

THE WORLD OF WEIGHTS & MEASURES

Have you ever wondered, "What makes a pound a pound? How do I know that what I think is a gallon of gas is the same as what my neighbor in the next town over thinks is a gallon? Who is the keeper of these standards? Come to think of it, has that scale at my grocery store ever been checked out? And who's verifying the meter on my taxicab? More importantly, how do I know I'm getting my fair share when I buy (or sell) a bushel of strawberries?"

Some of these are deep thoughts. And yet, they affect our everyday lives in countless ways, some big and some small. Thankfully, folks like you and me can take a load off and rest easy. Because the Weights and Measures Division of the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) is doing the heavy lifting, if you will, to ensure equity in the marketplace.

In this issue, we're celebrating National Weights & Measures Week, commemorating when President John Adams signed the first U.S. weights and measures legislation into law on March 2, 1799. We'll peek inside the wide world of weights and measures, as well as the lengths that LDAF Weights and Measures staff go to every day in order to protect all Louisiana citizens.

Humans have been buying, selling, and trading valuables from the beginning of time. With the rise of agriculture, civilizations started to stay in one place and build stores of goods like grains, wine, olive oil, and salt. As societies specialized in different goods unique to their location, they began to depend on each other to trade for different goods and commodities. All this trade among separate and competing groups required a consistent value system to produce fair and equitable transactions, which, as you can imagine, quickly became a concern.

With no global currency, and in some places no currency at all, trade values grew out of perceived fairness and natural scarcity. How much would a barrel of wine be worth in grain, salt, or tools? Evidence of the use of weights and measures dates as far back as ancient Mesopotamia, and you can find references to false balances, scales, and just weights throughout the Bible.

Although there seems to have been an effort to use accurate and fair weights and measures practices, by the Middle Ages, the world only had a mish-mash of imprecise, unreproducible standards; they could be based on anything from an animal's average work ability to the measurements of various royal body parts. For example, legend has it that King Henry I of England (who ruled from 1100 to 1135) defined a yard as the distance from the tip of his nose to his extended arm.

However, in 1215 the English produced the Magna Carta. Not only did this document come to define liberty in Western Civilization, but it also gave the world its first large-scale standardization of weights and measures. As the British empire spread across the globe over the next several centuries, the principles of the standardized weights and measures system were eventually exported around the world.

In Louisiana, federal and state laws did not introduce a formal and official system of weights and measures until 1912. In the United States today, our measurement standards, which the Constitution established, are adopted by federal law and through various international treaties. For example, the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) houses the physical standards on which all state-operated metrology labs — like the one we operate at LDAF — base their own in-house standards. State labs then use those

Application Period Open for FY 2023 Vet Medicine Loan Repayment Program

The USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) Veterinary Medicine Loan Repayment Program (VMLRP) announces the opening of the fiscal year (FY) 2023 application cycle. NIFA anticipates that approximately \$10 million in funding will be available in FY23 to help mitigate food animal veterinary service shortages in the United States. VMLRP helps qualified veterinarians offset a significant portion of the debt incurred in pursuit of their veterinary medical degrees in return for their service in certain high-priority veterinary shortage areas.

The VMLRP supports NIFA's Animal Systems portfolio by facilitating professional workforce development in critical agricultural sectors related to animal health and well-being. The program contains two general categories of participation:

- Mitigation of private veterinary practice shortage situations.
- Mitigation of public veterinary practice and specialty veterinary discipline shortage situations.

VMLRP awardees commit to providing at least three years of food animal veterinary services in a designated veterinary shortage area in return for payments of up to \$25,000 of student loan debt per year with a maximum of \$75,000 for a three-year contract. VMLRP awardees are eligible to reapply to continue to serve their originally awarded shortage situation area in the last year of their contract or one year after their contract ends.

