

EGOOD LANDS, GREAT GRAZING



The LDAF Office of Soil and Water Conservation (OSWC) recently met with David Daigle, Chairman of the Calcasieu Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) to film the second installment of LDAF's new video series "Good Lands."

In this episode, Mr. Daigle led partners from the United States Department of Agriculture-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) and LDAF-OSWC through his family farming operation that deliberately integrates forages, livestock, and tree production, better known as silvopasture.

Silvopasture, while unique, mimics the processes of a natural savanna ecosystem, where grazing animals like bison seasonally roamed and periodic burning was common, whether caused by lightning strikes or by Native Americans.

Once these lands were divided and sold, monocropping became the popular way of life; savannas were harvested for their timber, and the land was converted to host single or rotational crops that were more stable and profitable for landowners and their families in the short term. However, the poorly drained and nutrient deficient soil trended the land use decisions back to the native ecosystem.

For over 40 years, Mr. Daigle has farmed multiple tracts of longleaf pine savannas, like the one visited in the video, using various conservation practices to work with this natural system to produce agricultural products - beef and timber. While in partnership with his local SWCDs and the NRCS, Mr. Daigle's operation is based on his Resource Management System (RMS), a site-specific plan that identifies all resources available on the land, management objectives, and long-term strategies and goals. Each plan is individually created and catered to the needs of the land addressed. All RMS plans address natural resource concerns such as soil, water, air, plants, and animals.

Joey Breaux, Assistant Commissioner of the LDAF Office of Soil and Water Conservation and Executive Director of the Louisiana State Soil and Water Conservation Commission complimented Mr. Daigle on using herbivory and prescribed burns at the correct times to keep forages and grasses at manageable heights. These practices allow for a healthier food source and a larger diversity of plant species.

"This healthy ecosystem does not happen by accident," Breaux reminds us. "The herbivory, the use of fire... it's what this ecosystem

HALLOWEEN MUMMY SAUSAGES

Ingredients:

4 oz. puff pastry 1 16-oz. package of Richard's Pork Smoked Sausage 1 egg, beaten with 1 tsp. water 1 Tbsp. ketchup or mustard

Instructions:

On a lightly floured work surface, roll out the pastry into a thin rectangle, about 11-inches long and about 5 to 6 inches wide. Using a pizza cutter, cut thin, ¼ inch wide strips down the longer side of the pastry. Cut each Richard's Smoked Pork Sausage link in half, leaving 6 sausages total that are about 3 inches long. Using 2 strips per sausage, dip the ends of the pastry into the egg wash and wrap them around each sausage, leaving a small slit near the top of each sausage for the "eyes."

Place on a baking sheet and refrigerate for 15 minutes while the oven preheats to 400°F. Remove from the fridge and gently brush with egg wash. Bake until golden brown, about 20 minutes. Put the ketchup or mustard into a bowl. Using a toothpick, draw eyes onto the mummy.



evolved by, and Dave's using them in the proper prescription to maintain this ecotype."

In fact, according to the Louisiana Natural Heritage program, over 200 plant species have been identified on his lands, providing nourishment to the cattle and residing wildlife species. This biodiverse system is home to critically endangered species like the northern pine snake and the red-cockaded woodpecker.

On the 130-acre tract Mr. Daigle showcased to partners, Braford cattle cautiously greeted the visitors while grazing and waiting to be moved to the next pasture. This management practice of rotational grazing moves livestock prior to the vegetation being over-grazed, allowing the grasses and forages to rest



and regrow. Benefits of rotational grazing, in tandem with prescribed burning, include increased soil health, improved forage yield, carbon sequestration, prevention of soil erosion, and more.

Daigle Farms has been in operation for over 40 years and shows no sign of slowing down. Mr. Daigle continues to work with conservation partners, including the LDAF, NRCS, Calcasieu SWCD, Allen SWCD, Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, Louisiana Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative, and more.

Silvopasture addresses many natural resource concerns:



Rotational grazing allows for plants to be grazed but not overgrazed. Cattle are moved every couple of days to ensure grasses have time to rest and regrow.



By allowing these native plants to grow, you have grasses and forages growing year-round — allowing for roots to be in the ground 24/7/365. Roots in the ground = less erosion of soil into local waterbodies and waterways.



Trees and plants are a wonderful source of replenishing oxygen as well as capturing and storing carbon!



