WE ALL SCREAM... FOR QUINTIN'S NATURAL ICE CREAM & SORBET

In a recent episode of CRAWFISH TALES with Commissioner Mike Strain, we visited Quintin's Natural Ice Cream & Sorbet in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Before you say that ice cream is merely a summertime treat, think again! Louisiana's climate means it's really ice cream season year-round in our state. Some would even argue that fall and winter are the best times to eat ice cream because it won't melt quite as fast as it does in the summer heat.

Since 1998, Quintin has been churning out delightful, sweet treats in his New Orleans kitchen, including ice cream, sorbets, sherbets, and specialty ice cream desserts, like baked Alaska and their latest craveable creation, Screamer's Ice Cream sandwiches.

The creamery never adds artificial flavorings or coloring and uses the most natural ingredients possible to flavor their small batches of elegant and decadent



desserts. Quintin's has two batch freezers that turn his creations into ice cream... from there, it's sent to scoop-serve locations, anywhere from Tulane University to Vacherie's in the French Quarter.

Quintin's sells pints of their ice creams and sorbets at grocery stores in the Greater New Orleans area, including Baton Rouge and Mandeville. You can also find their ice cream at New Orleans restaurants, like Galatoire's and GW Fins, as well as numerous New Orleans festivals throughout the year.

Owner Quintin Quinlivan started making ice cream as a little kid; later, he trained in Switzerland, Paris, and London before working as a pastry chef in the New Orleans area.

Commissioner Strain, who graciously sampled Quintin's ice cream, says it's all absolutely delicious. "You can taste the passion," says Strain. "That's what you get when you buy Certified Louisiana products... you get local ingredients, yes, but you also get a taste of Louisiana, our culture."

Quintin admits it is a passion. "I think my secret is my love for ice cream," says Quintin with a laugh. "I also like being able to be creative... I have the opportunity to work with other chefs and local ingredients, like satsumas, local strawberries, blueberries, or blackberries, whatever we can find."

Quintin's Natural Ice Cream & Sorbet has been a Certified Louisiana and Creole company for the last five years, and he's always proud to showcase his Louisiana products made locally in New Orleans. In fact, Quintin's recipe for Creole Cream Cheese ice cream dates back over 100 years with tricks he learned from the Centanni family, who owned and operated

Statewide burn ban modified: Some agricultural burning to resume

Following consultation among the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF), the Louisiana State Fire Marshal's Office (SFM), the Governor's Office of Homeland Security (GOHSEP), and the National Weather Service (NWS), the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry has modified the burn ban order to rescind the prohibition on agricultural burning, EXCEPT for standing sugarcane, effective as of 5:00 p.m., September 27.

This modified burn ban order by LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, DVM, allows agricultural burning, including but not limited to prescribed burning, to resume EXCEPT for standing sugarcane. The burning of sugarcane fields is allowed after harvest. LDAF will post updates regarding the burning of standing sugarcane once conditions improve.

The Office of Louisiana State Fire Marshal also modified the statewide burn ban re-issued on August 25 to renew and establish certain exceptions. The active burn ban order in effect as of August 25, 2023, at 12 p.m., which prohibits all private burning, with no limitations, pursuant to authority under R.S. 40:1602, is being modified in the following ways:

- Provides for individual parishes to opt out of the statewide burn ban.
- Provides for fire chiefs to resume granting burn permissions.
- Provides for certain live fire training to resume with written permission from the SFM.

The SFM modified order went into effect Friday, September 29, 2023, at 5 p.m. The status of this burn ban order will continue to be reconsidered on a weekly basis.

