In the heart of Sun, Louisiana, Sonlight Farms shines as a symbol of family tradition, agricultural innovation, and local pride. Recently featured on "Crawfish Tales" with Commissioner Mike Strain, the farm showcases the dedication of a family-led operation that thrives on the values of togetherness and sustainability.

Sonlight Farms is operated by a dynamic team comprising a brother and sister duo, Mike and Linda, along with their spouses, Debbie and Michael. Their journey began on land that was once a cow pasture, passed down through generations. Mike Talley, inspired by an inner calling, convinced his father to plant blueberries instead of the typical pine trees common in the area. Despite initial challenges, such as the need for an efficient irrigation system, their persistence bore fruit—literally and figuratively.

They started the farm as more of a retirement project, not initially realizing the amount



of work it would entail. One of their main motivations was to be closer to their elderly parents. Typically, when visiting parents as adults, time spent is brief, just enough to check in on each other's well-being. They needed a reason to stay longer, and the farm provided that opportunity. It allowed them to spend three or four days at a time interacting with their parents, which significantly impacted their parents' lives. This was especially true for their mother after their father passed away, as they could spend time with her, watching shows like "Gunsmoke" together. The farm became a meaningful way to be present and supportive.

Today, Sonlight Farms spans 10 acres and is a certified Louisiana you-pick blueberry farm. They grow a variety of blueberries, including Premier, Pearl, Vernon, Prince, Star, Climax, Biloxi, and Emerald, with Rabbit Eye and High Bush being the main types. These varieties offer a delightful array of flavors and are rich



in antioxidants, making them a healthy and delicious choice for visitors.

The farm's commitment to being chemicalfree means that every berry picked is as natural as can be, with the family manually weeding around each plant. This labor of love not only promotes a healthier environment but also brings the family closer together, allowing them to spend quality time amidst nature's bounty.

A visit to Sonlight Farms is an experience in itself. Families are invited to pick their blueberries, with children often sampling berries from various bushes until they find their favorites. Even pets enjoy the outing, indulging in berries from the lower branches. With each visit, guests contribute to the farm's sense of community and the local economy.

Sonlight Farms proudly carries the Certified Louisiana label, which signifies authenticity

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER *Termite Season*

As temperatures rise and Louisiana heads into the busy summer season, homeowners are being urged to

take proactive steps to protect their properties from termite damage. The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) emphasizes that late spring through summer—particularly from

May through August—is the peak period for termite activity.

Termites are responsible for billions of dollars in property damage nationwide each year, and Louisiana's warm, humid climate creates ideal conditions for these wood-destroying insects. Left unchecked, infestations can compromise the structural integrity of homes and lead to costly repairs.

LDAF recommends several practical preventative measures homeowners can take to minimize the risk of termite invasion:

Reduce Moisture: Fix leaking faucets and pipes promptly, ensure proper drainage away from the foundation, and keep crawl spaces dry by maintaining good ventilation and using vapor barriers.

What To Know Before You Mow

Warm weather is upon us, and so is grass mowing season. The Childhood Agricultural Safety Network (CASN) urges parents and other supervising adults to ensure that young people are "Mow Ready" before tackling this potentially hazardous job.

Nearly 10,000 child/youth lawn mower injuries occur in the United States annually, with approximately 5 percent resulting in amputation. Despite improvements in engineering and safety features, pediatric lawn mower-related injury rates have remained constant over the past 40 years. Injuries include lacerations, burns and eye injuries. On farms, mowing is often the first job involving machinery that is assigned to young people.

"Before teens tackle lawn care and maintenance, it's important for parents and guardians to make sure teens know how to properly and safely do it," said Andrea Swenson, Ph.D., director of the National Children's Center for Rural and Agricultural Health and Safety, which manages the network. "Supporting teens includes adults modeling safe behaviors and providing appropriate supervision."

The Childhood Agricultural Safety Network's mower campaign website contains fact sheets and posters for both youth and adults. Both sets of materials include illustrations of key safety topics covering supervision, personal protective equipment, appropriate shoes, child bystanders and debris in the grass. Resources are also available in Spanish.

Among mower safety strategies on the CASN website:

- The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that youth be 12 years old and older to operate a push mower, and at least 16 years old to use a riding mower.
- Always wear sturdy, closed-toed shoes.
 Do not mow in sandals or with bare feet.

- Before mowing, scan the lawn to remove toys, hoses, tools and large rocks — they could become projectiles.
- Keep children out of the mowing area.
- Stay alert to others entering the mowing area.

It's especially important to prohibit children from riding mowers as passengers, whether blades are engaged or not.