"According to the American Veterinary Medical Association, outstanding student loan debt is growing

SEARED AHI TUNI IN BEURRE BLANC

Submitted by Frugé Seasoning

Ingredients:

Tuna steaks, fresh, 2+ inches thick 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 tablespoon butter Frugé Cajun Seasoning Balsamic Reduction

Beurre Blanc: 11/2 sticks butter 1/4 cup white wine vinegar 4 tablespoons shallots, minced 1/2 teaspoon sea salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 2 lemons or limes, fresh

Instructions:

Beurre Blanc: Take the stick and a half of butter and cut it into 12 separate tablespoons, then put back into the fridge to keep it cold. Using a saucepan on low heat, mix the white wine and vinegar. Add shallot, ½teaspoon sea salt, and ½teaspoon pepper. Take (1) fresh lemon or lime and roll it on the counter, putting pressure, to help create juice. You can microwave it for 30 seconds after. Cut the fruit in half then squeeze all of the juice into the pan. Stir well. Increase the heat to medium-high and let simmer/lightly rolling boil until the liquid reduces by about half. At that time, remove your butter from the fridge. Cut the heat, and add 2 tablespoons of butter, continuing to stir. Once those melt, add 2 more tablespoons of butter, continuing to stir. Add 4 tablespoons and stir. Add the final 4 tablespoons while continuing to stir. As the butter slowly cools the sauce and you continue to stir, the sauce pulls together. Once complete, you can transfer the sauce to a bowl or leave within the pan. Note: It will solidify with time but can still be used in the future if you like. GREAT on chicken as well.

In a medium pan, add 2 tablespoons of olive oil and 1 tablespoon of butter. Bring to low heat to slowly melt butter. Season your tuna with Frugé's Cajun Seasoning on both sides. Bring the pan up to medium-high heat. Add your tuna steaks, and sear for 2 minutes on each side. While the tuna is cooking, prepare your plate (or before starting the Tuna in the pan). Add a pool of Beurre Blanc on the plate, then drizzle drops or run a strip of balsamic reduction across the front crescent section of the plate, in the Beurre Blanc. You can then use a spoon to drag through the balsamic, creating a leafy ivy looking design. Take the extra citrus and cut two thin wheels for garnish. Slice the wheel halfway once cut, so you can fold it across the top of the Tuna. Remove the Tuna from the pan, place on prepared plate, top with sea salt and light black pepper. Add the garnish. Serve immediately.

4.5 times as fast as incomes for new veterinary school graduates," remarked Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry Commissioner Mike Strain, DVM. "The Veterinary Medicine Loan Repayment Program is a great opportunity to pay off a portion of student debt while providing veterinary services to areas experiencing shortage situations."

The VMLRP Request for Applications (RFA) and the 2023 veterinary shortage situations are now available. A new requirement this year is a Letter of Intent (LOI). Specific instructions are available in the VMLRP RFA. The deadline for LOI is April 3, 2023, and the application deadline is April 17, 2023.

standards to calibrate service agency and state inspector field standards, which are then used in the field to test and set the calibration of all commercial devices.

Every year, LDAF inspects more than 75,000 retail motor fuel devices at more than 3,000 retail outlets across the state. Using field testing equipment that is certified for calibration, LDAF Weights and Measures staff check gas pumps for accuracy, function, safety, and several other items that are required by NIST Handbook 44. Any pumps that aren't functioning properly are taken out of service until the device is calibrated and retested. These inspections also include the inner workings of the fuel pumps to ensure no fraudulent card skimming devices are attached.

In addition to fuel device inspections, LDAF Weights and Measures staff also investigate consumer complaints on various fuel-related issues including calibration, advertisement, price credit card skimming devices, price computation, labeling requirements, and contamination. When a contaminated complaint is received, samples are taken, field-tested, and sent to our in-house motor fuels laboratory for fuel quality analysis. When a sample does not meet the ASTM prescribed specifications for that fuel type, the locations devices are removed from service, and the fuel cannot be sold. Once the repairs have been made, resampling must occur. The location will not be allowed to sell the product until a sample passes fuel quality testing.

LDAF's Division of Weights and Measures is also the consumer's line of defense regarding the declared contents of packaged goods. We randomly and routinely sample and inspect packaged commodities of every kind to ensure you are getting what is advertised based on only the weight of the item for sale, not the weight of the bag, stickers, labels, or anything else.

Packaged commodities must be accurately labeled with 1) the name of the product, 2) the name and address or website of the manufacturer or packer, and 3) the net contents of the product.

If the item is sold using an automated price lookup system, the accurate price must also be correctly posted. In addition to performing package and labeling inspections throughout the state, LDAF Weights and Measures staff ensure equity in the marketplace through price

What is Metrology? by Jennifer Adair

When people ask me what I do, and I answer, "I'm a metrologist," inevitably, they'll respond, "Oh, so you predict the weather!"



