI SOLIDARITY FUNDING

UCI Solidarity funding in 2022 totalled CHF 1'264'985 with the Continental Confederation projects receiving CHF 760,686 and the National Federations CHF 504,299.

Furthermore, the UCI Management Committee approved exceptional financial support of 400,000 CHF to the activities of the Ukrainian Cycling Federation. In addition, the UCI allocated a 200,000 CHF budget to the organisation of the Afghanistan Road National Championships, held in Aigle, Switzerland. Further details can be found on pages 130-132.



DEVELOPMENT UCI WORLD CYCLING CENTRE



2022, BACK TO NORMALITY

The UCI World Cycling Centre (UCI WCC) is based in Aigle, Switzerland, and houses the UCI headquarters.

As a training and education centre, it welcomes predominantly riders from emerging nations from all over the world as they prepare for international competitions and major Games, as well as people involved in other aspects of cycling, such as coaches, mechanics, Commissaires, riders' agents and Sport Directors.

The UCI WCC is a fantastic facility and a major asset for helping Continental Confederations and emerging National Federations build their development strategies.

As the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic dissipated, the competition calendars across all disciplines were

filled once again. The UCI WCC welcomed trainees across multiple disciplines and continued to enhance its education courses both online and in person.

To best prepare for the post Covid-19 era at the UCI WCC, a position as Head of Training and Development was created to help the Sport Development Department roll out its objectives. Jacques Landry took up this role in early January.

Following the untimely death of Vincent Jacquet, Director of International Relations, Development and UCI World Cycling Centre, at the end of March, Jacques Landry was appointed UCI WCC Director, flanked by Philippe Duperrex as Head of UCI WCC Operations. The International Relations Director position was left to be filled.

CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF THE UCI WORLD CYCLING CENTRE

A fantastic milestone was reached in 2022. On Thursday 14 April the UCI WCC Centre celebrated its 20th anniversary. Located on the outskirts of Aigle in the canton of Vaud, at the foot of the Alpes vaudoises and a short distance from the canton of Valais, the UCI World Cycling Centre helped more than 1,400 young athletes train towards achieving their dreams and more than 1,200 people in cycling

professions to obtain qualifications through its different educational programmes.

To mark this momentous event, dignitaries from local and federal governments, IOC members, as well as Confederation Presidents joined both the President, David Lappartient and the UCI Director General, Amina Lanaya, at a cocktail party to celebrate two decades of the centre's development.



ATHLETES TRAINING AT THE UCI WCC

In 2022, activities at the UCI WCC returned to prepandemic levels for the first time since the Covid-19 pandemic.


At the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC), the preparation and training of athletes to qualify and compete at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games was a major focus for the coaches and staff as was the identification of young talents to ensure the future of the sport.

The UCI WCC collaborated closely with the five UCI WCC satellite centres around the world to devise common working methods and shared objectives, with a new set of specifications for "labelling" planned for 2022.


With the start of a new Olympiad, 2022 was a perfect opportunity for the UCI WCC to welcome new athletes across its BMX Racing, mountain bike, road and track programmes. Many of the athletes

had been identified via the UCI WCC's extensive coaching network, talent identification camps and UCI WCC Satellite centres. Athletes across all disciplines spent time expanding their training knowledge, whilst gaining valuable experience and exposure to international competitions. Whilst the UCI WCC welcomed several new athletes, an existing cohort of high-level athletes returned to the UCI WCC where they also played a vital role in the development of young athletes who visited the centre for the first time. These athletes included 2022 UCI World Championship medallists Nicholas Paul (track cycling) from Trinidad and Tobago, and Zoé Claessens (BMX Racing) from Switzerland.


For the first time, cycling's newest Olympic discipline, BMX Freestyle, featured at the UCI WCC. Athletes and coaches were invited to attend a training camp in August, with plans to expand the discipline support in 2023.

UCI WORLD CYCLING CENTRE



ROAD

The WCC Team, the UCI Women's Continental Team, comprised eight riders, from as many nations (Ethiopia, Czech Republic, Colombia, Japan, South Africa, Argentina, Estonia, Belarus). Their racing calendar was coordinated to provide varying levels of competition, from UCI ProSeries and Class 1 events to one-day "classics" (Class 1 and 2) and national level competitions.

During the season, three of these athletes were selected to represent their country at the 2022 UCI Road World Championships in Wollongong (Australia), in the road race, individual time trial and mixed team relay.

In August, two athletes from Eritrea and Switzerland joined the team as trainees.

As each year in August, a UCI WCC Men Under 23 road team was created to provide opportunities to take part in the Tour de l'Avenir. The team was composed of three Ethiopians, two Rwandans, and a South African, all of whom were selected for their talent and potential. The Tour de l'Avenir gave these riders exposure which could lead to a contract with a UCI WorldTeam.

Under the UCI Solidarity programme, the UCI WCC supported six athletes hailing from Ethiopia, Algeria, and South Africa to compete at the 2022 UCI Road World Championships. During these championships, for the third time, the WCC Team competed in the team time trial mixed relay.

TRACK

Seven athletes (3 females and 4 males) representing three Continental Confederations (ACC, COPACI and UEC) formed the core of the track cycling group during the 2022 season.

After a prolonged season due to the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, and Tissot UCI World Championships closely followed by the inaugural Track Champions League in the latter part of 2021, the risk of burn-out was high. Nonetheless the UCI WCC athletes acquitted themselves well throughout the 2022 season despite a few setbacks. Nicholas Paul from Trinidad and Tobago crashed twice in the first round of the Tissot UCI Track Nations Cup resulting in a broken collarbone which rendered him out of action for two months. He made a phenomenal recovery to come back and win both sprint and keirin events at the third round of the Tissot UCI Track Nations Cup in Cali (Colombia) where he was joined on the keirin podium by fellow UCI WCC athlete Jai Angsuthasawit from Thailand.

Time trial specialist Miriam Vece of Italy was crowned National Champion in both the 500m time trial and the individual sprint. She also picked up a bronze medal at the 2022 UEC Track Elite European Championships in Munich (Germany).

Nicholas Paul was the only UCI WCC rider to participate in the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham (United Kingdom). He claimed a full set of medals with a gold, silver and bronze in the keirin, sprint and 1km time trial respectively.

The Pan American Championships were held in Lima (Peru) and were attended by two of our cyclists, Jaïr Tjon En Fa (SUR) and Nicholas Paul (TTO). True to form Nicholas won three events: team sprint, keirin, and individual sprint with Jaïr in 2nd place on the sprint podium.

In the run-up to the Tissot UCI Track World Championships Nicholas suffered a horrendous training crash at the UCI WCC. Numerous injuries hospitalised him for a considerable time, but it is anticipated that he will be fully recovered by early 2023. As his crash was witnessed by the whole group, it had a marked effect on every athlete. As such, the teams' results were not as good as originally expected at the 2022 Tissot UCI Track World Championships in St Quentin (France).

Three UCI WCC athletes ended their season on a high with some great performances at the popular UCI Track Champions League series.



MOUNTAIN BIKE

Four nations and four Continental Confederations (COPACI, CAC, ACC, OCC) were represented among the UCI WCC mountain bike trainees in 2022. The season was structured to provide athletes with experience in a range of racing environments, whilst also balancing the number of racing days with quality training blocks. This consisted of 17 race days, four UCI Mountain Bike World Cup rounds and the 2022 UCI Mountain Bike World Championships in Les Gets (France).