BLOODY MARY PICKLED QUAIL EGGS

Submitted by New Orleans Distillers, LLC

Ingredients:

1 dozen eggs
 1 cup canned tomato sauce
 1 ½ cups apple cider vinegar
 ½ cup New Orleans Distillers vodka
 ½ cup Piratus 151 rum
 1 teaspoon celery seed
 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish
 ¼ teaspoon crushed red pepper
 2 tablespoons sugar
 ¼ teaspoon salt, or more to taste
 Freshly ground black pepper to taste

Instructions:

In a large nonreactive saucepan, cover the eggs with water by 1 inch. Bring to a boil over high heat and boil for 10 minutes. Plunge the eggs into a bath of icy water and let cool completely before peeling. Peel the eggs and pack them in a sterilized quart jar. Whisk together the tomato sauce, vinegar, vodka, rum, celery seed, horseradish, crushed red pepper, sugar, salt, and black pepper in a small saucepan. Bring the mixture to a boil over high heat. Once the mixture boils, reduce the heat to low and simmer for 5 minutes. Pour the brine over the eggs so that they are completely covered. Store in the fridge.

Let the eggs cure in the fridge for at least a few days before consuming. They'll get better the longer they sit in the brine and will last in the fridge about a month.



CHICKEN AND SAUSAGE GUMBO

Submitted by Rick Gremillion

Ingredients:

2 pounds chicken leg quarters or thighs
 1 pound sausage
 1 large onion, chopped
 1 bunch green onions, chopped
 1 tablespoon garlic, chopped
 1 stalk celery, chopped
 1 small can Rotel tomatoes
 3 basil leaves, chopped
 3 tablespoons parsley, chopped
 3 tablespoons dark roux
 Worcestershire sauce
 Liquid smoke
 Bouillon cubes, paste or granules

Instructions:

In a separate pot, start the chicken boiling with all of the fat and skin attached in about 1 gallon of mildly salted water. Boil until chicken is cooked, remove the chicken and debone, skim as much of the fat off of the stock and save. Cut sausage lengthwise and then slice and put in gumbo pot (about 2 gallon size, black iron if available) to brown, take it right to the edge of burnt, drain as much of the fat as you can. Add all of the other ingredients EXCEPT the roux, chicken, and bouillon. Cook down until the onions are clear, adding your chicken stock as necessary. Add the roux to the mix while slowly adding the chicken stock and constantly stirring to dissolve the roux. Add water to make about 1 gallon. Add bouillon (this usually is very salty, don't add extra salt yet!) according to directions. Bring gumbo to a boil and then turn down to a heavy simmer and let it go about 30 minutes. Add chicken, turn down to light simmer for 15-30 minutes. Taste and add salt, pepper, cayenne, or Cajun seasoning to taste. Serve over rice, some like to sprinkle filé on top. It's always better the next day!

Please continue to abide by the burn bans that remain in place at this time. As government officials opt out of the statewide burn ban in their respective parishes, LDAF will reflect the updates on the Louisiana Burn Ban Map located at <https://bit.ly/LouisianaBurnBanMap>.

LDAF's Office of Forestry is tasked with responding to wildfires at any hour, and crews are hard at work throughout the state.

Springhill juveniles arrested for shoplifting and arson

On September 12, Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Forestry Enforcement Division agents responded to an arson event in Webster Parish.

Webster Parish Fire Department advised LDAF agents that four unnamed juveniles had allegedly stolen a flare gun from the local Walmart in Springhill, LA, and proceeded to shoot flares into a field behind the Walmart, starting fires in the area. Thanks to the quick response by the Webster Parish Fire Department and LDAF fire crews, these fires only burned one acre of field area.

Upon investigation, Webster Parish Fire Department found several used flares in the area where the fires occurred. LDAF enforcement agents contacted the Springhill Police Department (SPD), who identified the four juveniles. After a joint investigation between SPD and LDAF, three of the juveniles were arrested. The Springhill police charged them with theft by shoplifting. They were also charged with two counts of simple arson by LDAF enforcement agents. The fourth juvenile is still at large.

Their names and ages are being withheld due to their ages. If convicted, each juvenile could receive four years in a Juvenile Detention Center.

