In the latest episode of Crawfish Tales with Commissioner Mike Strain, we got a taste of the sweet life with Allen Fabre, owner of Baton Rouge Bee Company. On his sunny, treefilled family property in Breaux Bridge, Fabre manages over 24 hives. Originally called Five Honey Farms, Baton Rouge Bee Company is proud to be a Certified Louisiana company.

Fabre is no stranger to working with bees, having served as the state apiarist for the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) from 2006 to 2022.

Likewise, LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, DVM, is also a beekeeper. On this field day, Strain donned his personal bee suit and joined Fabre to work on a hive. "Every time I'm with Allen, I learn a lot. If I have a problem or don't understand something with my own bees, he's the first one I call," said Strain.

Without a doubt there's a lot to learn. Bees are important pollinators who help sustain the environment. In fact, about a third of the food we eat is the result of honeybee pollination. If you ate today, go ahead and thank a honeybee! While you're at it, thank a beekeeper! Beekeeping is widely considered an enjoyable hobby/ profession. Aside from the good feeling that comes from positively contributing to one's environment, Fabre notes the varied appeal of beekeeping. "It's fascinating. Bees are the most studied insect in the world," he says. Even so, there are still many things they don't know about them. "It's also good for me mentally," he adds. "It's just me and the bees... it's kind of cathartic."

Not only that, but beekeeping can be a profitable endeavor. Besides the sale of honey and honey products, queens, and combs, the beekeeping industry employs a vast number of people in Louisiana. And Fabre says the people involved in beekeeping are "some of the nicest people you'll ever meet."

Beekeeping in Louisiana

LDAF's apiary programs prevent the introduction and spread of infectious diseases and pests of honey bees through hive registration, surveys, inspections, and sampling.

Whether you're a commercial honey producer, commercial queen and package producer, researcher, pollination service provider, or simply a hobbyist, we ask you to get a permit and help keep bee colonies healthy and thriving across the state.

- Permit fees depend on the number of colonies and are cheaper for Louisiana residents than nonresidents.
- Permits expire on September 30 each year and should be renewed annually.

Inspections of your apiary yards check for diseases or pests and might be required to sell honey bee queens, packages, or used beekeeping equipment. You may also need inspections before interstate movement of honey bee colonies and/or equipment for scientific research purposes.

In recent years, we've also administered grants for the USDA's beekeeping apprenticeship program.

The CPAMS gathers information to understand why people choose to use different conservation practices, and whether they continue to use practices over time. The data will help improve voluntary conservation programs.

NASS will mail an invitation to respond early online at **agcounts.usda.gov** starting June 24. NASS will mail questionnaires on July 8 with the option for survey recipients to respond online, by mail, or fax. If NASS does not receive completed questionnaires by July 28, they may reach out to schedule interviews. Data highlights are scheduled to be published at **nass.usda.gov** October 2024. Four different conservation categories are researched through CPAMS overall: 1) Crop practices; 2) Confined livestock practices; 3) Grazing practices; and 4) Forestry practices.

This year, NASS will survey grazing practices and forestry practices. Crop practices and confined livestock practices were surveyed in 2022. The grazing sample respondents are randomly selected from NASS records of operations that meet the grazing land criteria. The forestry sample respondents are determined by the USDA Forest Service area frame determination of wood or forest landowners. "With better data to help us understand how conservation fits into existing agriculture and forest management operations, program resources can be focused on where they will be most effective," said NASS Administrator Joseph L. Parsons. "I encourage everyone who receives a questionnaire to respond."

Protected by federal law, responses are confidential and used for statistical purposes only. No single respondent can be identified from the published data. Climate quick reference guides now on FARMERS.GOV

Even when data is at your fingertips it can sometimes still be hard to find what you're looking for—especially when it comes to climate information.

USDA's Climate Hubs and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) are helping to meet that need by providing Climate Quick Reference Guides for agricultural producers and landowners seeking basic and easily usable climate information.

The Climate Quick Reference Guides, which first published in July 2022 and were updated in August 2023, are now available on farmers.gov. They offer a simple way for users to view historic and projected weather and climate change information at the state and county levels. The easy-to-use guides show key data changes in climate most impactful to agricultural production in the local areas including max temperatures and precipitation amounts by season.

Guides are available for almost every county nationwide following a two-year effort by the Climate Hubs and NRCS.

