The Louisiana Century Farm Program recognizes Louisiana's farmers, ranchers, and forestry landowners who have owned family farmland for 100 years or more. The program seeks to honor the contributions to our state's rich agricultural heritage while encouraging the preservation and commitment to farm families. Each year, we recognize and salute the efforts of these family farms. After all, a farm is so much more than merely land and crops... it's a family's heritage and hard work, their past, present, and future. The program is proudly sponsored by the LSU AgCenter, Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF), Louisiana Farm Bureau Federation, and the Louisiana Land Bank.

The 2025 Louisiana Century Farm honorees are as follows:

- Eden's Place (1847) Bossier Parish
- Bryan L. Fontenot (1919) Evangeline Parish

"The Century Farm Program is an acknowledgment of where the past meets the future," said LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M. "Every year, we love to take this opportunity to recognize the hard-working

farm families who have contributed to the rich agricultural heritage of the state of Louisiana generation after generation."

There is no cost to sign up, and no money is given to award recipients. The distinction does, however, recognize your farm, your family's legacy, and your farm's historical relevance to your local area.

Program requirements:

- 1. Farm must have been in the family continuously for at least 100 years.
- 2. Farm must still include at least 20 acres of the original founder's land.
- 3. At least one owner must be a resident of Louisiana.
- 4. Farm must produce at least \$1,000 annually in farming income.*

*Tree farms are exceptions to this requirement.

Those interested in participating in the program are encouraged to apply during the annual application process which takes place each fall. You'll need to complete an application, submit any required documents, and have the application signature witnessed and documented by a Notary Public.

Next, the application committee will review and verify your application, and a representative from the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry will contact you regarding next steps.





5 Chicken Breeds That Are Great for Small Farms

Raising chickens can be a rewarding part of life on a small farm. Whether you're focused on fresh eggs, friendly birds, or cold-hardy breeds, the right chickens can make your setup more productive and enjoyable. If you're getting started, these five breeds strike a great balance between egg production, temperament, and adaptability.



1. Rhode Island Red

This breed is a favorite for a reason. Rhode Island Reds are known for their hardiness and steady egg production, laying about 260 eggs each year. They handle different climates well and are relatively low-maintenance, making them a reliable choice for new farmers.

2. Plymouth Rock

Also called Barred Rocks, these birds are calm, easy to handle, and beginner-friendly. Plymouth Rocks produce up to 250 eggs per year and tend to get along well with other chickens. Their gentle nature makes them a good option for farms with children or frequent visitors.



3. Leahorn

If egg production is your top goal, the Leghorn stands out. These active birds can lay as many as 320 eggs a year. They're great foragers, prefer open space, and rarely go broody, which means more time and energy spent laying eggs. They're best suited for freerange setups.



4. Orpington

Orpingtons are known for their soft feathers and calm personalities. They're also strong layers, producing up to 280 eggs annually. One of their key advantages is cold resistance—they tend to thrive in cooler climates, making them a smart pick for farms that face harsh winters.



5. Sussex

This dual-purpose breed offers both meat and eggs, with a yearly output of around 250 eggs. Sussex chickens are friendly, curious, and good foragers. Their adaptability makes them a strong fit for small farms with varying terrain or limited coop space.



Before adding any breed to your farm, make sure you understand their needs and whether your climate and setup can support them. From egg baskets to backyard coops, the right chickens can help your farm thrive.

USDA Encourages Producers to Prepare for the 2025 Hurricane Season

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and Risk Management Agency (RMA) offer a suite of disaster assistance programs to help you recover from the impacts of natural disasters.

Insurance and Risk Protection

If you have risk protection through Federal Crop Insurance, report crop damage to your crop insurance agent within 72 hours of discovering damage and be sure to follow up in writing within 15 days. For producers with coverage through the RMA's Hurricane Insurance Protection – Wind Index (HIP-WI) and Tropical Storm Option (TS), payments are generally made within weeks following a hurricane or tropical storm. For more resources, including a recent webinar, visit the HIP-WI webpage. If you have coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP), you should report crop damage to your local FSA office and file a Notice of Loss (CCC-576) within 15 days of the loss becoming apparent, except for hand-harvested crops, which should be reported within 72 hours.

