SUMMER SEASON GARDENING

Summer checklist

As we approach these hot summer months, there is plenty to do in the vegetable garden. Irrigation should be at the top of every gardener's list of things to check, especially considering last summer's drought.

Maintaining even soil moisture is the key to success. Vegetables don't particularly like dry, nor saturated soils. Drip irrigation helps maintain soil moisture while watering at the base of the roots and thus lessening disease pressure. If you haven't already installed an irrigation system, consider doing so.

Flooding row middles makes it hard to walk in the garden, aids in the spread of soilborne diseases, and if administered infrequently, can lead to split tomato skins. Overhead irrigation helps spread fungal spores from plant to plant.

Drip irrigation is the ideal form to apply, as it is cost friendly and places water right at the roots of the plants.

The two most important times plants need water are during the first two weeks after planting seeds and transplants and during bloom. Gardeners are planting and harvesting various crops throughout the summer, meaning irrigation is critical especially if we have another hot dry summer this year. If you can do only one thing to improve your summer garden, install irrigation before the fall.

There is much to do! See the notes below on gardening in June, July and August.

JUNE

✓ Mid-June, plant a summer crop of heat-set tomatoes. Planting heat-set tomatoes is VERY important. These cultivars have been bred to set fruit during high nighttime temperatures whereas, other cultivars will not. If managed correctly, heat-set tomatoes will produce fruit until a frost or freeze. Heat-set varieties include but are not limited to Tribute, Heatmaster, Summerset, Sun Sugar, Super Sweet 100, Phoenix, Florida 91, BHN 964 and Bella Rosa among others. Heat-set tomatoes can be planted again in late July for fall tomato production.

✓ Collard greens, cucumbers, watermelon, cantaloupe, okra, southern peas, pumpkins (end of June for a Halloween harvest) and summer squash can all be direct seeded into the garden during June.

✓ Start transplants of eggplants, peppers and sweet potato slips during June as well.

JULY

✓ Transplant a fall crop of heat-set tomatoes and bell peppers.

✓ Direct seed okra, southern peas,

cucumbers, squash, cantaloupe, pumpkins and watermelons throughout July. Late June through mid-July is the optimum time to plant pumpkins for a Halloween harvest.

✓ Late July through early August is a good time to start thinking about your fall garden. Order broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, Chinese cabbage, cabbage, collard green, mustard green, kale, turnip, radish and other fall crop seeds. If you want an early September planting of these crops, start seed in seedling trays in early August. Start your seed outdoors in a sunny area that is protected from foot traffic. Greenhouse or cold frames are not needed to start a fall crop as the weather is so warm. Transplants need to be watered daily so make sure they are in a very visible location. Start seed five to six weeks prior to the desired transplant date for broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, Chinese cabbage and cabbage. Greens such as kale, Swiss chard, mustard and collards can be started as transplants or directly sown into the garden.

AUGUST

✓ Plant bush snap and bush lima beans throughout August.

✓ Transplant broccoli and Brussels sprouts as early as mid-August in the garden. In north Louisiana start your lettuce seed, and plant beet and Irish potato seed in the garden.

✓ In late August, south Louisiana gardeners can start their lettuce seed and plant beet and Irish potato seed into the garden. All gardeners, regardless of location, can plant transplants of broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, Chinese cabbage, cabbage, cucumbers, squash, mustard greens and shallot sets in late August. *Be cautious when doing this because insect pressure and heat are very high. Planting an early*

The LDAF works with legislators each year to update the statutes and address issues affecting agriculture and forestry. These are commonly referred to as the “LDAF Legislative Package.” During the 2024 Regular Session, Commissioner Strain worked with legislators on the passage of several pieces of legislation. These are summarized below:

- **State chemist:** SB 82 by Sen. Allain provides that the director of the experiment station or his designee is the state chemist. *Act 53 — Effective 5/15/2024*
- **Strayed animals:** SB 95 by Sen. Wheat

allows electronic submission of notice by persons taking possession of a strayed animal. *Act 54 — Effective 5/15/2024*

- **Livestock at large:** SB 104 by Sen. Wheat adds animal control authorities to law. *Act 55 — Effective 5/15/2024*
- **Meat/poultry:** SB 114 by Sen. Cathey adds 51% ownership and also provides for voluntary inspection services. *Act 33 — Effective 5/13/2024*
- **Meteorology:** SB 117 by Sen. Jackson-Andrews creates the Agricultural Meteorology Program. *Act 34 — Effective 5/13/2024*

SCALES – Any person selling goods by weight or creating packages of commodities to be labeled by net weight must use a legal-for-trade scale. This scale must be registered annually with LDAF Weights & Measures.

