Avian influenza, or “bird flu”, is a respiratory disease of birds caused by influenza type A viruses. Wild birds, such as ducks, gulls, and shorebirds, can carry and spread these viruses but may show no signs of illness. However, avian influenza can kill domestic poultry (such as chickens, turkeys, ducks, and geese). There are two types:

- Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) virus strains are extremely infectious, often fatal to domestic poultry, and can spread rapidly from flock to flock.
- Low pathogenicity avian influenza (LPAI) virus strains occur naturally in wild migratory waterfowl and shorebirds without causing illness. LPAI can infect domestic poultry, with little or no signs of illness.

The virus spreads through direct bird-to-bird contact, and transmission is more likely during seasonal migration. Avian influenza viruses can also spread via contaminated surfaces or materials, such as manure; egg flats, crates, other farming materials and equipment; and people's clothing, shoes, or

hands. Biosecurity is key to protecting your flock.

Everyone who owns or works with poultry—whether you're part of a large commercial operation or raise birds as a hobby—needs to know the proper steps to keep avian influenza from entering the premises. Making biosecurity an “every day, every time” practice is the best way to protect your birds. Even if you're already familiar with biosecurity, it's always good to double-check your procedures. You are the best protection your birds have! It takes just one contact with this virus to sicken or kill your birds. In a single day, the avian influenza virus can multiply and infect every bird on your premises.

Biosecurity refers to everything people do to keep diseases—and viruses, bacteria, funguses, parasites, and other microorganisms that cause disease—away from birds, property, and people. It includes:

- Structural Biosecurity: Measures used in the physical construction and maintenance of coops, pens, poultry houses, family farms, commercial farms, and other facilities.

- Operational Biosecurity: Practices, procedures, and policies that people follow consistently.

The Basics of Biosecurity:

- Keep visitors to a minimum. Keep track of everyone on your property at all times, and ensure that anyone who comes into contact with your flock follows biosecurity principles.
- Wash your hands before and after coming into contact with live poultry. If using hand sanitizer, first remove manure, feathers, and other materials from your hands, as disinfectants will not penetrate organic matter or caked-on dirt.
- Provide disposable boot covers, disinfectant foot baths, or both for anyone coming into contact with your flock. If using a footbath, be sure to remove all droppings, mud, or debris from boots and shoes using a long-handled scrub brush before stepping into the disinfectant footbath, and always keep it clean.
- Change clothes before entering poultry areas and before exiting the property. Visitors should wear protective outer garments or disposable coveralls, boots, and headgear when handling birds, and shower or change clothes when leaving the facility.
- Keeping poultry houses, coops, and other enclosures clean is one of the best ways to prevent the spread of germs among poultry flocks. A thorough cleaning, followed by disinfectant application, takes time. But the process is vital to stop disease spread and keep flocks healthy.
- Protect your flock's water supply. Make sure wild birds, rodents, and other pests can't access it. And if you can, use a municipal water supply or treated well water so you know it's clean.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

LDAF opens the Louisiana Grain and Cotton Indemnity Fund

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Louisiana Agriculture Commodities Commission (LACC) has declared Nebraska-based grain dealer Hansen-Mueller insolvent following the company's filing for Chapter 11 bankruptcy on Monday, November 17. As a result of the company's inability to pay claims, the LACC voted to open the Louisiana Grain and Cotton Indemnity Fund to ensure Louisiana producers are paid.

The Louisiana Legislature established the Louisiana Grain and Cotton Indemnity Fund (LA R.S. 3:3:3412.1) to protect producers from losses if a licensed grain dealer or cotton merchant becomes insolvent and fails to fully compensate producers on delivered grain.

The fund is financed through mandatory assessments on commodity sales. These assessments are a percentage of the value of all agricultural commodities grown in Louisiana and sold to licensed dealers and merchants. The assessment rate is 0.0004% (1/25 of 1%). When a producer has not been fully paid for their agricultural commodities due to a dealer's insolvency, the fund can pay the producer any compensation owed.

"The Louisiana Grain and Cotton Indemnity Fund has proven to be a valuable insurance policy for Louisiana farmers, successfully shielding them from



Equine Herpesvirus Type 1 (EHV-1) Outbreak

Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) is monitoring an outbreak of Equine Herpesvirus Type 1 (EHV-1), including Equine Herpesvirus Myeloencephalopathy (EHM), associated with equine events in Oklahoma and Texas.