Two of the Thai Cycling Association's athletes joined the UCI WCC for an eight-week training block in March to prepare for the Southeast Asian Games in Hanoi (Vietnam) in May. These athletes benefited from the high-level early season racing in Switzerland for their preparation.

Two AusCycling athletes were supported during 2022, their National Federations having requested UCI WCC assistance over the course of their national mountain bike programme reform. A rigorous AusCycling selection process identified, Katherine Hosking and Domenic Paolilli as the chosen Under 23 athletes. Due to the restrictions imposed by the Covid-19 pandemic over recent

years, the racing season in Europe was an important development step for these Southern Hemisphere athletes.

Hugo Hahn (NAM), following a period of rehabilitation after an early season injury, made his way back to racing fitness and represented Namibia at the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham (United Kingdom). The bronze medal in this event went to his compatriot, and former UCI WCC athlete, Alex Miller.

Three Brazilian athletes also joined the mountain bike programme. Two Juniors, Gabriela Pereira Ferolla and Eiki Yamauchi Leoncio, and one Under 23 rider, Gustavo Xavier De Oliveira Pereira. Gustavo who was in his second year in the Under 23 category was spotted by the UCI WCC in 2019 through a talent identification camp. Following a strong start to the 2022 season in Brazil, he continued to progress in Europe with two UCI World Cup podiums - 2nd in Albstadt (Germany), 3rd in Val di Sole (Italy) - and four top ten additional results in total. For the Juniors, experiencing the European racing and the lifestyle of Elite athletes as part of the UCI WCC team provided them with valuable experience to build their cycling careers.

BMX RACING

A mixture of returning athletes and new athletes made up the BMX Racing group of trainees at the UCI World Cycling Centre in 2022.

Swiss Elite riders Simon Marquart and Zoé Claessens were the outstanding performers of the year with Simon being crowned UCI BMX Racing World Champion in Nantes (France). Zoé had a successful year with second at the 2022 UCI BMX Racing World Championships and second overall in the 2022 UCI BMX Racing World Cup. This was achieved with a very impressive five podiums out of eight races, with another two places in the finals. She only finished outside of the final on one occasion.

Komet Sukprasert (THA) was crowned Asian Continental Champion in Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia). This was the first time a Thai male athlete had won these Championships and it propelled Komet into the spotlight within Thailand. After the event he

was flown back to Thailand to speak and meet with dignitaries before returning to Europe to finish his season.

Pedro Jose Benalcazar Guerrero (ECU) was the Junior Elite brought into the group for a three-month period to prepare for the 2022 UCI BMX Racing World Championships. With the UCI WCC being able to offer racing at both European Cup and UCI World Cup level it was the best preparation possible for the South American rider. Pedro progressed well across all the races he participated in while in Europe, but due to a bit of bad luck ended with 12th place at the 2022 UCI BMX Racing World Championships. After the Championships Pedro returned to South America where he took part in the 2022 Pan American Championships and came second in the Men Junior category.

CYCLO-CROSS

A pre-season cyclo-cross training camp for young talents was organised at the UCI World Cycling Centre at the end of July.

Twenty-one young cyclo-cross athletes from Austria, Brazil, Great Britain, Denmark, Iceland, Iran,

Israel, Italy, and Sweden, benefitted from a week of practical and theory sessions led by British coach Ed Collins and Italian international athlete Eva Lechner, both members of the UCI Cyclo-cross Commission.





SPOTLIGHT ON THE 2022 WOMEN'S ROAD CHAMPIONSHIPS OF AFGHANISTAN

On Sunday 23 October, 50 young Afghan women took part in the Women's Road Championships of Afghanistan, starting and finishing at the UCI World Cycling Centre. By holding this event in Switzerland, the UCI and its partners continued to support the Afghan Cycling Federation and its female athletes who, in danger in Afghanistan, were evacuated and welcomed in other countries where they can live and cycle in safety. This event is part of our efforts to provide support and assistance to the Cycling Federation of Afghanistan, in line with the values of the Olympic Movement.

Riders competed on a course comprising two laps of a 28.5 km circuit. The peloton rode through the towns of Aigle, Yvorne, Rennaz and Vouvry which are all situated close to the UCI WCC in the Chablais region of Vaud.

Two separate titles were awarded: one for the riders in the Elite category, and the other for those in the Under 23 category. However, all the participants started simultaneously and covered the same distance. Fariba Hashimi won both titles.

This event also provided an opportunity for these young women based in different countries to come together and celebrate their passion for cycling.



UCI WORLD CYCLING CENTRE

UCI WCC EDUCATION

The UCI WCC provides training for coaches, mechanics, Sport Directors and riders' agents. One of the main objectives is to provide National Federations and other cycling stakeholders with the resources and skills they need to develop their potential and perform at a professional level.

ONLINE COACHING COURSES

2022 was the second year that the UCI WCC delivered the online Level 1 (introductory level) coaching course. Eighteen courses were delivered, with a total of 354 participants. It is important to note that in 2021, the total number of courses delivered was higher as it included the back-log of courses from 2020.

COACHING COURSES AT THE UCI WCC

From May to October 2022, four training courses were held, attracting 36 participants, including ten women, from 24 countries.




The UCI WCC organised a handful of courses internationally with the support of the Olympic Solidarity and UCI Solidarity programmes.

Attracting 295 participants, these courses included:



SPORT DIRECTORS COURSE

From 31 October to 4 November, 81 people from 26 countries took part in the annual Sport Directors course and examination. Four of the 13 women on the course were granted a UCI scholarship to attend.

RIDERS' AGENTS ONLINE EXAMINATION

In June, 23 participants sat the online riders' agents examination.

MECHANICS COURSES

From February to December, 10 training courses were held at the UCI WCC for a total of 37 participants, coming from 21 countries.

MECHANICS ONLINE COURSES

The modules for the Level 1 online mechanics course have been completed and will be available on the Moodle platform from early 2023. The course comprises seven basic tutorials and instruction videos in English with French and Spanish subtitles and will be available to all our National Federations, Continental Confederations and UCI WCC Development Satellites.

WOMEN IN SPORT HIGH PERFORMANCE PATHWAY (WISH)

The UCI WCC continued its collaboration with other International Federations and the IOC / Olympic Solidarity to develop leadership skills and competencies of women in sport. This high performance coach programme started in August 2022 with three women coaches taking part. Two

one-week residential courses were organised in London from 15 to 19 August and 23 to 29 October. This training programme is delivered mostly on-line and will end in January 2024.

OLYMPIC SOLIDARITY PROGRAMME

The UCI WCC and the IOC's Olympic Solidarity unit worked together during 2022 on different programmes:

- Three scholarships for the UCI WCC Level 1 and 2 coaching course and five scholarships for the UCI WCC Level 3 coaching course
- Eleven scholarships for the Certificate of Advanced Studies (CAS) in cycling coaching
- Coaching course Level 2 in Couva (Trinidad and Tobago).

CERTIFICATE OF ADVANCED STUDIES (CAS) IN CYCLING COACHING

Certification of Advanced Studies (CAS) in Cycling Coaching is an international continuing education programme in cycling coaching, which combines academic theory and practical application. It has been developed by the University of Lausanne (UNIL) and the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI).

Starting in November 2022 and finishing in March 2023, 18 people (5 women and 13 men) from 11 countries were chosen to attend this high level course.

The UCI, UCI WCC and University of Lausanne (UNIL) signed a cooperation agreement for continuing education and research in cycling in the areas of aerodynamics, nutrition, women in cycling, leadership and data analysis.

