year, and the average cost for Thanksgiving dinner will be about \$6.50 to \$7 per person.

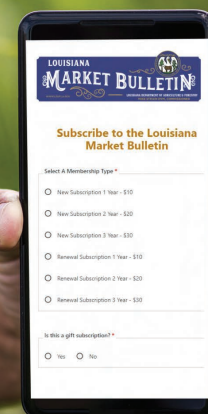

1 teaspoon garlic powder
½ teaspoon onion powder
¼ teaspoon cayenne
½ teaspoon dried thyme
2 heads Boston Bibb lettuce
Chopped green onions and parsley (optional)

Instructions:

You can chop the onions, peppers, and celery ahead of time and store in resalable plastic bags until needed. Heat olive oil in a medium skillet over medium-high heat. Add onions, red pepper, celery, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon pepper, Worcestershire sauce, and hot sauce, then sauté for 7 minutes. Meanwhile, in a small bowl combine the rock shrimp, lemon juice, 1 tablespoon of olive oil, ½ teaspoon salt and pepper, paprika, garlic powder, onion powder, cayenne, thyme, and set aside. Stir the fresh minced garlic into the veggies in the sauté pan, and cook for 1 more minute. Add Richard's Andouille Smoked Sausage and diced tomatoes and bring to a simmer, then add the shrimp and cook for 2-3 more minutes. HONEY APPLE PORK RIBS

Submitted by Kjun Bees

Ingredients:

Rib rub:

2 tablespoons ground black pepper
 2 teaspoons granulated onion
 2 teaspoons granulated garlic
 1 tablespoon sea salt
 1½ teaspoon ground white pepper
 3 tablespoons paprika
 1 tablespoon Cajun seasoning
 ½ tablespoons celery seeds
 1 cup KJUN honey

BBQ rib Ingredients:

2 racks of pork ribs, each cut into four sections
 3 quarts apple juice (approximate)

Instructions:

Rib rub: Mix all of the ingredients except the honey in a sealed, air-tight container. Mix (or shake) thoroughly until all of the dry ingredients are completely mixed. When ready to use, add the honey, and mix thoroughly. Store in a sealed air-tight container until the ribs are ready to be placed on the grill.

NOTE: Use a medium flavored honey for this recipe. A good choice would be our standard summer harvest honey from any part of south Louisiana. Use the Cajun Seasoning of your choice, but our favorite for this recipe is Jeanpierre's Special Blend Season-All. This recipe makes ½ cup of seasoning rub. If you want to use less at a time, just mix the rub with honey at a 1:2 seasoning: honey ratio. You can make the dry blend in advance and mix with honey immediately before you plan to use it. Use a 1:3 seasoning: honey ratio for a sweeter flavor.

BBQ ribs: Place sectioned pork ribs into a pressure cooker. Pour enough apple juice over the ribs to completely cover the ribs. Close the pressure cooker and apply heat. Cook on high (or 15 psi) for 25 minutes once the cooker starts to steam. (Cook thicker cuts for 30 minutes.) Turn off heat and allow pressure to drop slowly. Remove ribs from the apple juice, and discard the liquid. Coat ribs thoroughly with the honey rib rub on both sides. Place ribs on the grill under medium heat for 5-10 minutes until slightly charred and well smoked. Flip ribs one time and cook for an additional 5-10 minutes until slightly charred and well smoked. Remove from heat and serve.

NOTE: If grilling, pecan or apple woods best complement the flavor of these ribs. This recipe also works great with any wild game including deer, elk, and antelope ribs.

\$71M of timber lost to summer wildfires; more damage expected

Wildfires that engulfed more than 50,000 acres of Louisiana forests during this summer's record-breaking heat and drought dealt a blow of at least \$71 million to the state's timber sector, according to LSU AgCenter estimates.

That figure is expected to climb higher as wildfires continue to burn in some areas.

"The fires and drought conditions are ongoing. There were several fires last week," said Robbie Hutchins, an area forester with the LSU AgCenter. He is based in central Louisiana, which is known for its pine forests and has been the scene of some of the largest blazes, including the 31,000-acre Tiger Island Fire in Beauregard Parish.