LDAF is advising horse owners who have attended an equine event in Texas or Oklahoma, within the last 3 weeks, to contact their veterinarian, isolate their horses, and implement twice daily temperature monitoring under the guidance of their veterinarian.

If elevated temperature, respiratory signs, or EHM-compatible clinical signs are noticed, owners should contact their veterinarian.

EHV-1 is spread from horse to horse through contact with nasal discharge or spread as aerosol droplets. The incubation period is typically 2-10 days, meaning a horse can appear normal while still shedding the virus and act as a carrier. Horses can also contract the virus by coming into contact with contaminated surfaces such as stalls, water, feed, tack, and transport vehicles. People can spread the virus from horse to horse by contaminated hands and clothing. It is important for owners to watch for signs and symptoms and practice biosecurity measures.

BIOSECURITY TIPS FOR HORSE OWNERS

Anytime horses or their owners leave the farm to compete, breed, train, or go to a veterinary hospital they can be exposed to a variety of disease agents, increasing the risk of spreading diseases. By adding these practices to your herd management routine, you can mitigate the risk of diseases such as equine herpes myeloencephalopathy (EHM), equine infectious anemia (EIA), equine piroplasmosis, and equine viral arteritis (EVA).

Leaving the Stable

- When moving your horses, use your own trailer. Do not haul your horse with horses from other farms.
- If you must use someone else's trailer, clean and disinfect it before loading your horse.
- Prevent nose-to-nose contact.
- Do not share equipment (e.g., needles, water and feed buckets, brushes, or sponges).
- Wash your hands after helping other people with their horses.

Returning to the Stable

- Clean and disinfect tack, boots, equipment, and grooming supplies before returning.
- Upon your return, shower and put on clean clothes and shoes.
- If possible, keep horses that were off the farm separate from your other horses for at least two weeks. Prevent any nose-to-nose contact.
- When feeding and doing chores, work with the returning horses last. Wear boots and coveralls, and remove them before working with other horses.

Adding New Horses

- Keep new horses separate from other horses for 30 days. Do not use the same pitchforks, grooming tools, or feed and water buckets on any horse but the new one.
- Work with the new horse last each day, or wear boots and coveralls that can be removed before working with the other horses.

Personnel

- Wash your hands often.
- Always wash your hands with soap and water, and blow your nose after working with a new horse. You could carry germs to other horses in your nose.
- Do not let other people pet your horses, especially those with horses at home or people who have been out of the state or country in the past two weeks.

Keep Germs From Spreading

- If one of your horses is sick, isolate the animal and put up signs to limit unnecessary contact.
- Put a foot bath at the entrance and/or exit of the isolation area and keep coveralls and boots or plastic foot covers near.
- Insects, birds, and rodents can all spread disease causing germs to horses; use effective insect and rodent control methods.

LSU AgCenter expert advises to make plans, resist impulses to save during the holidays

Every year, parties and get-togethers for the holidays are an important tradition that brings abundant joy — and serious anxiety — into people's lives.

One of these stressors is always on the wallet, but Sandra May, LSU AgCenter curriculum coordinator for nutrition and community health programs, said there are easy ways to alleviate some of these issues.

To start, May suggests setting a budget for each party and gathering that will be held. This can prevent buying extra food or drinks that are not necessary for the event.

"You want to set a budget for how much you want to spend on each holiday or each event during the holiday," May said. "There are many events like cookie exchanges and dinner parties for different groups and then, of course, the family gathering. So you want to make sure that you have a budget plan for each one."

The day someone shops is also important for savings, May said. Grocery stores and supermarkets will usually increase the prices of seasonal foods the closer they get to the holiday, so she suggests shoppers plan ahead and not buy all their food at once. Some food, like those in cans or frozen, can be bought ahead of time and will allow for the more expensive perishable food that needs to be bought closer to the holiday.

She also suggests avoiding impulse buying and having a list for shopping.

"We typically over the holidays have lots of leftovers, and then some of them get thrown away. We kind of overestimate how much we need," May said. "You just want to scale back a little bit."

Also, when buying food products, do not just look for name brands and compare the prices with the store brands, which are in most cases cheaper and of the same quality.