Again, native plants will grow quicker, stronger, and heartier in a native environment. They will require less input, while still providing the same nutrition and shelter for insects and other animals.



This diverse ecosystem provides for habitat to multiple species — some even on the endangered species list. The native plants are a favorite for pollinators, too!

Nominees can represent any area of agriculture or agriculture-related industries, including farming, ranching, aquaculture, fisheries, education and agribusiness.



Nov. 1 application deadline: LACA scholarship

Applications for the Louisiana Agricultural Consultants Association (LACA) Scholarship are currently being accepted.

A minimum of one undergraduate and one graduate scholarship will be awarded in February of 2025. If funding is available, a third, and possibly even a fourth graduate scholarship will be awarded.

Each scholarship is valued at \$2,000.

Scholarships are awarded to applicants who express a strong interest in row crop agriculture.

A student can receive a LACA scholarship only once as an undergraduate, and only once as a graduate.

Both undergraduate and graduate applicants must be full-time students and cannot be employed full time.



Preference is given to applicants currently enrolled at a Louisiana college or university, and following an agricultural curriculum that emphasizes one or more of the following:

- Plant Pathology
- Plant Science
- Soil Science
- Weed Science

All applicants will be notified by December 15, 2024. Scholarships are presented to recipients at the LACA Louisiana Agricultural Technology and Management Conference held February 12-14, 2025.

USDA announces additional \$250 million in financial assistance for distressed farm loan borrowers

Payments to be made based on existing records; no application is necessary

The USDA has announced an additional \$250 million in automatic payments for distressed direct and guaranteed farm loan borrowers under Section 22006 of the Inflation Reduction Act. This significant step continues USDA's commitment to keeping farmers and ranchers financially viable and support for agricultural communities.

Over the past two years, USDA acted swiftly to assist borrowers in retaining their land and continuing their agricultural operations. Since President Biden signed the Inflation Reduction Act into law in August 2022, the USDA has provided approximately \$2.4 billion in assistance to more than 43,900 distressed borrowers.

Building on this momentum, USDA is announcing an estimated additional \$250 million in assistance to approximately 4,650 distressed direct and guaranteed farm loan borrowers. This includes approximately \$235 million in assistance for an estimated 4,485 delinquent direct and guaranteed borrowers who have not received prior IRA 22006 assistance, and approximately \$15 million in assistance for an estimated 165 direct and guaranteed borrowers with Shared Appreciation Agreements.

Distressed FSA borrowers with loans secured by real estate must sign a Shared Appreciation Agreement when they accept loan servicing actions that write down a portion of their direct or guaranteed debt. FSA is required to recapture a portion of that write-down if the property value of the real estate security increases when the agreement matures. Borrowers are required to either repay this amount or have it converted into an interestaccruing repayment agreement. As loan servicing actions that were paused due to the COVID-19 pandemic resume, such as Shared Appreciation Agreement recaptures, this added debt burden could severely impact borrowers who are already struggling.

How payments will be made

- For direct borrower delinquency assistance, FSA will make an automatic payment in the amount of any outstanding delinquencies, as of Sept. 30, 2024, on qualifying direct borrower loans that are one or more days delinquent, as of that date, provided those borrowers have not received prior Section 22006 assistance that was applied to reduce a direct FSA loan balance (excluding assistance for Disaster Set-Asides and Emergency Loans).
- For guaranteed borrower delinquency payments, FSA will mail via check an automatic payment in the amount of any outstanding delinquencies, as of Sept.

30, 2024, on qualifying guaranteed loans that are 30 or more days delinquent, as of that date, provided those borrowers have not received prior Section 22006 guaranteed loan assistance. Guaranteed loan borrowers are not considered to be in monetary default until 30 days past due. This assistance will be in the form of a United States Department of the Treasury check that is jointly payable to the borrower and the lender.

• For borrowers receiving assistance on their Shared Appreciation Agreements, a payment will be made to resolve outstanding amortized repayment agreements and recapture amounts owed to FSA which have matured as of Sept. 30, 2024. Borrowers whose Shared Appreciation Agreements have not matured as of Sept. 30, 2024, will be contacted by FSA and provided an opportunity to request that FSA calculate a partial recapture and Shared Appreciation Agreement assistance offer.



