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## SWCD Spotlight

## Iberia SOIL & WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Of Louisiana's 44 Soil & Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs), the Iberia SWCD's workload may paradoxically be considered both typical and quite unique. Typical in that the Iberia SWCD staff works primarily with private landowners to address conservation concerns on cropland and grazing land; unique in that conservation priorities in Iberia parish extend equally far beyond these primary land uses.

Conservation on agricultural land in Iberia parish may account for the bulk of the Iberia field office staff workload, but certainly not all of it. In fiscal year '25, although nearly 1,200 Iberia parish landowners were assisted with conservation on more than 60,000 acres, the Iberia SWCD also reestablished more than 29,000 linear feet of both shoreline and interior marsh vegetation in the Iberia parish intertidal wetlands as part of an ongoing coastal restoration effort.

Compared with arable ag land under voluntary conservation plans relative to its total geographic span



the Iberia SWCD is clearly among the most active SWCDs in the state.

The Iberia SWCD's (I-VSWCD) origins date back to June of 1945, when the "Iberia-Vermilion Soil Conservation District" was officially chartered, covering the expanse of both of those "Teche-Vermilion" parishes. Over time, conservation needs and concerns diverged, and in 1985, the I-VSWCD split into two distinct SWCDs, one of which is our current gem, ISWCD, which has remained relentless in its voluntary conservation focus and delivery.

In 2025, the Iberia Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) continued its mission of protecting natural resources through education, innovation, and hands-on conservation efforts. From engaging youth in environmental awareness to supporting local farmers with cutting-edge technology, the District's work reflects a deep commitment to sustainability and community collaboration.

One of the year's most impactful outreach events was Ag Day at the SugArena, held on March 7. Nearly 1,000 students and 60 educators attended the event,



where the District taught water conservation and sustainability using the Enviroscape model. This interactive watershed model helped students understand how pollution—both point and nonpoint source—can travel through neighborhoods, farms, and industrial areas, eventually reaching lakes, rivers, and oceans. The demonstration emphasized the importance of responsible land use and the role each person plays in protecting water quality.

The District also hosted its annual Locally-Led conservation meeting on March 12, bringing together cooperators, community members, and partners to discuss natural resource concerns. Topics included soil erosion, plant and soil health, and water ponding and flooding. These discussions help shape the District's priorities and ensure that local voices guide conservation strategies.

As a direct response to these stakeholder concerns, the District is engaging with Iberia Parish Government to develop a high-resolution 2D model aimed at identifying ways to improve drainage in the Teche-Vermilion Basin. This initiative is a direct spin-off from data collected through the USDA's Q1 LiDAR and a PL566 Watershed Plan. The model will provide critical insights into water flow and flood risk, helping the parish make informed decisions to enhance resilience and protect both agricultural and residential areas.

# COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

## LDAF opens applications for Black Vulture Depredation Sub-Permit

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) announces that it recently obtained a statewide depredation permit for black vultures from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and will begin administering it to protect livestock.

The LDAF statewide depredation permit provides livestock producers with the opportunity to apply for a Black Vulture Depredation Sub-Permit, which allows legal “takes” of black vultures attacking livestock. Livestock producers experiencing depredation by black vultures may apply for permits to “take” up to five birds. The permit is valid for this calendar year and must be renewed each year. Permits will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis.

“Black vultures can pose a significant threat to livestock, particularly calves,” said LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, DVM. “LDAF applied for and was granted a Migratory Bird Depredation Permit to help livestock producers manage these predatory birds effectively. I strongly encourage our livestock producers to take advantage of this opportunity.”

# Louisiana timber titan honored by Tech for forest products innovation

Louisiana timber titan Roy O. Martin III, who's retiring as CEO of his family's century-old forestry products empire Jan. 1, was honored for his ongoing advancement of the industry with an honorary doctorate of humanities from Louisiana Tech University.

Martin, who will remain as board chairman for the company his grandfather founded in 1923, was conferred the degree in a surprise presentation during Tech's Nov. 26 graduation ceremony.

Martin said he was "shocked and humbled" by the award.

"I believe that this honor recognizes the body of work accomplished by the RoyOMartin employees and charity of the entire RoyOMartin family and company," he told USA Today Network. "As the quarterback, I receive the prize, but this honor is shared by the world class team of RoyOMartin and the 100 year-old values of the RoyOMartin family."

