National FARM SAFETY AND HEALTH WEEK



Fall harvest time can be one of the busiest and most dangerous seasons of the year for the agriculture industry. For this reason, the third week of September has been recognized as National Farm Safety and Health Week (NFSHW). Now celebrating 80 years, this annual awareness campaign initiated by the National Safety Council has been proclaimed as such by each sitting U.S. President since Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1944. It is led by the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety (NECAS), the agricultural partner of the National Safety Council.

While farm incidents are common, many of them can also be predictable and preventable.

NFSHW is a time to increase awareness of the high injury and fatality risk in agriculture and to improve agricultural health outcomes through outreach and education.

The theme for this year's National Farm Safety and Health Week is "Don't Learn Safety by Accident." It reminds us that while farm incidents are common, many of them can also be predictable and preventable. That's why it's so important to stay informed on how to prevent farm illness and injuries and keep you, your family, friends, and neighbors safe and healthy throughout the harvest season and all year long.

Data from the Census of Fatal Occupational Injury shows that in 2022 the agriculture, forestry, and fishing industries had the highest rate of fatal work injuries compared to other occupations, at 23.5 deaths per 100,000 full-time workers — the majority due to incidents with transportation or equipment (*U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2023*).

Preventative education is key to reduce workplace rates of injuries and fatalities. In this issue, we're sharing just a handful of the tips and resources out there.

Tractor, vehicle, & roadway safety

Using a tractor is a routine part of farm life but can strike tragedy in an instant. Rollover Protective Structures (ROPS) are 99% effective in preventing injury or death in the event of an overturn when used with a seatbelt.

Check out the following tips from the Southwest Center for Agricultural Health, Injury Prevention, and Education to help ensure you're using your tractor safely every time.

10 tips to prevent tractor tragedies

Have a rollover protection system. The safest tractor has a ROPS with enclosed cab; the second safest tractor has a roll bar.

Match the operator to equipment. Consider operator size, experience, and decision-making ability.

One tractor seat equals one person. There is no safe place for a child on the tractor.

Stay in the protective zone. That means *on* the seat and *using* the seat belt.

Keep up good maintenance including light, hazard, decals, and signals.

Take preventive measures to avoid slips, trips, and falls. Use handholds, steps, and three-point mounting/dismounting procedures.

Avoid rollovers. Reducing speed on turns and hill, keep your front-end loaded buckets low, drive forward down steep slopes.

Avoid overturns. Only hitch loads to the drawbar, keep your front-end loader buckets low when pulling rear-mounted loads, back up steep hills, and drive forward down steep hills.

Keep PTO guards in place. Make a rule to never use an implement missing a guard.

Be safe on roads. When possible, don't travel during peak travel times.

New notification process for non-certified prescribed burning

Prescribed burning is an important and useful management practice for forestry, agriculture, and wildlife habitat. It can be used to prepare a site for planting by reducing debris, to eliminate excess brush which serves as a fuel for wildfires, or to restore native ecosystems by reducing invasives. However, there are guidelines for prescribed burning whether it's done by a *certified* prescribed burn manager or a *non-certified* prescribed burn manager. You can find the requirements for each type below.

CERTIFIED prescribed burning

Controlled burning by certified professionals benefits the environment and keeps our communities safe from

unplanned fires. Since Act 589 of 1993, LDAF has administered the Louisiana Certified Prescribed Burner Program, which requires that anyone designated as a certified prescribed burner must meet the following standards:

- Have received either formal or "on the job" training in prescribed burning. Formal courses are taught by the LSUAgCenter using the *Louisiana Smoke Management Guidelines for Agriculture* as the basis for the training.
- Have conducted five burns as the supervising professional.
- Burn using a prescribed burn plan.
- Adhere to all Louisiana Voluntary Smoke Management Guidelines and Voluntary Best

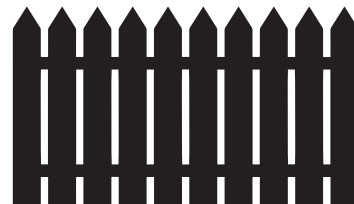

CRAWFISH BEIGNETS ACADIENE

Submitted by Guillory's Greatest Foods, LLC

Ingredients for Beignet Glaze:

- ½ c. Steen's Cane Syrup
- ¼ c. dry white wine
- 1 tsp. Louisiana Love All-Purpose Seasoning
- ⅛ tsp. allspice

Instructions:

Place all ingredients in a heavy skillet over medium-high heat. Once boiling, allow to reduce for 4-5 minutes. Glaze is ready when a cooled sample has a thick, syrup consistency.