A total of 52,883 acres of forests statewide had burned as of mid-October, Hutchins said. Most of that timber would normally be

worth at least \$1,500 per acre, and little of it is salvageable now.

Conservatively, Hutchins estimates 75% of trees on burned acreage are a total loss or considerably devalued, amounting to a loss of about \$60 million. But the percentage of unsellable timber is likely closer to 90%, he said, putting the loss estimate at \$71 million.

That figure could be even higher depending on whether the damaged stands were made up of smaller trees destined for pulpwood production or larger, more valuable ones that could have been used for sawtimber.

Producers' economic woes are not limited to the timber and income they've lost. They also are facing decisions about whether to go to the expense of reforestation, a process that takes years.

While companies manage a large portion of the timberland destroyed by the fires, many

of the burned trees are owned by individuals with just a handful of acres, often inherited from family. Forest landowners do not have options for insuring their timber.

Timber is Louisiana's No. 1 agricultural commodity, generating more than \$10 billion yearly in economic activity. Logging companies, sawmills and other forestry businesses are major employers in areas such as Beauregard, Vernon and Rapides parishes, which suffered some of the worst wildfire damage.

In Louisiana, the fall is the driest time of year, and conditions this year are especially conducive to wildfires. With burn bans still in effect in many parishes, it is important for people to heed rules to avoid starting any more fires.

Our forest landowners need all the help they can get," Hutchins said.

Drought, low numbers could mean slow start to Louisiana season

Duck season opens in Louisiana's West Zone on November 11, followed by the East Zone on November 18. Unfortunately, severe drought continues across the state, and poor habitat conditions appear to be impacting duck numbers.

"The 2023 November survey estimate of 584,000 ducks in Louisiana's coastal region and Little River basin is the lowest on record," said Jason Olszak, waterfowl study leader with the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF). While some species (mallards, shovelers, wigeon, ring-necked ducks and canvasbacks) were up from 2022 estimates, the numbers remain extremely low compared to long-term averages.

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A little further south in Venice, John Randle hosted three youth hunters over the weekend. "The boys shot pretty easy limits both days. It was all teal (mostly greenwings) except for a pair of gray ducks on Saturday. The ponds we hunted were light on feed, but the teal were packed with tiny dark seeds, so they are finding food somewhere nearby," Randle said.

A bit further west, in the Cocodrie area, Captain Anthony Kyzar with Cajun Fishing and Hunting Charters also had a good youth weekend. "There were a good many ducks in the area: blue- and green-winged teal, scaup, redheads, gadwalls, wigeon and pintail," Kyzar said.

The low river has pushed more saltwater into the marshes in southeast Louisiana, threatening water supplies as far up as New Orleans. The increased salinity has taken a toll on the submerged aquatics in some areas.

Steven Savoye hunts in the Pointe-a-la-Hache area. "While out tending blinds last weekend, we saw very few ducks. The saltwater has definitely affected the area, and there's very little grass in the ponds," he said. Anglers running throughout the marsh in nearby Hopedale reported seeing few ducks while traversing the area.

A mild cold front is moving into the state, bringing cooler temperatures and some much-needed rain. The overcast skies, rain and cooler temps will make it feel like duck hunting weather. Hopefully more birds are on the way too.

Mottled Duck reminder: *The season is closed for mottled ducks during the first 15 days of the season in both zones, and the bag limit will be one bird per day for the remaining 45 days.*

Assessing tree damage after an extended drought

Excessive drought conditions in Louisiana are quickly becoming a natural disaster that will have effects on gardens, landscape plants and natural areas all across the state for some time. We may not understand the full extent of the damage for years. The U.S. Drought Mitigation Center has categorized a substantial portion of Louisiana's parishes as being in an "exceptional drought" state for an extended period.

Without supplemental irrigation, many lawns have gone dormant or have areas where the lawn will not recover. Many smaller bedding plants and shrubs have died. As we have experienced months of drought, we are really beginning to see the damage to trees. Shrubs such as azaleas, junipers, spireas, camellias, have been affected too.