Martin's company, which owns more than 500,000 acres of timberlands, employs more than 1,200 workers at its forest product manufacturing mills in Chopin, Oakdale and Corrigan, Texas, and corporate headquarters in Alexandria. The company also operates a healthcare division.

Louisiana's timber and forest products industry is the largest sector within the state's agriculture economy with a \$3.6 billion annual impact and 15 million acres of farmed timber in the state.

Louisiana Agriculture and Forestry Commissioner Mike Strain and Martin are longtime friends.

"He's a stalwart in the timber industry, a true leader in advancing harvesting and manufacturing in our state and beyond our borders," Strain said in an interview with USA Today Network.

State Rep. Jack McFarland, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, went to work for Martin at the Chopin mill in 1995 and continues to contract with the company today as an independent timber harvester.

"He's a leader of innovation in the forest products industry and always on the cutting edge of technology," McFarland said.

Martin is an LSU graduate, but his partnership with Tech has led to the development of the university's Forest Products Innovation Center, a facility now under construction on Tech's South Campus set to open in the fall of 2026.

The center is designed to advance forestry education, research and cutting-edge discovery while supporting research and workforce development.

"He has distinguished himself through his professional achievements, civic leadership and dedicated support of higher education, including through his generosity as we establish the Louisiana Tech University Forest Products Innovation Center," Tech President Jim Henderson said.

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# Ag Producers Should Do Year-End Tax Planning

Now is the time to consider year-end income tax planning. There have been changes to the tax law in 2025 that agricultural producers should be aware of.

“When tax planning, it is best to start with year-to-date income and expenses, and estimate them for the remainder of the year,” says Ron Haugen, North Dakota State University Extension farm management specialist. “Estimate depreciation, and include any income that was deferred to 2025 from a previous year.”

Haugen recommends producers try spreading out income and expenses so as to not have abnormally high or low income or expenses in any one year.

Farmers and ranchers have until March 2, 2026, to file their 2025 income tax returns without penalty if they have not made estimates.

Qualified farmers have until April 15, 2026, to file without penalty if they have paid their estimated tax deposit by Jan. 15.

Haugen encourages producers to think about making a deposit by Jan. 15, 2026, if it looks like they will have a tax liability:

“That would give producers more time to prepare their return and file on April 15.”

Haugen includes tax provisions to take note of:

- Agricultural producers are allowed to use 200% declining balance depreciation for 3-year, 5-year, 7-year and 10-year property. A 150% declining balance is required for 15-year and 20-year property.
- For most new agricultural machinery and equipment (except grain bins), the recovery period is five years.
- The Section 179 expense has increased. It generally allows producers to deduct up to \$2.5 million on new or used machinery or equipment purchased in the tax year. There is a dollar-for-dollar phase-out for purchases exceeding \$5 million. Equipment must be above 50% business use to use Section 179. A net operating loss cannot be generated with a 179-expense election.
- The additional 100% first-year bonus depreciation has been reinstated for purchases after Jan. 19, 2025. The rate is 40% for purchases between Jan. 1 and Jan. 19, 2025. It is available for both used and new property.
- Net operating loss (NOL) carryback rules are in effect. Producers can carry back losses to offset income.

- Like-kind exchanges are not allowed for personal property but are allowed for real property.
- Income averaging can be used by producers to spread the tax liability to lower income tax brackets in the three previous years. This is done on Schedule J.
- Producers may also use Form ND-1 FA (income averaging) for North Dakota income tax calculations.

Haugen offers these tax planning tips for a low-income year:

- Amortize fertilizer purchases.
- Capitalize repairs. Pick and choose which repairs to capitalize.
- Postpone expenses.
- Do not 179 expense all purchases. Use regular depreciation.

## Stay safe when decorating for the holidays

As families prepare their homes for the holidays, the LSU AgCenter's LaHouse Research and Education Center encourages residents to keep safety at top of mind while choosing decor.

Holiday decor, especially lights, trees and inflatables can increase fire risks if not managed properly. Following proper safety protocols for common decoration pieces can help keep your family and home safe during the holiday season.

Electrical fires increase each winter and much of the risk comes from overloaded outlets, older lighting strands and dried-out trees. LaHouse recommends:

Inspect lights before hanging. Replace strands with frayed wires, cracked bulbs or loose connections. Choose LED holiday lights, which stay cooler and reduce fire risk.