Disaster Assistance

FSA offers several disaster programs to help producers recover from crop, livestock and infrastructure losses, including low-interest emergency loans. A full list of programs is available on the Hurricane webpage. NRCS provides technical and financial assistance to producers through its Environmental Quality Incentives Program to help with immediate needs and longterm support to help recover from natural disasters and conserve environmental resources. The program can assist with restoring livestock infrastructure, emergency animal mortality disposal, and immediate soil erosion protection. Additionally, NRCS offers help to communities through its Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program which provides assistance to landowners and project sponsors following a natural disaster. EWP is designed to help people and conserve natural resources by relieving imminent hazards to life and property caused by floods, fires, windstorms, and other natural occurrences.

- 2. Pour batter into 9 x 13 glass pan. Spread evenly.
- 3. In another bowl mix softened cream cheese, 2 eggs, softened stick of butter, box of powdered sugar, and beat on low for 1 minute. Then add 2 tablespoons of Olde Tyme New Orleans Mardi Gras Syrup and mix.
- 4. Pour over batter in pan and spread evenly. Bake for 30 minutes at 350-375 or until slightly brown. After cooling, cut into small rectangular pieces and drizzle icing and sprinkled colored sugar. Refrigerate and enjoy.

INGREDIENTS

2 Pounds Sweet Onions1 Bottle of Zyde'ceaux Joe's

2 Faas

Cajun Fish Fry

- 1. Wash the onions toughly and remove the first layer from the onion. Using a sharp knife evenly cut the onions into 1/2-inch slices. Separate all the rings and place in a bowl.
- 2. In a separate bowl, whisk eggs, whipping cream, and 2 ice cubes until blended.(Do not Season Egg Wash) ***Dip onion rings in egg wash mixture, then coat with Zyde'ceaux Joe's Cajun Fish Fry Mix. (For a more crispier crunch, repeat the process).
- 3. In a cast iron skillet/deep fryer heat oil to about 350°. Once grease is hot and ready, carefully fry onion rings. Please allow about 1 to 1-1/2 minutes on each side or until golden brown. Drain off excessive oil by using paper towels or oil draining rack.

- 3. Meanwhile, boil noodles according to directions on package. Drain noodles and mix all ingredients together. Stir well. Serve with a light salad, some garlic bread and enjoy!

I was joined at the convention this year by several teams from LDAF, including staff from the Office of Soil & Water Conservation, our Agricultural Workforce Development, Stay Rooted, and Century Farm programs.

From talk-meets and talent contests to commodity conferences and community conversations, once again, the LFBF convention provided everyone who attended with so many opportunities to connect with old and new friends and work toward a bright future for Louisiana agriculture. Thank you, Louisiana Farm Bureau, and everyone who participates in this outstanding event.















Expanding Horizons: LSU Ag Leadership Class XIX's First Out-of-State Experience in Idaho

In January 2025, the LSU Agricultural Leadership Class XIX officially began its two-year journey aimed at developing stronger leaders and more informed advocates for Louisiana agriculture. Representing a broad cross-section of the industry—from farmers and loan officers to commodity brokers, state and federal employees, and political analysts—Class XIX brings together 26 individuals dedicated to advancing agriculture in Louisiana.

Our program includes seven in-state seminars, two national trips, and one international experience. After a strong start in Baton Rouge and Thibodaux, our first national seminar took us to the vast and varied agricultural landscape of southwestern Idaho from June 8-13, 2025. Hosted by Leadership Idaho Agriculture (LIA)—Idaho's counterpart to our program—this experience expanded our understanding of agricultural operations, natural resource management, and leadership strategies far beyond our state's borders.



Learning from the Land: From Feedlots to

Our first full day began with a visit to the Simplot Feedlot in Grand View, a vertically integrated operation that spans over 700 acres. The feedlot's innovative use of potato by-products in feed rations and its emphasis on genetics and consistency were eye-opening. Next, we toured TLK Dairy in Mountain Home, where 10,000 cows are milked daily with the help of 150 employees. TLK impressed us with its cleanliness, animal welfare practices, and commitment to efficiency. The day concluded with a policy-focused meeting at AgWest Farm Credit, where we heard from Idaho Lt. Governor Scott Bedke about the state's approach to managing scarce



water resources—a sharp contrast to Louisiana's battle with excess rainfall.