2024 annual meeting of Horticulture Inspection Society

The Horticulture and Quarantine Division of LDAF's Office of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences (AES) hosted the 2024 Annual Meeting of the Horticultural Inspection Society's Southern Chapter at the Hilton Capital Center in Baton Rouge from September 23-26. This year's gathering attracted approximately 50 participants, including inspectors, laboratory personnel, and field specialists from 13 states and one territory, all united in their mission to regulate plant movement and prevent the spread of pests and diseases.

The event commenced with a welcome address from Dr. Ansel Rankins Sr., Assistant Commissioner of AES. Dr. Rankins emphasized the importance of collaboration in safeguarding horticultural resources, stating, "Together, we can make strides in protecting our plants and ensuring a healthy environment for future generations."

A highlight of the meeting was the engagement of local youth, as students from Zachary High School's Beekeeping Apprenticeship program shared their thoughts on how the LDAF sponsored program has empowered them with skills in beekeeping, honey production, and ecological awareness.

Participants also had the privilege of hearing from LSU faculty members Dr. Raj Singh and Dr. Blake Wilson, who shared their insights on the latest research in pest management and plant health. Their presentations sparked lively discussions, fostering a collaborative atmosphere among attendees.

On the third day of the meeting, participants took part in a tour of the Burden Museum and Gardens, where they explored the region's rich botanical heritage and discussed innovative approaches to horticultural inspection in a picturesque setting.

On October 2, Christopher Kyle Holman was arrested following a threemonth investigation between the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Enforcement Division and the Union Parish Sheriff's Office.

In June of 2024, LDAF's enforcement division received a complaint involving a local volunteer fire department (VFD) setting fires. Investigators say that Holman discovered, reported, and was first on the scene of numerous fires during his shifts as a volunteer firefighter, which led to suspicions among the fire department.

LDAF investigators obtained information that eventually led to the arrest of Holman. Holman admitted to starting two of the fires.

Holman is charged with six counts of simple arson in violation of LA R.S. 14:52 and is currently booked at the Union Parish Detention Center with his bond set at \$150,000.

Note: All persons accused of any crime are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.





Sprout to break ground on new community farm

Local community organization Sprout is announcing the future buildout of a new community farm on the Lafitte Greenway. The local food justice and sustainable agriculture nonprofit has run a community garden at the ReFresh Project for the past ten years, adapting and refining its program offerings and fostering high engagement with its neighbors during that time. Drawing from their decade of community gardening in the Treme/Lafitte neighborhood, the organization is now positioned to grow into the Sprout Community Farm.

"I'm overjoyed to see the expansion of our community farm come to life," said Mina Seck, Sprout's Community Food Director. "Sprout and Friends of Lafitte Greenway have a long organizational history and relationship, being neighbors and partners for almost a decade, and it's so incredible for this project to be actualized. I can't wait to see how our farm expansion continues to bring people together and continues to support urban agriculture projects in New Orleans," Seck continued.

The new Sprout Community Farm will be located on the Lafitte Greenway between N. Dorgenois and Rocheblave Streets near local businesses Hey Cafe, Skeeta Hawk, and Flour Moon. The garden move and expansion will provide Sprout with more physical growing space and additional opportunities for programming in partnership with the New Orleans Recreation Development Commission (NORD) and Friends of Lafitte Greenway.

The farm site is earmarked for community gardening in the Lafitte Greenway Master Plan and was also identified as an ideal site in a recent round of community engagement with over 100 nearby neighbors. The Community Farm will have personal beds for gardeners, increased area to grow consistent and accessible food for the community, a greenhouse, community pantry and fridge, seating areas and a large shade structure for community education programs.

"We're excited to see the Sprout Community Farm take root on the Lafitte Greenway," said Larry Barabino, Jr., CEO of NORD Commission. "This project showcases how NORD provides something for everyone, from sports and recreation to education and urban agriculture. Partnering with Sprout and Friends of Lafitte Greenway allows us to create new opportunities for residents to come together, learn and grow. We look forward to seeing this farm thrive."

Faculty and students at Tulane's Small Center for Collaborative Design have been working with Sprout, community gardeners, neighbors and partner organization staff to develop schematic designs for the farm and the community education shade structure. The shade structure, which will be a centerpiece for the garden and house community classes and events, will be constructed by the Small Center by December 2024, with the garden's move and build to follow.

Sprout started when neighbors and market gardeners came together to provide community space and training to grow food. We support established and developing small-scale and sustainable farmers in Louisiana with technical and social support to create a more equipped network of growers in Louisiana and access to community food systems. Sprout strives for community control of food and to address access problems by giving

locals a stake in their own food. By creating communities that revolve around local food, we take a holistic approach to nutritional justice, encouraging people to enjoy every step of the process.



