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## **Summary**

Biosis Pty Ltd (Biosis) was commissioned by AT&L to undertake an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA) for the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek, New South Wales (NSW) (the study area). This ACHA will support a State Significant Development (SSD) application under Part 4.36 of the *Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979* (EP&A Act).

#### Consultation

The Aboriginal community was consulted regarding the heritage management of the project throughout its lifespan. Consultation has been undertaken as per the process outlined in the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010* (DECCW 2010a) (consultation requirements) (Appendix 1). The appropriate government bodies were notified, and advertisements placed in the *Western Weekender* newspapers (19 January 2024), which resulted in the following Aboriginal organisations registering their interest (Table 1):

A search conducted by the Office of the Registrar, *Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983* listed no Aboriginal Owners with land within the study area. A search conducted by the National Native Title Tribunal (NNTT) listed no Registered Native Title Claims, Unregistered Claimant Applications or Registered Indigenous Land Use Agreements within the study area.

Upon registration (Appendix 2), the Aboriginal parties were invited to provide their knowledge on the study area and on the proposal provided in the methodology (Appendix 3). The responses identify Kemps Creek as an area of high significance. Responses from the Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs) are included in Appendix 3.

Site officers from elected RAPs participated in the field investigation and did not provide comment on the study area with regard to the proposal.

The outcome of the consultation process was that the RAPs considered the study area to have a high level of cultural significance, although that significance was not clearly defined, and specific examples were not provided. The results of the consultation process are included in this document Appendix 4.

The recommendations that resulted from the consultation process are provided below.

#### Results

The ACHA assessment undertook background research for the proposed study area. Key considerations arising from the background research include:

- Previous predictive modelling conducted for the Cumberland Plain and Kemps Creek region indicates that the most important factor for site distribution in this landscape is distance to water (AMBS 2012, White, B & McDonald, J 2010, Brayshaw McDonald Pty Ltd 1994a, McDonald, J & Rich, E 1993). The study area is located within proximity to a second-order non-perennial creek line and has two first-order creek lines crossing it. It is also in proximity to Kemps Creek, a fourth-order perennial water course. The presence of a ample water sources in proximity to the study area indicates that food resources were readily accessible (JMCHM 2000, p.19).
- The Luddenham soil landscape underlays most of the study area and has erosional soil deposits that have the potential to contain in situ archaeological deposits in areas subjected to low levels of disturbance.
- Previous archaeological assessments in the local area identified artefact sites are the most common site type followed by Potential Archaeological Deposits (PADs).



 A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. Three sites are located within the study area: AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02, AHIMS 45-5-5692/Aldington Road IF01 and AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01.

An archaeological survey was conducted on 15 March 2024 by Crystal Garabedian (Biosis, Heritage Consultant), Bronte Baonza (Biosis, Graduate Heritage Consultant) and Kurt Brenner (Kamilaroi Yankuntjatjara Working Group, Cultural Sites Officer). The overall effectiveness of the survey for examining the ground for Aboriginal sites was deemed low. This was attributed to vegetation cover and the roads restricting ground surface visibility combined with low exposure. Parts of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road were not surveyed due to safety concerns related to heavy vehicles travelling at high speeds on these roads, however a survey of these portions of the roads would be unlikely to impact the outcome of the assessment. During the field investigation no Aboriginal sites or objects were identified. The results of the field investigation coupled with the background research determined that the study area has low potential to contain archaeological deposits. This was due to unfavourable landforms present and high level of disturbances along Aldington, Abbotts and Mamre Road, including the roads, construction sites, residential developments, driveways, utilities, and erosion furthered by water run-off and traffic.

Biosis (2023b) assessed all three sites within the study area as possessing low archaeological significance. The bulk excavation and modification of the landforms within the study area will result in a partial loss of value (Table 2).

## **Management recommendations**

Prior to any development impacts occurring within the study area, the following is recommended:



#### **Recommendation 1: Development of a Cultural Heritage Management Plan**

As per Section 4.41 of the EP&A Act, an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act) is not required for SSD projects authorised by a development consent. All works must be conducted in accordance with the SSD consent conditions.

It is recommended a Cultural Heritage Management Plan (CHMP) be included in the Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) that is being developed for the study area. The CHMP will aid to appropriately manage Aboriginal cultural heritage identified within the study area and would include unanticipated finds protocols and a heritage induction to be undertaken by the site personnel prior to works.

The CHMP must be prepared by a suitably qualified heritage consultant in consultation with the Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs) for the project.

### **Recommendation 2: Community collection of AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01**

It is recommended that community collection of the isolated surface artefact from site AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01 be undertaken. The methodology for this collection should be included in the CHMP for the project.

#### **Recommendation 3: Areas identified as having low archaeological potential**

No further investigations are required for areas assessed as having low archaeological potential. This recommendation is conditional upon Recommendations 4 to 7.

#### **Recommendation 4: Discovery of Unanticipated Aboriginal Objects**

All Aboriginal objects and Places are protected under the NSW NPW Act. It is an offence to knowingly disturb an Aboriginal site without a consent permit issued by the Heritage NSW. Should any Aboriginal objects be encountered during works associated with this proposal, works must cease in the vicinity and the find should not be moved until assessed by a qualified archaeologist. The anticipated Aboriginal object will then be the subject of the appropriate process outlined in the CHMP.

### **Recommendation 5: Discovery of Unanticipated Historical Relics**

Relics are historical archaeological resources of local or State significance and are protected in NSW under the *Heritage Act 1977* (Heritage Act). Relics cannot be disturbed except with a permit or exception/exemption notification. Should unanticipated relics be discovered during the course of the project, work in the vicinity must cease and an archaeologist contacted to make a preliminary assessment of the find. The Heritage Council will require notification if the find is assessed as a relic.

#### **Recommendation 6: Discovery of Aboriginal Ancestral Remains**

Aboriginal ancestral remains may be found in a variety of landscapes in NSW, including middens and sandy or soft sedimentary soils. If any suspected human remains are discovered during any activity, you must:

- 1. Immediately cease all work at that location and not further move or disturb the remains.
- 2. Notify the NSW Police and Heritage NSW Environmental Line on 131 555 as soon as practicable and provide details of the remains and their location.
- 3. Not recommence work at that location unless authorised in writing by Heritage NSW.



## **Recommendation 7: Continued consultation with the registered Aboriginal stakeholders**

As per the consultation requirements, it is recommended that the proponent provides a copy of this draft report to the Aboriginal stakeholders and considers all comments received. The proponent should continue to inform these groups about the management of Aboriginal cultural heritage sites within the study area throughout the life of the project.

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## 1 Introduction

## 1.1 Project background

Biosis has been commissioned by AT&L to undertake an ACHA of the Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek, NSW (study area) (Figure 1 and Figure 2). This ACHA will support an SSD application under Part 4.36 of the EP&A Act.

This report details the investigation, consultation and assessment of Aboriginal cultural heritage undertaken for the study area. The Archaeological Report (AR) in Appendix 5 details the findings of the archaeological investigations conducted as part of the ACHA. As required under Section 2.3 of the *Code of Practice for the Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code), the AR provides evidence about the material traces of Aboriginal land use to support the conclusions and management recommendations in the ACHA.

## 1.2 Study area

The study area is located within the Penrith Local Government Area (LGA), Parish of Melville, County of Cumberland (Figure 1). The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, and is bounded by private property to the north, south, east, and west (Figure 2).

## 1.3 Proposed development

The proposed development will involve upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road (Figure 3). This includes earthworks including cutting and filling along existing road corridor, refining and reinforcing the new infrastructure and installation of road signage.

## 1.4 Planning approvals

The proposed development will be assessed against Part 4.36 of the EP&A Act. Other relevant legislation and planning instruments that will inform this assessment include:

- Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act).
- NSW NPW Act.
- State Environmental Planning Policy (Transport and Infrastructure) 2021.
- State Environmental Planning Policy (Industry and Employment) 2021.
- State Environmental Planning Policy (Western Sydney Aerotropolis) 2020.
- Mamre Road Precinct Development Control Plan 2021 (MRP DCP).