You may have noticed that some trees are more susceptible than others. In my personal observations and in talking with people in the forestry, landscape and green industries, magnolia species and pines appear to be the most frequently affected. In research conducted in the southeastern United States, scientists found that pines and mesophytic species (those that thrive in moderate moisture conditions) are sensitive to drought while oaks are more drought tolerant.

Assessing damage after extended droughts is essential to determine the health and condition of your trees. Extended droughts can weaken trees and make them more susceptible to various issues.

Some signs that your tree is in distress: diminished leaf production, increased defoliation, interior thinning or dieback and smaller leaf size. If you want to assess the damage to our trees, start with a visual inspection of your trees to identify visible signs of damage.

Look for wilting or discolored leaves that are brown or yellow and prematurely dropping leaves, as they can be a sign of drought stress. Look for leaf scorch, where the edges of leaves turn brown, and check for cracks in the bark. Look for dying or dead branches. Many trees will sacrifice parts of the plant to survive. Check the overall canopy of the tree. Does it have a reduced canopy density or sparse foliage? This can be an indicator of drought damage.

You can check to see if a stem or branch is dead by gently pulling down on it to see how pliable it is. If it bounces back, it's likely alive. If it snaps, it might be a goner. You can also scratch the bark of the stem. If you see green underneath, the plant is alive. If it is brown, it could be dead, depending on the species.

If you have real concerns that a tree is dead, another home assessment can be to check the condition of the tree's root zone. Examine the roots for signs of damage such as root dieback or root rot. Gently dig around the

base of the tree to inspect the roots without causing further harm. You can use a broom or large brush to gently sweep away soil.

It's often beneficial to consult a certified arborist or tree care professional for a more comprehensive evaluation. Arborists have the expertise to assess tree health and recommend appropriate treatments or interventions. A list of licensed arborists can be found on the website of the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry.

After assessing the damage, implement a supplemental watering and care plan to help the tree recover. Regularly monitor the tree's health and progress. Adequate watering, mulching and pruning may be necessary to aid recovery.

In severe cases, if a tree has sustained significant damage and poses a risk of falling or is unlikely to recover, it may need to be pruned or removed. A professional tree service can help with this decision and the necessary work.

Drought-stressed trees are more susceptible to pests and diseases. Keep an eye out for any signs of infestation or disease and address them promptly. Due to persistent drought conditions and multiple instances of freezing in recent years, the trees in our area have experienced higher levels of stress than usual, and this will make them more vulnerable to high winds, disease and pest pressures.

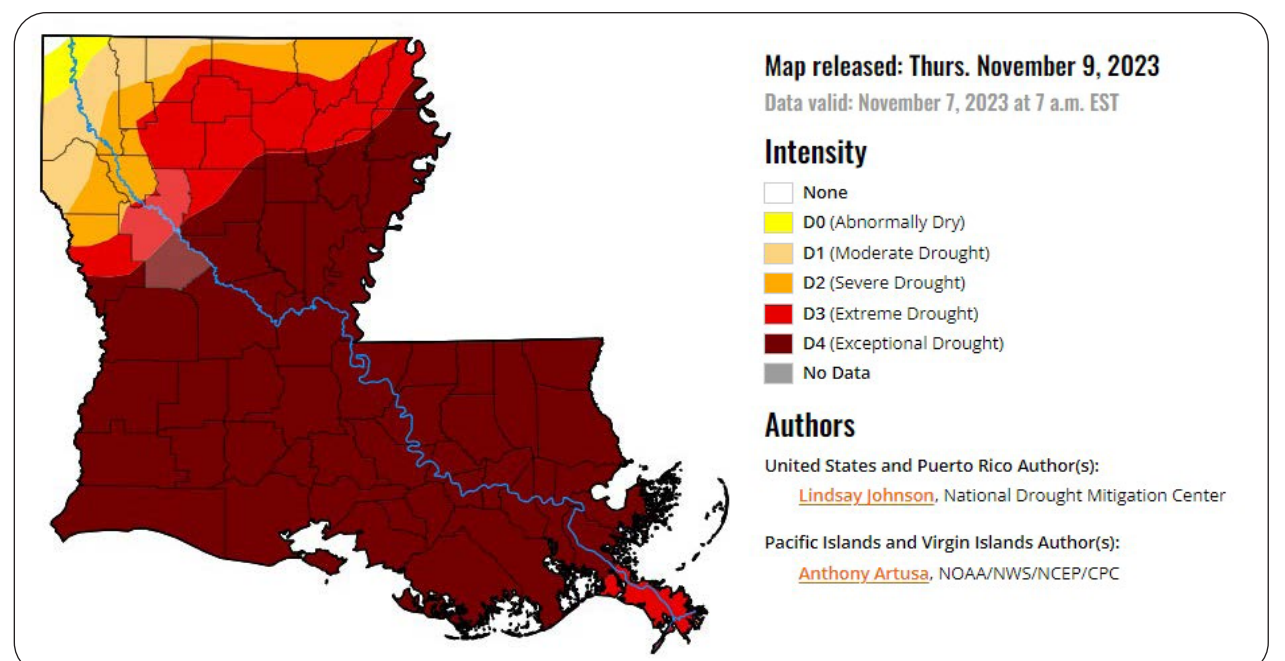
Remember that tree recovery from drought damage can be a slow process, and it may take several years for a tree to fully regain its health and vigor. Regular maintenance and care can help prevent future drought-related damage and promote tree resilience. Don't give up on your trees immediately. You can take measures to help them survive as mentioned above.