USDA/NRCS LA announces Regional Conservation Partnership Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) in Louisiana has announced the application period for the Open Pine Landscape Restoration Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) project. *The signup period will begin on November 18 and run until December 13, 2024.*

RCPP promotes coordination of NRCS conservation activities with like-minded

conservation partners that offer value-added contributions to expand the ability to address on-farm, watershed, and regional natural resource concerns. Through RCPP, NRCS invests with partners to implement projects that provide innovative and creative solutions to conservation challenges and provide measurable improvements and outcomes.

Kelli McClelland, Louisiana Assistant State Conservationist for Programs, explained the importance of partnerships in getting



conservation on the ground, "Working with our partners through these regional programs allows Louisiana NRCS to expand our conservation efforts. This RCPP is a win for NRCS, our partners, the participants, and the environment."

Louisiana NRCS along with the lead State of Arkansas and the lead partner organization the American Bird Conservancy, work to improve forest health for wildlife resources. This project focuses on addressing wildlife habitat, fire management, and water quality concerns in Arkansas and Louisiana by implementing open pine forest management practices across private lands in Arkansas and Louisiana.

Individuals and other entities actively engaged in agricultural production are eligible to participate in RCPP. RCPP offers a continuous application sign-up. However, to be considered for the current funding period, applications must be received by December 13th. Livestock grazing makes more habitat for native bees

Everyone knows that bees need flowers. But you might not know that most bees also need bare ground. About 70% of the estimated 4,000 bee species in the United States build their nests underground each spring.

This means they need access to very small patches of bare ground. When the soil is covered in dead leaves and other litter, these bees have less space to lay eggs and raise their young. Livestock like sheep and cows help clear out litter on rangelands in the American West by grazing or with their hooves.

New USDA-Conservation Effects Assessment Project (CEAP)-funded research from Montana shows that pastures where livestock are grazing have twice as many groundnesting bees. This means that **in addition to providing food, fiber, and carbon storage for America, working rangelands give us plenty of pollinators, too.**

Up to \$550 billion worth of global food supplies for people are pollinated by insects like bees. Pollinators are also essential for feeding wildlife. Animals from tiny warblers to giant grizzly bears munch on protein-rich beetles, butterflies, and other insects. Plus, pollinators help create healthy, productive soils. Sadly, pollinators worldwide are at risk from pesticides, conversion of native landscapes, climate change, and disease. Activities that maintain or restore pollinators' habitat—like sustainable livestock grazing on rangelands are important for people and the planet.

In the Lower 48 where rangelands cover one-third of the landscape, native bees are the main pollinators. Female ground-nesting bees dig out small nests in the soil where they pack brood chambers with pollen, then deposit eggs.

Ground litter hinders bees' nest building. Plus, fewer bees would survive when emerging from their underground nest if they have to fight up through dense leaf litter.

Researchers from Montana State University recently examined the abundance of bees on rangelands with funding from the Natural Resources Conservation Service's (NRCS) Working Lands For Wildlife initiative and CEAP. They compared pastures that were actively grazed to pastures that sat idle for several years.

Results showed double to triple the number of ground-nesting bees on grazed pastures compared to un-grazed pastures. This increase was likely because grazed pastures had nearly twice as much bare ground and half as much leaf litter as un-grazed pastures. The new findings from Montana show that, in addition to maintaining wildlife habitat and supporting rural communities, livestock grazing also helps pollinators thrive. That means when we lose rangelands in the American West to development or cropland conversion, we also lose pollinators.

"For people who like to see cows not condos this is great data," said Hayes Goosey, Extension Forage Specialist and entomologist at Montana State University who led the study. "It's one more check in the box that livestock agriculture on rangelands is a good thing."

This is just one of many recent NRCS projects that builds on research that helps inform data-driven decision making for pollinator conservation. Prescribed grazing and brush management are just two of the 51 NRCS grazing practices included in a recent Conservation Effects Assessment Project, that were proven to provide benefits to pollinators. Another recent CEAP project also provided findings to help guide decisions on which wildflowers to plant to best support native bees, resulting in researchers working with NRCS to develop a seeding mix for the southeastern U.S.

over the last year, and we hope to see it continue to grow."