Ingredients for Beignets:

- 1 c. all-purpose flour
- 1 Tbsp. + 1 tsp. baking powder
- ¼ tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. Louisiana Love All-Purpose Seasoning
- ½ c. water
- 3 oz. Louisiana crawfish tails, chopped
- 3 oz. Tasso, chopped
- 2 oz. white mushrooms, chopped

Instructions:

In a medium sized bowl combine all of the dry ingredients and stir. Add the water and stir until a very soft dough is formed. Stir until just combined. Overworking the dough will result in tough beignets. Stir in the crawfish, tasso, and mushrooms. Cover until ready for use. Can be made several hours in advance and kept chilled. Using two tablespoons to make roughly 2 inch sized portions of beignets and, pan fry in 2 inches of cooking oil at 375° for 3-4 minutes turning once, or deep fry until golden brown.

Ingredients for Sauce:

- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- ½ medium white onion, chopped
- ½ lb. Tasso, chopped
- 6-7 cleaned baby Bella mushrooms, sliced
- ½ c. dry white wine
- 2 c. heavy whipping
- 1 Tbsp. corn starch (dissolved in 2 Tbsp. water)
- ½ lb. Louisiana crawfish tails
- 3-4 cloves garlic, chopped
- Louisiana Love All-Purpose Seasoning, to taste

Instructions:

Place a heavy skillet over medium-high heat adding oil and butter. Once hot, add onions, tasso, mushrooms, and sauté until onions are clear. Deglaze with wine and reduce by half. Add the cream and bring to a simmer, then season with Louisiana Love. Add cornstarch mixture to desired consistency. Stir in crawfish and garlic, cooking for 2-3 minutes. Taste and adjust seasoning.

Ingredients for Carrot Glaze:

- 1 c. orange juice
- ¼ c. Balsamic vinegar
- ¼ c. sugar
- 1 tablespoon Louisiana Love Seasoning Blends

Instructions:

Add all ingredients to a heavy pot over medium-high heat. Once boiling, reduce for 4-5 minutes or until thick when cool. Steam or boil carrots until fork tender, drain well, and toss with glaze.

CHICKEN AND SAUSAGE GUMBO

Ingredients:

- 3 lb. boneless skinless chicken thighs
- 1 lb. smoked sausage, chopped
- ½ c. onion tops, chopped
- 1 med. onion, chopped
- ½ green bell pepper, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- ¼ c. parsley, chopped
- 2 qt. water
- 2 qt. low sodium chicken broth

Add onion, bell pepper, garlic, chicken, and sausage. Bring back to a boil, and boil uncovered over medium heat for approximately 1 - 1¼ hours. When the chicken is cooked and tender, add in parsley and green onion, and cook for 10-15 minutes longer. Serve over a scoop of rice.

Roadway crashes are a leading cause of injuries and death in agriculture. Increasing your visibility with proper lighting can help prevent crashes and keep the roads safe for everyone.

While ATVs and UTVs are enjoyable to drive and practical for work, it's important to remember that they are not toys. The thrill of riding can turn dangerous, even deadly, if not handled with caution. Skid steers are also incredibly useful on the farm, but they can be risky to operate — their power, quick movements, instability when loaded, and limited visibility can lead to injury. When operating a skid steer always:

- Use the seatbelt and safety bar.
- Keep your body inside cab with no extra riders.
- Be aware of surroundings and use hearing protection.

Confined spaces

Grain bins, forage storage silos, liquid storage tanks, manure storage facilities and even transport vehicles are common confined spaces on farms. Never work alone in a confined space — having a second person can make sure you stay safe and quickly get help if something goes wrong. Sleep, stress, and mental health

Harvest season is a busy time on the farm. Not getting enough rest can increase the risk of mistakes and injuries. See "Ten Sleep Tips for Farmers" on the opposite page for healthy sleep tips from UMASH to help you stay sharp.

As we all know, a life rooted in agriculture can bring high levels of stress and anxiety. There are tools available to help during tough times, but you do have to acknowledge when you're struggling and need help. Community is important, and there is power in checking on your neighbor.

Too often, folks are afraid to have a difficult conversation. But you can find some helpful guidance by taking a free, online suicide prevention training sponsored by LDAF's Stay Rooted Louisiana. QPR, which stands for Question, Persuade, and Refer, helps people learn to recognize signs of a suicide crisis, ask the right questions, and get someone help.