"Giving lawn mower rides acclimates young children to the loud noises of mowers, desensitizes them to their inherent dangers, and converts the mowers from working machinery to a riding plaything in children's minds," said Charles Jennissen, M.D., a pediatric emergency medicine specialist and researcher at the University of Iowa Carver College of Medicine. "Many of the children injured as bystanders in our study were approaching the lawn mower to get a ride."

Jennissen said 73 percent of children injured as bystanders had previously ridden on a lawn mower as a passenger.

CASN is celebrating 25 years dedicated to children and youth growing up safely on farms and ranches. It is a coalition of nearly 250 individuals and organizations. Resources associated with earlier CASN campaigns (including ATVs and tractors) are available online. The Childhood Agricultural Safety Network offers free membership, an online community and use of all campaign materials

Greaux the Good is cultivating community across North Louisiana by doubling shoppers' food funds

Every summer across North Louisiana farmers' markets open their doors and invite community members to check off their grocery lists as they fill their baskets with nutritious produce, meats, and more. Farmers' markets, farm stands, and other similar food businesses have become a staple food source for many residents in North Louisiana, and the food access they provide to residents in the region has been purposefully expanded through partnership with Greaux the Good, a program that doubles shoppers' benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and/or the Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP).

"Since joining Greaux the Good, we've seen neighbors coming into the market, and whether they have SNAP benefits to redeem or not, they are spreading the word about the program. It's given more families and seniors the confidence to come out to the market and have that sense of shared access and inclusion," said Whitney Hebert, Market Coordinator for the Ruston Farmers Market, a year-round market open every Saturday from 9AM to 1PM, rain or shine. The Ruston Farmers Market's partnership with Greaux the Good launched in January of this year.

"It has really strengthened our community," said Hebert. "Ruston stands out as a really special place because we are all rooting for each other, cheering one another on, and we've seen that at the farmers market. Our community really wants to see everyone prosper."





Every weekend, when a SNAP beneficiary visits the Ruston Farmers Market, they can swipe their electronic benefit transfer (EBT) card for \$20, and the customer then receives an additional \$20 in value. The shopper can then utilize their \$40 total on purchasing local produce and meat.

"It's great all around for the customer, for the vendors, for the farmers market, and for the Ruston community," said Hebert.

The Ruston Farmers Market is not the only market in North Louisiana to partner with Greaux the Good. Emerie Holtzclaw, Market Director of Shreveport Farmers' Market, shared how Greaux the Good was born out of a common need that became apparent to Market Umbrella, Greaux the Good's parent organization, as market leaders sought to promote greater food accessibility and affordability within their communities.

"We have a group of market managers from around the state who meet monthly over Zoom to bounce ideas off each other and help one another," said Holtzclaw. "We were all individually trying to find organizations, businesses, and grants to match benefits for our shoppers, and Market Umbrella saw that need and created a way."

The Shreveport Farmers' Market is a seasonal summer market, with approximately 80 vendors, that operates every Saturday 8AM to 12PM, from the weekend after Memorial Day until the weekend before Labor Day. The market has been an implementer of Greaux the Good since 2023. According to Holtzclaw, the Shreveport Farmers' Market has seen a 400% increase in SNAP benefit users after implementing the program, which allows SNAP users a dollar-for-dollar match for up to \$40 of purchases.

"I'm consistently seeing new faces at the market. It's been exciting to see the community come out to enjoy the sun and interact with the farmers, and I've seen the community grow and develop a sense of pride in our market. The hype is here," said Holtzclaw.

In addition to benefiting the consumer, part of Greaux the Good's purpose is to put expenditure back into the local economy by increasing the revenue of local growers on market days or at independent farmers' stands and businesses. The increase in revenue allows vendors to invest in their operations, ultimately creating a more sustainable and healthy food industry in the region.

For Donna Isaacs, who owns and operates DeLaTerre Permaculture Farm along with partner, Waylon LaBreaux, partnering with Greaux the Good means their farm will become a greater resource for the residents in the town of Eros, Louisiana. Having grown up in Jamaica on her family's land that had a year-round, selfsustaining assortment of fresh produce, Isaacs knows the beauty and community that can be found in having direct access to nutrient-rich food. DeLaTerre Permaculture Farm, which sells produce, meat, and eggs directly to the consumer from their farm, is now authorized to accept FMNP benefits and apply a 50% discount to eligible transactions.

"I think Greaux the Good means access. It would be an hour-long trip for people in our area to get food from a grocery store. This is a gamechanger," said Isaacs. "It's helping people to access nutrient-rich food because it's affordable. They really are growing the good."