PACKAGE LABELING: Any person who is pre-packaging goods for sale must ensure they label each package with the name of the commodity in the package, a Net Quantity Statement, and the name and place of business of the manufacturer, distributor, or seller.







BRISKET LAFLEUR

Ingredients:

- 1 large beef brisket

BAKED BRIE

Ingredients:

- 6 sheets (14 x 18) phyllo dough
- 1 stick butter, melted
- 1 pound round brie
- 1 jar of Robin's Rockin' Cajun Pepper Jelly, any flavor
- Crackers for serving

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 425°F. Before opening the phyllo dough, have a clean, dry cloth on hand to cover the phyllo that you are not working with. Unroll the phyllo dough and lay one sheet onto a large cutting board. With a pastry brush, brush the dough with melted butter. It's okay if it tears a bit; as you use more layers of phyllo dough, the tears will be covered. Wrap phyllo around the brie. (You can use more butter to get the folds to stick to the brie.) Take the next sheet and brush it with melted butter. Place the wrapped brie fold side down in the center of the phyllo sheet and wrap around the brie. Repeat until you have wrapped 5 sheets around the cheese, always turning the cheese over each time so that the folds are on the bottom.

Brush a generous amount of butter on your 6th sheet of phyllo dough, then spread the Robin's Rockin' Cajun Pepper Jelly across the top of the wheel. Gently place the phyllo over the Pepper Jelly, butter side down, being careful not to tear the dough. Finish wrapping the brie with the dough, folding the edges underneath the brie and using additional butter as needed to smooth the phyllo folds around the cheese. Brush additional butter over the top.

Place in a round baking pan or on a cookie sheet. Bake 15 minutes in 425°F oven or until lightly brown. Let sit for 5 minutes before serving with crackers.

Sugarcane harvest BMPs: New residue management modifications

The St. Martin Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) hosted a Sugar Cane Best Management Practice (BMP) field day on May 30 with the help of the Lafayette and Iberia SWCDs, Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) Office of Soil and Water Conservation, LSU AgCenter, and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). Speakers from each partner agency provided updates on BMP cost-share opportunities through EPA's Section 319 Nonpoint Source Management Program, current soil fertility research, soil health analysis methods and interpretation, and the use of cane mill filter press mud as a soil amendment within agricultural operations.

Following the indoor presentation, participants visited field test plots, viewed BMP installations, and spoke field-side with Mr. Mike Melancon (St Martin SWCD cooperator) and a representative from Progressive Tractor and Implement Co. about recent advances in development and installation of prototypical residue management modifications on cane harvesters. These modifications have already proven to aid significantly in reduction of row damage and offsite mud tracking during harvest, improved water quality, improved soil organic matter, and reduced soil erosion.

When asked about the benefits these field days provide, Mr. Melancon stated, "Today's BMP field day was very well attended by both researchers and farmers. The topic of sugarcane residue management by modifying the harvester has a lot of interest." Some of the advantages from this new modification are still becoming evident, but Mr. Melancon has already seen the following benefits in his fields:

- For starters, cane harvesting equipment, including the tractors and carts that follow the combine, do not sink nearly as much under muddy conditions, so fields are in better condition after harvest.
- The harvester tracks over a leaf residue (trash) mat that keeps the combine tracks from placing mud on top of the adjacent uncut cane row. This was part of the original intent of the modification.
- Only a small amount of leaf residue remains on row tops after harvest, so there is no immediate need to burn residue.
- Significantly less mud gets tracked onto public roads when going between fields.
- The residue left in the furrow decomposes relatively quickly due to improved soil contact.