The crime of simple arson, where the damage amounts to five hundred dollars or more, carries a fine of not more than \$15,000 and imprisonment at hard labor for not more than 15 years. Where the damage is less than \$500, the offender shall be fined no more than \$2,500 or imprisoned with or without hard labor for no more than five years or both.

All persons accused of crimes are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Saltwater intrusion & Louisiana agriculture

As surface water salinities continue to increase across most of coastal Louisiana, farmers nurserymen, and fishermen are maintaining a heightened awareness of the drought-induced situation and planning contingencies where necessary to maintain viable production as well as the protection and wise use of soil and water resources. Irrigation and water use options or alternatives may vary widely among producers due to topography, local geology, and other factors. Recent data from remote U.S. Geological Survey and Coastal Reference Monitoring System water monitoring stations along the Louisiana Gulf Coast show the following surface salinity measurements:

- 30 parts per thousand (ppth) on Cameron, LA (9/22/23),
- 30 ppth slightly inland from the coast at the Cameron/Vermilion Parish line (9/22/23),
- 17 ppth in Vermilion Bay at the Intracoastal Canal (9/25/23), and
- 13 ppth at Black Bay near Point a-la-Hache (9/22/23).

For reference, the average salinity level of the Gulf of Mexico is 35 ppth. Without the seasonally typical rainfall patterns to provide a freshwater offset, these salinities continue to encroach farther inland than normal via coastal bays, canals, bayous, and rivers.

Cattle — The agriculture enterprise physically nearest the Gulf is often beef cattle production. For generations, many cattle have been grazed along the coast especial-

ly in Cameron, Vermilion, and Plaquemines parishes, in tidal marsh areas where seasonal salinities normally fluctuate. A positive and often unintended benefit of cattle grazing in these areas is the enhanced biological function of the coastal grassland ecosystem which developed under centuries of influence of similar large, hooved grazers, and any concerns related to drinking water for cattle being grazed in these coastal areas is usually caused by tropical weather systems, rather than drought.

According the LSU AgCenter, water salinity of less than 3,000 parts per million (ppm), or 3 ppth is safe for cattle, and 3,000 to 5,000 ppm is regarded as satisfactory, but this salinity level may cause scour or diarrhea in some animals. While considered safe for some cattle, 5,000 ppm – 10,000 ppm salinities are too much for pregnant or nursing cows, calves and older cows which should not be exposed to drinking water salinities higher than 5,000 ppm. Water with a salinity measuring higher than 10,000 ppm is unsafe for all cattle. The salinity tolerance threshold for horses is probably less than half that of cattle. Additionally, horses may refuse to drink salt tinged water even if the salinity level is safe, which may lead to gastrointestinal issues, i.e. colic. Horse owners suspecting that their watering sources may become saline should consult their veterinarian.

Rice and crawfish — In the rice and crawfish production region of southwest Louisiana, saltwater intrusion is a rather common concern, especially for farmers using local sur-

face water for irrigation. Their surface water sources are often drainage canals, natural coulees, bayous, or rivers accessed via riparian ownership or agreement. While crawfish can be fairly tolerant of elevated salinity levels (newly hatched young can survive up to 15,000 ppm, and sub-adult crawfish up to 30,000), rice, the vegetative forage that they rely on in a farm production system, cannot. For fields used for rice/crawfish rotation, many farmers do their absolute best to avoid salinities greater than 1,000 ppm, whereas a 750-ppm threshold is ideal. The soil salinity damage threshold in sugarcane is 640-1,200 ppm.

Citrus — In Plaquemines Parish, where the Mississippi River's diminished flow is being countered by intrusion of saline Gulf water, the citrus industry is the key plant-based agriculture enterprise in the sale of both citrus fruit and containerized trees. Regarding the encroaching Mississippi River salinities, the greatest potential impact in Plaquemines may be to citrus nurseries rather than to citrus orchards. The nurseries rely much more heavily on irrigation, and potted seedlings are typically more sensitive to salt water than mature trees in the ground.