#### 1.4.1 Mamre Road Precinct Development Control Plan 2021

The MRP DCP aims to ensure that Aboriginal heritage values are managed appropriately to produce conservation outcomes for archaeological and culturally significant areas. The DCP has mapped areas of high



and moderate Aboriginal archaeological potential along Mamre Road; however, it was noted by Heritage NSW in their review of the DCP that the designations of potential were primarily based on a desktop assessment and predictive modelling with very limited field survey. The study area contains areas of moderate-high Aboriginal potential along sections of Aldington Road (Photo 1).

The DCP has a list of controls for completing assessments for Aboriginal heritage. For ground disturbing works this includes completing an ADDA for areas that have not yet been mapped or areas of low potential as a first step. If land is within or adjacent to land that contains a known Aboriginal cultural heritage site, assessments must consider and comply with the requirements of the NPW Act.

The DCP determines that an ACHA is required if the study area contains areas of moderate to high Aboriginal archaeological potential and that these areas would be impacted by the proposed development.




Photo 1 MRP DCP archaeological potential with the study area in red (Source: MRP DCP 2021)

## 1.6 Aboriginal cultural heritage

#### 1.6.1 General description

It is generally accepted that people have inhabited the Australian landmass for the last 50,000 years (Clarkson et al. 2015). Dates of the earliest occupation of the continent by Aboriginal people are subject to continued revision as more research is undertaken. New evidence out of the Northern Territory has pushed this date back with the Malakanunja II rock shelter dated at around 65,000 years BP (before present) (Clarkson et al. 2017). The timing for the human occupation of the Sydney Basin is still uncertain. While there is some possible evidence for occupation of the region around 40,000 years ago, the earliest known radiocarbon date for the Aboriginal occupation of the Sydney Basin is associated with a cultural/archaeological deposit at Parramatta, which was dated to  $30,735 \pm 407$  BP (JMCHM 2005).

Without being part of the Aboriginal culture and the productions of this culture, it is not possible for non-Aboriginal people to fully understand the meaning of site, objects, and places to Aboriginal people—only to move closer towards understanding this meaning with the help of the Aboriginal community. Similarly, definitions of Aboriginal culture and cultural heritage without this involvement constitute outsider interpretations.

With this preface Aboriginal cultural heritage broadly refers to things that relate to Aboriginal culture and hold cultural meaning and significance to Aboriginal people (DECCW 2010a, p. 3). There is an understanding in Aboriginal culture that everything is interconnected. In essence Aboriginal cultural heritage can be viewed as potentially encompassing any part of the physical and/or mental landscape, that is, 'Country' (DECCW 2010a, p. iii).

Aboriginal people's interpretation of cultural value is based on their 'traditions, observance, lore, customs, beliefs and history' (DECCW 2010a, p. 3). The things associated with Aboriginal cultural heritage are continually and actively being defined by Aboriginal people (DECCW 2010a, p. 3). These things can be associated with traditional, historical or contemporary Aboriginal culture (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).

#### 1.6.2 Tangible Aboriginal cultural heritage

Three categories of tangible Aboriginal cultural heritage may be defined:

- Things that have been observably modified by Aboriginal people.
- Things that may have been modified by Aboriginal people, but no discernible traces of that activity remain.
- Things never physically modified by Aboriginal people (but associated with Dreamtime Ancestors who shaped those things).

### 1.6.3 Intangible Aboriginal cultural heritage

Examples of intangible Aboriginal cultural heritage would include memories of stories and 'ways of doing', which would include language and ceremonies (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).

#### 1.6.4 Statutory

Currently Aboriginal cultural heritage, as statutorily defined by the NPW Act, consists of objects and places which are protected under Part 6 of the Act.



Aboriginal objects are defined as:


any deposit, object or material evidence...relating to the Aboriginal habitation of the area that comprises NSW, being habitation before or concurrent with (or both) the occupation of that area by persons of non-Aboriginal extraction, and includes Aboriginal remains


Aboriginal places are defined as a place that is or was of special Aboriginal cultural significance. Places are declared under Section 84 of the NPW Act.


#### **1.6.5 Values**


Aboriginal cultural heritage is valued by Aboriginal people as it is used to define their identity as both individuals and as part of a group (DECCW 2010a, p. iii). More specifically it is used:


- To provide a:
  - 'Connection and sense of belonging to Country' (DECCW 2010a, p. iii).
  - Link between the present and the past (DECCW 2010a, p. iii).
- As a learning tool to teach Aboriginal culture to younger Aboriginal generations and the general public (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).
- As further evidence of Aboriginal occupation prior to European settlement for people who do not understand the magnitude to which Aboriginal people occupied the continent (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).















## 2 Study area context

This section discusses the study area in regard to its landscape, environmental and Aboriginal cultural heritage context. This section should be read in conjunction with the AR attached in Appendix 5. The background research has been undertaken in accordance with the Code.

## 2.1 Topography and hydrology

The study area is located within the Cumberland Lowlands physiographic region, which consists of low lying and gently undulating plains and hills, with a dense drainage net of predominantly northward flowing channels (Bannerman & Hazelton 1990, p. 2). Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation consists of shales with pockets of occasional calcareous claystone, laminate, grey siltstone and infrequent coal deposits (Bannerman & Hazelton 1990, p. 28). Aboriginal artefact scatter sites are common across this formation, as are PADs. The lack of underlying sandstone geology in this area makes other varieties of sites such as rock shelters and engraving sites less common (JMCHM 2002). Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

Full details on topography and hydrology can be found in the AR in Appendix 5.

## 2.2 Soil landscapes

Soil landscapes have distinct morphological and topological characteristics that result in specific archaeological potential. Because they are defined by a combination of soils, topography, vegetation and weathering conditions, soil landscapes are essentially terrain units that provide a useful way to summarise archaeological potential and exposure.

The study area is located within the Luddenham and Blacktown soil landscapes. The Luddenham soil landscape is the dominant landscape within the study area, existing everywhere apart from the western border and is characterised as an erosional soil landscape. Erosional landscapes are generally subject to movement of shallow soils, which can result in poor preservation of the archaeological record. Dispersed and undisturbed sandy soils found within this landscape usually have a low erosion potential. However, when cleared of vegetation the soils typically experience high levels of erosion, can be shallow and highly permeable, and have low soil fertility. This could suggest that the presence of Aboriginal sites and objects may be unlikely where erosion has occurred (Chapman et al. 1989, pp. 64–7, McInnes 1997, p.45, cited by Umwelt (Australia) Pty Limited 2016, p. 13).

The study area is also located within the Blacktown soil landscape. It is contained within the westernmost portion of the study area and is characterised as a residual soil landscape. Residual soils form from the *in situ* weathering of bedrock material, resulting in slow accumulation of soils over long periods of time. Due to their age and slow accumulation, residual soil landscapes have reasonable potential to preserve archaeological deposits in an open context, such as stone artefacts derived from occupation sites.

Full details on soil characteristics can be found in the AR in Appendix 5.



#### 2.3 Climate and rainfall

Climate and rainfall data provide use evidence to determine human occupation of a site or area. Often, changes in climatic pattern will affect the presence or likelihood that people would occupy a specific area. This climate data is from 2023 and has been supplied by the Australian Government Bureau of Meteorology from the Orchard Hills Treatment Works weather station (067084), approximately 7.4 kilometres from the study area (BOM 2024).

- The maximum mean temperature observed was in December with 28.4 degrees Celsius.
- The lowest mean temperature observed was in July with 17.2 degrees Celsius.
- On average, rainfall was highest in February with 113 millimetres observed across the month and lowest in September with 36.8 millimetres.

Based on modern climate data it is likely the study area would have provided a temperate area with high average rainfalls and proximity to permanent water sources, making it likely the area was seasonally occupied. This would also suggest the presence of Aboriginal sites is highly likely as a result.

## 2.4 Landscape resources

Within the Cumberland subregion of the Sydney Basin Bioregion a variety of vegetation types are present, with Grey Box *Eucalyptus microcarpa*, Forest Red Gum *E. tereticornis*, Narrow-leaved Ironbark *E. crebra* woodland, and Spotted Gum *Corymbia maculata* present on shale hills. Hard-Leaved Scribbly Gum *E. sclerophylla*, Rough-Barked Apple *Angophora floribunda* and Old Man Banksia *Banksia serrata* are identified on alluvial sands and gravels. Broad-Leaved Apple *Angophora subvelutina*, Cabbage Gum *E. amplifolia*, Forest Red Gum *E. tereticornis* and Swamp Oak *Casuarina glauca* are present on river flats. Tall Spike Rush *Eleocharis sphacelata*, and Juncus *Juncus effuses* and Parramatta Red Gum *E. parramattensis* are noted around lagoons and swamps (NPWS 2003, p. 193).