While Mr. Melancon is still working out some of the specifics of how to best utilize this modification with other practices, he has been able to move to no till on at least 40% of his 2024 sugarcane crop thanks to its benefits.

Dr. Brenda Tubana, an LSU AgCenter Professor in the School of Plant, Environmental, and Soil Sciences, spoke at length about her ongoing crop residue management and soil health research. Dr. Tubana explained that sugarcane harvesting causes significant disturbances to soil, due to operations of heavy equipment, in concert with the many rainfall events that are typical of harvest time in Louisiana. Her current study in Henderson and Loreauville was initiated in 2022 to evaluate the potential of a modified sugarcane harvester to better manage post-harvest residue and reduce disturbances on soil surface.

"Unburned residue can become a buffer layer that protects the soil surface on the furrow from rail traffic," she explains. "The harvester collects and redirects the residue in the furrow which becomes a cushion layer minimizing the contact between the soil and tracks. Our cooperator on this project, Mr. Oubre, has seen the benefits of using the modified harvester in his fields." Dr. Tubana envisions that the long-term use of modified sugarcane harvesters will have the following positive outcomes:

- Provide protection to the soil surface, preventing soil loss from within the furrow;
- Retain nitrogen and sulfur which is otherwise be lost in soil erosion, dilution of rainfall runoff, and burning;
- Improve soil organic matter content/soil health; and

- Reduce the runoff of nutrients and sediment, improving water quality, drainage, and sustainability.

"The study is collecting data that will validate these benefits, all of which can protect soil health, sustain sugarcane productivity, and reduce the environmental footprint of sugarcane production," says Dr. Tubana.

Early results indicate there's reason to be hopeful about new technology. Michael Schooler, Ag Nonpoint Source Management Programs Coordinator for LDAF, shared this excitement, saying "In addition to allowing the producer to reduce the number of trips across the field, leaving this residue in the field, and allowing it to be placed in a precise location, could improve water quality and infiltration, and maintain the soil moisture during dryer times."

fall garden in late August requires time, care and scouting.

- ✓ If you hate the heat, consider pulling all vegetables out of the garden and planting a cover crop of southern peas to add nitrogen to the soil and shade out the weeds. However, if you do this to maximize nitrogen, till the pea plants under as they bloom and before they set pods.

Supporting pollinators

Between 75%-95% of the world's flowering plants rely on insects and other animals for pollination (Ollerton, 2011). Unfortunately, intensive agriculture methods that homogenize the landscape have led to declining numbers of unique native bee species among other pollinators. During the summer, horticulturalists and gardeners have a prime opportunity to enjoy the gorgeous blooms of native plants that also support the pollinators which are so essential for plant life. So, how do we plan our gardens to maximize support for pollinators?

CHOOSE NATIVE: Choosing native plants is a great way to support pollinators. Native plants are better suited to provide food and shelter for native pollinators that evolved alongside the local flora. Further, plants that are native to your region are typically going to be hardier to local conditions like drought, heat or disease. Planting some non-native species is okay too; just be sure that the more aggressively growing species do not outcompete your native plants.

PLANT DIVERSITY: Cultivating a diverse array of native flowers will help provide resources for many different pollinators. Some species have a specialized plant-pollinator relationship and may favor specific flower shapes or structures. When choosing your combination of pollinator plants, try to create a continuous source of food for pollinators by selecting plants that will bloom sequentially. Not only does this enhance the visual appeal of your garden, but it also ensures a consistent supply of nectar and pollen for local species.

LANDSCAPE LAYOUT: Since more diversity is better, embrace creativity with your pollinator garden design. Incorporating a mix of flowering trees or shrubs, vining plants and wildflowers will create an exciting look and provide ample resources for pollinators. Avoid isolating individual plants; instead,

cluster flowers of the same species to optimize pollinator foraging efficiency.

CAUTIOUS PESTICIDE USE: Minimize pesticide application, particularly insecticides, to mitigate unintended harm to pollinator populations. A pollinator-friendly and often more cost-effective alternative is using biological pest control, which harnesses the natural predators of pest species to control pest populations. If insecticides must be used, avoid applying directly to a flower and schedule applications for the evening after most pollinators are done foraging for the day.