While no citrus nurseries or orchards have yet been affected, concerned citrus growers and nurserymen are planning contingencies and farm-specific innovations that will allow them to maintain production. Citrus nursery seedlings are moderately sensitive to salinities, with an accepted threshold of 500 ppm.

USDA to measure bee losses in Louisiana

This month, the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will begin reaching out to bee and honey producers to collect information for its Quarterly Colony Loss survey. This survey measures colony losses to determine the stability of the regional bee



population and helps monitor health of those hives.

"While Colony Collapse Disorder is a continuing threat, this survey will also identify the hives lost during the winter months. The majority of Louisiana cash crops depend on bee pollination during the growing season, so it is important to start out the season with an understanding of our pollination needs," said Kathy Broussard, Louisiana State Statistician. "Reports produced from the data collected help address key issues facing the Louisiana apiculture industry such as bee health, competition for apiary sites, and maintaining confidence of consumers and regulators."

In Louisiana, National Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NASDA) enumerators will survey a sample of local beekeepers. By participating, these producers

ensure NASS provides timely, accurate, and objective data which all stakeholders can use to make sound business decisions. Accurate information helps reduce uncertainty and provides reliable facts on bee colony health.

Information provided by respondents for all NASS surveys is confidential by law. NASS safeguards privacy of all responses and publishes only aggregate data, ensuring no individual operation or producer can be identified.

NASS will publish survey results on its website in the Honey Bee Colonies report in August 2024. This and all other NASS reports are available online at www.nass.usda.gov/Publications/.

Creation of a new center through LSU AgCenter will aid in mitigating damage of invasive species

Louisiana is home to some of the most destructive invasive species found in the United States. The LSU AgCenter has long worked to monitor and manage these non-native insects, weeds and wildlife.

To better understand and control invasive species, the LSU AgCenter is developing a Center of Research Excellence for the Study of Invasive Species. The Louisiana Board of Regents approved the creation of the center on Sept. 20.

Invasive species cause \$120 billion in damage in the U.S each year, harming agricultural production, human habitation, forestland, wetland or native species. They threaten economic and ecological stability, displace native species and increase agricultural production costs.

Matt Lee, LSU vice president for agriculture and dean of the LSU College of Agriculture, said this center will provide pioneering and transformational solutions to problems associated with invasive species in the southern United States, with the aim of mitigating the harm these organisms cause.


“The center will take a holistic approach to address invasive species issues. We will conduct research into management practices or changes in policies, foster the training of students or practitioners and provide opportunities to increase collaborations among research teams,” Lee said.

In addition to the LSU AgCenter, the Center of Research Excellence for the Study of Invasive Species will involve LSU A&M and other Louisiana institutions of higher education with appropriate faculty expertise and will seek cooperation with fitting governmental and nongovernmental agencies.

Lee said the center will provide a framework for the creation of the Mississippi River Invasive Species Consortium, with the LSU AgCenter working as the coordinating institution for research, education and outreach efforts involving partner institutions in states along the Mississippi River.

The LSU AgCenter has several scientists conducting research on the identification, monitoring, management and economic impact of invasive species in Louisiana. LSU AgCenter entomologist Rodrigo Diaz has worked with invasive weeds and insects looking at biological control methods.

Diaz helped to identify the roseau cane scale which was implicated in the die-offs of roseau cane, an important marsh plant along the Mississippi River's Bird's Foot Delta in the Gulf of Mexico.

“Having direct access to a multidisciplinary team of scientists will aid our research on invasive insects and weeds,” Diaz said. “We can expedite the development of comprehensive management plans by harnessing the diverse skills and techniques within our team, which include taxonomic and molecular identification of organisms, the creation of advanced monitoring methods, tracking the dispersal of pests into new regions and evaluating control tactics.”

Glen Gentry has devoted much of his recent research efforts to developing a bait for feral hogs, which cause more than \$90 million in agricultural damage annually in Louisiana.

Gentry said the center will allow a more collaborative and focused effort on feral swine control.