Don't connect too many lights. Most indoor and outdoor lights have a limit on how many strands can be connected, be sure to follow this recommended number to reduce fire risk

Avoid overloaded outlets. Plug décor into multiple circuits when possible and use power strips with built-in circuit breakers.

Water real Christmas trees daily. A hydrated tree is far less likely to become a fire hazard. Keep all trees at least three feet from heat sources such as fireplaces, space heaters and candles.

Use outdoor-rated lights outdoors. Weather-rated cords, timers and lights prevent electrical hazards.

Turn off decorations before bedtime. Use timers or smart plugs to ensure lights are off overnight and when no one is home.

Also, decorate with efficiency in mind.

December can also bring higher energy bills as temperatures drop and decorative lighting increases. LaHouse recommends these easy efficiency tips:

Choose LEDs over incandescent lights. LED strings use up to 75% less energy and last longer.

Use timers and smart plugs to limit run time for lights and inflatables.



In support of precision agriculture, the District continued to offer its Real-Time Kinematic (RTK) system for rent. This satellite-based technology delivers centimeter-level accuracy for tasks such as planting, fertilizing, and spraying. Eleven cooperators used the system this year, improving row spacing in sugarcane fields and enhancing the accuracy of fertilizer and herbicide applications—ultimately reducing waste and improving yields.

The District also expanded its feral hog trapping program by renting out three Pig Brig traps year-round. Since 2023, over 100 hogs have been captured, helping to reduce the damage these invasive animals cause to farmland and ecosystems. The traps were funded through the 2022 Supplemental Appropriations Bill, thanks to an amendment by Rep. Jack McFarland. The bill provided over 60 hog trapping systems to statewide SWCDs not included in the 2018 Farm Bill-funded pilot program—seven of which are in Louisiana. The District also participated in a Pig Brig seminar to train staff and cooperators on trap setup, baiting, and removal techniques.

Conservation efforts extended to wetlands and forests as well. On May 22, the District carried out its annual Revegetation Project at Scat Lake Pond in Marsh Island. By planting native grasses, the District helps stabilize shorelines and reduce erosion caused by



wave action and rising water levels. The Vegetation Technician identifies high-priority areas and selects plant species and quantities to maximize ecological impact.

In February, the District joined forces with NRCS partners, local Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and 4-H members for its annual tree planting event at Lake Fausse Point. Sponsored by the Apache Corporation, this initiative is part of a national effort that has provided over five million trees to more than 1,000 nonprofit and government partners since 2005.

The District's work was also celebrated at the Outstanding Farmer Supper, held on March 20 at the Harvest Room in New Iberia. This annual event honors the achievements of local cooperators and highlights the District's ongoing projects. This year's Outstanding Farmer was Mr. Buddy Oubre, who was also recently featured in the LDAF-Office of Soil and Water's Goodlands series. Mr. Oubre modified sugarcane harvesters to redirect leafy residue onto



the harvester tracks, creating a protective mat that reduces soil compaction and field damage during harvest.

During the supper, the District also recognized Mrs. Lisa Hulin, who retired after 48 years of dedicated service as the District's Administrative Assistant. Her decades of commitment have left a lasting legacy, and her contributions were warmly celebrated by attendees.

The District's leadership continues to guide its success. Board members include Robert Judice (12 years), Guy Viator (11 years), Benson Langlinais (5 years), John Viator (4 years), and Lisa Hulin (1 year). Associate Board Member Brad Judice, who previously served for 8 years. He carries on a family tradition of service; his father, Darrell Judice, served on the board for nearly 30 years.

Through education, innovation, and community partnerships, the Iberia SWCD remains a vital force in protecting Louisiana's natural resources for future generations.

# It is fruit planting season in Louisiana. See what LSU horticulturalists say should be planted now

Now that the cooler winter months are rolling in, it's time to start planting.

Despite misconceptions, the prime time to plant fruits and vegetables is the late fall, not the spring.

"You want to get them out during this cold season," said Denyse Cummins, an extension horticulturalist at the LSU AgCenter.

By planting fruits like strawberries in the late fall, they have the time to sit through the winter and start blooming and producing fruit around February. Even though it looks like plants are just "sitting there" in the winter, Cummins said, there is a lot more going on underground. These plants are growing roots and accessing all of the nutrients during these colder months.