- Inspect Regularly: Check for cracks or gaps in the foundation and walls and seal any openings around utility pipes and wires.
- Remove Debris: Clear away fallen branches, firewood, and wood piles from the vicinity of your home.
- Schedule Inspections: Have licensed pest control professionals conduct annual termite inspections, with extra vigilance during the late spring and summer months.
- Stay Alert for Signs: Look for mud tubes on foundation walls, hollowsounding wood, or discarded wings near windows and doors.

With termite activity at its highest during warmmonths, the LDAF urges homeowners to remain vigilant now and throughout the summer. Early detection and preventive action can save homeowners thousands of dollars in repairs and protect their investments.

AES Hosts EPA Region 6 Inspector Training Program in Baton Rouge

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF), through its Pesticide and Environmental Programs Division, hosted the EPA Region 6 Inspector Training from May 6-8, 2025, at the Baton Rouge Hilton-Capital Center in downtown Baton Rouge. The event brought together approximately 30 participants from Arkansas, Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma, fostering collaboration and knowledge sharing among regulatory professionals and industry experts across the region.

The training commenced on May 6 with a warm welcome from Dr. Ansel Rankins, Assistant Commissioner of the LDAF's Agricultural and Environmental Sciences (AES). The first day featured insightful presentations, including a historic overview of Baton Rouge by Faye Phillips. Kim Brown from the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture provided a presentation on the history of the Endangered Species Act, highlighting its implications for pesticide regulation and environmental stewardship. Attendees also received updates on Worker Protection Standards, inspections, enforcement procedures, and upcoming changes to pesticide labels, ensuring inspectors stay current with evolving regulations.











Day two took participants out into the field, beginning with a visit to LSU Tiger Stadium to explore ornamental and turf pest management issues affecting university athletic fields and campus landscapes. The group then traveled to Four Oaks Farm in Morganza, Louisiana, for a quintessential Southern farm tour. Welcomed with warm hospitality, attendees observed and learned about the diverse agricultural practices involving sugarcane, rice, soybeans, crawfish, and cattle. Highlights included a crawfish pond, where participants experienced firsthand the trapping and harvesting process, and a tour of the farm's equipment shed, showcasing the specialized machinery used in crop maintenance and harvesting.

The final day of training featured a series of expert presentations aimed at enhancing inspector knowledge and skills. Dr. Connor Webster discussed herbicide drift and its impact on surrounding environments, while Dr. Aaron Ashbrook shared tips on identifying invasive weed species. Dr. Claudia Riegrl provided insights into rodent control strategies, and the Gulf South Vector Program. Additionally, Amy Hernandez, Ag Chemistry Lab Manager at LDAF, delivered a practical session on "Pesticide Sample Analysis: Do's and Don'ts," emphasizing best practices from a laboratory perspective to support effective pesticide regulation.

The EPA Region 6 Inspector Training exemplifies the collaborative effort between federal and state agencies to promote safe, effective, and environmentally responsible pest management practices. Participants left equipped with enhanced knowledge, practical skills, and new professional connections to better serve their respective regions.

American Sugar Cane League Announces New Variety Highlighting Successful Research Partnership

The American Sugar Cane League, in partnership with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Agricultural Research Service (ARS) and the LSU AgCenter, has announced the release of USDS ARS HoCP 18-803, another new variety for Louisiana sugarcane farmers to utilize.

This milestone is the latest result of more than five decades of collaboration between the League and its research partners. It also stands as a clear example of what sustained investment and industry-wide commitment can deliver.

"Every grower, miller and landowner who supports the League through dues, field trial participation or research advocacy has a stake in this achievement," said ASCL President Jim Simon. "USDA ARS HoCP 18-803 is more than a new variety. It's proof that our long-term strategy continues to pay dividends"

A Strong Performer Across Soil Types



USDA ARS HoCP 18-803 stems from a cross made in 2012 at the USDA-ARS station in Canal Point, Florida. It was selected in 2014 at the Houma station and has undergone extensive testing over the past decade. The variety has demonstrated strong sugar per acre and tonnage yields in both heavy and light soils, largely due to its excellent stalk weight.

Outfield test results from 2022 to 2024 show USDA ARS HoCP 18-803 performing on par with, or better than, existing commercial varieties like L 01-299, particularly in tons per acre and overall sugar production. While its sugar per ton is slightly lower than some competitors, the high tonnage output helps offset that factor, making it a solid option for growers statewide.

A Proven System That Delivers

The release of USDA ARS HoCP 18-803 marks the tenth new variety introduced in the past decade. Each one reflects years of research, trial work and refinement. These varieties are more than scientific accomplishments, they are practical tools that help Louisiana growers remain productive, sustainable and competitive despite the challenges of drought, hurricanes, disease, pests and economic issues facing farmers in Louisiana.