TEN SLEEP TIPS FOR FARMERS

DAYTIME

- Get up at the same time everyday.**
Regular wake times can help you fall asleep easier at bedtime.
- Get light.**
Sunlight during the day can help regulate your body's internal sleep clock. If you work at night, try to work in a well lit area.
- Get exercise.**
Movement during the day can make sleeping at bedtime easier.
- Stretch your muscles.**
Tense muscles at bedtime can make it hard to sleep.
- Eat well.**
Eat a wide variety of foods and drink lots of water while you are awake. Your body needs fuel to sleep.

NIGHTTIME

- Avoid caffeine and alcohol.**
Avoid caffeine 8 hours before bed and alcohol 4 hours before bed.
- Clear your mind.**
Consider keeping your journal or to-do list beside your bed to write down what's keeping you awake.
- Create a bedtime routine.**
A regular bedtime routine can help you fall asleep. Avoid screen time 30 minutes before bed.
- Avoid bright lights**
Shut off lights in your home as it nears bedtime. If needed, use thick curtains to make your sleeping space darker.
- Make your sleeping space relaxing.**
If possible, a quiet and cool room can help you sleep well.

ERGONOMIC-ASSOCIATED INJURY PREVENTION CHECKLIST

LIFTING AND CARRYING LOADS

- Avoid lifting from floor or over shoulder height and keep objects close to your body.
- Provide handles on containers using both arms to balance weight.
- Avoid lifting object weighing fifty pounds or more.
- Use mechanical equipment whenever possible.
- Use dollies, pallet trucks, or carts to transport heavy items.

HAND WORK

- Work at below shoulder height.
- Work within 17 inches of body.
- Rotate job to reduce repetition.
- Standing on floor mats will increase comfort, but may not prevent an injury.

POWER HAND TOOLS

- Use tool handles that allow forefinger and thumb to overlap.
- Chose hand tools with handles covered with smooth, non-slip material and at least 4" long.
- Use hand tools to allow the wrist to stay straight.
- When selecting power tools consider purchasing vibration reduction characteristics or use anti-vibration gloves.

SHOVELING AND STOOPED WORK

- Use long handles for stooped work and keep feet at shoulder width.
- Sit on a stool when doing stationary work.
- Do stooped work intermittently with other tasks and avoid twisting.
- Use leg and arm muscles instead of back when shoveling. Use more small loads instead of fewer large ones.

VEHICLE USE

- Chose vehicle seats with lumbar support and replace worn out seats.
- Sit using a slightly inclined posture with full back support.
- Maintain three-point contact facing the farm equipment when mounting and dismounting.
- Shift driving position frequently.

Calcasieu SWCD hosts Water Festival



On September 4 and 5, the Calcasieu Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) hosted a Water Festival for all 6th graders in Vernon Parish. Staff from LDAF's Office of Soil and Water Conservation (OSWC) joined the effort.

Students rotated among five different educational stations that provide hands-on lessons about water conservation, water literacy, water quality, and the importance of barrier islands.

The interdisciplinary lessons, such as those listed below, bring awareness to students of where our water comes from and how our actions can positively or negatively impact our watersheds.

- **The Long Haul** is a relay race focused on water consumption and aquifer use, as well as an awareness of factors involved in access and convenience.
- **A-maze-ing Water** introduces students to the different types of pollutants and how they affect us and our environment. This maze shows their track through our environment, as they drain, get filtered by wetlands, cleaned in treatment plants, or make their way back into the watershed.



- **The Incredible Journey** illustrates the free movement of water from different states of being. They follow water as it moves through grass, plants, animals, clouds, etc. with help from the sun.
- **Pass the Jug** brings an awareness of water use with a reminder that while water sources can replenish and recharge, without planning and thought, there may not always be enough for all uses.
- **Lines of Defense** shows the different lines of defense, such as marsh grasses and barrier islands, that Louisiana has for coastal protection.

Livestock Brand Commission to host saddle microchipping event

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Livestock Brand Commission will host its next saddle microchipping event Thursday, September 26, from 10 A.M. to 2 P.M. It will be held at the LSU AgCenter's Lafourche Parish office located at 115 Texas Street in Raceland, Louisiana.

LDAF's microchip identification program provides all saddle owners in the state of Louisiana the opportunity to have their saddles registered and identified by using a microchip implant. If microchipped saddles are ever stolen, the program allows brand officers to confirm ownership and return the property. This service is provided free to the public.

"Saddles don't often have serial numbers to reference if they are stolen," said LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M. "This program provides a tool that can deter and prove theft, as well as assist with the return of stolen saddles."

The saddle microchipping program is a joint venture of the Livestock Brand Commission, parish sheriff's offices, other law enforcement agencies, parish cattlemen's associations, and riding clubs.