Always consult with a local arborist or horticultural expert for guidance tailored to the specific conditions in your area and the tree species in question.

The workshop provided an invaluable opportunity for field staff to receive hands-on training on a range of important topics. Dr. Ansel Rankins, LDAF Assistant Commissioner, attended the event and expressed his satisfaction with the engaging and informative sessions.

"Having the opportunity for our field staff to receive hands-on training on the symptomology of herbicide damage on tomato and cucurbit crops was incredibly valuable," remarked Dr. Rankins. "The workshop provided a comprehensive overview of herbicide drift management, including proper tank cleaning demonstrations, pesticide safety protocols,



licensing and testing, risk management, crop loss reporting, and worker safety measures." The event also was used for recertification of private and commercial applicator licenses.

The Herbicide Drift Management Workshop aimed to enhance the participants' knowledge and understanding of herbicide drift and its impact on agricultural operations. The event featured expert speakers and interactive sessions, ensuring that attendees gained practical insights and strategies to effectively manage and mitigate herbicide drift risks.

The next Herbicide Drift Management Workshop is scheduled to take place in north Louisiana in May 2024. This initiative is part of the LSU AgCenter's ongoing commitment to supporting Louisiana's agricultural community by providing valuable education and resources to assist farmers and growers in safeguarding their crops and livelihoods.

Make your land more drought resilient

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service can help you conserve water and build resilience to drought, through conservation practices that improve irrigation efficiency, boost soil health, and manage grazing lands.

Improving your irrigation efficiency ensures each drop of water is used wisely. Saving water on your farm can help during drought and can offset rising water costs; reduce expenditures for energy, chemicals, and labor; and enhance revenues through higher crop yields and improved crop quality. Funded conservation practices include conversion to more efficient irrigation systems, such as micro-irrigation or subsurface drip irrigation, installation of irrigation pipeline, irrigation water management, structures for water control, and flow meters. Tools like drip irrigation, which provides water precisely where and when it's needed, can achieve greater precision with flow meters and soil moisture sensors.

In addition, soil health conservation practices, such as reduced- or no-till, cover crops, mulching and residue management can help to make your soil, and the plants you grow or animals you raise, healthier. Healthier soil can absorb and retain more water for longer periods of time, making your farm or ranch more resilient to drought. Using soil health practices, you can conserve water by increasing your soil's water-holding capacity and use conservation tillage to keep the ground covered, reducing water loss through transpiration and evaporation.

And soil health practices increase organic matter, and each pound of organic matter can hold up to 20 pounds of water. That means less money and time spent on inputs like water and fertilizer, which make your operation more profitable.