When it warms up in the spring, the fruit plants get the push to grow. Since they had time to grow over the winter, Cummins said the plants have something to fall back on when it stops raining and gets hot.

Some of the fruits that are best to plant now through February are apples, blackberries, figs, peaches and plums.

Alongside other horticulture professors, Cummins contributed to the creation of a "Sustainable Gardening" guide.

"The whole concept behind it is that you are going to garden in such a way as to leave the environment as good or better as when you started," Cummins said.

Carl Motsenbocker, a horticulture professor at LSU and the executive director of the Louisiana Farm to School Program, said that the guide is a part of their work. It is based on temperature zones throughout the state and shows when it is best to plant different fruits and vegetables.

While it might be best to plant strawberries in November, other crops like tomatoes should be planted from March to May.

Beyond the guide, Motsenbocker and his team put together detailed guides of different crops, which can be found on the Seeds to Success website. The details include more than just planting times, including the history about where certain plants are from and how their cultivation began. Their largest guide is on tomatoes and how to grow them successfully in the high temperatures of Louisiana summers.

"Heat-tolerant tomato cultivars are used in Louisiana summer heat," Motsenbocker said.

Alongside history, culture plays a big role in planting and gardening. Cummins said that cultural practices are when someone

repeats something out of habit. In relation to gardening, maybe it was because they saw a relative do it or maybe it is an activity that has grown on them from their community.

The AgCenter offers advice on preventive methods that make plants easier to grow and require less labor. Here are some steps that Cummins recommended repeating:

Keep soil covered at all times, especially during the winter

Keep up with fertilizer and put it down when you first plant because it gives the plant a little more as it grows

Grow plants at the right time

Use a lot of mulch on top of the soil because it gives the soil nutrients and organic matter

Learning how to be a sustainable gardener leaves the soil better than when it was found, Cummins said. Paying attention to these tips not only makes gardening easier and more productive, but also more mindful.

"These are practices and things that your grandfather did and you know they kind of got forgotten and a lot of people don't know about them," Cummins said.

## LDAF Announces Partnership with Everblue to Launch Online Pesticide Certification and Horticultural Licensing Exams

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) has partnered with Everblue, an innovative technology company specializing in digital transformation and process automation, to introduce online pesticide certification and horticultural licensing examinations. This new option, launched in November 2025, is designed to increase convenience, access, and flexibility for exam candidates across the state.

Dr. Ansel Rankins Sr., Assistant Commissioner of the Office of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, said the partnership marks a major advancement in how LDAF delivers its regulatory exams.

"This is an important step forward in our exam delivery for candidates," said Dr. Rankins. "It not only expands access to

testing but also frees up valuable time for our field inspectors, who often assisted with exam administration duties when administrative staff were unavailable. The new system modernizes our process while maintaining exam integrity."

Through Everblue's platform, candidates approved by LDAF now have the option to take their exams remotely with full online proctoring. The system manages candidate enrollment and exam delivery, ensuring a secure and credible testing experience for Louisiana businesses and applicators.

For many years, LDAF offered in-person exams at seven regional offices throughout the state. With the adoption of the online testing format, exams are no longer administered at regional locations. However,

in-person testing will continue to be offered at the LDAF Baton Rouge main office for those who prefer or require a traditional testing environment.

Candidates must still submit an application and applicable fees to LDAF before registering to take any exam. Upon approval, they will receive instructions on selecting their preferred testing method—either online through Everblue or in person in Baton Rouge.

# USDA to Expand Crop Insurance Access for Farmers and Ranchers, Boosting the Farm Safety Net

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke L. Rollins announced major updates to federal crop insurance, reducing red tape for farmers, modernizing long-standing policies, and expanding access to critical risk protection beginning with the 2026 crop year. The Expanding Access to Risk Protection (EARP) Final Rule streamlines requirements across multiple crops, responds to producer feedback, and strengthens USDA's commitment to putting America's farmers first.

"President Trump is cutting burdensome regulations and strengthening the farm safety net to ensure the future viability of American agriculture. Across the Trump Administration, we are removing burdensome regulations that were strangling small businesses. For every new regulation, President Trump has eliminated a remarkable 48 – lifting a weighted blanket from the American economy," said Secretary Brooke Rollins. "With this new rule, we are delivering real, meaningful relief by modernizing the system, expanding access to crop insurance, and making it easier, not harder, for farmers and ranchers to protect their operations and keep doing the work that keeps America fueled and fed. We are continuing to put Farmers First every step of the way."