Native fauna that may have been present in the vicinity of the study area include Australian Wood Duck *Chenonetta jubata*, White-Faced Heron *Egretta novaehollandiae*, Eastern Long-Necked Tortoise *Chelodina longicollis*, Eastern Water Skink *Eulamprus quoyii*, Garden Skink *Lampropholis guichenoti*, Welcome Swallow *Hirundo neoxena*, Western Swamphen *Porphyrio porphyrio*, as well as arboreal fauna including owls *Strigiformes*, Ringtailed Possum *Pseudocheirus peregrinus* and Brushtailed Possums *Trichosrus vulpecula*, and gliders *Petauridae*.

Full details on landscape resources can be found in the AR in Appendix 5.

## 2.5 European land use history

Historical aerial imagery allows for modern developments and land use to be identified within the study area. Table 3 summarises the development of the study area with reference to the historical aerials, which can be found in the AR in Appendix 5.

## 3 Aboriginal cultural heritage context

## 3.1 Ethnohistory

Our knowledge of Aboriginal people and their land-use patterns and lifestyles prior to European contact is mainly reliant on documents written by non-Aboriginal people. These documents are affected by the inherent bias of the class and cultures of their authors, who were also often describing a culture that they did not fully understand - a culture that was in a heightened state of disruption given the arrival of settlers and disease. Early written records can however be used in conjunction with archaeological information and surviving oral histories from members of the Aboriginal community to gain a picture of Aboriginal life in the region.

Despite a proliferation of Aboriginal heritage sites there is considerable ongoing debate about the nature, territory, and range of pre-contact Aboriginal language groups in the greater Sydney region. These debates have arisen largely because, by the time colonial diarists, missionaries and proto-anthropologists began making detailed records of Aboriginal people in the late 19th century, pre-European Aboriginal groups had been broken up and reconfigured by European settlement activity. The following information relating to Aboriginal people on the Cumberland Plains is based on such early records.

There is some confusion relating to group names, which can be explained using differing terminologies in early historical references. Language groups were not the main political or social units in Aboriginal life. Instead, land custodianship and ownership centred on the smaller named groups that comprised the broader language grouping. There is some variation in the terminology used to categorise these smaller groups; the terms used by Attenbrow (2010) will be used here.

The study area is in the vicinity of three language groups, Dharawal, Gundungurra and the hinterland Darug. Attenbrow (2010, p. 34) suggests:

- The Gundungurra covered "the southern rim of the Cumberland Plain west of the Georges River, as well as the southern Blue Mountains".
- The Dharawal covered "the south side of Botany Bay, extending as far as the Shoalhaven River; from the coast to the Georges River and Appin, possibly as far west as Camden".
- The hinterland Darug covered the area "from Appin in the south to the Hawkesbury River in the north; west of the Georges River, Parramatta, the Lane Cove River and Berowra Creek".

These areas are indicative only and would have changed through time.

After the arrival of European settlers, the movement of Aboriginal people became increasingly restricted. European expansion along the Cumberland Plain was swift and soon there had been considerable loss of land to agriculture. At the same time diseases such as smallpox were having a devastating effect on the Aboriginal population. Death, starvation, and disease were some of the disrupting factors that led to a reorganisation of the social practices of Aboriginal communities after European contact. The formation of new social groups and alliances were made as Aboriginal people sought to retain some semblance of their previous lifestyle.



## 3.2 Aboriginal heritage located in the study area

#### 3.2.1 AHIMS search results

An extensive search of the AHIMS database was conducted on 12 January 2024 (Client service ID: 854166). The search identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area (Figure 4). Three sites are located within the study area: AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02, AHIMS 45-5-5692/Aldington Road IF01 and AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform in the western portion of the assessment area (Photo 2). The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area along Aldington Road (Figure 4). It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert (Photo 3). The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5692/Aldington Road IF01

AHIMS 45-5-5692/Aldington Road IF01 was identified during an archaeological survey as part of a ADDA being completed by Biosis (2023c). The site was located on the mid-slope of a sloped landform, within a disturbed landscape, and is approximately 10 metres west of the current Biosis study area (Photo 4). It consisted of a single, silcrete multi-platform core with two complete flake scars (Photo 5). The artefact measured 34.18 millimetres in length, 28.36 millimetres in width, and 22.01 millimetres in thickness. The artefact was identified within vehicle tracks, on top of the topsoil layer.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01

AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01 is an isolated artefact that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Austral Archaeology (2022). The site was located in an upper slope landform and contained a single silcrete proximal flake (Photo 6).





## 3.3 Interpretation of past Aboriginal land use

The study area is situated within the Cumberland Lowlands which features undulating plains and low hills with dense drainage lines. The study area itself reflects this, possessing undulating moderately inclined slopes. The study area is underlain by the Bringelly shale geological unit, where artefact sites and PADs are common. Rock shelters and grinding grooves are less common within this unit due to the lack of sandstone geology.

Streams located in the study area include two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that crosses Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. These water sources would have provided resources exploitable by Aboriginal people. The location of the study area in such proximity to Kemps Creek and its elevated landforms may suggest Aboriginal occupation in the past. This occupation may have occurred primarily during the early months of the year when the capacity of the creek was the greatest due to rainfall.

The European history of the Kemps Creek region is largely one of rural development. Early exploration and movement into the region accompanied early land grants which were subdivided and sold, not often developed. More recent aerial images show that study area was extensively developed with the addition of Aldington, Mamre and Abbotts Roads, and infrastructure to support residential developments along these roads including driveways, telegraphs poles and subsurface services. These activities would have disturbed archaeological remains that exist within the study area. Tree clearing would have removed any modified trees and disturbed the top layer of soil due to uprooting.





## 4 Aboriginal community consultation

Consultation with the Aboriginal community has been undertaken in compliance with the consultation requirements as detailed below. A consultation log of all communications with RAPs is provided in Appendix 1.

A search conducted by the Office of the Registrar, *Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983* (NSW) listed no Aboriginal Owners with land within the study area. A search conducted by the NNTT listed no Registered Native Title Claims, Unregistered Claimant Applications or Registered Indigenous Land Use Agreements within the study area.

#### 4.1.2 Public notice

In accordance with the consultation guidelines, a public notification was placed in *The Western Weekender* (19 January 2024).

The advertisement invited Aboriginal people who hold cultural knowledge to register their interest in a process of community consultation to provide assistance in determining the significance of Aboriginal object(s) and/or places in the vicinity of the study area. A copy of the public notice is provided in Appendix 2.

#### 4.1.3 Registration of Aboriginal parties

Aboriginal groups identified in Section 4.1.1 were sent a letter inviting them to register their interest in a process of community consultation to provide assistance in determining the significance of Aboriginal object(s) and/or places in the vicinity of the study area. In response to the letters and public notice, a total of 28 groups registered their interest in the project. Responses to registration from Aboriginal parties are provided in Appendix 3. A full list of Aboriginal parties who registered for consultation is provided below:

## 4.2 Stage 2: Presentation of information about the proposed project

On 15 February 2024, Biosis provided RAPs with details about the proposed development works (project information pack). A copy of the project information pack is provided in Appendix 3.

## 4.3 Stage 3: Gathering information about cultural significance

#### 4.3.1 Archaeological assessment methodology information pack

On 15 February 2024, Biosis provided each RAP with a copy of the project methodology pack outlining the proposed ACHA process and methodology for this project. RAPs were given 28 days to review and prepare feedback on the proposed methodology. A copy of the project methodology pack is provided in Appendix 3.

There were five responses received that were in support of the proposed methodology. Specific response details have been provided in Appendix 1.

#### 4.3.2 Information gathered during fieldwork

No comments from RAPs were received at this stage of consultation.