That evening, we gathered with LIA alumni for dinner at Shoshone Falls State Park, beside the breathtaking 212-foot waterfall. It was a perfect setting for sharing stories and building cross-state connections with our fellow ag leaders.



Scaling Innovation: Farms, Processing, and People

Day two featured a visit to Grant 4-D Farms, a multi-generational operation farming over 44,000 acres in Idaho and Oregon. The scale and diversification of crops—potatoes, onions, sugar beets, small grains, and more—were matched only by their smart use of federal programs and marketing strategies to increase productivity. We ended the day at Mart Produce, where automation and modern tech streamline the production of fully baked, frozen potatoes for markets across North America.

Stewardship and Sustainability

Day three took us to the Niagara Springs Hatchery, where millions of steelhead smolts and sturgeons are raised annually in a partnership between Idaho Fish & Game and Idaho Power Company. We also toured the National Interagency Fire Center (NIFC), the national hub for wildfire management. Their efforts in coordination, equipment, and personnel are critical in managing today's increasingly complex wildfire seasons.

We wrapped the day with visits to Boise State University's "Blue Turf" football field and the Idaho State Capitol, deepening our understanding of both local pride and national history—particularly Idaho's ties to President Abraham Lincoln.

Seeds, Sustainability, and Soil Health

Thursday brought us to Syngenta Seed, where we explored elite corn hybrid development and cutting-edge plant breeding. At Timber Creek Recycling, we saw how nearly 400 million pounds of waste are processed annually—from construction materials to food packaging—highlighting agriculture's role in sustainability.

We enjoyed a farm-to-table lunch at Red Top Market, courtesy of the Gooding sisters, followed by a tour of Gooding Farms, where over ten hop varieties are grown for brewers big and small. Then it was off to Rasgorshek Farms, where diverse crops like sugar beets, peppermint, and



alfalfa support both local dairies and sugar processing operations.

Our last farm visit, McIntyre Pastures in Caldwell, emphasized regenerative agriculture and soil health. With year-round rotational grazing and a direct-to-consumer farm store, McIntyre exemplified resilience and innovation.

A Toast to New Perspectives

Our Idaho seminar concluded with a farewell dinner and wine tasting at Ste. Chapelle Winery, overlooking the stunning Snake River Valley. Joined once again by LIA alumni and hosts, we reflected on what we had learned, the relationships we had built, and how the insights gained would shape our future efforts in Louisiana.

Class XIX extends heartfelt thanks to our incredible hosts, Rick Waitley and Kendra Dustin of LIA, the LIA alumni who joined us on tours and sponsored meals, and every operation that opened its doors and shared its knowledge. We are especially grateful to Dr. Bobby Soileau, Cortni Bell, and the LSU Ag Leadership Board of Directors for their continued leadership and support in making this trip possible.

This Idaho experience wasn't just a travel seminar—it was a transformational week that deepened our understanding of American agriculture and the unique challenges and opportunities it holds across regions.

The Louisiana Agricultural Workforce Development Program is now accepting applications for internship program







The Louisiana Agricultural Workforce Development Program (LAWDP) is now accepting applications for the 2025 - 2026 program year from qualified agricultural and forestry businesses interested in participating in the program.

The LAWDP provides businesses with a monetary incentive to establish intern programs that will grow the next generation of agriculture professionals. Participating businesses may be reimbursed for up to 50 percent of the cost of hiring an intern. A maximum of \$5,000 per internship is allowed.

"This program helps our agriculture and forestry businesses find qualified individuals while simultaneously providing quality, handson training opportunities to people pursuing careers within the agriculture and forestry sectors," said the LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, DVM. "These interns are the future of Louisiana agriculture and forestry. When we invest in them, we invest in Louisiana."

A qualified agricultural business includes agricultural producers or a person or legal entity who engages in agriculture or provides support activities, products, or services to an agricultural producer and such products or services that are directly related to the planting, growing, production, harvesting, or processing of Louisiana products. They must also carry worker's compensation insurance.

Internships must offer at least 130 hours of work experience, not exceeding one year in duration, and interns must be paid at least the minimum wage rate as per the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938.