"As federal investments in mitigating and adapting to the effects of climate change continue to be a priority, so too must our collective understanding of the current science and information," said National Climate Hub Lead Lynn Knight. "Providing easy to digest and synthesized information for producers, federal employees, partners, teachers, agricultural professionals—really anyone with an interest in our climate—is a goal of the USDA Climate Hubs."

Those interested in using the guides can access their state-level data by clicking on their state or searching for it by name. If they are interested in accessing county level, they must first select a state and then click the "view counties" button before either searching for the county by name or selecting it on the map. The requested data can then be viewed by clicking the "get guide" button.

The Climate Quick Reference Guides can be especially useful when NRCS conservationists are working with farmers, ranchers and private forest landowners to address natural resource concerns on their land and implement climate-smart agriculture and forestry activities. The guides use layers of science-based maps and graphs to show temperature, precipitation and even crop loss data. The data can in turn help the public make informed decisions for their farms, ranches, or forest lands.

The Climate Hubs are a collaboration of USDA agencies that deliver science-based tools that enable climate-informed decisionmaking by USDA agencies and their partners. The Climate Hubs celebrated their 10-year anniversary in February, honoring a decade of helping farmers, ranchers, forest landowners and communities address the threats of climate change. They are led and hosted by the Agricultural Research Service and Forest Service located at 10 regional locations, with contributions from many agencies including NRCS, the Farm Service Agency, and the Risk Management Agency.

Since its inception over 23 years ago, over 4,000 agricultural producers and landowners have participated in at least one phase of the first environmental stewardship program offered by the LSU AgCenter and other program partners. Designed for producers, regardless of commodity or size of operation, the program focuses on helping agricultural producers address environmental concerns and enhance production and resource management skills through Best Management Practices.

The Louisiana Master Farmer Program teaches producers about environmental stewardship, conservation-based production techniques, and sustainability. Through a collaboration with other program partners, the program uses a comprehensive approach that consists of three phases:

- Phase I: Attendance at environmental lecture/classroom training (6 hours)
- Phase II: Attendance at a conservationbased field day or workshop
- Phase III: Develop and implement a comprehensive conservation plan on entire farming operation (working with USDA NRCS and SWCD)

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Lunch or refreshments will be provided by the Louisiana Farm Bureau.

Certification: Once all phases are complete, a producer may apply and receive certification through the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry.

The LSU AgCenter still has scheduled several Phase 1 training courses across the state this year. Pre-registration is now required and can be accessed at www.lsuagcenter. com/topics/environment/conservation/ master_farmer/phase1. (Sessions that don't have a minimum of five participants will be rescheduled or cancelled.)

For those unable to attend an in-person training, an online module is available at Phase 1 (**Isuagcenter.com**) where producers can watch pre-recorded presentations and take short exams to complete this phase of the program. Field days and other Phase 2 events are also listed online at www. lsuagcenter.com/topics/environment/ conservation/master_farmer/phase2.

Too much, too little? Tips to water wisely By Heather Kirk-Ballard LSU AgCenter Horticulturist

One of the most common causes of plant death is water - more specifically, too much or too little water.

You might be surprised to learn it's sometimes hard to tell the difference. Watering correctly is a fundamental aspect of caring for both indoor and outdoor plants and trees. Providing the right amount of water is crucial for their health and vitality, impacting everything from root development to overall growth and resilience.

Underwatering and overwatering can lead to severe consequences, manifesting in similar distress signals such as wilting, yellowing and even death. Understanding the precise watering needs of each plant species and considering factors like soil type, climate and growth stage is essential for creating an optimal growing environment.

Proper watering practices not only ensure the survival of plants but also enhance their beauty and productivity, making this knowledge indispensable for every gardener and plant enthusiast.

When plants appear fatally ill or dead, one common symptom is wilted, weeping foliage that transitions from green to yellow and often crispy brown. Let's investigate the potential causes.

To check for underwatering symptoms, we start with the soil. Check beyond the surface by inserting a finger a couple of inches into the soil. In addition, you can inspect the roots. For potted plants, remove the plant from the pot and examine the roots. Healthy roots are firm and white. Another great test is the flexibility test. Bend a stem; if it snaps, it's dry. If it springs back, it's OK.

One last test is the scratch test. To perform this test, lightly scratch a tender stem. Green beneath the bark or surface indicates the plant is still alive.

If these signs point to dehydration, water the plant thoroughly and establish a regular watering schedule based on the plant's needs, environmental conditions and light exposure. In the heat of the summer, plants are transpiring and losing a great deal of water, so check potted plants several times a week.