For the menu, May suggests planning to cook as much food yourself as you can. More often than not, premade ingredients and meals will cost more than what it takes to make it at home.

"A lot of times, I prefer to make things on my own if I have the ingredients already at home. If I'm making a green bean casserole and topping it with dried onions, well, can I make my own dried onions?" May asked. "Maybe substitute some things that are a little bit cheaper that may not be your typical way of doing things, but you can definitely switch things up and sometimes it even works out better."

Finally, May urges hosts and guests to enjoy conversations with one another during a gathering.

"Eat slowly, enjoy the conversation and enjoy the family time," May said. "And as you eat during those conversations, you tend to eat less because you have time for your body to digest the food and feel full."




1. Blend all the ingredients in a blender until smooth, and the amounts can be adjusted to your liking.

Roasted Creole Tomato Salsa

 1 poblano pepper, stemmed and halved
 ½ white onion, peeled and halved
 1 garlic clove (unpeeled)
 1 tsp of cumin
 1 tsp black pepper
 1 tsp salt
 ½ tsp white pepper
 ½ tsp Bayou Dust seasoning
 1 tsp of lemon juice
 Handful of fresh cilantro leaves (roughly chopped)

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit.
2. Throw your Creole tomatoes (skin side up), garlic, onion, jalapeño, and poblano pepper (skin side up) in an even layer into your favorite cast-iron skillet. Roast 'em in the oven for 20 minutes or until the tomatoes and jalapeños have blistered and blackened.

4. Transfer your charred Creole tomatoes, garlic, onion, jalapeño, and poblano pepper to a food processor or blender. Blend until the mixture comes together. Avoid blending too much or your salsa will be very liquid-y.
5. Toss in the blend of seasonings, lemon juice, and cilantro and fold.
6. Let the salsa sit in the fridge for a few hours to cool, then eat up!

Biosecurity: Avian Influenza

While an occasional unexplained bird death is normal, a large percentage of dead or dying birds in your flock is not normal. If there's no obvious cause (such as predators, weather issues, or other external factors), report the deaths to animal health officials immediately. Early detection is vital to prevent the spread of HPAI.

Birds infected with the HPAI virus may show one or more of the following signs:

- Sudden death without clinical signs
- Lack of energy and appetite
- Decreased egg production or soft-shelled or misshapen eggs
- Swelling of the head, comb, eyelids, wattles, and hocks
- Purple discoloration of wattles, comb, and legs
- Nasal discharge, coughing, and sneezing
- Incoordination
- Diarrhea


If you see these signs, take action right away! Louisiana bird owners should

report sick birds or unusual bird deaths to state and federal officials through the USDA's toll-free number at 1-866-536-7593. In Louisiana, poultry owners can report to the USDA number or directly to the LDAF Diagnostic Lab at 1-318-927-3441.

Louisiana's Sweet Tradition Rolls Through Thanksgiving

November is a season of gratitude, a time when most farmers across the country have wrapped up their harvests and turned their attention to winter and next year's plans. It is very different in the cane belt. For Louisiana's sugarcane producers, November means one thing, the hardest push of the year.

While families gather around their Thanksgiving tables, sugarcane farmers and mill workers will be out in the fields and at the mills harvesting and processing cane into raw sugar. The crop does not take holidays off and neither can they. Timing is everything in this business and when it comes to harvest its 24/7 for the 100 plus day harvest season.

This year's harvest is more than 50% percent complete. The early part of the year brought concern after a rare snowfall across the cane belt along with two freezes. The good news is that those cold snaps were followed by ample rainfall this summer and, so far, a relatively dry harvest season. After a slow start, sugar levels have been encouraging,

and producers are watching to see if that trend holds through the final stretch without any heavy rainfall, late hurricane or early freeze to put a damper on what could be an above average crop.

Every year tells a different story from the sugarcane fields. Some seasons test the patience of even the most experienced growers while others reward them with record yields. No matter the outcome of the previous year, sugarcane farmers approach each harvest with the same steady commitment and optimism that have sustained this industry for more than two centuries.

The work is demanding. It takes 100 days straight of cutting, hauling and milling. It is also deeply rewarding. Sugarcane farming is not a solo act. It is a family affair and during the holidays that family extends from the growers in the fields to the factory crews keeping the mills running around the clock.