## 4.4 Stage 4: Review of draft ACHA report

A copy of the draft ACHA and the proposed testing methodology were provided to RAPs on 10 May 2023 for review and comment. RAPs were given 28 days to provide comments in accordance with consultation requirements. Two responses were received as detailed below, and a record of all correspondence is provided in Appendix 4.

Comments were received from one group. Ninnum [19] responded by email on 15 and 16 April 2024 providing thanks and stating that had reviewed the methodology, but no specific comments were provided.



# 5 Aboriginal cultural significance assessment

The two main values addressed when assessing the significance of Aboriginal sites are cultural values to the Aboriginal community and archaeological (scientific) values. This report will assess the cultural values of Aboriginal sites in the study area. Details of the scientific significance assessment of Aboriginal sites in the study area are provided in Appendix 5.

## 5.1 Introduction to the assessment process

Heritage assessment criteria in NSW fall broadly within the significance values outlined in the Australia International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) *Burra Charter: The Australia ICOMOS Charter for Places of Cultural Significance* (Australia ICOMOS 2013) (the Burra Charter). This approach to heritage has been adopted by cultural heritage managers and government agencies as the set of guidelines for best practice heritage management in Australia. These values are provided as background and include:

- **Historical significance** (evolution and association) refers to historic values and encompasses the history of aesthetics, science and society, and therefore to a large extent underlies all of the terms set out in this section. A place may have historic value because it has influenced, or has been influenced by, a historic figure, event, phase or activity. It may also have historic value as the site of an important event. For any given place the significance will be greater where evidence of the association or event survives in situ, or where the settings are substantially intact, than where it has been changed or evidence does not survive. However, some events or associations may be so important that the place retains significance regardless of subsequent treatment.
- Aesthetic significance (Scenic/architectural qualities, creative accomplishment) refers to the sensory, scenic, architectural and creative aspects of the place. It is often closely linked with social values and may include consideration of form, scale, colour, texture, and material of the fabric or landscape, and the smell and sounds associated with the place and its use.
- Social significance (contemporary community esteem) refers to the spiritual, traditional, historical or
  contemporary associations and attachment that the place or area has for the present-day community.
  Places of social significance have associations with contemporary community identity. These places can
  have associations with tragic or warmly remembered experiences, periods or events. Communities can
  experience a sense of loss should a place of social significance be damaged or destroyed. These aspects
  of heritage significance can only be determined through consultative processes with local communities.
- **Scientific significance** (Archaeological, industrial, educational, research potential and scientific significance values) refers to the importance of a landscape, area, place or object because of its archaeological and/or other technical aspects. Assessment of scientific value is often based on the likely research potential of the area, place or object and will consider the importance of the data involved, its rarity, quality or representativeness, and the degree to which it may contribute further substantial information.

The cultural and archaeological significance of Aboriginal and historic sites and places is assessed on the basis of the significance values outlined above. As well as the Burra Charter significance values guidelines, various government agencies have developed formal criteria and guidelines that have application when assessing the significance of heritage places within NSW. Of primary interest are guidelines prepared by the Australian Government, Heritage NSW and the Heritage Branch, and the NSW Department of Planning and Environment. The relevant sections of these guidelines are presented below.



These guidelines state that an area may contain evidence and associations which demonstrate one or any combination of the Burra Charter significance values outlined above in reference to Aboriginal heritage. Reference to each of the values should be made when evaluating archaeological and cultural significance for Aboriginal sites and places.

In addition to the previously outlined heritage values, the Heritage NSW Guidelines to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW (OEH 2011) also specify the importance of considering cultural landscapes when determining and assessing Aboriginal heritage values. The principle behind a cultural landscape is that 'the significance of individual features is derived from their inter-relatedness within the cultural landscape'. This means that sites or places cannot be 'assessed in isolation' but must be considered as parts of the wider cultural landscape. Hence the site or place will possibly have values derived from its association with other sites and places. By investigating the associations between sites, places, and (for example) natural resources in the cultural landscape the stories behind the features can be told. The context of the cultural landscape can unlock 'better understanding of the cultural meaning and importance' of sites and places.

Although other values may be considered – such as educational or tourism values – the two principal values that are likely to be addressed in consideration of Aboriginal sites and places are the cultural/social significance to Aboriginal people and their archaeological or scientific significance to archaeologists and the Aboriginal community. The determinations of archaeological and cultural significance for sites and places should then be expressed as statements of significance that preface a concise discussion of the contributing factors to Aboriginal cultural heritage significance.

## 5.2 Cultural (social significance) values

Cultural or social significance refers to the spiritual, traditional, historical and/or contemporary associations and values attached to a place or objects by Aboriginal people. Aboriginal cultural heritage is broadly valued by Aboriginal people as it is used to define their identity as both individuals and as part of a group (DECCW 2010a, p. iii). More specifically it provides:

- A 'connection and sense of belonging to Country' (DECCW 2010a, p. iii).
- A link between the present and the past (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).
- A learning tool to teach Aboriginal culture to younger Aboriginal generations and the general public (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).
- Further evidence of Aboriginal occupation prior to European settlement for people who do not understand the magnitude to which Aboriginal people occupied the continent (DECCW 2010a, p. 3).

It is acknowledged that Aboriginal people are the primary determiners of the cultural significance of Aboriginal cultural heritage. During consultation the following information was provided by RAPs in regard to the cultural values of the study area.

Kamilaroi Yankuntjatjara Working Group [15] responded to project information and methodology pack on 11 March 2024 via email:

The study area is highly significant to our people for tens of thousands of years our people have cared for country and we continue to do so. With the vast ecosystems that make up the environment, that's rich with flora and fauna allowing Aboriginal people to thrive, with rich water ways that were utilised for daily activates.



### 5.3 Historic values

Historic significance refers to associations a place or object may have with a historically important person, event, phase, or activity to the Aboriginal and other communities. The study area is not known to have any historic associations. Therefore, this assessment has concluded that the study area has low historic significance.

### 5.4 Archaeological (scientific significance) values

An archaeological scientific assessment was undertaken for the study area and is presented in detail as part of the attached AR (Appendix 5). Background research identified the presence of a registered Aboriginal site within the study area; AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02. This low density site is consistent with predictive modelling for gentle slope landforms in the area. Isolated artefacts and low density deposits are considered a common site type within the region with limited potential to contribute further information about Aboriginal occupation and land use within the local region. The archaeological significance of these sites has been assessed as low.

### 5.5 Aesthetic values

There is a diverse yet accessible literature regarding the identification of aesthetic values and determining aesthetic significance (Burke & Smith 2004, pp. 248–9). It is generally agreed that aesthetic values are an important part of cultural heritage significance; however, they are dependent on an individual's sensory response, which means determining aesthetic value is fraught with difficulty, and should be applied on a case-by-case basis as it is not always a value applicable to archaeological sites. However, when dealing with some types of sites aesthetic values and landscape context are an important consideration. The question 'does the place have a relationship between its parts and the setting which reinforces the quality of both', while originally proposed in an architectural context (Kerr 2013, p. 15), is relevant also for many sites in a local setting—such as in forests, deserts, or coastlines, where there is often an important relationship between cultural sites and the natural environment, which contribute to the values of a 'sense of place'.

The study area has been highly disturbed through land clearance and road, residential and industrial development. The vegetation clearance and other development surrounding the study area indicates that the aesthetic values have been altered from the original landscape before European settlement, and therefore has low aesthetic value.

### 5.6 Statement of significance

The significance of sites was assessed in accordance with the following criteria:

- Requirements of the Code.
- The Burra Charter.
- Guide to Investigating and Reporting on Aboriginal Heritage.

The combined use of these guidelines is widely considered to represent the best practice for assessments of Aboriginal cultural heritage. The identification and assessment of cultural heritage values includes the four values of the Burra Charter: social, historical, scientific and aesthetic values. The resultant statement of significance has been constructed for the study area based on the significance ranking criteria assessed in Table 5.