A **METROLOGIST** (not meteorologist) is a measurement scientist. Metrologists study all things measurement and its application to the world around us. As a NIST-certified state metrologist with LDAF's Division of Weights and Measures, I perform calibrations on weights and volumetric measures for industry and state personnel. These calibrations ensure that 1 kilogram is 1 kilogram and 5 gallons at a fuel pump is 5 gallons at every fuel pump. How do we know this?

Our state standards are metrologically traceable to the International System of Units (SI) through NIST, the National Institute of Standards and Technology.

Whenever a Louisiana state inspector tests a scale at a grocery store or a pump at a gas station, they use a weight or a 5-gallon test measure that has been certified by the LDAF Metrology Lab. If you ever see a sticker on a grocery store scale or at a gas pump featuring the familiar boot-shape of the state of Louisiana, you can rest assured that the product you're receiving will be the amount for which you pay. In this regard, metrologists are the backbone of consumer protection in ensuring that equity prevails in the marketplace for both buyers and sellers.



So, no, we do not predict the weather. **But we can** predict that you're getting what you pay for!

verification inspections. In a nutshell, we ensure the price you see is correct and is the price you pay at checkout.

These inspections are performed on a sample of items in a store, and a 98% accuracy rate is required to pass. If a store fails, we conduct follow-up inspections. A location may face civil penalties or have its license revoked for continued noncompliance.

Business staffing shortages and inflation may be contributing to an increase in these types of violations. To help stores come into compliance, LDAF continually offers training for independent and corporate stores alike. Our goal is to help all stores come into compliance so we can make sure consumers are getting what they pay for.

At the end of the day, the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's Weights and Measures team is working diligently to ensure a fair marketplace in Louisiana. We want consumers to get what they pay for and our Louisiana businesses to be successful. Thank you for joining us in celebrating National Weights and Measures Week.

Best Agriculture Apps for 2023 By Matt Hopkins, CropLife.com

Mobile apps have become so integral to our daily lives that most of us can't imagine living without them. In fact, consumers in more than a dozen markets worldwide are now spending four to five hours per day in apps, according to a recent report from app intelligence firm data.ai. But to truly understand how mobile apps have become the center of our attention, we must first look back at when they finally went mainstream.

The first iPhone was released in 2007 – and soon after the first Android — and along with it came several pre-installed apps like Notes, Weather, and Calculator. This was just the tip of the iceberg. When the App Store went live in 2008, it "only" featured 500 apps. It now has more than 2 million apps available for download. Google Play started out with 50 apps and now has about 3.5 million apps available.

Over the past 15 years, developers have created better versions of those mobile apps first launched in the early days of the app stores. Initially, apps were simple to use, offering some basic functions like calculation and recordkeeping. Then developers started to add more functions to stand out from the crowd. Unfortunately for users, this often led to feature fatigue. What began with a useful, focused app, had too many extraneous features over time.

Fortunately, those bulkier, buggier apps have given way to a new development era of doing one thing and doing it well. A key catalyst to this trend has been app integration. Integration – or the process of enabling independently designed applications to work together — has also been quite popular in agriculture. More agtech companies are looking to partner with other app providers to give

ag professionals the option of using the complete infrastructure behind their applications, ultimately leading to better results and improved productivity.

"From a developer perspective, it is much easier to create an app as part of an existing ecosystem and as an extension piece of other offerings, rather than as a standalone offering," says Reinder Prins, Marketing Lead at Leaf Agriculture.

While it used to be trendy for every agtech startup to create their own app, providers are realizing that users don't want to deal with several different apps each day. Companies also are losing the appetite to invest in an app that only gets minimal usage. Not only is app integration bringing a lot to the table for developers, it is also allowing users to reap the benefits, says Prins.

"The user is the real winner here," he says. "Nobody wants to use a plethora of apps and end up with data in a bunch of different silos that are not connected to each other. In this scenario, an app can either replace desktop software or become the in-field piece of a larger desktop offering. In both cases, the user will experience an increase in useability and extend their office away from the desk into the field, tractor, or wherever it may lead, without using a different provider or switching to a different ecosystem altogether."

With more and more agtech providers integrating with other companies, where it makes sense, mobile app users are increasingly being put at the center of development strategies, Prins says. "If users have an agtech app that they already use every day, it can often make sense for other providers to work together with this incumbent provider instead of trying to force users to include another app in their daily routine," he says.