Louisiana's 11 mills and hundreds of growers make up a network of resilience and pride. Their work supplies the sugar that sweetens

millions of tables across America. So, this Thanksgiving, when you stir sugar into your coffee or bake that pecan pie, take a moment to be thankful for the people behind that sweetness.

Speaking of pecan pie, try this Louisiana favorite only made possible by our sugarcane farmers and millers.

Cane Syrup Pecan Pie.

Mix 1 cup cane syrup, 3 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons melted butter, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Stir in 1½ cups pecans, pour into an unbaked 9-inch pie crust, and bake at 350°F for 60 to 70 minutes. Let it cool two hours before serving.

For Louisiana's sugarcane families, Thanksgiving is not a day off. They'll find a little time in the day to celebrate with their families before going back out to work in the fields, knowing their labor makes the celebration sweeter at dinner tables across the country.

LSU AgCenter unlocks secrets beneath the soil for sweet potato yields, lower fertilizer use



A dedicated group of researchers are behind the sweet potato casserole that will grace many Louisiana tables on Thanksgiving. At the LSU AgCenter Sweet Potato Research Station, scientists have developed sweet potato varieties that have ample sweetness for consumers, ideal shape for processors and high yields for farmers.

One project at the station is aimed at helping growers produce their crop with just the right amount of fertilizer. LSU AgCenter researcher Arthur Villordon is leading the study that uses gene expression to predict the fertilizer requirements of sweet potatoes by variety.

Researchers can't see what is happening with the storage root of the sweet potato plant — the part we eat — while it develops underground. Villordon said this study can give them new insights into what is happening beneath the soil.

"What if we can hear what the plant says? What if we can communicate with the plant?" Villordon said. "That's where gene expression profiling comes in."

Villordon, relying on prior research in other plant systems, was able to identify candidate genes that express nitrogen and phosphorus needs, calling it a game changer.

Lisa Arce, a doctoral student working with Villordon, helped carry out the research. Her work focused on characterizing gene expression patterns. Gene expression is how plants communicate with the environment and interpret its signals. She did this by subjecting the genes to low nitrogen and phosphorus conditions and using quantitative polymerase chain reaction to better understand the plants' responses at the molecular level.

"We will know if those genes are upregulated or the expression is higher if they are under low nutrient conditions," Arce said.

She said fertilizer recommendations in Louisiana are typically 45 pounds of nitrogen per acre, 80 pounds of phosphate per acre and 120 pounds of potash per acre. The researchers questioned whether this was best for all cultivars.

"Based on our research that we have conducted, it's not best all the time, and certainly more is not always better. So that's why we wanted to investigate what's the molecular basis behind cultivar-specific fertilizer requirement," Arce said.

The research led them to nutrient transporters. Arce described them as delivery trucks that bring nitrogen and phosphorus from the soil to the root and help the plant absorb the nutrients. They determined that cultivars with what they called active transporters need less fertilizer while those with lazy transporters need more.

Through two years of greenhouse trials and third year with a field trial, the researchers discovered the accurate fertilizer requirements for popular sweet potato varieties. The variety Beauregard needs more nitrogen than Orleans, and Evangeline needs more phosphorus than Bayou Belle. These outcomes affect the shape and size of the storage root.

"If we grow Bayou Belle under low phosphorus condition, it will form storage roots that are blockier-shaped," Arce said. "This is important because processors like blockier shaped roots for more efficient and uniform slicing."

With this information, the researchers can tailor cultivar-specific recommendations.

Villordon said it is possible that growers have been applying too much phosphorus to their fields all this time. He said they will get more precise with growers.

"We will be able to tell the growers that you're in this field, and this field has too much phosphorus. And if you're growing this cultivar — maybe Bayou Belle — maybe you don't need to be putting in phosphorus anymore."

This can lead to savings for growers.

"That means no more spending money for those fertilizers or nutrients that your specific cultivars don't really need," Arce said. "We are one step closer to achieving our main goal, which is to help our growers earn more by spending less."

Trump administration delivers second stage of Crop Disaster Assistance for farmers

President Donald J. Trump and U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke L. Rollins continue to put Farmers First, including the unprecedented move to reopen over 2,000 county FSA offices in the middle of the government shutdown so farmers could continue to access U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) services during harvest. Today, the USDA will continue to support farmers and will release billions in disaster assistance for those recovering from natural disasters across the country.