Recommended native species for the summer:

- **American wisteria** (*Wisteria frutescens*): Vining plant with clusters of violet blooms
- **Butterfly weed** (*Asclepias tuberosa*): Bushy herbaceous perennial with bright orange flowers
- **Purple coneflower** (*Echinacea purpurea*): Herbaceous perennial with long-lasting, pinkish purple blooms
- **Black-eyed Susan** (*Rudbeckia hirta*): Annual or short-lived perennial with cheerful yellow flowers

\$824 million in new funding to protect livestock health:

USDA launches voluntary H5N1 Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program

The USDA announced it is taking several additional actions to ensure the health and viability of the nation's livestock and poultry. In the two months since the initial detection of H5N1 in dairy cattle, USDA has worked quickly and in concert with its federal and state partners to better understand the virus and contain the disease and remains committed to seeking additional ways to collect the data needed to better understand and mitigate the risk created by this outbreak. USDA is adding an additional \$824 million in emergency funding from the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to bolster these efforts and is launching a new Voluntary H5N1 Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program to give dairy producers more options to monitor the health of their herds and move cows more quickly while providing on-going testing and expanding USDA's understanding of the disease.

Emergency funding to build on response efforts

To help ensure the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) can continue to provide critical rapid response activities, Secretary Vilsack approved the transfer of \$824 million from the CCC to APHIS to directly support the response efforts. This funding allows APHIS to continue its critical work with state and local partners to quickly identify and address cases of HPAI/H5N1 in poultry and livestock.

The funding will support anticipated diagnostics, field response activities, pre-movement testing requirements, other necessary surveillance and control activities, surveillance in wildlife for APHIS, the Agricultural Research Service's (ARS) work in developing vaccines for HPAI in cattle, turkeys, pigs, and goats, and ARS and the Food Safety and Inspection Service's food safety studies.

The Secretary is authorized to transfer funding from available resources including the CCC to address emergency outbreaks of animal and plant pests and diseases. USDA previously approved the use of \$1.3 billion in emergency funding to address nationwide HPAI detections in wild birds and commercial poultry operations. These additional funds will ensure our continued robust and rapid response to this outbreak.

Voluntary Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program

Continuing to build on the efforts to contain H5N1, APHIS is standing up a Voluntary H5N1 Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program, which provides alternative testing and movement options to the Federal Order to increase USDA's monitoring capabilities to mitigate the spread of H5N1. The Voluntary H5N1 Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program aims to create additional testing options for producers with herds that have tested negative for three weeks in a row, further reduce H5N1 virus dissemination, provide for further opportunities to test herds that are not known to be affected with H5N1, increase surveillance and expand our knowledge of the disease, and support an overall national program to reduce the risk of H5N1 in dairy herds.

The main benefit for farmers who choose to enroll in the Voluntary H5N1 Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program is that once they can demonstrate their herds are free of H5N1 with results from a National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) facility, they will then need to conduct weekly tests on bulk milk from that herd to confirm that status and will be able to ship their cows at the time they prefer and without testing individual animals.

Dairy producers from States enrolled in the first phase of this program who choose

to enroll their herds and who test negative for H5N1 for three consecutive weeks using on-farm bulk tank milk samples or similar representative milk samples tested at a NAHLN laboratory will be able to move animals without additional pre-movement testing currently required under the Federal Order. Producers must also comply with continued regular weekly monitoring and testing of the herd for H5N1.

APHIS is currently working with state animal health officials to identify states to participate in a pilot phase of the program. Producers from states participating in this pilot can start enrolling in the Voluntary H5N1 Dairy Herd Status Pilot Program on the week of June 3, 2024, by contacting their APHIS Area Veterinarian in Charge or State Veterinarian and signing a Herd Monitoring Plan agreement. USDA strongly encourages dairy producers to enroll in this new program. Beyond the benefits for their own operations, increased producer participation may help USDA to establish state and/or regional disease-free statuses that could further ease compliance with the current Federal Order. Those herds not enrolled in the pilot program will continue to follow the interstate testing and movement requirements published in the Federal Order. More specific guidance on the new program, including how to enroll and how to obtain and maintain a herd status, will be made available on the APHIS website (see *below*) in the coming days.