From 2022, these organisations collaborated with a view to establishing a continuing education course "Cycling Coaching" aimed at National Federation coaches. Short courses were proposed in the domains of development and cycling for all. In addition, the UCI and UNIL worked together to set up joint research projects.

UCI WORLD CYCLING CENTRE



UCI WCC OPERATIONS & INFRASTRUCTURES

In line with the UCI Agenda 2030, which recognises the importance of collective actions to tackle climate change while promoting transitions towards cleaner energy sources, major works were carried out by the UCI WCC. A total of 292 photovoltaic panels were installed on the roof of the gymnastic hall and 106 on the administrative building. At the same time, all the lamps in the velodrome and the gymnastic hall were replaced by LED technology, improving the quality of lighting and saving energy. The work started in early November and the panels were operational by the end of December.

The energy produced by these panels is about 175,000 kWh a year which represents just over 35% of the building's annual consumption. These changes will also contribute to reduce our emissions by 50% by 2030 compared to the reference year of 2019. The new lighting will save the UCI WCC around CHF 20,000 in 2023.

The two start ramps (8m and 5m) of the BMX Racing track were repaired and a study has been instigated to replace both ramps with more weather resistant

material to significantly reduce their maintenance and ensure even more frequent usage. Slight repair work was also carried out on the BMX Freestyle park.

General repairs and maintenance were carried out across the UCI WCC building including windows and blinds, the main entrance doors, kitchen appliances and in Mon Séjour, our athletes' accommodation centre.

Lastly, a complete review of our insurance cover was carried out by our broker to ensure adequate cover for the buildings (UCI WCC, archives storage and Yvorne warehouse) especially for the high value equipment stored in Yvorne.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE AFRICA 2025 STRATEGY

Rwanda will be the host of the 2025 UCI Road World Championships, the first in history on the African Continent. This flagship event will create a solid development footprint of the sport of cycling in Africa. To ensure that both Rwanda and the African continent put their best foot forward come September 2025, the UCI WCC, in collaboration with different partners, has engaged in two separate initiatives.

In Rwanda, following up on discussions held in 2020 and 2021, an operational plan was put in place with the focus on developing a strategy to ensure enhanced coaching, mechanic and Commissaire education as well as racing and athlete development. To roll out the implementation of this strategy, a project lead who will work hand in glove with the Rwandan Cycling Federation (FERWACY), was appointed in December 2022. This lead will continue to contribute to the building of a robust programme in Rwanda until the end of 2025, when it is anticipated that FERWACY will continue to drive the momentum created by this initiative.

On a larger scale, in June 2022, an agreement was struck between the UCI and ANOCA (Association of National Olympic Committees of Africa) to develop 20 male and female athletes from different African nations who would be competitive in both the Junior and U23 categories come the 2025 UCI Road World Championships.

From October, a talent identification and detection camp was held at the UCI WCC Continental Satellite in Paarl, South Africa. The initial camp welcomed 25 male and female athletes from 12 different African nations. Fifteen of these athletes have been retained to progress onward in this programme.

It is planned that in 2023, and the two years that follow, this programme will continue using the format of talent identification and development camps in Africa during the months of November through to April, with racing and training incursions in Europe between May and September, culminating with participation at the first ever UCI Road World Championships on African soil.

UCI WCC REGIONAL AND CONTINENTAL DEVELOPMENT SATELLITES

The UCI World Cycling Centre Regional and Continental Development Satellites are labelled extensions of the UCI World Cycling Centre, offering a central access point for education and athletic cycling development services in different regions, as well as support for National Federation programmes.

They operate with the same mission as the UCI WCC, which is to be a key driver of development and sporting excellence in service to National Federations and their members.

UCI WCC Regional and Continental Development Satellites create enhanced opportunities for emerging nations to become more autonomous in driving their own projects and missions.

The first UCI WCC Satellites were launched in 2002. Between 2002 and 2021, five satellites were developed in different regions of the world: South Africa, Korea, India, Japan, and Portugal.

In June 2022, a satellite reform was approved by the UCI Management Committee and four new satellites were approved: Couva (Trinidad and Tobago), Bromont (Canada), Cairo (Egypt) and San Juan (Argentina). Two of these satellites were officially announced in December 2022 whereas the two others will be announced in 2023. These four new satellites were the result of an online application process that was put in place during the year (we received more than 10 requests for new satellites in 2022).

Following the reform, guidelines have been created to orientate the activities of the satellites, but these do not determine the success or failure of a satellite. Obtaining and maintaining the Satellite label depends on a dialogue between the UCI WCC and the UCI WCC Satellites.

To facilitate exchanges between the UCI WCC and the satellites, a sharing platform has been set up (SharePoint). It allows the satellites to fill in calendars and activity reports directly online. Using this platform UCI WCC Satellites can also find the guidelines, a style guide produced by the Communications Department, and information regarding education courses. The sharing platform aim is to create links between satellites enabling them to share good practices.

Apart from this online communication, the UCI WCC Continental and Regional Development Satellites are in regular contact with the UCI WCC staff via virtual meetings.

The reform approved in 2022 also required the UCI WCC Satellites to focus their activities (training camps, coaching and mechanic courses) predominantly on National Federations and their members from groups 3 and 4 (according to UCI Federation classifications 2023-2025).

All this information is gathered in a Memorandum of Understanding signed between the UCI World Cycling Centre and the satellite to clarify the agreements between the two entities.









well as the findings of PATH's new report, Make way for walking and cycling, were also shared and promoted by PATH members in a range of meetings, talks and official side events at the Climate Change Conference (COP27) in Sharm-el-Sheikh, Egypt.

Carbon Fibre Circular Alliance: The UCI, in collaboration with SCOTT Sports, joined the Carbon Fibre Circular Demonstration Project, which was launched by World Sailing Trust. This alliance of sports federations and sports equipment manufacturers includes World Sailing, the International Biathlon Union, the International Tennis Federation (ITF) Wilson Sporting Goods, Starboard, and OneWay. The cross-sector collaboration is seeking to develop new processes for the recycling and reuse of carbon fibre - a key material used in competitive bicycle manufacture.

CYCLING FOR ALL & SUSTAINABLE CYCLING



The UCI's network of UCI Bike Cities and Regions currently includes 22 cities and regions in 14 countries. In 2022, two regions were awarded the UCI Bike Region Label for their commitment to hosting UCI cycling events coupled with their development of cycling amongst their wider populations:

- Noord-Brabant, the Netherlands: The province of Noord-Brabant has hosted numerous rounds of the UCI Cyclo-cross World Cup, in Hoogerheide and in Rucphen, and was also awarded the 2023 UCI Cyclo-cross World Championships. The province has defined a long-term strategy - until 2027 - for the development of cycling for all. Its objective is to increase the modal share of cycling by 20%. Plans to increase the cycling network include connecting the areas around city centres within a 5-15 km radius, as well as developing cycling highways to connect cities. The focus is on road safety through a network analysis carried out in collaboration with the University of Breda.
- Vaud, Switzerland: The canton of Vaud has hosted several UCI events: a round of the 2022 UCI Gran Fondo World Series in Villars-sur-Ollon, as well as the UCI Junior Track World Championships in Aigle, in 2016 and 2018.

In terms of cycling for all, the canton of Vaud, where the UCI headquarters and the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC) are located, has developed a long-term strategy for cycling, with dedicated government funding, entitled "Horizon 2035", which aims to achieve a 10% modal share for cycling. The latter has been well integrated as a tool to achieve carbon neutrality by 2050, and promote health, social cohesion and sustainable territorial and economic development.