Did you know that the symptoms of underwatering can look just like a plant that has been overwatered? Yellowing leaves, wilting, leaf drop and stunted growth are shared symptoms. Overwatering can also produce soft stems, brown or black roots, mold or algae, lesions on the leaves and stunted growth. The first step is to check

for standing water around the plant. Next, check the soil with your finger in the soil; if it's excessively wet, this could be the issue.

Next, check the condition of the roots. Check for brown, soft roots and any foul odor indicating rot. You can try the stem flexibility and scratch tests to check for overwatering too. A limp stem and dark discoloration under the bark confirm overwatering.

Excess water in the soil can suffocate roots, leading to root rot caused by fungal infections. Saturated soil fills air pockets, preventing roots from absorbing oxygen, effectively drowning the plant. In addition, overwatering can wash away essential nutrients from the soil, making them unavailable to the plant. This leads to nutrient deficiencies. Excess moisture can weaken the structural integrity of the plant, making it more susceptible to diseases and pests.

Achieving a balance between wet and dry soil is crucial. Ensure adequate drainage and appropriate watering schedules. Healthy roots are fundamental for vigorous plants.

For persistent issues, consult your local AgCenter office for expert diagnosis and treatment recommendations.

Remember, maintaining optimal root health is key to preventing plant ailments.



USDA expands funding opportunities for specialty crop growers Help to offset on-farm food safety expenses for 2024 and 2025

The USDA is expanding the Food Safety Certification for Specialty Crops (FSCSC) program to now include medium-sized businesses in addition to small businesses. Eligible specialty crop growers can apply for assistance for expenses related to obtaining or renewing a food safety certification. The program has also been expanded to include assistance for 2024 and 2025 expenses.

"The Food Safety Certification for Specialty Crops program helps producers cover costs of on-farm food safety certification in order to meet regulatory requirements and access additional markets," said Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Zach Ducheneaux. "We recognize the value in supporting specialty crop producers incurring these expenses, so we're not only continuing the program but also improving access by expanding program reach to include medium-sized operations." FSCSC assists specialty crop operations that incurred eligible on-farm food safety certification and expenses related to obtaining or renewing a food safety. FSCSC covers a percentage of the specialty crop operation's cost of obtaining or renewing its certification, as well as a portion of related expenses.

Program details

Eligible FSCSC applicants must be a specialty crop operation; meet the definition of a small or medium-size business and have paid eligible expenses related to certification.

 A small business has an average annual monetary value of specialty crops sold by the applicant during the three-year period preceding the program year of no more than \$500,000.

Applying for assistance

Interested applicants have until Jan. 31, 2025, to apply for assistance for 2024 eligible expenses. FSA will issue payments as applications are processed and approved. For program year 2025, the application period will be January 1, 2025, through January 31, 2026. FSA will issue 50% of the calculated payment for program year 2025 following application approval, with the remaining amount to be paid after the application deadline. If calculated payments exceed the amount of available funding, payments will be prorated.

Specialty crop producers can apply by completing FSA-888-1, Food Safety Certification for Specialty Crops Program (FSCSC) for Program Years 2024 and 2025 application. The application, along with the AD-2047, Customer Data Worksheet and SF-3881, ACH Vendor/Miscellaneous Payment Enrollment Form, if not already on file with FSA, can be submitted to the FSA office at any USDA Service Center nationwide by mail, fax, hand delivery or via electronic means. Alternatively, producers with an eAuthentication account can apply for FSCSC online. Producers interested in creating an eAuthentication account should visit **farmers.gov/sign-in**.

Specialty crop producers can also call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a FSA employee ready to assist. Visit **farmers.gov/ food-safety** for additional program details, eligibility information and forms needed to apply.

Exploration, invention, & evolution: 125 years of soil survey

In 1899, Congress authorized funds for USDA to investigate the soil resources of the United States in the field and laboratory, and the first soil surveys began. We celebrate and continue to build upon a 125-year legacy by providing soil data to inform, protect, and sustain future generations.

It's 1899, and as the world prepares for a new century, railroad tycoon Edward Henry Harriman, along with a large crew, embarks on a two-month expedition to catalog the flora and fauna of the Alaskan coast; Joshua Lionel Cowen invents and patents the electric flash-lamp; and aviation pioneer Wilbur Wright discovers wing warping for aircraft wings.