The Louisiana Equine Promotion and Research Advisory Board was created by Act 168 of the 2021 Regular Session of the Louisiana Legislature. Its purpose is to support the growth and development of the equine industry in Louisiana by enhancing research, education, promotion, facilities, tourism, events, and equine-related activities throughout the state.

The Louisiana equine industry includes some 40,000 owners and 160,000 horses and has an economic impact of \$3 billion. Since the board's inception in 2021, it has helped fund multiple events, facilities, and equine-related activities, resulting in a 2,150% return on investment. In 2022-23, the board awarded a total of \$194,000 in grants with an economic impact of \$4,438,200; additionally, 50% of that was generated by out-of-state funds.

Reduce feed costs and waste with forage testing

Cow-calf operations are the heart of Louisiana's livestock industry. Cattle in this sector spend much of their lives grazing perennial and annual pastures, so high-quality forage is important. Summer 2023 was one of the hottest and driest in recent memory. The drought took a major toll on crop production, and everyone from sugarcane farmers to cattle ranchers felt the effects. One of the biggest concerns was a lack of hay. Dry conditions made for great baling weather, but hay yields were down nearly 50% compared to a typical year. This had cattle producers scrambling for alternative forage sources like rice straw or cornstalks, and many were putting out hay as early as July.

Forage testing is strongly encouraged by the LSU AgCenter, and with sources in short supply due to drought, knowing forage quality is even more critical. A forage test is a cost-effective tool providing key information about how much energy and protein cattle will receive from consuming the tested forage. Research has pinpointed values for cow nutritional needs, allowing producers to match feed resources to these needs. With proper management, forage can satisfy the needs of cattle throughout various production stages of life. If there are times when needs exceed feed resources, then higher energy or protein feed sources like grain might be needed. When this happens, a forage test provides information about how much of the cow's requirement can be satisfied by forage alone. From there, producers can work with LSU AgCenter Extension agents or specialists to determine the least amount of grain required per day to still meet requirements. This approach reduces overall feed costs and waste, which helps make Louisiana cattle producers more profitable.

To get a forage analysis, contact your local extension agent. Agents have the supplies needed to take your sample and send it to the LSU AgCenter forage lab in Baton Rouge. After the analyses, results will be emailed to the producer and the parish agent. A routine analysis costs \$15 and will provide a plethora of information about the forage submitted. Results can be overwhelming, so it is helpful to narrow down what's important. All cattle diets should be formulated on a dry matter basis. Make sure to read the values from the dried sample column when making feeding decisions. From there, producers should take note of the

crude protein (CP) and total digestible nutrients (TDN).

Crude protein is the amount of nitrogen in the forage and is especially important for growing and lactating cattle. TDN is essentially the energy value of a forage and is mostly driven by the amount of indigestible fiber present in the sample. Another useful tool that is provided by the forage lab is dry matter intake (DMI) as a percentage of mature body weight.

It is not uncommon for some producers to make decisions about hay quality based on the NDF and ADF values found on their feed analysis. ADF and NDF are lab procedures to determine the fiber fraction of a forage. The cell wall is made up of components called cellulose, hemicellulose and lignin. These three components together are the neutral detergent fiber (NDF) of a forage, while the least digestible components (hemicellulose and lignin) make up the acid detergent fiber (ADF). Essentially, NDF is a predictor of dry matter intake (DMI). ADF is a predictor of digestibility, so the lower a forage's ADF, the more digestible it is.

Many agents do not discourage producers from looking at ADF and NDF values, but they do not recommend making feeding decisions based solely upon them. Cattle nutritional requirements can be calculated based on TDN and CP, which take fiber into account already. NDF and ADF values do have their place, especially for forage management. The maturity stage of a forage at harvest is heavily correlated to NDF, so if producers are looking to decrease their NDF value, harvesting earlier is a great management strategy to improve hay quality and digestibility.

Testing your hay and knowing how to interpret the analysis is the first step in creating a costeffective feeding program. Forage testing allows you to know exactly what you are working with, and from there you can supplement strategically if needed. Proper forage management practices can help reduce indigestible fiber values and reduce supplementation and overall feed costs.

The LSU AgCenter continues to encourage testing forage resources and management strategies such as fertilization and more frequent harvests. The implementation of these recommendations helps reduce overall feed costs for producers, which is key to ensuring that Louisiana's cattle industry continues to thrive amid rising production costs.