In addition, several actions were implemented by the UCI to strengthen the impact of the UCI Bike City Label and further support its network, including:

- the addition of "sustainability" as a tenth official criterion to obtain the UCI Bike City Label
- the development and approval of a new annual reporting process, based on a new mandatory reporting template provided by the UCI
- the development of new digital networking, education, and reporting tools, to strengthen communications and knowledge sharing with and between all UCI Bike Cities and Regions.





The UCI Cycling for All and UCI WCC teams worked closely to deliver a series of events for the public at the UCI WCC in Aigle. These included:

- the 20th anniversary of the UCI World Cycling Centre (14 April)
- the Tour de Romandie in Aigle (1st May)
- World Bicycle Day (3 June)
- the Tour de France in Aigle (10 July).

During each of these open days, numerous activities were organised for the public, including:

- BMX Racing and track initiations
- bike maintenance courses
- bike skills circuits provided by Swiss Cycling and the local police

- funny bike trial runs with eclectic Swiss bicycle creative artist Gerry Oulevay
- guided visits of the UCI World Cycling Centre
- open access to children of all ages on the various pump tracks.

During both the anniversary of the UCI WCC and World Bicycle Day, the UCI also welcomed more than 120 local schoolchildren each day, to learn cycling skills and take part in initiations. A cycling programme tailored for children included a Swiss Cycling agility course, safe-cycling sessions with the local police, pump track initiations, and mechanical workshops. Finally, to increase the positive social impact on World Bicycle Day, the public could also make bike donations via the charity Vélafrica. The UCI collected unused bikes that were subsequently given a new lease of life in Africa.



The UN Climate Change Conference (COP27) took place from 6 to 20 November 2022 in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt. The UCI was invited to deliver a session entitled "How to create a cycling city", alongside the Institute for Transport & Development Policy (ITDP) on Solutions Day (17 November). This interactive session helped the audience understand how a cycling city can be created using examples from the UCI Bike City Label, as well as the ITDP Cycling Cities campaign, which aims to bring 25 million more people near safe cycle lanes by 2025.

UCI CLIMATE ACTION CHARTER

Following its adoption by the UCI Management Committee in September, the UCI Climate Action Charter was officially launched during the COP27 two months later. The 80 founding signatories have seen their number boosted on a regular basis since the launch. UCI WorldTeams, UCI Women's WorldTeams, National Federations and major event organisers including Amaury Sport Organisation (ASO), RCS Sports and Flanders Classics are among cycling's stakeholders that have already signed the Charter.

By signing this Charter, they commit to measure and report emissions to internationally recognised standards and take concrete actions to reduce waste and energy demand. The UCI supports signatories through the provision of tools, resources, and strategic programmes aligned with the UCI sustainability strategy.

SPORTS FOR NATURE FRAMEWORK

In December, the UCI joined 23 sports organisations, including the International Olympic Committee (IOC) as a founding partner of the Sports for Nature Framework. The signatories pledge to adhere to four key principles that will safeguard nature and contribute to the new global goals for biodiversity, which governments agreed to during the Convention on Biological Diversity 15th Conference of the Parties meeting in Montreal (Canada).

Co-created by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), the IOC and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), in collaboration with the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), the Framework aims to deliver transformative action for nature across sports, by 2030 and beyond. The Framework brings together sports federations, leagues, clubs and events in a commitment to protect and avoid damage to important species and habitats, restore key ecosystems, create sustainable supply chains, and educate and inspire the wider sporting community to take action for nature.

SUSTAINABILITY EDUCATION

On Earth Day 2022, the UCI highlighted the vital role of the bicycle in global climate action and reemphasised the solutions proposed by the authors of the IPCC Sixth Assessment Working Group 3 Report.

The UCI continues to embark its commercial partners on its sustainability journey and underlined the important role of the bicycle for taking climate action at the 2021 and 2022 UCI Partner Seminars. Sustainability has become an essential consideration for UCI partnership renewals, with ongoing engagement on shared environmental/social objectives a key factor.

The UCI has created a bespoke online Climate Action Training course (2 hours in duration) to inform and engage the cycling world about the climate emergency and how the sport can reduce its impacts and mitigate unavoidable emissions. The course is tailored to an audience including National Federations, event organisers, teams, and other partners, with full deployment planned for









TESTING

The past year saw a higher volume of doping tests in all cycling disciplines than in 2021, mainly due to increased in-competition testing given that the UCI International Calendar was less impacted by Covid-19 related cancellations than in the previous two years. Moreover, the anti-doping programmes for women (UCI Women's WorldTour and at continental level) were steadily strengthened. All cycling's doping controls were targeted and intelligence-led, with a test distribution plan based on input received from the Athlete of Understanding with the OCLAESP (French Gendarmerie) at the end of 2022, a testament of the mutual trust between both organisations which will greatly support and complement the ITA's I&I efforts in France and at UCI events in France. Similar partnerships with other national entities in other key regions of the world will be pursued by the ITA in the future.

The ITA's information-sharing platform REVEAL was further promoted as a confidential and trustworthy reporting mechanism to the professional cycling community.





EDUCATION

In addition to the in-person education training administered in 2022, all athletes included in the UCI Registered Testing Pool (RTP) have the obligation to complete the WADA online antidoping education and e-learning platform (ADeL) for international level athletes or an equivalent course. Throughout the year, riders and their entourage could benefit from the ITA's and UCI's various offers aimed at increasing prevention and anti-doping knowledge, including the ITA's monthly athlete-led webinars on various clean sport topics.

RESULTS MANAGEMENT

Results management of Anti-Doping Rule Violations (ADRVs) and whereabouts failures is handled by the UCI Legal Anti-Doping Services (LADS). LADS is set up as a unit separate from the rest of the UCI and conducts results management of cases under the UCI's jurisdiction independently from the UCI Management but in consultation with an external legal counsel. This guarantees the independence of anti-doping activities with regards to the UCI by removing any conflict of interest and thus ensures the ethics of the fight against doping in cycling.






MORE RESOURCES FOR MORE IMPACT

In December 2022, the Funding Committee of the UCI Anti-Doping Programme decided to further strengthen the ITA's capacity to protect cyclists and the integrity of their sport with an increased anti-doping budget from 2023. The CHF 7.5M budget for the ITA-led cycling clean sport programme, funded by all cycling families, will increase by 35% to reach €10 million in the next two years. These additional resources will allow for the reinforcement of capacities in the areas of I&I, testing, science, data analysis, long-term sample storage and sample re-analysis.

The ITA's strategy for using the increased funding in the coming years will complement the cycling anti-doping programme, already internationally recognised as one of the most robust. It will not only anticipate and address potential gaps by taking a complementary state-of-the-art approach, but it will also continue its efforts to protect riders and the credibility of cycling well into the future. While the focus of the current budget increase is on men's professional road cycling, the ITA and the UCI will also strive to improve clean sport efforts in other cycling disciplines, as each has its own specificities when it comes to anti-doping approaches.

PROHIBITED LIST

Major change since January 1st, 2022: All injectable routes of administration are prohibited for glucocorticoids during the in-competition period. This change was largely supported by the UCI.



CYCLING INTEGRITY

SAFE CYCLING

Every member of the cycling community, whether a rider or not, must benefit from a safe environment, free from harassment or other abuse, in which they feel respected. To ensure this is the case, the UCI implements preventive actions and is working on policies and procedures that seek to protect individuals.