“This type of networking from entities on either an existing or up-and-coming invasive species threats would create a more complete picture of the issue at hand,” Gentry said. “Because researchers would not be competing but collaborating, the available dollars would have a more significant impact on solving these issues.”

Other invasive species, such as apple snails, giant salvinia and the guava root-knot nematode, have threatened waterways, fisheries and agriculture.

Mike Salassi, LSU AgCenter executive associate vice president overseeing research said the center is essential for taking a proactive approach to managing threats from invasive species and the LSU AgCenter is the ideal place for it.

“The lower Mississippi River Delta region is vulnerable to these threats because the large volume of trade through ports makes it a likely route of introduction of invasive species,” Salassi said. “In Louisiana, climatic, agricultural and geographical features of the region make it susceptible to impacts from the establishment of invasive species.”

Lee said the LSU AgCenter is working with the Louisiana congressional delegation and other key congressional agriculture leaders in Washington, D.C., to find a possible solution to mitigate the economic, environmental and social threats that new non-native pest species could create to the safety and security of U.S. food and natural resources.

“Through these efforts, researchers, educators and producers across the entire Mississippi River watershed can create and introduce programs and plans that will aid in identifying and mitigating these threats before their full impact is realized,” Lee said.

Rapides Parish woman arrested for setting fires which resulted in millions of dollars of damage

On September 22, investigators with the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Enforcement Division arrested Laura McLaughlin of Pitkin, LA, for setting wildfires in Rapides Parish.

In the early morning hours of August 24, LDAF fire crews and the Plainview Fire Department responded to multiple wildfires set in the Union Hill area in Rapides Parish. LDAF enforcement investigators, Rapides Parish Sheriff's Office detectives, and Office of State Fire Marshal deputies immediately began investigating the wildfires as arson was suspected to be the cause.

Originating in Rapides Parish and burning into Vernon Parish, the fires consumed over 7,000 acres of timber and one residence. These fires raged for several days and continue to be monitored. The total value of the timber burned is estimated to be over 2 million

dollars. The suppression cost associated with these fires is estimated at 2.7 million dollars.

McLaughlin was booked in the Rapides Parish Jail on four counts of simple arson and one count of obstruction of justice. The bond was set at \$25,000.

The crime of simple arson, where the damage amounts to five hundred dollars or more, carries a fine of not more than \$15,000 and imprisonment at hard labor for not more than 15 years. Where the damage is less than \$500, the offender shall be fined no more than \$2,500 or imprisoned with or without hard labor for no more than five years or both.

All persons accused of crimes are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Write down three things each day for which you are thankful.

According to research, people who regularly express appreciation have more good feelings, get better sleep, and even have more robust immune systems.

Keep things basic. Did you enjoy your morning coffee? Put it in writing. Have you observed a lovely dog? Include it. You'll notice an expanding array of pleasures as time passes.

The 'is it true?' test

Every unfavorable idea should be contested with the question "Is it true?"

Cognitive behavioral therapy claims that questioning our beliefs might lead to a shift in perspective. We frequently accept our pessimistic views without challenging them.

The next time your mind tells you, "I'm not good at this," ask yourself, "Is that true?" It's probably not, spoiler alert.

The 5-minute nature break

Spend time in nature, even if it's only a park close by. A study found that going on a nature walk reduces rumination, an act of excessive thought that frequently veers toward pessimism. Taking a 90-minute walk in nature lowered negative repetitive thoughts and decreased activity in a specific brain area related to this, both in depressed and non-depressed individuals.

On the other hand, a 90-minute walk in a city setting didn't show these benefits.

No forest close by? No issue. According to studies, simply viewing images of nature or taking care of a plant might be beneficial.

The laughter prescription

Watch a comedy, hear a joke, or just laugh out of the blue. Why it works. Laughing heartily can lower stress hormones and raise endorphin levels.

Worrying about the future or dwelling on the past is a proven method to conjure up unfavorable thoughts. Try to stay in the here and now. Simply be, take in the noises of the environment, and feel the air.