As additional testing measures take place, USDA anticipates that it will see an increase in testing and positive test results, which will add to our knowledge of the disease and how it may spread between herds. At the same time, this pilot program will help to gather additional information on how producers with affected herds can document elimination of the virus on their operations and steps they can take to maintain an H5N1 virus-free herd.

This new investment in risk mitigation augments the previously announced Federal Order on pre-movement testing of lactating dairy cattle, announced on April 24, as well as the tools to support biosecurity activities, announced on May 10, and the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-raised Fish Program funding availability, announced on May 23.

As USDA continues to take steps to protect the health of livestock, the Department continues to work closely with federal partners at the CDC on protecting the health of people and FDA on protecting the safety of the food supply. The U.S. government remains committed to addressing this situation with urgency.



The Nature Conservancy's Louisiana Treesilience Program

Disaster recovery funding for urban forests impacted by hurricanes

The Nature Conservancy (TNC) is excited to announce the opening of the request for applications for the new Louisiana Treesilience Program (LTP), a funding program designed to bring hurricane disaster relief to urban forests in South Louisiana. Information about the program and how to apply can be found at www.nature.org/louisianatreesilience.

Thanks to a three-year grant from the USDA Forest Service and support from the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry, TNC launched Treesilience Louisiana in late 2023. The program represents a collaborative initiative designed to address the barriers to resilient urban forest canopy in frontline communities hit hardest by the 2020 and 2021 storm seasons.

"Urban Forests in South Louisiana are our first line of defense to climate change and an important part of city infrastructure that often lack the necessary funding for long-term maintenance and post-storm restoration," notes Amanda Takacs, Community Forest Coordinator for the LTP. "It is our hope that this program makes building resilient urban forests more accessible while addressing canopy deficiencies in underserved communities." According to the Vibrant Cities Lab, more than eight in ten people

in the United States live in urban areas. Integrating nature, like urban forest canopy, in cities provides a myriad of benefits, such as, improved health outcomes, stormwater management and lowered risk of damage from storms and other climate related disturbances.

The LTP is currently available to public entities in 22 parishes in South Louisiana that were most impacted by storms in the 2020 and 2021 seasons which included category 4 storms like Hurricane Laura and Ida. Program funding will cover projects that better prepare communities for future storms and address storm recovery needs such as hazard removal with a focus on disadvantaged and underserved neighborhoods. Projects must be on public lands and can include tree pruning and removal, reforestation of urban areas, and assessments and planning materials which will aid in future forest management. The current program includes over \$430,000 dedicated for these projects through funding provided by the USDA Forest Service through a Natural Disaster and Recovery Supplement grant.

The Nature Conservancy in Louisiana is currently accepting applications on a rolling basis and will review applications and distribute funds competitively until the funding is gone. BEAT THE HEAT! Tips from LaHouse

With the first heat advisory of 2024 being announced, the **LSU AgCenter LaHouse Research and Education Center** is offering advice to homeowners to keep their homes comfortable more efficiently this summer.

"Higher temperatures don't necessarily mean higher energy bills," said LaHouse director Carol Friedland. "There are many different projects for homeowners to improve their home's energy efficiency to lower their spending this summer."

One of the easiest strategies is **blocking the sun from entering your home**, especially if your windows receive direct sunlight during the day. Window coverings like curtains can reduce the thermal gain that occurs near windows from the sun. For a slightly larger project, solar films and screens can be installed over existing windows to reduce the load on your home's HVAC system.

Another simple change is **switching off**

smaller devices like televisions, lights and computers when not in use, which can reduce your energy usage. Countertop appliances in your kitchen like the toaster or coffee maker use energy even when not in use, so unplugging them can reduce your home's overall energy usage as well.

Additionally, now is a great time to **make sure your air conditioning unit is running as efficiently as possible**. Make sure that you are changing your air filters as often as recommended for your model. If your system is slightly older, you can have it tested for leaks to make sure it is efficiently cooling your home and seal any of these leaks.

Larger swaps like a more efficient HVAC unit or new windows are expensive projects, but there are also many **small ways to improve your home's efficiency**. It's smart to follow heat advisories carefully and make sure everyone in your family, especially young children and the elderly, are staying safe during high temperatures.