EDUCATION

The UCI also provides face-to-face training on safeguarding, to explain what harassment and abuse is, how to recognise the signs and symptoms of abuse, and the procedure for reporting their concerns.

UCI SPEAKUP PLATFORM

In addition to the education programmes in 2022, the UCI launched a secure reporting platform, UCI SpeakUp, where it is possible to report any behaviour that undermines the integrity of people in sport. The UCI SpeakUp platform is accessible to all cycling stakeholders worldwide and can be used anonymously.

Launched at the end of 2021, SpeakUp was operational in 2022 and will be further promoted in 2023 through an awareness raising campaign and improved accessibility on the UCI website.

Anyone, whether a victim or witness, is encouraged to use the platform. It is managed by the UCI, and information received is dealt with by the UCI Integrity and Education Manager. If necessary, a limited number of people with expertise in dealing with questions concerning abuse and harassment, ethics and competition manipulation may be consulted.

Initiatives for ensuring a safer sport will expand in 2023, with the development of a UCI Safeguarding Policy and practical templates covering areas such as a code of conduct for different stakeholders and measures for safer recruitment.

FAIR CYCLING

Technological fraud and all forms of competition manipulation can pose major threats to sport. Athletes should be confident that they are taking part in competitions where the rules are observed and where their sole aim is to do their best. Furthermore, cycling must be credible in the eyes of the public.

EDUCATION AND INFORMATION

To educate the different stakeholders, the UCI provided face-to-face training courses on fair cycling to raise awareness about competition manipulation, the risks involved in sports betting, and how to handle different situations in order to protect our sport.

To ensure that our sport is fair, the UCI takes part in the International Olympic Committee's (IOC) Integrity Betting Intelligence System (IBIS). This allows for the exchange of information on potential competition manipulation, particularly concerning sports betting, with the aim of preventing any such activity at UCI World Championships.

UCI SPEAKUP PLATFORM

The whistleblowing platform UCI SpeakUp is also available for informants to use to share their concerns and signal suspicions of competition manipulation.





COMMENTS ON UCI FINANCES



The year 2022 is consistent with the financial plan for the current cycle and shows an expected operating loss but below the maximum amount set in the plan for a non-Olympic year. In addition, the geopolitical and economic environment of the year had a strong negative impact on the UCI investment portfolio and on the results of the year.


2022 OPERATIONS

After two years of cost control, activities in 2022 are back to normal. Revenues, excluding the Olympic Games, are rising compared to 2021 due to the return of the UCI Urban Cycling World Championships in their full format. And, despite the depreciation of the euro against the Swiss franc (CHF), which accounts for 31% of revenues, revenues have resumed their pre-pandemic growth. At the same time, direct costs remained under control, confirming an improvement in the gross margin.

The UCI once again allocated a significant part of its budget to development and training

activities, whether through the UCI Solidarity Programme or the activities of the UCI World Cycling Centre. These activities are still progressing and amount


to more than CHF 6.5 million, i.e. 14% of the UCI's operational budget. Full details are presented in the Development section of this Annual Report.



The President and the UCI Management Committee have renewed their commitment to Afghan athletes, in particular with the organisation of the 2022 Afghan Women's Road Championships in Aigle. Given the exceptional geopolitical situation, and in the interest of our sport, our federation was strongly engaged, financially and logistically, in the support of Ukrainian athletes.

Travel expenses also returned to their pre-pandemic level, but the amount needs to be balanced against the UCI Road World Championships held in Australia and the inflation, which had a significant impact on the year. The UCI Management continued to implement actions to contain the expenses related to meetings and travel; otherwise these expenses would have increased significantly.

With a return to normal activities but also considering the challenges to come for our Federation, our teams have been strengthened in strategic areas, such as digital, integrity and the innovation. These changes are necessary with the

implementation of the UCI's Agenda 2030, bringing staff costs and headcount back to pre-pandemic levels.

UCI BUDGET


The UCI balances its budget on 4-year cycles. The revenues from the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games expected to fund the UCI's activities until the end of 2024. The non-Olympic years therefore show an operational loss.

The final margin from the Tokyo Olympic Games was CHF 22 million. A linear distribution of Olympic revenues permitted the UCI a maximum loss of CHF 5.5 million per year. The first two years of the cycle were well below this limit, i.e., excluding Olympic revenues, the loss was CHF 4.6 million in 2022 and CHF 1.9 million in 2021. The UCI continues to manage these resources prudently and in line with its annual objectives.

At the end of 2022, the cumulative operating losses of the cycle were CHF 6.5 million. For the last two years of the cycle, the cumulative operating losses should not exceed CHF

15.6 million, i.e. CHF 7.8 million per year in order to achieve a financial balance. For the end of the current cycle, the UCI is in a favourable budget position.

2021-2024 MAXIMUM CYCLE BUDGET (IN MILLION CHF)




COMMENTS ON UCI FINANCES

BALANCE SHEET OVERVIEW

The UCI's financial balance sheet has been strongly impacted by the decrease in investment portfolio. On average, funds under management dropped by 11.63% at 31 December 2022. This strongly impacted the financial result with the recognition of an unrealised loss of CHF 4.7 million.

The unrealised loss of the portfolio was logical and expected in a context of strong pressure on the financial markets as a result of the war in Ukraine. We remain confident in our long-term strategy of seeking moderate growth in funds under management. Since the implementation of the current strategy in 2016, funds under management have grown, even considering this year of exceptional under-performance.

In addition, the funds invested by the UCI are defined with the objective of not having to withdraw funds in the short term to fund current operations in the current cycle. In this way, the funds invested are able to face fluctuations and recover unrealised losses over the next few years. Despite the decrease in the portfolio, the UCI's balance sheet at the end of 2022 is still very strong, with a working capital surplus as a result of the revenues already received from future World Championships. Cash flow remains high and the surplus from the Tokyo Olympics has, as expected, been invested in our portfolios.



OUTLOOK

The UCI is in a good position to face the end of the current cycle. Reserves at the end of 2022 have been impacted by the temporary decrease in the portfolio but remain at a satisfactory level to face the last two years of the current cycle.

2023 will be a year marked by the first edition of the UCI Cycling World Championships organised in Glasgow and across Scotland, which is a wonderful opportunity to promote our sport. It will also be the first year of exploitation of the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup series by Discovery Sport Events which, as well as bringing in additional revenues, should accelerate the development of the discipline.

With the attribution of the majority of UCI World Championships until 2027, the UCI's financial resources are largely secured and the objective is to continue these attributions for the period 2028-2031, increasing the level of financial certainty. In addition, the visibility of our future events allows us to be in the best possible position to renew our media and commercial rights.

In 2022, the UCI Congress approved the 2030 Agenda of our International Federation. This agenda is the UCI's roadmap for the next 8 years. The UCI's financial strength allows it to plan and define the financial resources to achieve these objectives over the years.

Furthermore, we confirm that we have had unrestricted and complete access to all the relevant documents and information necessary for our assessment. On this basis, we recommend that the UCI Congress approve the consolidated financial statements for 2022.

I. GENERAL INFORMATION

The UCI is a non-governmental, not-for-profit Swiss Association constituted in accordance with Articles 60 ff. of the Swiss Civil Code.