Drought also impacts grazing lands, and NRCS works with you to increase the resilience of your livestock operation. Ranchers can adapt to dry conditions in two main ways: increasing the availability and suitability of forage and ensuring that cattle have an adequate and reliable source of water. For forage, rotational or prescribed grazing (rotating cattle among pastures) can relieve pressure on stressed vegetation and ensure a more consistent supply of forage for animals. NRCS conservationists can also work with you to plant more drought-tolerant forage species, plants best suited to local soils and conditions. For reliable sources of water, NRCS can help you with installing watering facilities, water wells, or water pipeline for livestock.

What is pesticide/herbicide drift

Pesticide spray drift is the movement of pesticide dust or droplets through the air at the time of application or soon after, to any site other than the area intended. Pesticide droplets are produced by spray nozzles used in application equipment for spraying pesticides on crops, forests, turf and home gardens. Some other pesticides are formulated as very fine dry particles (commonly referred to as dust formulations).

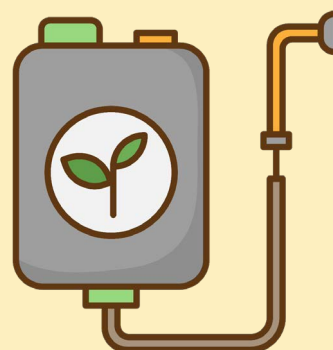
Pesticide drift of sprays and dusts can affect people's health and the environment, and damage nearby crops.

Health and environmental risks — Pesticide drift can pose health risks when sprays and dusts are carried by the wind and deposited on other areas:

- Nearby homes, schools, and playgrounds
- Farm workers in adjacent fields
- Wildlife, plants, and streams and other water bodies

Economic effects — Pesticide drift can cause economic loss:

- Drift of herbicides can injure some crops. Crops on nearby farms can become unsellable if the drifting pesticide is not registered for use on the crop.
- State and local agencies receive thousands of complaints about drifting pesticides each year and spend substantial resources investigating drift complaints.

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#NoTillNovember: *Learn how keeping the stubble can help your farm throughout No-Till November 2023*

This November, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is again playing off the popular awareness campaign, "No-Shave November" with our very own campaign, "#NoTillNovember." No-till (also called zero tillage or direct seeding/drilling) is a way of growing crops or pasture year over year with minimal soil disturbance through tillage.

Disturbing your soil through tillage reduces water infiltration, increases runoff, and can make the soil less productive. Tillage also disrupts the soil's natural biological cycles, damages soil structure, and increases erosion.

When you instead keep the stubble by reducing tillage or transitioning to a full no-till system you reap a multitude of benefits. These include, but are not limited to, improving the soil's structure which helps it retain more water, saving energy by reducing passes through the field, improving nutrient cycling in the field and increased soil organic matter.

Soil is a precious and irreplaceable resource. Reducing tillage on your land is one of the key principles of soil health, along with maximizing soil cover, the presence of living roots, and biodiversity. Working within these principles can help rebuild your soil health system and preserve this vital resource for future generations.

Whether you have never heard of no-till farming, are no-till curious but haven't taken the leap, or have already adopted no-till practices, our goal throughout November is to help you learn more about the practice, how it can help your farm and how NRCS can assist you in reducing tillage on your land.

Whether you farm thousands of acres of row crops, tend a small vegetable garden, or manage pasture for livestock, no-till can benefit your farm.

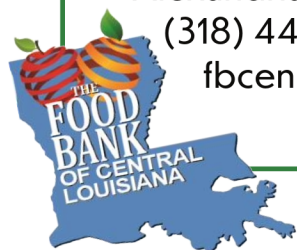
- No-till farming and the story of Springhill Farms in Clinton, Kentucky, where Jerry Peery and Jonathan Reynolds are having a generational impact on their soil health through no-till farming. We will also visit

Reddick Farms in Bardwell, Kentucky, where Brad and Joel Reddick have transformed their soil through no-till and other soil health practices as the farm prepares to be passed down to the next generation.

- How pairing no-till with additional soil health practices such as cover crops can increase organic matter, reduce inputs, and lead to higher yields.
- How no-till farming can reduce your costs and help you play a role in combating the negative impacts of climate change and farm more climate-smart.
- How no-till can benefit your operation no matter where your farm is located or the size of your operation.

NRCS has a wide variety of resources available in multiple languages to help you learn more about no-till farming, many of which will be highlighted during #NoTillNovember.