USDA awards \$300 mil. to diversify export markets for U.S. ag

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is allocating \$300 million to 66 U.S. organizations, under the new Regional Agricultural Promotion Program (RAPP), to build demand for American food and farm exports in high-potential markets around the globe.

Secretary Vilsack launched RAPP in October 2023, authorizing \$1.2 billion in Commodity Credit Corporation funding to help U.S. exporters expand their customer base beyond traditional and established markets, focusing on regions such as Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, and South and Southeast Asia, where consumer demand and purchasing power are growing.

"By enabling U.S. exporters to expand their footprint in diverse and dynamic new markets, RAPP will help make them more competitive and resilient in an increasingly volatile global trading environment," said Vilsack. "We know the potential is out there, but it takes time and money to grow new markets. USDA is

pleased to be able to provide the start-up capital to help tap into these opportunities, because if we are serious about reversing the decline of small and mid-sized farms, and building wealth that stays in rural communities, it's crucial that we create and sustain diverse market opportunities abroad as well as at home."

The initial round of RAPP funding will help recipient organizations carry out hundreds of projects encompassing a wide variety of products and markets. For example:

- **The Cranberry Institute** plans to conduct trade education seminars and other consumer-focused activities to target export opportunities in India, Brazil, Colombia and Southeast Asia.
- **The Southern Forest Products Association** is targeting new market opportunities for Southern yellow pine products throughout the Caribbean region through educational seminars and promotional events.

- **The Hazelnut Marketing Board** will conduct market research and trade missions to facilitate support market development in several African countries.
- **The U.S. Dairy Export Council** plans to expand its presence in Africa by utilizing RAPP funding to better understand and develop dairy import regulations and regulatory frameworks in many markets.
- **The U.S. Meat Export Federation** plans to expand its export efforts to new markets in the ASEAN region and throughout Africa, as well as enhance its investment in the convenience store segment in South Korea, Central America and Colombia.
- **The Brewers Association** will tap into the burgeoning craft beer scene in Southeast Asia, taking part in the region's premier brewing trade show and festival and also bringing buyers from the region to the top trade shows in the United States.

JUNE 28 DEADLINE: Grassland Conservation Reserve Program

Agricultural producers and private landowners can sign up for the Grassland Conservation Reserve Program (Grassland CRP) through June 28, 2024. Grassland CRP, offered by USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), is a voluntary working lands conservation program that enables participants to conserve grasslands and provide important conservation benefits for wildlife, soil health and carbon sequestration, all while continuing most grazing and haying practices.

"Grassland CRP is a vital conservation tool that supports two of USDA's top priorities: the wellbeing of American agriculture and the

health of America's grasslands," said Ronald Guidry Jr., FSA State Executive Director in Louisiana. "Over the past three years, we have seen historic interest in the Grassland CRP with producers signing up to conserve over 6.8 million acres. This historic interest from agriculture has proven that agricultural productivity and conservation priorities are not exclusive from one another, but can coexist and, more importantly, complement and enhance one another."

More than 2.3 million acres from agricultural producers and private landowners were accepted through the 2023 Grassland CRP signup. That signup reflects the continued

success and value of investments in voluntary, producer-led, working lands conservation programs. The current total participation in Grassland CRP is 8.64 million acres, which is part of the 24.8 million acres enrolled in CRP opportunities overall.

Landowners and producers interested in CRP should contact their local USDA Service Center to learn more or to apply for the program before the June 28 deadline.

FSA is also accepting applications for the Continuous CRP signup. Under this enrollment, producers and landowners can enroll in CRP throughout the year. Additionally, FSA also offers financial assistance to producers and landowners enrolled in CRP to improve the health of their forests through the Forest Management Incentive (FMI), which can help participants with forest management practices, such as brush management and prescribed burning.

Producers with expiring CRP acres can use the Transition Incentives Program (TIP), which incentivizes producers who sell or enter a long-term lease with a beginning, veteran, or socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher who plans to sustainably farm or ranch the land.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest voluntary private-lands conservation programs in the United States. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production.