"New variety development doesn't happen overnight," said Simon. "It's the result of decades of planning and support from our members. Our system is working, and USDA ARS HoCP 18-803 is the latest evidence of that."

Industry-Wide Investment in Research

Research remains a central pillar of the League's mission, alongside advocacy and public relations. In March, the League's membership approved a budget that includes an increase in research funding to ensure Louisiana's sugar industry continues to lead in innovation despite tightening federal investment.



Looking Ahead

Growers can learn more about USDA ARS HoCP 18-803 in the upcoming June Sugar Bulletin, which will include seedcane applications and station availability. The variety will also be featured at summer field days hosted by the League and its research partners.

"This release is exciting on its own," said Simon. "But it is even more powerful as proof that our investment in research, advocacy and outreach is moving the industry forward."

Additionally, Hathaway was named the 2024 Louisiana Ag in the Classroom Teacher of the Year. According to the Avoyelles Parish School Board, Hataway is only the fourth Louisiana teacher to receive this honor in 27 years.

"Oh, I started crying," Hataway said when she learned about her achievement. "I was very emotional because I never dreamed in a million years that I would have this opportunity." The program aims to enhance students and their understanding of agriculture's role in the economy and society.

"Hands-on experience [is] very important to this society," said Hataway. "Without agriculture, we don't have food, we don't have clothing, and the kids need to know about that."

Hataway shared this message to students interested in ag:

"My message to students that are interested in agriculture is to get your hands dirty. Start with planting you a garden, planting you a flower garden, get your hands dirty."

Farmers Market Promotion Program

The FY 2025 grant application period is open. Applications are due on June 27, 2025. Applications received after the due date will be subject to the AMS' - Policy on Late Applications. For any questions related to FMPP, contact FMLFPPgrants@usda.gov.

The RFA (Request For Applications) is a primary resource for information about the Farmers Market Promotion Program grant. Applicants are strongly encouraged to review it carefully and follow its guidance.

Project Types

FMPP offers four types of projects, 36-month Capacity Building, 36-month Community Development Training and Technical Assistance, 24-month Turnkey Marketing and Promotion, and 24-month Turnkey Recruitment and Training. Capacity Building

projects range from \$50,000 to \$250,000, while Community Development Training and Technical Assistance projects range from \$100,000 to \$500,000. Each of the turnkey project options are available for a defined set of activities, with funding amounts ranging from \$50,000 and \$100,000.

Eligibility

All applicants must be domestic entities owned, operated, and located within the 50 U.S. states, the District of Columbia, American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico or the U.S. Virgin Islands to be considered eligible. Entities that are eligible to apply include:

Agricultural businesses and cooperatives.

- Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) networks and associations.
- Food councils.
- Economic development corporations.
- Local governments.
- Nonprofit and public benefit corporations.
- Producer networks or associations.
- Regional farmers' market authorities.
- Tribal governments. •

The program requires cost share contributions in an amount equal to 25 percent of the total Federal portion of the grant.

USDA Invests \$200M to Expand Timber Production, Strengthen Rural Economies, Secure American Industry

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke L. Rollins today announced a bold \$200 million investment to implement the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service's National Active Forest Management Strategy (PDF, 24.7 MB), a key initiative to increase timber harvest, improve forest health and productivity, reduce wildfire risk, and support rural prosperity in forest communities.

The strategy supports President Trump's Executive Order: Immediate Expansion of Timber Production by streamlining burdensome regulations, leveraging emergency authorities, and expediting project approvals—ensuring faster access to critical timber resources. Increasing the use of longterm contracts to carry out these projects, the strategy envisions a more stable supply of wood products, healthier forests, and stronger rural economies.

"President Trump is committed to cutting red tape, rolling back burdensome regulations and unleashing the potential of America's abundant natural resources. We are doing just that at USDA with this announcement to invest in timber production. This is a win for consumers who will see better prices with American grown products, and a win for forest management which will help keep our forests safer and reduce wildfire risk," said Secretary Rollins. "Not only will this help our staff on the ground better carry out the mission of protecting lives, livelihoods and resources, it will support jobs in rural America and reduce our reliance on foreign lumber imports."

This work to increase domestic timber harvests implements Secretary Rollins' memorandum to the Forest Service to take immediate action in support. In response, the Forest Service has committed to increasing timber harvest (PDF, 285 KB) on national forests by 25%, with an overall goal of 4 billion board feet harvested annually by fiscal year 2028.