The objectives of the UCI are:

- a) to direct, develop, regulate, control and discipline cycling in all forms worldwide;
- to promote cycling in all the countries of the world and at all levels;
- to organise, for all cycling disciplines, World Championships of which it is the sole holder and owner;
- d) to draw up regulations and provisions and ensure their enforcement:
- e) to encourage friendship between all members of the cycling world;
- f) to promote sportsmanship, integrity, ethics and fair play with a view to preventing all methods or practices such as corruption or doping, which might jeopardize the integrity of competitions, riders, officials and members or give rise to abuse of cycling;

- g) to promote gender parity and equity in all aspects of cycling;
- h) to promote para-cycling;
- to advocate for the safety and rights of cyclists;
- j) to represent the sport of cycling and defend its interests before the International Olympic Committee, the International Paralympic Committee and all national and international authorities:
- k) to cooperate with the International Olympic Committee, and the International Paralympic Committee in particular as regards the participation of cyclists in the Olympic and Paralympic Games;
- to direct, develop, regulate, control and discipline any and all virtual/electronic cycling activities and competitions in all forms worldwide and to organise World Championships of which it is the sole holder and owner.

Its principal resources are host city fees, the broadcasting and marketing rights generated by its World Championships and Cups, and fees related to the International Calendar, as well as quadrennial revenues from the Olympic Games.

The objective of the present report is to provide Member Federations, the cycling community and other readers a clear and complete picture of the financial situation and results of the UCI.

The UCI believes in and applies the principle of financial transparency. It seeks to implement and uphold the best practices in force within the major international sporting federations.

The accounts are presented according to Swiss GAAP RPC (Accounting and Reporting Recommendations).

The financial statements are presented on a fully consolidated basis.

Ш. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with Swiss GAAP RPC, applying where necessary specific UCI regulations. Specific accounting policies are detailed below.

The Consolidated Financial Statements are presented in thousands of Swiss Francs (k CHF) as a result of which some rounding differences may appear in the statements.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis under the historic cost convention.

Changes to the presentation of the financial statements have been made in order to facilitate the readers' understanding of the financial information and to achieve compliance with Swiss GAAP RPC. Where necessary, prior year items have been reclassified for consistency and to facilitate comparison without impact on result and capital.

Although the UCI does not fulfil all of the criteria of a Charitable Non-Profit Organisation as defined by Swiss GAAP RPC, it has adopted key presentational and disclosure aspects of Swiss GAAP RPC 21 (Accounting for Charitable Non-Profit Organisations) as best practice. This principally concerns the presentation of changes in equity and remuneration disclosures.

The operating statement is presented in both of the prescribed formats, by nature of income/expense and by functional area.

THE FUNCTIONAL AREAS ARE **DESCRIBED BELOW:**

1. Competitions

Revenues and costs directly related to UCI World Championships, UCI World Cups, the Olympic Games and other UCI competitions.

2. Cycling governance

Revenues relate principally to organiser, team and rider fees in respect of UCI sanctioned international races, in accordance with UCI Regulations and its published Financial Obligations. Cycling Governance direct costs include the expenses related to the International Calendar races' governance (Commissaires, etc.), as well as the cost of the different bodies of the UCI, including the various commissions.

3. Solidarity & development

Solidarity and development comprises:

- the operations of the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC) which welcomes trainees from around the world for periods of 1 -12 months;
- the UCI WCC's financial or in-kind contributions to satellites of the UCI World Cycling Centre around the world;
- UCI's financial contributions to Continental Confederations or National Federations and other development initiatives.

4. Velodrome operations

Activities included under Velodrome operations include the public restaurant, which is situated at the UCI headquarters, and the commercial exploitation of the sports and business conference facilities not directly attributed to the other functional areas.

5. Administration

This includes the costs of the UCI shared service departments, namely finance, legal, HR, IT and office administration, which are not directly attributed to the other functional areas.

SPECIFIC ACCOUNTING **POLICIES ADOPTED ARE AS FOLLOWS:**

Consolidation

The UCI controls a Swiss foundation, Fondation Centre Mondial du Cyclisme, and its subsidiary, CMC Exploitation SA.

CMC Exploitation SA is 100% shareholder of a subsidiary in South Africa, WCC Africa NPC. in order to manage its satellite centre's operations in that country. This subsidiary has been created to reinforce the governance and the control over the WCC's development operations already operating in South Africa since 2005.

The results of these entities have been consolidated with the UCI on a full consolidation basis

No material valuation differences between the entities were identified.

The UCI created, and has involvement in, a second Swiss Foundation, the Cycling Anti-Doping Foundation (CADF). In order to maintain the highest degree of independence, the governance structure of the CADF ensures that the UCI has no significant control or influence over CADF's internal operations.

The entity is therefore not consolidated with the UCI. CADF is in liquidation and had no activities in 2021.

Disclosures concerning the CADF can be found under *notes* 3 & 19.

Foreign currency transactions & hedging instruments

Transactions in foreign currency are converted according to the exchange rate in force at the time of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currency are converted according to the exchange rate in force on the closing date of the financial year.

The exchange differences that result from these transactions are presented under *note 5*.

Hedge instruments are revalued at mark-to-market rates at balance sheet date, using internationally recognised valuation methodology where appropriate. Profits or losses are booked to the income statement.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the UCI will derive economic benefit from it and that the revenue can be reliably measured.

Specifically, it is considered that due to uncertainty over recovery, the economic benefit

from fines imposed on riders cannot be considered probable until payment is received and any such revenue is not recognised until payment occurs. Such amounts are nonetheless pursued with the same diligence as would apply to recovery of any other asset.

Revenue relating to competitions is recorded for the financial year during which the events take place. The revenue deriving from the Olympic Games is recognised in the year of the Olympic Games or the year it becomes probable that the UCI will derive economic benefit from it and can be reliably measured.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and at bank, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term, highly liquid and easily convertible investments with original maturities of less than three months.

Cash and cash equivalents are recorded at fair market value; foreign currencies are converted at the closing exchange rate.

Accounts receivable

Receivables are initially recognised in the accounts at fair value, which corresponds to the amount invoiced, less any deductions. Loans and other receivables are recognised at nominal value.

Receivables and loans are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for impairment is established according to objective rules based on the age of the debt and the nature of the debtor.

Inventory

Inventory consists of restaurant raw materials, merchandising products for resale and equipements for the UCI Solidarity programme. It is valued at cost less provision for impairment as required.

Investments and financial assets

Investments and financial assets are recognised at their current market value at year end date. The investment policy is summarised in *note 11*. Portfolio investments are recorded in the balance sheet, under long term non-current assets, according to our policy. However, these remain liquid instruments, easily convertible into cash.

Tangible and intangible fixed assets

The UCI's accounting policy with regard to tangible and intangible assets is as follows:

- Property and equipment: buildings, equipment and computer hardware are stated in the balance sheet at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the related item. Land is stated at historical cost.
- Sports equipment: The UCI WCC is provided with complimentary cycling equipment by various manufacturers. The total value of this equipment is capitalised and amortised over 3 years. An offsetting liability is recognised on the balance sheet under Deferred Revenue. In the income statement, the annual change is booked in the revenues under 'Commercial rights' and compensated in 'Cost of goods & materials' and 'Amortisation'. (see note 10).
- Intangible assets: Computer software is stated in the balance sheet at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Software development costs are recorded on a project by project basis. Costs are capitalised as they are

incurred if conditions defined by RPC10 are satisfied. The asset is amortised starting at the end of the hypercare period following the project go-live. Expenditure on brands is recognised in the income statement as an expense as incurred.

All other expenditures, repairs and maintenance are recognised in the income statement as expenses as incurred.

Depreciation on assets is calculated using the straightline method over the estimated useful life, which is as follows for the main categories (in years):

Grants related to assests are offset against the asset concerned.