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Minimizing impacts of climate change on livestock

Recent weather extremes, which include record heat and cold as well as drought and flooding, have made it especially difficult to maintain the health and production of livestock in Louisiana. Predicting these weather extremes is nearly impossible at times, but advanced planning can help livestock producers minimize the impacts of these events.

Flooding from excess rain, storm surges from hurricanes and drought bring issues with **water quality and availability**. Water pollution and excess water salinity from the first two problems are familiar to Louisiana livestock producers, but the extreme drought of the summer of 2023 brought a new set of troubles. Water quality suffered from increased salinity, increased total solids, such as metals and minerals, and increased bacteria. The specific water quality issues depended on the location of the water source and whether it came from a municipal water supply or a well, pond, canal or other source. Short-term exposure to mild to moderate decreases in water quality likely has few immediate effects if water intake remains normal, but some animals may drink less than their requirements because of taste. Unfortunately, there is a dearth of research into the long-term effects of drinking water of differing quality on livestock production and health.

Because of the volume of water needed for livestock daily, producers need a plan for either transporting large amounts of fresh water or relocating animals. If increased salinity and/or total solids in water is a problem, remove all other sources of mineral supplements. In individual animals, tracking the volume of water intake is important. Adding flavoring to water for horses may increase water consumption. Finding a local water quality expert who can make specific recommendations based on water testing will be helpful.

Maintaining livestock in moderate body condition helps protect them against extreme temperatures. Animals with excess body condition according to the body condition score scale or those with fat cover, particularly horses and non-heat-adapted breeds of cattle and sheep, are more likely to suffer from life-threatening heat stress or stroke. Animals with added condition or fat insulating their bodies may be more susceptible to heat stress or stroke than those with proper fat cover. Animals that

are too thin will have to burn extra energy to keep warm in extreme cold temperatures, particularly when accompanied by wind and rain. This stress leads to increased risk of illness and death. During drought, available **feedstuffs will vary greatly** in quality and safety. The quality of local pasture will decrease. Toxic plants may be more abundant, and animals may then be more likely to consume them. Failed crops may be baled and redirected to livestock forage. These feeds should always be tested for quality and any possible toxins (nitrates, mycotoxins, etc.).

Plans should be in place for short-term feeding during flooding and cold spells. Planning for the long-term issue of feed availability and quality during drought is more difficult. The LSU AgCenter, Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry and local feed dealers can help locate feed and hay, develop a supplement plan based on availability and quality of feedstuffs, and test for potential feed toxins. Purchasing feedstuffs in bulk from other parts of the country in cooperation with other producers can help lower costs.

Louisiana summers are always tough on livestock, but the extreme, prolonged heat of the summer and fall of 2023 was especially taxing. Exposure to high temperatures day after day leads to decreased production, reproduction and neonatal health. It can also cause death from acute heat stroke. **Adequate shade**, either natural or artificial, must be provided for the health and welfare of livestock.

Colder-than-normal temperatures, even for short periods of time, are also detrimental to the health and welfare of livestock. Permanent shelter may not always be cost effective, but plans should be made for temporary shelter. Providing dry bedding and setting up temporary wind breaks with round bales of hay can minimize impacts of the cold.

Changes in water temperature, either too hot or too cold, can decrease water intake. Ruminants are more resilient to short-term

changes in water intake, but horses are more likely to colic, especially in cold weather. Shade over water troughs and proper flow rates to troughs can help keep water cool in summer. Water intake in horses should be monitored in winter.

Different feedstuffs acquired during drought may make it necessary to have special loading and hauling equipment and feed storage areas. These may also prove helpful during winter supplementation. Natural water sources can either dry up during drought or become frozen during extreme cold. Having water troughs available to provide water can be advantageous during these times.

Extreme weather events are very stressful to livestock. Healthy livestock withstand these stresses better. Veterinarians can develop a **preventive health program** that will help livestock during normal times and times of more intense stress. They can also help livestock producers develop an emergency health plan should animals get sick or injured during these events.

The LSU AgCenter Master Cattleman, Master Goat and Master Horse programs all incorporate husbandry and animal health information that can prepare livestock producers to be more successful during normal times and during times of extreme weather.