### Reducing Regulatory Burdens

#### Improving Land Access Through Prevented Planting Relief

Removes the "insured" requirement from the "1 in 4" rule for prevented planting payments. Producers must still show the land was planted and harvested (or adjusted for an insurable cause of loss) in one of the previous four years.

#### Streamlining Production Reporting

Allows policyholders switching Approved Insurance Providers (AIPs) to submit production reports directly to their new provider, reducing confusion and paperwork.

#### Expanding Direct Marketing Options

Allows insurance under the Dollar Plan for direct-marketed fresh market tomatoes and peppers beginning with the 2027 crop year, reflecting specialty crop business practices in Northeastern states.

#### Simplifying Dispute Resolution

In accordance with Executive Order 14192, Unleashing Prosperity Through Deregulation, removes the "automatic nullification" rule and shifts fact-finding authority to the courts, reducing administrative burdens on policyholders and AIPs.

#### Deregulating Coverage Dates

Removes termination, cancellation, and end-of-insurance dates from federal regulations and places them in policy provisions, enabling more flexible, county-level updates.

### Additional Policy Updates

#### One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA) Implementation:

- Incorporates provisions from Manager's Bulletin 25-006.
- Extends beginning farmer and rancher eligibility from 5 to 10 crop years.
- Updates additional premium subsidy rates: 15% (years 1-2), 13% (year 3), 11% (year 4), and 10% (years 5-10).

#### Revenue Protection Clarifications

- Establishes that harvest prices will equal projected prices when insufficient data prevents use of the approved methodology.
- Creates a reimbursement process for policyholders who paid additional revenue protection premiums in such cases.

#### Crop-Specific Improvements

- Fresh Market Tomatoes: Extends end of insurance period by one month in TN and SC to better cover late-season hurricanes (2027 crop year).
- Fresh Market Peppers: Adds insurance dates aligned with northern growing seasons to support Dollar Plan expansion into Northeastern states.
- Safflower: Moves the contract change date from December 31 to November 30, aligning with other spring crops and simplifying enrollment.

### Effective Dates and Public Comment

The EARP Final Rule became effective Nov. 30, 2025, for crops with a contract change date on or after that date (2026 crop year) and for the 2027 crop year as specified. USDA will accept public comments until January 27, 2026.

## Black Vulture Depredation Sub-Permit

All applicants for the depredation sub-permit must agree to the requirements found in the Authorizations and Conditions section of the black vulture depredation permitting page at <https://www.ldaf.la.gov/animals/livestock/livestock-programs-and-permitting>. These authorizations and conditions are part of the statewide permit issued by the USFWS to LDAF.

All approved applicants will be allowed to "take" up to five black vultures, provided the statewide total "take" has not exceeded 1,000. Approved applicants must report each "take" within 48 hours. If 1,000 vultures are harvested

in the state, applicants will receive an email informing them that they are no longer allowed to take any more vultures during the permit period.

Approved applicants are not allowed to take any other migratory bird species. If an approved applicant does not harvest any black vultures, they are still obligated to report "no birds taken" to [BlackVultureProgram@ldaf.state.la.us](mailto:BlackVultureProgram@ldaf.state.la.us) no later than December 31st.

# How Midsouth row crop producers fared in 2025

Row crop producers across the South faced another difficult year in 2025. Weather challenges led to wide yield variability across much of the region. Even where yields were strong, low commodity prices and persistently high input costs kept margins tight, leaving many operations near or below breakeven for a third straight year. Shifts in acreage were common, with corn gaining ground at the expense of cotton and, in some areas, soybeans.

Financial stress remains a major concern heading into 2026, as limited storage capacity, tighter credit conditions and low prices continue to pressure farm profits. To capture conditions across the south, we asked Extension agricultural economists in each state to provide a brief summary of the 2025 season. Their state-by-state perspectives are below.

## Arkansas

Arkansas row crop producers entered the 2025 crop year in one of the most financially challenging environments of the past decade, as crop receipts fell by \$465 million to \$4.46 billion, marking the third consecutive annual decline.

Corn led the downturn with a 31% year-over-year decline, followed by soybean and rice receipts, while cotton receipts remain soft due to acreage reductions. At the same time, production expenses remain elevated relative to historical averages, with fertilizer, seed, labor and interest costs continuing to pressure operating margins.