Using tools like Good Neighbor Authority, this investment will support efforts to work across jurisdictions and property lines to improve forest health and grow economies in communities nationwide. This investment also focuses on innovative wood products like cross-laminated timber, which due to its strength in comparison to steel, is used in commercial building construction. Similarly, active management often creates byproducts with a low conventional wood market value, but are still useful in wood energy, pellets, and other biomass applications.

These investments have direct impacts on communities and businesses in the wood products sector, supporting jobs in timber harvest, at lumber mills, as well as in innovative wood products and energy sectors. These landmark investments secure a strong domestic timber supply, fueling rural industries, stabilizing markets, and driving long-term economic prosperity.

LSU adds new coastal meteorology degree program

LSU is adding a new coastal meteorology degree program under the College of the Coast and Environment, the university announced Monday.

The program will start accepting enrollees in the fall. It will be within the department of oceanography and coastal sciences.

Especially in Louisiana, which faces coastal challenges such as hurricanes and erosion, the degree program is vital.

"Our livelihoods in Louisiana are so intricately tied to the coast and to its weather that LSU is the natural place to study coastal meteorology. Our students will graduate well-prepared to tackle weather-related coastal issues and help keep our communities safe," said the program's director Robert Rohli, a professor in the department of oceanography and coastal sciences, in a statement. The program will open up career paths like broadcasting, private and public sector jobs and in the energy and agriculture fields.

The curriculum will follow federal OPM-1340 hiring standards, LSU said, so students will be fully qualified for meteorologist positions after graduation.

"Weather-related hazards like hurricanes and tropical storms impact Louisiana's communities and industries and can significantly alter our state's coastline. The research and learning opportunities created by our new BS in Coastal Meteorology will fuel discoveries and build the workforce necessary to protect and restore vital areas while advancing LSU's leadership in coastal research," College of the Coast and Environment Dean Clint Willson said in a statement.

USDA Reminds Louisiana Producers to File Crop Acreage Reports

After spring planting is complete, agricultural producers in Louisiana should make an appointment with their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county office to complete crop acreage reports before the applicable deadline.

"In order to receive many USDA program benefits, producers should file an accurate crop acreage report by the applicable deadline," said SED Craig McCain, Executive Director in Louisiana. "Call your local FSA office to make an appointment after planting is complete to report your acreage and take care of any other FSA-related business."

How to File a Report

A crop acreage report documents a crop grown on a farm or ranch, its intended use and location. Producers should file an accurate crop acreage report for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage and prevented planted acreage before the applicable deadline.

Acreage reporting dates vary by crop and by Parish. Contact your local FSA office for a list of acreage reporting deadlines by crop.

To file a crop acreage report, producers need to provide:

- Crop and crop type or variety
- Intended crop use
- Number of crop acres
- Map with approximate crop boundaries
- Planting date(s)
- Planting pattern, when applicable
 - Producer share(s)
 - Irrigation practice(s)
 - Acreage prevented from planting, when applicable
 - Other required information

Acreage Reporting Details

The following exceptions apply to acreage reporting dates:

- If the crop has not been planted by the acreage reporting deadline, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.
- If a producer acquires additional acreage after the acreage reporting deadline, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendar days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP-covered crops is the acreage reporting date or 15 calendar days before grazing or crop harvesting begins, whichever is earlier. Producers with perennial forage crops should check with their local FSA office to see if their crops are eligible for continuous certification, which rolls the certified acreage forward each year until a change is made.

Prevented Planted Acreage

Producers should also report the crop acreage they intended to plant but were unable to because of a natural disaster, including drought. Prevented planted acreage must be reported on form CCC-576, Notice of Loss, no later than 15 calendar days after the final planting date as established by FSA and USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA).

Farmers.gov Portal

Producers can access their FSA farm records, maps, and common land units through the farmers.gov customer portal. The portal allows producers to export field boundaries as shapefiles and import and view other shapefiles, such as precision agriculture boundaries within farm records mapping. Producers can view, print and label their maps for acreage reporting purposes. A login.gov account that is linked to a USDA customer record is required to use the portal. Producers can visit farmers. gov/account to learn more about creating an account. Producers who have the authority to act on behalf of another customer as a grantee via an FSA-211 Power of Attorney form, Business Partner Signature Authority or as a member of a business can now access information for the business in the farmers.gov portal.

Geospatial Acreage Reporting

Acreage reports using precision agriculture planting boundaries can be filed electronically with an approved insurance provider or an authorized third-party provider, who will then share the file with FSA staff. Producers should notify their local FSA office if they submitted an electronic geospatial acreage report containing precision planting boundaries that they want to use as part of their FSA acreage report.