### 5.6.1 Statement of significance for AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road ASO2 is a low density sub-surface artefact scatter consisting of 31 lithic artefacts. The site extent covers an area of approximately 110 metres by 34 metres and was identified on a lower slope landform. This low density scatter is considered a common site type in the region with limited potential to contribute further information about Aboriginal occupation and land use within the local region. The archaeological significance of this site has been assessed as low. Discussions with the local Aboriginal communities reflect that the site is high in cultural in value. The site has no known direct historical associations and has low historical value. This site type occurs frequently within the region and the scientific significance of this site has been assessed as low. The site is located within the rolling green hills and pastoral landscape of Kemps Creek, though has been impacted by the housing development and agricultural facilities. This development and disturbance have altered the original landscape before European settlement, and therefore the site has low aesthetic value. The overall significance of this site has been assessed as low.

### 5.6.2 Statement of significance for AHIMS 45-5-5692/Aldington Road IF01

AHIMS 45-5-5692/Aldington Road IF01 is an isolated silcrete multi-platform core. The site was located on a mid-slope landform, within a disturbed landscape. This isolated artefact is considered a common site type in the region with limited potential to contribute further information about Aboriginal occupation and land use within the local region. The archaeological significance of this site has been assessed as low. The site has no known direct historical associations and has low historical value. This site type occurs frequently within the region and the scientific significance of this site has been assessed as low. The site is located within the rolling green hills and pastoral landscape of Kemps Creek, though has been impacted by the housing development and agricultural facilities. This development and disturbance have altered the original landscape before European settlement, and therefore the site has low aesthetic value. The overall significance of this site has been assessed as low.

### 5.6.3 Statement of significance for AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01 (from Austral Archaeology 2022)

This statement of significance is from the ACHA undertaken by Austral Archaeology (2022). A new statement of significance was not written as part of this assessment.

Aldington Rd 01 (AHIMS ID # 45-5-5607) consists of an isolated stone artefact recovered from a depth of between 0-20 cm in association with test pit TP\_A1. The isolated sub-surface artefact consists of a proximal flake manufactured from red silcrete. The site measures approximately 0.25 m by 0.25 m and is located in an upper slope landscape context. The site represents one of the most common site types identified within the Cumberland Plain (i.e. Artefact sites) and comprises of an artefact manufactured from the most common raw material observed in assemblages from such sites (e.g. silcrete). Based on the isolated nature of the artefact, its fragmented nature and the lack of distinctive technological features and/or artefact types (retouched or utilised artefacts), the site is assessed as having low research potential and thus low scientific significance. Aldington Rd 01 (AHIMS ID# 45-5-5607) has been assessed to have low to no historic, aesthetic, social or spiritual significance (Austral Archaeology 2022).

### 6 Development limitations and mitigation measures

The proposed development will involve upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road (Figure 3). The potential impacts of these works on Aboriginal heritage are presented below.

### 6.1 Predicted physical impacts

The proposed development will include earthworks such as cutting and filling along existing road corridor, refining and reinforcing the new infrastructure and installation of road signage. These works all heavily impact ground surfaces and will result in direct impacts to the Aboriginal sites within the study area (Figure 5). A summary of impacts is provided below in Table 6.

### **6.2 Ecologically Sustainable Development**

One of the primary aims of the NP&W Act is the 'conservation of objects places and features ... of cultural value within the landscape, including ... places, objects and features of significance to Aboriginal people ...' ((s.2A(1)(b)(i)). The *Operational Policy: Protecting Aboriginal Cultural Heritage (Version 2)* (DECC NSW 2011) provides guidance to proponents in term of 1.1 Ecologically Sustainable Development (ESD).

ESD has been defined in Part 3, 6. (2) Objective of the Authority of the *Protection of the Environment Administration Act 1991* (NSW). This outlines that the ESD requires the integration of economic and environmental considerations (including cultural heritage) in the decision-making process. In regard to Aboriginal cultural heritage, ESD can be achieved by applying the principle of intergenerational equity and the precautionary principle.

### Intergenerational equity

The principle of intergenerational equity states that the present generation should make every effort to ensure the health, diversity and productivity of the environment – which includes cultural heritage – for the benefit of future generations.

In terms of Aboriginal cultural heritage, intergenerational equity can be considered in terms of the 'cumulative impacts' of any proposal to Aboriginal objects and places. For example, if few Aboriginal objects and places remain in a region (because of harm authorised under previous AHIPs), fewer opportunities remain for future generations of Aboriginal people to enjoy the cultural benefits of those Aboriginal objects and places.



Information about the significance of Aboriginal cultural heritage values associated with the Aboriginal objects and places proposed to be harmed will be relevant to the consideration of intergenerational equity and an understanding of the cumulative impacts of a proposal.

Where there is uncertainty, the precautionary principle should also be followed (see below).

### The precautionary principle

The precautionary principle states that the lack of full scientific certainty about the threat of harm should not be used as a reason for not taking measures to prevent harm from occurring.

In applying the precautionary principle, decisions should be guided by:

- a careful evaluation to avoid, wherever practicable, serious or irreversible damage to the environment (which includes cultural heritage)
- an assessment of the risk-weighted consequences of various options. The precautionary principle is relevant to OEH consideration of potential harm to Aboriginal cultural heritage where:
- the proposal involves a risk of serious or irreversible harm to Aboriginal objects or places or to the value of those objects or places, and
- there is a lot of uncertainty about the significance of Aboriginal cultural heritage values of the Aboriginal objects or places proposed to be harmed.

Where this is the case, a precautionary approach should be taken and all cost-effective measures implemented to prevent or reduce harm to the Aboriginal objects/place.

### 6.3 Management and mitigation measures

Ideally, heritage management involves conservation of sites through the preservation and conservation of fabric and context within a framework of 'doing as much as necessary, as little as possible' (Marquis-Kyle & Walker 1994, p. 13). In cases where conservation is not practical, several options for management are available. For sites, management often involves the salvage of features or artefacts, retrieval of information through excavation or collection—especially where impact cannot be avoided—and interpretation.

Avoidance of impact to archaeological and cultural heritage sites through design of the development is the primary mitigation and management strategy and should be implemented where practicable.

There is one AHIMS site that is partially present within the study area requiring management; AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 (Figure 5). The site is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted as part of an ACHA by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform in the western portion of the assessment area, and the site extent intersects in part with the current Biosis study area (Figure 4). This site has been assessed as having low scientific significance, and considered a common site type in the region with limited potential to contribute further information about Aboriginal occupation and land use within the local region (Biosis 2023b). If the proposed works cannot avoid impacts to the sites located within the study area, then the following mitigation measures, which consider the principles of ESD and intergenerational equity in their design, are proposed:

### **Development of a Cultural Heritage Management Plan**

It is recommended a CHMP be included in the CEMP that is being developed for the study area. The CHMP will aid to appropriately manage Aboriginal cultural heritage identified within the study area. To ensure that any unexpected Aboriginal objects are treated appropriately, the CHMP would include a heritage induction to





be undertaken by the site personnel prior to works and an unexpected finds protocol, including protocol for the discovery of human remains, and included in the CEMP for the proposed development.


The CHMP must be prepared by a suitably qualified heritage consultant in consultation with the RAPs for the project.

#### **Continued consultation**

As per the consultation guidelines, the proponent provides a copy of this report to the RAPs and considers all comments received. The proponent should continue to inform these groups about the management of Aboriginal cultural heritage sites within the study area throughout the life of the project. The RAPs should be consulted regarding the long-term care of the artefacts.











### 7 Recommendations

The recommendations below respond specifically to the wishes of the RAPs. Recommendations regarding the archaeological value of the site, and the subsequent management of Aboriginal cultural heritage is provided in the archaeological report (Appendix 5).

Prior to any impacts occurring within the study area, the following is recommended.

### **Recommendation 1: Development of a Cultural Heritage Management Plan**

As per Section 4.41 of the EP&A Act, an AHIP under the NPW Act is not required for SSD projects authorised by a development consent. All works must be conducted in accordance with the SSD consent conditions.

It is recommended a CHMP be included in the CEMP that is being developed for the study area. The CHMP will aid to appropriately manage Aboriginal cultural heritage identified within the study area and would include unanticipated finds protocols and a heritage induction to be undertaken by the site personnel prior to works.

The CHMP must be prepared by a suitably qualified heritage consultant in consultation with the RAPs for the project.

### **Recommendation 2: Community collection of AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01**

It is recommended that community collection of the isolated surface artefact from site AHIMS 45-5-5607/Aldington Road 01 be undertaken. The methodology for this collection should be included in the CHMP for the project.