The LSU AgCenter continues to be a leading resource in crawfish data. Many of you know, LSU and their data sources have been key in all funding opportunities and communications with USDA on any assistance programs we have been able to secure over the past few years.

As recently as the USDA's Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) excessive heat calculations of 2023, LSU AgCenter agents and faculty were the leading resource for information on our niche "farm raised fish." In an effort to continually improve those figures, we are supporting their effort to update key information that is a general resource for the industry and allows their scientists and economists to provide quality anonymous information back to the industry when needed.

The LSU AgCenter is committed to effectively support and advocate for the Louisiana Crawfish Industry. Personnel with the LSU AgCenter were involved in the multi-agency effort that caused the USDA to modify its eligibility criteria and make the damages caused by drought and excessive heat to crawfish production eligible for the ELAP program.

To ensure that we are able to continue to serve as an effective advocate for the industry and are

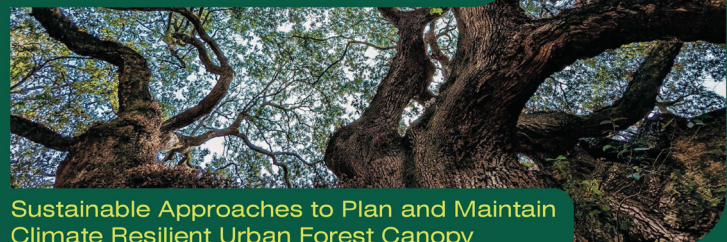
addressing important issues, the LSU AgCenter must ensure that our data remains accurate and robust. This is not only important to continue to be able to effectively petition the USDA to expand programs to include crawfish, but also to ensure that these programs operate in a manner that provides adequate assistance to crawfish producers.

To that effort, the LSU AgCenter is conducting a survey of crawfish producers. The information collected in this survey will not only help us better depict the size and status of the crawfish industry, but also help us focus efforts on issues that are considered the most critical to the industry.

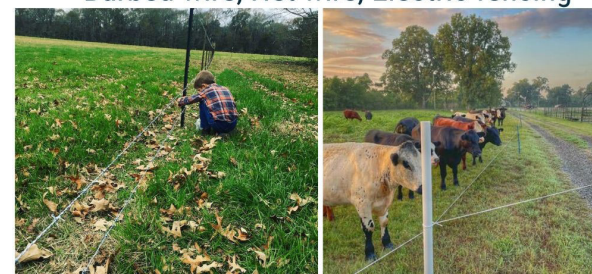

Tennessee man arrested for felony theft and other charges

On September 4, inspectors with the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Livestock Brand Commission (LBC) arrested 53-year-old Bert E. Smith, IV, of Lewisburg, Tennessee, on an arrest warrant out of Anderson County, Kansas.

Smith is a known cattle buyer and regularly buys at several sale barns in Louisiana. For that reason, LDAF's LBC was notified of the warrant by the Anderson County Sheriff's Office. Once made aware of the warrant, LBC inspectors took Smith into custody without incident. He was booked in the Avoyelles Parish Jail.

The Anderson County warrant included ten counts of felony theft pertaining to livestock (with an estimated value of approximately \$1,815,172), six counts of giving a worthless

check valued over \$25,000, and one count of mistreatment of a dependent adult or elder person. Smith has been released on bond, which was set at \$150,000.

"Livestock Brand Commission personnel, who investigate all agricultural crime in Louisiana, are sometimes called on to assist with cases in other states," said LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, DVM. "This kind of coordination and cooperation is instrumental in fighting agricultural-related crimes across the country."

The Livestock Brand Commission maintains a 24-hour Crimestoppers hotline at (800) 558-9741 for the public to report thefts or other agriculture-related crimes. All persons accused of crimes are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Management Practice Guidelines for Forestry and Marsh.

- Meet the Louisiana Notification of Burn directives.
- Pass the certification exam with a score of 70% or higher.

NON-CERTIFIED prescribed burning

The following requirements apply to non-certified prescribed burning, pursuant to La. R.S. 3:17.1 (Act 288 of the 2024 Regular Session):

- A non-certified prescribed burn manager, prior to conducting a prescribed burn, shall provide the office of forestry with the location, date, and time of the prescribed burn.
- The office of forestry shall review the information, and the non-certified prescribed burn manager shall agree to follow the relevant smoke management guidelines as approved by the department in order for the notification to be accepted.
- This notice shall be submitted to the department 24-72 hours in advance. It can be made via phone at 1-855-452-5323 or through the online form at the link in the box below.
- Upon receipt and review of the information submitted, a department representative will contact you.