A great example of successful app integration in agriculture has been the John Deere Operations Center. The popular open platform is now integrated with dozens of other agricultural apps, such as Intelinair's AGMRI, Golden Harvest's E-Luminate Mobile, and GeoPard, whereby farm data is connected directly to the Operations Center.

With AGMRI, for instance, seamless integration with the Operations Center is bi-directional: customers can import field boundaries, as planted, as applied, and yield maps directly into AGMRI while sending AGMRI alerts and imagery into the Operations Center. AGMRI users are alerted to emergence issues, earlyseason weeds, nutrient deficiencies, weather damage, water stress, disease outbreaks, and insect infestations, so they can make data-driven decisions that impact the current season and beyond.

Other recent examples include Bushel's FarmLogs, which also connects to the John Deere Operations Center and Climate FieldView. "Over the past year, we've continued to focus on making FarmLogs the easiest-to-use, most automated farm management software," says Julia Eberhart, Public Relations & Communications Manager, Bushel. "Integration is at the forefront of our priorities for FarmLogs. By integrating

with other agricultural software, Bushel is increasing productivity and saving time for growers."

Successful integrations don't happen without a mutually beneficial partnership, something that has been happening quite often in agriculture in recent years. For example, Rantizo, a precision ag company focused on providing drone application systems and services, formed a partnership with EFC Systems to integrate their FieldAlytics software into the workflows for drone application. Customers of both companies will have access to the integration starting this year.

Other Trends in Agriculture Apps

So where do agriculture apps go next? As we look ahead to 2023 and beyond, experts from several agtech companies offered their insight into the trends shaping mobile app development and what we can expect to see in agriculture.

One significant trend recently has been data connectivity, which goes hand-inhand with app integration. "From where I sit, data connectivity is becoming increasingly important," says Leaf's Prins. "There are hundreds, if not thousands, of agtech startups out there that have an offering for their specific target audience, and a lot of them look at utilizing, processing, or integrating data from only a handful of key providers in the industry such as John Deere, Climate FieldView, and Planet Labs.

"In other words, these agtech startups almost entirely exist on the premise of being able to use data from a third party, as opposed to creating their own through in-field sensors or other technology, and adding value to this data in some way, shape, or form. This, in my opinion, is

a change from only a couple of years ago when everyone seemed to want to deliver some kind of A to Z stand-alone solution. Some companies of course still have this mindset, but things are certainly changing."

There's also been a greater emphasis on creating trust with app users from the outset, says Sasha Shayovitch, Head of Marketing at Prospera Technologies, which powers the Valley Insights app. "The most prominent trends we are seeing involve a movement toward simple, quick, and intuitive flows, so there is no confusion or question as to what is being viewed or what action needs to be taken," she says.

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected almost every single facet of our world, and the mobile apps space was no exception, says Rob Weber, Marketing Manager at Software Solutions Integrated and the Grower360 app. "The pandemic changed us as consumers, and it had a ripple effect across many industries - ag included," he says. "Think of how you shop on Amazon from your phone or tablet to quickly reorder or buy something. It is transferring over more and more to the agtech space where our partners and their customers expect a similar experience."

Bushel's Eberhart agrees, saying the trend toward mobile technology that promotes digital payments in agriculture is here to stay. "Digital payments will help move money through the agriculture supply chain much more quickly and sustainably than the paper checks that are used for billions of dollars in payments today," she says. "Farmers won't have to wait for checks to arrive in the mail. And, digital records will make their end-of-year accounting easier."

Finally, mobile apps that promote sustainability and environmental stewardship are also becoming more common in agriculture. One example of this trend shows up on this year's list of best agricultural apps - Syngenta's Cropwise Sustainability app. Featuring the Sustainable Outcomes in Agriculture (SOA) standard, the app enables growers to complete a self-assessment about their practices and receive a performance including a sustainability report, leadership score and actionable insights to identify how they can improve sustainability in their operations.

The Unwanted Pesticide Pick-Up Program, sponsored by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF), collects pesticide products for proper disposal at no cost to producers, applicators, or homeowners. The program, which is funded through fees associated with pesticide manufacturers' product registrations in Louisiana, is completely anonymous for those who wish to participate.