The application period is open online from July 1 through August 31. Once approved, the applicant will be required to submit an intern application to be completed by the intern or beginning farmer. Students currently enrolled at a Louisiana secondary or postsecondary institution or a young and beginning farmer or rancher employed by an agricultural business are eligible to participate in the program.

Louisiana holds statewide animal response exercise ahead of hurricane season



With hurricane season underway, Louisiana officials held a statewide tabletop exercise Tuesday to strengthen plans for protecting animals during emergencies. The daylong event at the Opelousas Civic Center marked 20 years of organized animal disaster response efforts since Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

Led by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry and the Louisiana State Animal Response Team, the 2025 Louisiana State Animal Response Tabletop Exercise aimed to improve coordination among local, state and national partners involved in animal care during disasters.

The training brought together emergency managers and animal services from more than a dozen parishes, including Lafayette, Iberia, Acadia and St. Landry. State agencies such as the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, Department of Health and the Department of Transportation and Development also participated.



Organizers said the goal was to identify any remaining gaps in animal evacuation, sheltering and emergency veterinary care plans.

The event was funded by a grant from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. National groups also in attendance included the U.S. Department of Agriculture and several members of the National Animal Rescue and Sheltering Coalition, such as the American Red Cross, American Humane, RedRover and the International Fund for Animal Welfare.

The state has also hosted several recent webinars for parish animal control agencies to help prepare for hurricane-related challenges.

Officials said the exercise underscores Louisiana's continued commitment to protecting pets and livestock during emergencies, and ensuring lessons from past storms lead to stronger responses in the future.

LSU AgCenter Unveils New Rice Variety "Venus" at Annual Field Day

The LSU AgCenter hosted its annual Rice Field Day this week at the H. Rouse Caffey Rice Research Station offering farmers and students an inside look at the latest innovations in rice breeding, disease management, and production techniques. Among the highlights was the unveiling of Venus, a new medium-grain variety set for commercial release next year.

Attendees boarded a trailer tour, guided by AgCenter staff, making the first stop at the breeding project. Here, Director Adam Famoso discussed Venus and its potential impact on Louisiana's rice industry.

"Venus is a new medium grain that was bred here at the rice research center by our medium grain rice breeder. It offers big advantages in yield and stability over the two widely grown medium grains that have been grown over the last 10 plus years."

Famoso noted that Venus delivers approximately

10 % higher yield compared to existing varieties, while maintaining grain quality which is a key advantage for the predominantly domestic medium-grain market.

"A lot of our medium grain goes to Kellogg's to make products like rice crispies. So Kellogg's have very specific properties that they want that will work throughout their production process."

The event also underscored the educational mission of Rice Field Day. LSU President Matt Lee stressed the importance of field-based learning for Ag students.

"It's really important to get our students out here so they can see world class science and engineering in action ... and be more productive and be more efficient in their own agricultural activities"

Another focus of the day was disease pressure, particularly the role of temperature in disease development.

"A lot of warm temperatures ... those are perfect conditions ... when it's too hot or when it's too cold, the disease will not develop so the temperature is above 95 or 100 will stop the disease from developing."

Dr. Felipe Dalla Lana addressed recent concerns about cercospora leaf spot and its emergence.

"More specifically cercospora being a concern. It was a disease that didn't cause much problems a few years ago, but we saw a huge outbreak in 2022 and 2024 and we are really concerned about the weather for the disease this year."

Dr. Felipe says as of now it's too early to predict how diseases will affect the rice season, but he should have a more definite answer in July.

West Baton Rouge Parish man arrested for theft of livestock

On June 30, Livestock Brand Inspectors arrested 54-year-old Ricky G. Hasbert of Port Allen regarding theft of livestock in Pointe Coupee Parish.

The arrest resulted from an investigation by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF's) Livestock Brand Commission. It is alleged that Hasbert received sacks of crawfish and failed to render proper payment to a local producer in Pointe Coupee Parish on three occasions in May of 2024. Hasbert allegedly received a total of 135 sacks of crawfish, estimated to be valued at over \$8,800 at the time.

Hasbert was booked on the warrant at the West Baton Rouge Parish Jail with his transfer pending to Pointe Coupee Parish

The West Baton Rouge Parish Sheriff's Office and Pointe Coupee Parish Sheriff's Office assisted the Livestock Brand Commission in this investigation.