Restricted assets

The UCI WorldTour Reserve Fund is governed by articles 2.15.227 to 2.15.237 of the UCI Regulations.

Amounts recorded as cash quarantees held represent amounts drawn down under bank guarantees deposited by professional racing teams which have been received by the UCI and are held on a dedicated account until the settlement of the claim between the team and the third party in accordance with UCI Regulations.

As part of the winding-down of the CADF's activities (see note 3) and in response to the reduced activities resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, the UCI and contributing stakeholders (AIGCP, AIOCC, CPA) took the decision to reduce contributions

to the CADF in the second part of 2020. The parties contributed instead to a dedicated account held by the UCI and recorded as a Restricted Asset in the UCI's balance sheet. Any surplus arising following the liquidation of the CADF will be redistributed to the stakeholders.

A liability in respect of Restricted Assets is recorded under Liabilities - Fund capital -Restricted funds.

Accounts payable & deferred revenue

Accounts payable represent non interest-bearing supplier amounts due as part of the UCI's normal course of business.

Amounts invoiced in respect of future events are recorded under deferred revenue, split between current liabilities for events taking place during the year following balance sheet date and non-current liabilities.

Provisions

The UCI records provisions:

- when it has an obligation, legal or constructive, to satisfy a claim and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required;
- when a risk exists at balance sheet date: the corresponding risk provision is adjusted at year-end based on an internal analysis to match the UCI's risk exposure;
- when imminent special projects, approved prior to the balance sheet date, are already under way and are substantially complete. In the following year(s), the cost of such projects is included in the income statement as incurred, however, an equal reversal of the provision is recorded in the same period.

Competitions include revenues and costs directly related to UCI World Championships, UCI World Cups, the Olympic Games and other UCI competitions.

Unallocated amounts represent media technical revenues, merchandising and licensing revenues.

Revenues from Olympic Games are received principally in the year of the Olympics with a final settlement in the year following the Olympics. This final settlement is accrued the year of the Games. In 2021, a safety margin was included in the provision. Consequently a residual amount is accounted in 2022.

Direct costs related to the Olympic Games are principally travel and accommodation costs for the UCI's delegation, including Commissaires and officials. The UCI also subscribes to the IOC's global event insurance policy.

For UCI competitions, revenues are primarily hosting fees, media rights and sponsor revenues.

Competition direct costs include event logistics, timing, officiating, TV production and distribution, prize money and sponsor implementation to the extent that these costs are not specifically covered by local organisers, sponsors or broadcasters. The operating expenses are a time-based allocation of staff costs.

The direct costs of the President's & Director General's office and the Management Committee include the fees and costs detailed in *note 2* as well as the logistics expenses of Management Committee meetings.

The operating expenses represent the staff costs of the President's and Director General's office as well as an allocation of sport department personnel costs.

Congress costs include all costs related to the organisation of the UCI's annual Congress.

Commission costs represent travel, accommodation and meeting costs.

Other activities are the cost of Advocacy and other discipline management expenses.

In 2021, the centenary of the UCI Road World Championships has also been included in other activities.

[b] International Calendar

Direct costs comprise the travel costs and per diems of UCI International Commissaires attending UCI sanctioned races.

[c] UCI WorldTour

The revenues and costs related to the UCI WorldTour are presented in more detail in Section "UCI WorldTour" following the consolidated financial statements.

[d] Anti-doping

[e] Other governance activities

The principal items included are the UCI's work around use of material and equipment in competition - this includes revenue from the validation of bike equipment from manufacturers and cost of the UCI's efforts to combat and detect mechanical fraud.

1.c Training & development

Training and development comprises principally the operations of the UCI World Cycling Centre (WCC) which accommodates trainees from around the world for periods of 1-12 months.

Also included under training and development are the UCI WCC's financial or in-kind contributions to satellites of the UCI World Cycling Centre around the world and the funds attributed to the

Continental Confederations and National Federations for projects relating to the development of the sport and its good governance. Further details can be found in this Annual Report under the Development section.

Other direct costs include the cost of the accommodation and meals for the UCI WCC trainees as well the cost of their participation at cycling races. In respect of the UCI WCC

satellite centres operations, the UCI WCC is the primary funder in resources, material and personnel, of the operations of its South African satellite in Paarl, and contributes funds or resources to satellites in Korea, Japan, India and South America. The UCI WCC also funds athlete detection programmes globally. Operating expenses comprise principally the cost of coaches, mechanics and support staff.

1.d Velodrome operations

Activities included under Velodrome operations include the public restaurant, which is situated at the UCI headquarters, and the commercial exploitation of the sports and business conference facilities. The restaurant's primary function is to feed athletes; the operating margin is therefore a blend of arm's length public business and zero margin catering for the athletes.

Direct costs comprise principally the restaurant cost of sales. All staff costs are included under operating expenses, which also include velodrome operating, repairs and maintenance, as well as the depreciation of the building and offices.

1.e Administrative costs

These comprise the costs of the UCI 'back office' functions,

namely legal, finance, information technology, human

resources, and administrative services.

1.f Reallocations

In order to allocate costs between functional areas, internal rebilling and allocations take place in the UCI and WCC's accounts. The reallocations in the following table reconcile the income statement by nature of costs/revenues to the income statement by functional area.

The UCI President is resident in France and the UCI is subject to the French social security regime in respect of his emoluments. The President receives no other benefits.

A new mandate started in September 2021, and in consequence the remuneration of the governing bodies has been revised from October 2021.

The Management Committee also decided, on the proposal of the Remuneration Committee, to pay the President a one-off bonus for his achievements during the 2017-2021 mandate and his management of the pandemic.

Fees of Management Committee members are presented net of tax withheld at source which represents, for all members, a total amount of less than 20k CHF per year.

The average annual fee of the Vice-presidents was 27.0k CHF (2021 : 25.6k CHF). The average annual fee of the remaining MC Members 18.2k CHF (2021: 17.1k CHF).

Travel expenses are transport and accommodation costs for the year.

Per diem rates of all other officials (commission members, Commissaires, race delegates etc) can be found on the UCI website under Financial Obligations.

Cost of personnel includes salaries, social charges, benefits and other employee-related costs.

Executive Management comprises the UCI Director General and the Senior Management team. In 2022, this team consisted of eleven persons (2021: ten). The UCI held neither a pension benefit nor a pension obligation, as defined by RPC16, at 31 December 2022 and 2021. The pension plan is fully covered meaning that the pension institution guarantees liabilities are 100% covered.

In 2021, the UCI and WCC received furlough contributions in accordance with the COVID-19 ordinance for unemployment

insurance dated 20 March 2020 and subsequent amendments. These contributions received were offset against cost of personnel and amounted to a total of 461k CHF.

In 2022, the UCI received retroactive furlough contributions of 180k CHF for the year 2021 and 2020. The contributions have been booked in other revenues.

3. ANTI-DOPING ACTIVITIES

Since 1 January 2021, the International Testing Agency (ITA) has undertaken the activities previously managed by the CADF.

The CADF, which was set up by the UCI but whose governance and management were independant has ceased its activities and started its liquidation.

Anti-doping activities are undertaken by the UCI, in its role as signatory International Federation to the World Anti-Doping Code, and the operations are delegated to the International Testing Agency (ITA).

The ITA is responsible for testing and intelligence. It is funded by direct contributions from men's professional road cycling stakeholders (teams and organisers) and by the UCI.

The ITA's total budget in 2022 exceeded 7.0M CHF.