Please note that this is a pesticide-only disposal pick-up event. All pesticides will be accepted, and containers will be supplied for transportation to the collection site if old containers are damaged. Fumigants, waste oils, paints, and gasoline/diesel will not be accepted.

"Improperly disposed of pesticide wastes can create serious hazards for the environment," said Commissioner of Agriculture and Forestry Mike Strain, D.V.M. "By providing individuals opportunities to properly dispose of these products, we ensure that the environment and the health of our citizens are protected."

This FREE six-month program offers applicants the opportunity to earn college credit, skill-based training, management and project efficiency training, and more. Sustaining Future Farms in Louisiana is a grant funded program that was awarded to LSUE through the Workforce Opportunity for Rural Communities Initiative in 2022.

The program's goal is to invigorate an aging Louisiana farming population, provide college education to youths in rural areas with an interest in agriculture, relieve the stress from unemployment caused by the workforce challenges in the oil and gas industry, and provide a boost in the economic economy for the rural areas of St. Landry, Acadia, and Evangeline parishes.

Although anyone is welcome to apply, targeted groups for this program are high school students, military veterans, and displaced energy extraction workers.

Accepted applicants would be enrolled into a free six-month program that includes an online 1-hour credit course (Intro to Agriculture AGRI-1001) and would have the opportunity to choose from four specific Ag pathways to gain training in:

- Cattle (Training: Beginner Cattleman w/ the LSU AgCenter)
- **Farming/Aquaculture** (*Training:* Master Farmer w/ the LSU AgCenter)
- Drone certifications (Training: *pilotinstitute.com*)
- **Crop Advisor certifications** (Training: Certified Crop Advisor program).

High school students are eligible for dual enrollment. All participants will earn their Lean Six Sigma White-Black belt online training and receive their Industrial Based Credentials (IBC) and attend jobreadiness workshops. There will also be paid apprenticeship and internship opportunities with our partners Coastal Plains Meat Company, Supreme Rice, 3rd Day Gardening in Eunice, and Main Street Meal Preps.

At the end of the program, participants will be encouraged to continue their education at LSUE through our new Associates of Science in Agriculture degree. Those who wish to continue their education will be awarded a \$1000 scholarship following their first official semester at LSUE.

Those who wish to join the workforce will be aided in finding employment.

Deadline to Enroll in USDA's Key Commodity Safety Net Programs

Agricultural producers who have not yet enrolled in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for the 2023 crop year have until March 15, 2023, to elect and enroll a contract. The USDA offers these two safety net programs to provide vital income support to farmers experiencing substantial declines in crop prices or revenues.

"The Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage programs provide critical financial protections to many American farmers. As producers across the country deal with unexpected market volatility and natural disasters, these programs offer muchneeded support and stability," said Ronald Guidry, Jr., State Executive Director for FSA in Louisiana.

Producers can elect coverage and enroll in ARC-County or PLC, which are both commodity-by-commodity, or ARC-Individual, which covers the entire farm. Although election changes for 2023 are optional, producers must enroll through a signed contract each year. Additionally, if a producer has a multi-year contract on their farm and makes an election change for 2023, they will need to sign a new contract.

- If producers do not submit an election by March 15, 2023, the election remains the same as 2022 for commodities on the farm. Farm owners cannot enroll in either program unless they have a share interest in the commodity.
- In Louisiana, producers have completed 11,576 contracts to date, representing 70 % of the more than 16,500 expected contracts.
- Producers who do not complete enrollment by the deadline will not be

enrolled in ARC or PLC for 2023 and will not receive a payment if triggered.

 Producers are eligible to enroll farms with base acres for the following commodities: barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.

Decision Tools – In partnership with USDA, two web-based decision tools are available to assist producers in making informed, educated decisions using crop data specific to their respective farming operations:

- Gardner-farmdoc Payment Calculator, a tool available through the University of Illinois allows producers to estimate payments for farms and counties for ARC-CO and PLC.
- ARC and PLC Decision Tool, a tool available through Texas A&M University that allows producers to estimate payments and yield updates and expected payments for 2023.

Crop Insurance Considerations

ARC and PLC are part of a broader safety net provided by USDA, which also includes crop insurance and marketing assistance loans.

Producers are reminded that ARC and PLC elections and enrollments can impact eligibility for some crop insurance products.

Producers should contact their crop insurance

agents to make certain that any new elections or enrollments do not affect existing programs or coverage.