With the spirit of exploration and invention in the air, Congress recognized the vital role soil surveys play in guiding agricultural development and supporting community planning and resource development. On May 3, 1899, Congress authorized funds for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to investigate the soil resources of the United States in the field and laboratory, and the first soil surveys began. By the end of 1899, USDA mapped 720,000 acres and published four separate soil surveys in parts of Maryland,

Connecticut, Massachusetts, Utah, and New Mexico.

After 125 years, USDA soil surveyors and partners continue to map soils in new areas, collecting data on what are called static soil properties, or those that change over thousands of years. They also revisit mapped soils to explore dynamic soil properties, such as soil organic carbon and structure, which change within the human timescale. These changes can be from natural factors, like soils eroding during a severe rain event, and human-caused factors, like soils building carbon as a result of good conservation practices.

Our knowledge of soils increases each year as we evolve with new technology, types of field and laboratory equipment, and ideas. Our experience observing, investigating, and researching in the field leads to new standards, methodology, and new and improved products for public use. Traditionally, we have conducted soil surveys on land to determine the best soils for growing corn, building a pond, maintaining wetlands, or supporting roads; however, today, we even conduct soil surveys from specialized boats in coastal zones!

The USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is founded on the need to

understand the soil resources of our nation. Data-driven and science-based, we fulfill a legislative mandate to inventory the soil resources and keep the soil survey relevant to ever-changing needs through the National Cooperative Soil Survey (NCSS).

We set standards in classification, mapping, and laboratory procedures with the largest and highest resolution inventory of natural resource data in the world used by our staff for conservation planning, application ranking criteria, and Highly Erodible Land determinations, among other services. The USDA NRCS' world-renowned Kellogg Soil Survey Laboratory (KSSL) provides data and standards to the international community, as well as for our state conservation staff, supporting conservation activities involving soil health, wetlands, and ecological sites.

How can soil surveys help you?

Soil data assist farmers, ranchers, foresters, land managers, and conservation planners in effectively managing, conserving, and appraising their most valuable investment the soil. The data can help determine soilrelated hazards or limitations that affect home sites. It can help estimate the potential crop or forage production of a farmer's land. Soil data can also help determine the suitability of soil for housing areas, onsite sewage disposal systems, pipelines, buildings, landfills, and recreation areas.

The fruits of our labor with soil surveys are visible in the productive soils we walk on, the food we eat, and the air we breathe. We will continue to build upon our 125-year legacy by providing soil data to inform, protect, and sustain future generations.

SUMMER SAFETY: Hydration tips for working in the heat

When it comes to staying hydrated on the job, it is important to hydrate before, during, and after working. Drinking enough fluids is one of the most important things you can do to prevent heat illness.

Make sure to drink *before* you feel thirsty. By the time you feel thirsty, you are already behind in fluid replacement. Dehydration is a primary contributor to heat exhaustion.

When we become dehydrated, work performance can suffer whether it is from low energy or experiencing other symptoms like fatigue or headaches.

When working in the heat, make sure to drink 1 cup (8 ounces) of water every 15-20 minutes.

It is more effective to drink small amounts frequently than to drink large amounts infrequently.

Do not drink more than 48 oz (1½ quarts) per hour! Drinking too much water or other fluids (sports drinks, energy drinks, etc.) can cause a medical emergency because the concentration of salt in the blood becomes too low.

When working in the heat, remember to avoid the following:

Energy drinks

- Many energy drinks contain much more caffeine than standard servings of coffee, tea, or soft drinks.
- Drinking several energy drinks per day can raise your caffeine levels enough to affect your heart. High caffeine levels can be risky when added to the strain placed on your body by heat.



Water will almost always maintain hydration during work in the heat, as long as you eat regular meals to replace salt lost in sweat.



Alcohol

- Alcohol can cause dehydration and puts a strain on your liver.
- Drinking alcohol within 24 hours of working in the heat can increase the risk of heat illness.

For prolonged sweating lasting several hours, or if you are feeling extra stressed, it is a good idea to add electrolytes to your water for better hydration, to replace salt lost in sweat, and support the adrenal glands. However, most sports drinks contain high amounts of sugar and other artificial ingredients. You can make your own with the following recipe:

Homemade electrolyte drink

- Juice from half a lime/lemon (Vitamin C)
- 2 cups of water
- 1 cup of coconut water (potassium)
- ¹⁄₂ teaspoon of sea salt or Himalayan salt (sodium)
- 2 tablespoons of honey or agave nectar