The UCI is responsible, through its Legal Anti-Doping Service (LADS) and the Anti-Doping Tribunal, for analysing and prosecuting positive cases reported by the ITA and, through the Anti-Doping Commission, for cycling's Anti-doping Regulations and strategy.

In addition to funding from men's professional road cycling teams' and organisers' direct contributions to the ITA, as part of the UCI's Financial Obligations, riders, race organisers and teams pay a levy in order to finance the

fight against doping. These funds, shown as revenues in the operating statement, are allocated to funding the UCI's contribution to the ITA as well as the UCI's own internal costs in the fight against doping.

Fines levied for anti-doping infringements are recognised in the accounts only when received.

Whilst the full cost of in- and out-of-competition testing as well as the cost of maintaining the biological passport are covered by the ITA, the UCI covers the cost of LADS, the prosecution of anti-doping disciplinary procedures opened against UCI licence holders and the recovery of fines.

The UCI is structurally exposed to fluctuations in the exchange rate between the Swiss franc and the euro or the US dollar, most especially a strengthening of the Swiss Franc against the euro.

The exchange rate loss relates mainly to bank accounts and receivables expressed in currencies other than CH. For 2022, the loss is due to the euro's weakening from 1.036/1 CHF to 0.987/1 CHF and for 2021 to the euro's weakening from 1.082/1 CHF to 1.036/1 CHF. The UCI's hedging policy consists of seeking to manage this exposure on a prudent basis through appropriate hedging instruments:

- with respect to the euro, we seek to maintain a rolling coverage to sell euros as required in order to meet Swiss franc operating expenses;
- with respect to the US dollar, we undertake specific hedging operations focused on cash inflows from the Olympic Games;

 with respect to the British Pound, the UCI has undertaken a hedging strategy to cover contracted GBP cash inflows from the UCI Cycling World Championships in Glasgow and across Scotland in 2023.

The UCI seeks to minimise its exposure to currency risk by maintaining naturally hedged activities.

At 31 December 2022:

 The UCI held vanilla forward contracts to sell 2.2M GBP at rates between 1.2265 CHF/ GBP and 1.2635 CHF/GBP for maturity between 16 January 2023 and 14 April 2023. The UCI held vanilla forward contracts to sell 2.0M USD at rates between 0.86 CHF/ USD and 0.865 CHF/USD for maturity on 29 November 2024.

At 31 December 2021:

As part of the construction financing of the UCI World Cycling Čentre, the Fondation CMC was granted loans for CHF 4.0M CHF and 1.0M CHF from the Cantons of Vaud and Valais respectively, in each case with a 50 % participation by the Swiss Confederation.

These loans granted under special Swiss regional conditions ("LIM"), are interest free and repayable over a period of 27 years in equal instalments.

The loan from the Canton of Vaud carries a charge over the WCC building.

Following the postponement of the 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games, the UCI received a loan of 5.0M USD from the IOC. This loan has been reimbursed in 2021 by offsetting with the revenues due from the Olympic Games.

The UCI holds two litigation risk insurance policies to cover lawyers' expenses and damages.

Following a claim from an internet service provider in Belgium, the Belgium Competition authorities opened an investigation into the media rights attribution process for the 2015/16 - 2019/20 UCI Cyclocross World Championships and World Cup in Belgium. The UCI's lawyers are seeking to find an agreement with the authorities and an appropriate provision has been booked. The litigation insurance is expected to cover any unprovided risk.

In October 2019, the UCI was notified of a claim before the European Commission (competition directorate) by Velon Limited, a commercial company registered in the

United Kingdom, for alleged anti-competitive behaviour.

The UCI has provided its observations and awaits the position of the Commission to learn whether a formal procedure will be opened against it. The UCI considers that it is not necessary to book a provision in its accounts for this claim.

Fund capital - Restricted funds

UCI WorldTour Reserve Fund

The UCI WorldTour Reserve Fund is governed by articles 2.15.227 to 2.15.237 of the UCI Regulations.

The fund was established to support a UCI WorldTour Team or Organiser or to carry out projects for the benefit of all UCI WorldTour partners.

Use of the fund is decided by the Professional Cycling Council (PCC).

Following a decision by the PCC on 29 January 2020, 1.0M CHF was withdrawn from the fund in order to respond to the complaint by Velon Limited (see *note 13*) before the European Commission.

These funds will be held as a liability on the UCI's balance sheet until used or returned.

Cash guarantees held

Amounts recorded as Cash guarantees held represent bank guarantees deposited by professional racing teams drawn down by the UCI and held on a dedicated account until the claim has been settled between the team and the third party in accordance with the UCI Regulations. Any surplus amounts after all claims have been settled are returned to the team which issued the guarantee. Guarantees are further described in *note 18*.

Anti-Doping Transition Funds

Following the decision by the UCI to transfer anti-doping activities from the CADF to the International Testing Agency with effect from 1 January 2021 and following a reduction in competitions in 2020 as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic, the representatives of the funding stakeholders (professional teams,

organisers and riders and the UCI) sought to ensure that any surplus funds in the CADF prior to its liquidation be returned on an equitable basis to those stakeholders.

As a result of this decision, the final 2020 contributions were paid into a dedicated bank account held by the UCI. The funds held will be returned to the stakeholders as soon as there is sufficient certainty concerning the final financial position of the CADF prior to its liquidation.

Management expects remaining funds to be redistributed in 2023.

Organisation capital

The Management Committee took the decision to merge the UCI's reserves into a single general reserve. Use of the fund is decided by the UCI Management Committee.

17. MOVEMENT OF RESTRICTED ASSETS

17a. UCI Cash guarantees

Movements in the Third party bank guarantee Restricted Fund are triggered by claims submitted by interested parties to the UCI against UCI WorldTour teams or UCI Professional Continental Teams. A call on the guarantee by the UCI will generate an inflow of restricted funds. Payments to claimants

or funds returned to the teams, following the UCI's procedures and regulations, will generate an outflow of funds.

The team guarantees are intended to defray any debts, notably but not exclusively to UCI licence holders, unsettled by the team in accordance with the UCI's Regulations. Once a valid claim has been made

against a professional cycling team, the UCI will call the guarantee and the funds will be held as Restricted funds until a competent authority has ruled on the claim.

The organiser guarantees are intended to guarantee payment to the UCI and performance of the organiser's obligation to hold the Championships.

In 2021 a dispute settlement with an IT provider allowed a oneoff saving of 221k CHF booked under 'IT & Telecoms'.

1. ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Swiss Code of Obligations (CO), applying where necessary specific UCI Regulations. Specific accounting policies are detailed below.

The financial statements are presented in thousands of Swiss Francs (CHF) as a result of which some rounding differences may appear in the accounts. They have been prepared on an accruals basis under the historic cost convention except financial assets reported at their market value.

2. COMPANY INFORMATION

The Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI) is registered under the number CHE-107.741.983 at the Commercial Registry of the Canton of Vaud. The UCI is an Association under Swiss law with its registered office at Allée Ferdi Kübler 12, 1860 Aigle, Vaud, Switzerland.

On average, the UCI has fewer than 250 full-time employees.

The contributions received were offset with the cost of personnel and reached an amount of 241k CHF in 2021. In 2022, the UCI received retroactive furlough contributions of 180k CHF for the year 2021 and 2020. The contributions have been booked in the other revenues.

In 2021 a dispute settlement with an IT provider has allowed a one-off saving of 221k CHF booked under 'Other operating expenses'.