“President Trump continues to put Farmers First and provide relief to American farmers reeling from the devastating natural disasters that struck across the United States in 2023 and 2024. The continued financial success of our farming and ranching operations is a national security priority,” said Secretary Brooke Rollins. “USDA is doing whatever it takes to make good on President Trump’s promise to expedite disaster recovery assistance to U.S. farmers and ranchers, ensuring viability, prosperity, and longevity for these men and women who dedicate their entire lives to our nation’s food, fiber and fuel production. The majority of payments from the first stage are already in the hands of producers helping them prepare for and invest in the next crop year.”

USDA’s Farm Service Agency (FSA) is delivering more than \$16 billion in total

Congressionally approved SDRP assistance. This is on top of over \$9.3 billion in Emergency Commodity Assistance Program (ECAP) assistance to over 560,000 row crop farmers and over \$705 million in Emergency Livestock Relief Program (ELRP) assistance to over 220,000 ranchers. Stage Two of SDRP covers eligible crop, tree, bush and vine losses that were not covered under Stage One program provisions, including non-indemnified (shallow loss), uncovered and quality losses. For Stage Two program details, including fact sheets, please visit fsa.usda.gov/sdrp.

The first stage, announced in July, remains available to producers who received an indemnity under crop insurance or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for eligible crop losses due to qualifying 2023 and 2024 natural disaster events. FSA county offices will begin accepting SDRP Stage Two applications on November 24, 2025. Producers have until April 30, 2026, to apply for both Stage One and Stage Two assistance. FSA is establishing block grants with Connecticut, Hawaii, Maine, and Massachusetts that cover crop losses; therefore, producers with losses on land physically located in these states are not eligible for SDRP program payments.

Since March 2025, USDA has supported U.S. farmers and ranchers with more

than \$16 billion in supplemental disaster assistance mandated by Congress in the American Relief Act, 2025 including \$9.3 billion through the Emergency Commodity Assistance Program, over \$1 billion through the Emergency Livestock Relief Program and, to date, more than \$5.7 billion in SDRP Stage One payments.

Milk and On-Farm Stored Crop Loss Assistance

The Milk Loss Program provides up to \$1.65 million in payments to eligible dairy operations for milk that was dumped or removed without compensation from the commercial milk market because of a qualifying natural disaster event in 2023 and/or 2024.

Producers who suffered losses of eligible harvested commodities while stored in on-farm structures in 2023 and/or 2024 due to a qualifying natural disaster event may be eligible for assistance through the On-Farm Stored Commodity Loss Program, which provides for up to \$5 million to impacted producers.

The enrollment period to apply for milk and on-farm stored commodity losses is Nov. 24, 2025, through Jan. 23, 2026. Information and fact sheets for both programs are available online at fsa.usda.gov/mlp for milk loss and fsa.usda.gov/ofslcp for on-farm stored commodity losses.

- Any correspondence with Hansen-Mueller regarding the unpaid grain.

China Buys Nearly 1 Million Tons of US Soybeans

Reuters' Karl Plume reported that "China bought at least 14 cargoes of U.S. soybeans on Monday, two traders with knowledge of the deals said, its largest purchase since at least January and the most significant since a summit between President Donald Trump and President Xi Jinping in October."

"China is buying U.S. soybeans to meet the pledges it made to Washington at the trade summit in Busan, South Korea, even though the cargoes are priced higher than rival Brazilian offers, two Asia-based traders said," Plume reported. "This bigger round of U.S. soybean buying is no longer a goodwill gesture but a manifestation of China's commitment to the Busan terms," said a Singapore-based trader."

"China's state-owned grain trader COFCO bought at least 840,000 metric tons for shipment in December and January, the two traders with knowledge of the deals told Reuters," Plume reported. "Eight of the vessels were for shipment in December and January from U.S. Gulf Coast terminals, while the rest were for shipment in January from Pacific Northwest ports, one trader said. A second trader estimated around 75% of the sales were for Gulf shipment, with the remainder from the Pacific Northwest ports."

During the government shutdown, USDA daily sales data showed China made two soybean purchases totaling 232,000 metric tons, bringing China's total recent soybean buys to nearly 1 million metric tons.