### Recommendation 3: Areas identified as having low archaeological potential

No further investigations are required for areas assessed as having low archaeological potential. This recommendation is conditional upon Recommendations 4 to 7.

### **Recommendation 4: Discovery of Unanticipated Aboriginal Objects**

All Aboriginal objects and Places are protected under the NSW NPW Act. It is an offence to knowingly disturb an Aboriginal site without a consent permit issued by the Heritage NSW. Should any Aboriginal objects be encountered during works associated with this proposal, works must cease in the vicinity and the find should not be moved until assessed by a qualified archaeologist. The anticipated Aboriginal object will then be the subject of the appropriate process outlined in the CHMP.

### **Recommendation 5: Discovery of Unanticipated Historical Relics**

Relics are historical archaeological resources of local or State significance and are protected in NSW under the Heritage Act. Relics cannot be disturbed except with a permit or exception/exemption notification. Should unanticipated relics be discovered during the course of the project, work in the vicinity must cease and an archaeologist contacted to make a preliminary assessment of the find. The Heritage Council will require notification if the find is assessed as a relic.

### **Recommendation 6: Discovery of Aboriginal Ancestral Remains**

Aboriginal ancestral remains may be found in a variety of landscapes in NSW, including middens and sandy or soft sedimentary soils. If any suspected human remains are discovered during any activity, you must:



- 1. Immediately cease all work at that location and not further move or disturb the remains.
- 2. Notify the NSW Police and Heritage NSW Environmental Line on 131 555 as soon as practicable and provide details of the remains and their location.
- 3. Not recommence work at that location unless authorised in writing by Heritage NSW.

### **Recommendation 7: Continued consultation with the registered Aboriginal stakeholders**

As per the consultation requirements, it is recommended that the proponent provides a copy of this draft report to the Aboriginal stakeholders and considers all comments received. The proponent should continue to inform these groups about the management of Aboriginal cultural heritage sites within the study area throughout the life of the project.

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

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

### Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

#### The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. #### Study area

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.














## Stage 3 - Gathering information about cultural significance

The aims of stage 3 of the consultation process are to facilitate a process where RAPs for the project can:

- Contribute to culturally appropriate information gathering and the research methodology.
- Provide information that will enable the cultural significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places in the proposed study area to be determined.
- Have input into the development of any cultural heritage management options (DECCW 2010a, p. 12).

The purpose of the stage 3 document below is to provide RAPs with information about the proposed ACHA methodology for the project, including the survey strategy and test excavation (if required) methodology and to seek feedback on the Aboriginal cultural values present within the study area.

The assessment methodology includes the following tasks:

#### **Background research**

This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

- A search of the AHIMS database will be completed to identify registered sites in the vicinity of the assessment/study area. The results of the AHIMS search will be used to obtain relevant site cards and relevant previously completed Aboriginal cultural heritage assessments.
- A review of relevant reports identified through the AHIMS search will be undertaken.
- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

#### **Consultation with the Aboriginal community**

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.

Aboriginal community consultation will be undertaken in accordance with the consultation requirements, which includes:

- COMPLETED. Biosis ascertained the names of Aboriginal people or groups who may hold cultural knowledge relevant to determining the significance of Aboriginal objects and/ or places within the study area.
- COMPLETED. Aboriginal stakeholders were provided with notification by letter of the project on behalf of Biosis on 30 January 2024, and given the opportunity to be involved in consultation.



- This document outlines the details of the project and proposed archaeological testing methodology. If required. The RAPs must be given an opportunity to review and provide feedback to the proponent within a minimum of 28 days of Biosis providing the methodology document.
- The Draft ACHA report and AR will be provided to all RAPs for comment the proponent must allow 28 days for comment. All comments and correspondence sent and received regarding the project will be included in the final report in an appendix.

#### **Culturally sensitive material**

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Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

#### **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

#### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

#### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

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

# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

# **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.

This will be undertaken in accordance with their role specified in section 5 of the consultation requirements.

Biosis and the proponent, in accordance with their role under section 5 of the consultation requirements, will consult with the Aboriginal community by:

- Displaying a meaningful appreciation, understanding and respect for the belief system, spiritual
  connection and sense of belonging that Aboriginal people have to their land, people and
  environment, which includes plants, animals, waterways, sacred sites and other places of cultural
  significance and importance.
- Upholding and respecting the traditional rights, obligations and responsibilities of Aboriginal people who hold cultural knowledge in accordance with traditional lore and custom, particularly as these relate to the cultural business of men and women.
- Encouraging active participation of culturally experienced and appropriate Aboriginal people who hold cultural knowledge in the consultation process.
- Encouraging opportunities for the effective transfer of cultural knowledge from older to younger generations in accordance with traditional lore and custom through the consultation process.
- Have an awareness and understanding of how colonisation has impacted the Aboriginal people of Australia.
- Supply suitable project information and provide the opportunity for Aboriginal stakeholders to provide input into the heritage management process (DECCW 2010a).














# Stage 3 - Gathering information about cultural significance

The aims of stage 3 of the consultation process are to facilitate a process where RAPs for the project can:

- Contribute to culturally appropriate information gathering and the research methodology.
- Provide information that will enable the cultural significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places in the proposed study area to be determined.
- Have input into the development of any cultural heritage management options (DECCW 2010a, p. 12).

The purpose of the stage 3 document below is to provide RAPs with information about the proposed ACHA methodology for the project, including the survey strategy and test excavation (if required) methodology and to seek feedback on the Aboriginal cultural values present within the study area.

The assessment methodology includes the following tasks:

# **Background research**

This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

- A search of the AHIMS database will be completed to identify registered sites in the vicinity of the assessment/study area. The results of the AHIMS search will be used to obtain relevant site cards and relevant previously completed Aboriginal cultural heritage assessments.
- A review of relevant reports identified through the AHIMS search will be undertaken.
- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

# **Consultation with the Aboriginal community**

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.

Aboriginal community consultation will be undertaken in accordance with the consultation requirements, which includes:

- COMPLETED. Biosis ascertained the names of Aboriginal people or groups who may hold cultural knowledge relevant to determining the significance of Aboriginal objects and/ or places within the study area.
- COMPLETED. Aboriginal stakeholders were provided with notification by letter of the project on behalf of Biosis on 30 January 2024, and given the opportunity to be involved in consultation.



- This document outlines the details of the project and proposed archaeological testing methodology. If required. The RAPs must be given an opportunity to review and provide feedback to the proponent within a minimum of 28 days of Biosis providing the methodology document.
- The Draft ACHA report and AR will be provided to all RAPs for comment the proponent must allow 28 days for comment. All comments and correspondence sent and received regarding the project will be included in the final report in an appendix.

# **Culturally sensitive material**

Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

#### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

#### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

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

- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. 



- A search of the AHIMS database will be completed to identify registered sites in the vicinity of the assessment/study area. The results of the AHIMS search will be used to obtain relevant site cards and relevant previously completed Aboriginal cultural heritage assessments.
- A review of relevant reports identified through the AHIMS search will be undertaken.
- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

## **Consultation with the Aboriginal community**

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.

Aboriginal community consultation will be undertaken in accordance with the consultation requirements, which includes:

- COMPLETED. Biosis ascertained the names of Aboriginal people or groups who may hold cultural knowledge relevant to determining the significance of Aboriginal objects and/ or places within the study area.
- COMPLETED. Aboriginal stakeholders were provided with notification by letter of the project on behalf of Biosis on 30 January 2024, and given the opportunity to be involved in consultation.



- This document outlines the details of the project and proposed archaeological testing methodology. If required. The RAPs must be given an opportunity to review and provide feedback to the proponent within a minimum of 28 days of Biosis providing the methodology document.
- The Draft ACHA report and AR will be provided to all RAPs for comment the proponent must allow 28 days for comment. All comments and correspondence sent and received regarding the project will be included in the final report in an appendix.

# **Culturally sensitive material**

Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

#### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

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

# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

# **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.



# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

# **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



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The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.



If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

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
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

- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

# **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.



- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.



The aims of stage 3 of the consultation process are to facilitate a process where RAPs for the project can:

- Contribute to culturally appropriate information gathering and the research methodology.
- Provide information that will enable the cultural significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places in the proposed study area to be determined.
- Have input into the development of any cultural heritage management options (DECCW 2010a, p. 12).