The propensity for negativity in our brains is an evolutionary holdover. Simple techniques can shift your perspective:

- Keep an appreciation diary.
- Use the "Is it True?" question to dispel unfavorable beliefs.
- Take pauses in nature.
- Laugh!
- To stop dwelling on the past or future, center yourself on the here and now.

Starting the farm succession/ transition planning process

Succession planning for farmers and ranchers is important, but it's also complicated. Land, equipment, equity, your own retirement — how do you even begin to think about handing your business over to the next generation? First, you need a trusted team of professionals, including your insurance agent. Then, you need to start the succession planning process as soon as possible to ensure a plan is in place before you're no longer able to run the farm.

The best way to transfer a family farm or ranch varies from family to family. That's why the first step of an effective farm inheritance and succession plan is to define your goals by prioritizing your needs first — after all, these are your assets. Then, you can incorporate the needs of future generations who will also benefit from your succession plan.

Identify your own needs

Most importantly, your goals should factor in your needs in retirement and as you age. In the process of passing the family farm or ranch to the next generation, you may start letting your heirs manage the land, purchase farm equipment and take on more responsibilities. But you might need income from assets like cell towers, billboards, natural gas and rental properties to support your lifestyle in your retirement years. If these revenue streams are essential to your retirement plan, don't feel pressured to release them within your lifetime.

The following questions can help you identify priorities:

- Is it important for the business to continue?
- Does the successor generation want to provide a dignified retirement for the owner generation?
- Does the owner generation value keeping the land in the family name?

- Do the successors' priorities match with the owners' priorities?

As you map out your succession plan goals, also consider what's important to you. If your home has significant meaning to you and your family, you may want to keep it in the family. Likewise, there may be certain charities you'd like to gift assets to, or you might have stipulations on the how the land you're passing on should be used. Ultimately, you must determine what you want for your legacy. This will be your north star when you put your farm succession plan into motion.

Who to include in your farm succession plan

Next, think through the logistics of your succession plan, starting with who should be involved. This can be a difficult task, but it's your job to make sure your farm or ranch will be managed well so it continues to thrive for future generations. To help determine who should be part of your succession plan, ask yourself these farm succession planning questions:

- Do I have one or multiple heirs?
- If multiple, what is the split between those who are farmers/ranchers and non-farmers/ranchers?
- If there are multiple heirs who want to farm the land, would they be able to work well together?
- How might increasing the number of heirs affect my farm succession plan?

Once you've answered these questions, you'll know whether you have one or more heirs and what roles they'll play in the future of your farm or ranch.

PESTICIDE DISPOSAL PICK-UP
THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 2, 2023 **MONROE**

Agricultural producers, pesticide applicators, and homeowners can drop off pesticides for disposal during the Unwanted Pesticide Pick-Up Day on Thursday, November 2, 2023, from 7 a.m. until 1 p.m. at the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) Monroe District Office in Ouachita Parish, 754 Highway 80 E. in Monroe.

LDAF's Unwanted Pesticide Pick-Up Program collects pesticide products for proper disposal at no cost to producers, applicators, or homeowners. The program, which is funded through fees associated with pesticide manufacturers' product registrations in Louisiana, is completely anonymous for those who wish to participate.

All pesticides will be accepted, and containers will be supplied for transportation to the collection site if old containers are damaged. Please note that this is a **pesticide-only** disposal pick-up event. Fumigants, waste

oils, paints, and gasoline/diesel will not be accepted.

"Improperly disposed of pesticide wastes can create serious hazards for the environment," said Commissioner of Agriculture and Forestry Mike Strain, D.V.M. "By providing individuals opportunities to properly dispose of these products, we ensure that the environment and the health of our citizens are protected."

Although it's not necessary, we strongly encourage you to submit an inventory sheet prior to the event to help us prepare for the amount of material being dropped off. Inventory sheets can be obtained from your local LSU AgCenter office or at www.ldaf.la.gov/plants/pesticide-safety.