Across all principal crops, state-average net returns are projected to be negative, with breakeven prices and yields often 30%-40% above expected levels; late planting from generational flooding in April further increased downside risk. Record ad hoc assistance through ECAP (Emergency Commodity Assistance Program) and SDRP (Supplemental Disaster Relief Program) is expected to exceed \$1 billion and offset a portion of these losses. However, net farm income for the crop sector is still projected to remain negative even after accounting for program payments.

The mounting financial strain facing Arkansas producers continues as they confront low commodity prices, persistently high input costs and tighter credit conditions.

## Kentucky

Three consecutive years of lower prices have already put Kentucky producers in a difficult position, and this year's extreme yield variability is adding even more pressure. Some areas will post record yields, while others will

fall well below average — especially soybeans, which are currently rated in the worst condition of any state.

A major concern right now is the lack of soybeans in storage. At harvest, many producers moved beans rather than storing them due to uncertainty surrounding the trade dispute, leaving most available storage filled with corn. That decision removed the opportunity to take advantage of last month's rally in soybean futures, and many producers were unable to benefit from the price improvement when it finally arrived.

While diversified operations with livestock may still be close to breakeven, row crop-focused farms are likely hovering at or below breakeven for the third consecutive year, tightening cash reserves and leaving many operations increasingly vulnerable to financial stress or potential default.

## Louisiana

In Louisiana, corn acres increased by 330,000 acres (+75%) from 2024 to 2025. Most producers favored corn over cotton (and, to a lesser extent, soybeans) due to grain price competitiveness. Overall, yields were near the previous four-year average of 176 bushels per acre. Prices are finally becoming somewhat favorable for producers who elected to store their crop.

Like most of the Midsouth region, cotton acres in Louisiana were down year-over-year. Producers planted only 90,000 acres in 2025. Despite the low acreage, yields were at record highs at 1,314 pounds per acre, nearly a 250-pound-per-acre increase from the previous year. While yields were excellent, prices remained low. The high cost of production, coupled with the narrow price movement within the 66-68 cents per pound range in the spring, was a main factor behind the reduced acreage in the state.

Soybean acres in Louisiana were down year-over-year. Acreage for the oilseed is typically between 1.1 million and 1.2 million acres. However, the 2025 acreage was 790,000, mainly due to lackluster prices and trade uncertainty surrounding exports. Yields were the highest in five years, coming in at 54 bushels per acre.

Rice acres in Louisiana totaled 482,000 planted acres in 2025, the most since 2010. The yield per acre was 6,650 pounds, which is on par with the five-year average. High production costs and decreasing rice prices at harvest presented a major challenge for rice growers heading into the winter.

## Mississippi

Weather played a major role in Mississippi's 2025 crop. Frequent heavy rains delayed planting for many producers, and late-summer drought stressed crops, resulting in significant yield variability across the state. Soybeans remained the largest crop at 1.8 million acres, but growers shifted more toward corn than cotton, planting 900,000 acres of corn compared with 330,000 acres of cotton. Financial conditions remain difficult.

The price environment is still unfavorable, and because Mississippi producers harvest early and lack the storage capacity common in other states, many were unable to capitalize on the recent soybean price rally. High production costs continue to squeeze margins, leaving most producers facing negative profits for the third consecutive year. Looking ahead to 2026, a growing number of producers have expressed equity concerns as they evaluate their farm financing options.

## Tennessee

In Tennessee, 2025 row production was highly variable. Drought during July and August reduced yields and contributed to a second consecutive season of losses for many corn, soybean and cotton farmers. Cotton and soybean yields were hardest hit by the drought and will likely result in further downward revisions from current USDA yield estimates.

High input costs, low commodity prices and below trend yields resulted in per-acre losses between \$100 and \$250 for many producers. Before crop insurance and other government payments, Tennessee corn, cotton, soybean and wheat farmers are projected to lose over \$400 million in 2025. With substantial year-over-year losses, many producers will carry operating debt over into the next season for the second straight year.

Obtaining credit for the 2026 crop will be challenging for many producers without ad hoc government payments. Canola acres in Tennessee and Kentucky continued to expand in the fall of 2025, providing producers with an alternative to more traditional double-cropping systems. Growth in canola acreage has been driven by contracted acres, primarily in northwest Tennessee, to support a pilot program to produce sustainable aviation fuel.

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