The purpose of the stage 3 document below is to provide RAPs with information about the proposed ACHA methodology for the project, including the survey strategy and test excavation (if required) methodology and to seek feedback on the Aboriginal cultural values present within the study area.

The assessment methodology includes the following tasks:

# **Background research**

This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

- A review of relevant reports identified through the AHIMS search will be undertaken.
- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

# **Consultation with the Aboriginal community**

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.

Aboriginal community consultation will be undertaken in accordance with the consultation requirements, which includes:

- COMPLETED. Biosis ascertained the names of Aboriginal people or groups who may hold cultural knowledge relevant to determining the significance of Aboriginal objects and/ or places within the study area.
- COMPLETED. Aboriginal stakeholders were provided with notification by letter of the project on behalf of Biosis on 30 January 2024, and given the opportunity to be involved in consultation.



- This document outlines the details of the project and proposed archaeological testing methodology. If required. The RAPs must be given an opportunity to review and provide feedback to the proponent within a minimum of 28 days of Biosis providing the methodology document.
- The Draft ACHA report and AR will be provided to all RAPs for comment the proponent must allow 28 days for comment. All comments and correspondence sent and received regarding the project will be included in the final report in an appendix.

# **Culturally sensitive material**

Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.

- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

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A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.

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

# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

# **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.





- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.

The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. 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The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. 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



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Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.

- Encouraging opportunities for the effective transfer of cultural knowledge from older to younger generations in accordance with traditional lore and custom through the consultation process.
- Have an awareness and understanding of how colonisation has impacted the Aboriginal people of Australia.














# Stage 3 - Gathering information about cultural significance

- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

#### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

## Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

## The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

## Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

## **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.

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

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This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

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  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

#### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

## Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

## The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

## Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

## **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



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The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.



#### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
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- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.



- This document outlines the details of the project and proposed archaeological testing methodology. If required. The RAPs must be given an opportunity to review and provide feedback to the proponent within a minimum of 28 days of Biosis providing the methodology document.
- The Draft ACHA report and AR will be provided to all RAPs for comment the proponent must allow 28 days for comment. All comments and correspondence sent and received regarding the project will be included in the final report in an appendix.

# **Culturally sensitive material**

Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

#### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.

- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

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

- Encouraging opportunities for the effective transfer of cultural knowledge from older to younger generations in accordance with traditional lore and custom through the consultation process.
- Have an awareness and understanding of how colonisation has impacted the Aboriginal people of Australia.
- Supply suitable project information and provide the opportunity for Aboriginal stakeholders to provide input into the heritage management process (DECCW 2010a).

Each section of the ACHA methodology will be undertaken in consultation with the RAPs for the project. Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.



This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

- A search of the AHIMS database will be completed to identify registered sites in the vicinity of the assessment/study area. The results of the AHIMS search will be used to obtain relevant site cards and relevant previously completed Aboriginal cultural heritage assessments.
- A review of relevant reports identified through the AHIMS search will be undertaken.
- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

# **Consultation with the Aboriginal community**

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.

Aboriginal community consultation will be undertaken in accordance with the consultation requirements, which includes:

- COMPLETED. Biosis ascertained the names of Aboriginal people or groups who may hold cultural knowledge relevant to determining the significance of Aboriginal objects and/ or places within the study area.
- COMPLETED. Aboriginal stakeholders were provided with notification by letter of the project on behalf of Biosis on 30 January 2024, and given the opportunity to be involved in consultation.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

# **Background**

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. The Bringelly Shale formation is part of the Wianamatta group, and consists of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate, lithic sandstone, and rare coal. Artefact scatters are common in this geological unit, as are PADs. The presence of underlying shale deposits suggests that sites commonly found within sandstone formations, such as grinding grooves and rock shelters/rock art, are less likely to be present. Alluvial floodplain deposits consist of alluvium, and this is comprised of gravel, sand, silt, and clay from sandstone and shale that overlies buried estuarine sediments (Hazelton 1992, p. 68). Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).

A field investigation consisting of a pedestrian survey of the study area will be conducted in order to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects, sites, or areas of potential.

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

# Stage 2 - Project information

The aim of the stage 2 document is to provide registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) with information about the scope of the project, and the proposed cultural heritage assessment process, and to seek their feedback on the project.

# The project

The project refers to the proposed upgrades to Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road in Kemps Creek. AT&L are now preparing a modification to the approved State Significant Development, which included the design plans for the road upgrades.

Biosis has been engaged by AT&L to undertake the ACHA to support the modification and to inform the proposed works design for the study area. The ACHA will be prepared in accordance with *the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011). It includes an Archaeological Report (AR) prepared in accordance with the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW 2010b) (the Code) and consultation with Aboriginal community in accordance with the consultation requirements. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

# Study area

The study area incorporates Aldington Road, Abbotts Road, and the intersection of Mamre Road and Abbotts Road, Kemps Creek NSW. It is within the Penrith local government area (LGA) and is approximately 40 kilometers west of the Sydney central business district (Figure 1). The study area encompasses private land adjacent to the road reserves, with the Lots presented in Figure 2.

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. 












# Stage 3 - Gathering information about cultural significance

The aims of stage 3 of the consultation process are to facilitate a process where RAPs for the project can:

- Contribute to culturally appropriate information gathering and the research methodology.
- Provide information that will enable the cultural significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places in the proposed study area to be determined.
- Have input into the development of any cultural heritage management options (DECCW 2010a, p. 12).

The purpose of the stage 3 document below is to provide RAPs with information about the proposed ACHA methodology for the project, including the survey strategy and test excavation (if required) methodology and to seek feedback on the Aboriginal cultural values present within the study area.

The assessment methodology includes the following tasks:

# **Background research**

This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

- A search of the AHIMS database will be completed to identify registered sites in the vicinity of the assessment/study area. The results of the AHIMS search will be used to obtain relevant site cards and relevant previously completed Aboriginal cultural heritage assessments.
- A review of relevant reports identified through the AHIMS search will be undertaken.
- A review of aerial photographs and other resources to gauge the existing landscape and previous history of land disturbance will be undertaken.
- A review of the historical heritage databases will be undertaken.
- A brief summary of the historical uses of the study area will be developed.

# **Consultation with the Aboriginal community**

This task will provide the Aboriginal community with the opportunity to participate in decisions regarding the management of their cultural heritage by providing proponents information regarding cultural significance and opportunities to input into management options.

Aboriginal community consultation will be undertaken in accordance with the consultation requirements, which includes:

- COMPLETED. Biosis ascertained the names of Aboriginal people or groups who may hold cultural knowledge relevant to determining the significance of Aboriginal objects and/ or places within the study area.
- COMPLETED. Aboriginal stakeholders were provided with notification by letter of the project on behalf of Biosis on 30 January 2024, and given the opportunity to be involved in consultation.



- This document outlines the details of the project and proposed archaeological testing methodology. If required. The RAPs must be given an opportunity to review and provide feedback to the proponent within a minimum of 28 days of Biosis providing the methodology document.
- The Draft ACHA report and AR will be provided to all RAPs for comment the proponent must allow 28 days for comment. All comments and correspondence sent and received regarding the project will be included in the final report in an appendix.

# **Culturally sensitive material**

Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

#### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

#### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. The ACHA will inform AT&L of any potential for the project to impact on or expose Aboriginal objects or sites. Biosis will provide recommendations based on the outcomes of the ACHA.

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#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal

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












# Stage 3 - Gathering information about cultural significance

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This task will identify known Aboriginal sites, areas of potential archaeological sensitivity and previous disturbance, and inform the predictive modelling for the assessment/study area. The following steps will be undertaken:

# **Culturally sensitive material**

Biosis invites RAPs to provide culturally appropriate information via mail, email or phone with regards to this project.

Cultural information provided will be recorded in the Aboriginal consultation log and discussed in the report. If the information is regarded as too sensitive to be made public, then RAPs should advise Biosis and identify the nature of the sensitivity. Biosis will then arrange for the recording of the information in accordance with its sensitivity. Documents which hold sensitive information will clearly list, on the front cover, who can have access to the document. These documents will be stored securely.

# **Field investigation**

An archaeological survey of the study area will be conducted on a future date. If there are areas of moderate and/or high potential identified during the survey and these areas cannot be avoided by the proposed works, further assessment in the form of test excavations will be required.

Recording during the field investigation will follow requirements 5 to 10 of the Code and industry best practice. Information recorded will include:

- Aboriginal objects or sites present in the study area during the investigation.
- Survey coverage.
- Any resources that may potentially have been exploited by Aboriginal people.
- Landforms.
- Photographs of the site indicating landform.
- Evidence of disturbance.
- Aboriginal artefacts, culturally modified trees or any other Aboriginal sites.

Where possible, Identification of natural soil deposits within the study area will be undertaken. Representative photographs of survey units, landform, vegetation coverage, ground surface visibility will be undertaken.

Detailed results of the field investigation will be provided in the draft ACHA report and AR.

### **Archaeological test excavations (if required)**

Any areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit (PAD) identified during the field investigation which cannot be avoided by the construction works, will be subject to archaeological test excavations in line with the Code as outlined below.



#### **Aims**

The principle objectives of the test excavations are to identify and understand the nature, extent and significance of any areas of PAD within the study area. This will further our knowledge of Aboriginal archaeological site patterning within the study area and enable the predictive model to be further tested and refined.

The aims of the testing program are to:

- Determine the nature and extent of the sub-surface archaeological deposits in the study area.
- Identify if the archaeological material occurs in an intact, undisturbed context, by examining the soil profile and stratigraphy.
- Analyse and interpret any archaeological finds (such as stone artefacts, hearths, etc.) recovered during the testing program.
- Inform current knowledge of Aboriginal occupation and land use models of the region.
- Provide management and mitigation measures for Aboriginal archaeological objects located during the subsurface testing program.
- Test the predictive model and answer the research questions developed as part of this assessment.

#### **Test excavation methodology**

If test excavations are required within the study area, they will conform to the following methodology in line with Requirement 16 of the Code:

- Test excavations will be conducted in 50 by 50 centimetre units.
- The test pits will be excavated by hand (inclusive of trowels, spades and other hand tools) along transects at intervals of between 10 and 20 metres or other justifiable and regular spacing (being no smaller than five metres).
- The first test pit within a site or PAD area will be excavated in five centimetre spits; the subsequent test pits conducted within the site or PAD area can then be excavated in either 10 centimetre spits or stratigraphic units (whichever is smaller) to the base of Aboriginal object-bearing units being the removal of the A-horizon soil deposit down to the sterile clay or bedrock layer (B-horizon).
- If the depth of deposit prevents reaching sterile deposits within the 50 by 50 centimetre test pit, additional 50 by 50 centimetre test pits may be excavated adjacent to the original test pit (for example expanding the test pit to 50 by 100 centimetres) to reach the sterile deposits.
- Test pits may be combined and excavated as necessary in 50 by 50 centimetre units for the purposes of further understanding site characteristics. Note that under the Code, the maximum area that can be excavated in any one continuous area is three metres squared (3 m²).
- The Code dictates that the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the PAD or area being investigated.
- All excavated soil will be sieved in 5 millimetre sieves. Dry sieving will be attempted in the first instance, however wet sieving may be used if deposits cannot be dry sieved.

All cultural material will be collected, bagged and clearly labelled. They will be temporarily stored in the Biosis office for analysis at 14/17-27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015.



- For each test pit that is excavated, the following documentation will be taken:
  - Unique test pit identification number.
  - GPS coordinate of each test pit.
  - Munsell soil colour and texture.
  - Amount and location of cultural material within the deposit.
  - Nature of disturbance where present.
  - Stratigraphy.
  - Archaeological features (if present).
  - Photographic records.
  - Spit records.
- Test excavation units will be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- An AHIMS Site Impact Recording form will be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar for any sites impacted during test excavations.
- In the event that suspected human remains are identified works will immediately cease and the NSW Police and Heritage NSW will be notified.
- Test excavations will cease when enough information\* has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

\*Enough information is defined by Heritage NSW as meaning "the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance. This may include things like locally or regionally high object density: presence of rare or representative objects: presence of archaeological features: or locally or regionally significant deposits stratified or not."(DECCW 2010b, p. 28).

#### Storage of cultural material

Any cultural material identified during test excavations will be temporarily stored in the Biosis, Sydney office for analysis (14/17–27 Power Avenue, Alexandria, NSW 2015).

Once the cultural material has been analysed, the cultural material can be managed in the following manners:

- Cultural material can be held by the Aboriginal community under a care and control agreement.
- Cultural material can be returned to country and reburied as soon as practicable in a secure location in accordance with Requirements 16b and 26 of the Code.

Biosis requests any comments regarding the care and control of any cultural material be included as part of the review of this assessment methodology.

#### Reporting

Biosis will prepare an ACHA and AR for the project. The ACHA will document the findings of the assessment and detail the consultation process. The AR will be included as an appendix to the ACHA and will document the desktop assessment, field investigation, and test excavation results.

The main aim of the report is to document the assessment of potential development related impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage and to formulate strategies to manage these impacts. Reporting will follow the



guidelines of Heritage NSW, in particular the consultation requirements, the Code, and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW* (OEH 2011).

### The ACHA report will contain:

- Details of the Aboriginal consultation process undertaken as part of the assessment.
- A review and summary of the environmental context of the study area.
- A review and summary of the Aboriginal archaeological context of the study area.
- Archaeological test excavation results.
- Aboriginal site significance assessment.
- Impact assessment.
- Management strategies.
- Maps detailing any Aboriginal sites identified during the assessment process.

The RAPs will be provided with the draft ACHA report and AR, and their comments on the report content sought. Comments on the report's content are to be provided to Biosis by the party's respective nominated spokesperson(s). All comments not provided in writing will be recorded in an informal logbook by Biosis. These comments and responses to these comments will be documented in the final ACHA.

As part of this methodology registered Aboriginal parties will be provided with the draft report for comment and allowed **28 days** for review.

The final report will incorporate all comments and will be forwarded on to RAPs once completed.

Biosis conducted two Aboriginal Due Diligence Assessments in April 2023 for Aldington Road, Abbotts Road and part of Mamre Road. A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database on the 12 January 2024 (Client Service ID: 854166) identified 100 Aboriginal archaeological sites within a 1.2 by 1.2 kilometre search area, centred on the study area. One of these AHIMS sites were identified within the study area, AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02.

#### AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02

AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 is a subsurface, low density artefact scatter that was identified during a program of test excavations conducted by Biosis (2023b). The site is located within a lower slope landform and is partially located in the western portion of the current study area. The site extent of AHIMS 45-5-5747/270 Aldington Road AS02 overlaps the current Biosis study area. It contained 31 lithic artefacts recovered from across the PAD area, of which 25 were silcrete, three were IMT and three were chert. The artefact forms consisted of 15 angular fragments, five distal flakes, four complete flakes, three proximal



flakes, two medial flakes, one multidirectional core and one manuport. Disturbances observed within the area relate to low intensity agriculture.

The background research for the study area identified that there are two non-perennial first order creek lines that cross Aldington Road and one second-order non-perennial creek line that cross Mamre Road and travels across to the south of Abbotts Road. These creek lines are tributaries of Kemps Creek, a perennial fourth-order watercourse. Kemps Creek is located approximately 351 metres west of the study area at its closest point. Proximity to a permanent water source is considered a positive indicator for past Aboriginal land use. Stream order is recognised as a factor that assists the development of predictive modelling in Sydney Basin Aboriginal archaeology, and has seen extensive use in predictive modelling for the Sydney region, most notably by Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM) (JMCHM 2000, JMCHM 2005a, JMCHM 2005b, JMCHM 2008). These predictive models tend to favour higher order streams as the locations of campsites and therefore archaeological deposits. Larger water sources would have been more likely to provide a stable source of water and by extension other resources which would have been used by Aboriginal groups.

Topographically, the study area features a broad to moderate slope. This landscape is situated on the Bringelly Shale formation and alluvial floodplain deposits. Alluvial floodplains are deposited when flooding breaks through the river bank, with deposited materials varying depending on the energy of the river (Nanson, & Croke 1992).


