COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

Current Drought Conditions

Drought is a normal part of all regions, including areas with high and low average rainfall. Drought results when the amount of precipitation received over an extended period of time (usually a season or more in length) is significantly less than normal amounts for that area. Although Louisiana features several large bodies of water, thousands of miles of rivers, streams, and bayous, and is home to thousands of acres of wetlands, the state does experience occasional drought conditions. A drought's impact may also include direct effects on local economic and hydrological resources (rivers, reservoirs, and water tables), as well as secondary effects such as wildfires. Historically, northern parishes have been especially prone to agricultural droughts, which can lead to severe decreases in soil moisture and have serious consequences for crop production.

According to the National Drought Summary for October 21, 2025, Louisiana is experiencing a varied landscape of drought conditions. Recent moderate to heavy rains have brought some relief to northeastern areas of the state, yet challenges persist, particularly in south-central Louisiana, where moderate drought conditions have expanded.

According to the latest U.S. Drought Monitor data released on October 23, 2025, approximately 19% of Louisiana is experiencing drought conditions, while nearly half of the state, around 49%, is considered abnormally





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National Women In Ag Study Launches

A just-launched national Women in Agriculture Study is a comprehensive effort to capture women's voices from across all 50 states and Puerto Rico. The survey remains open through March 31 to gather insights from women working in production agriculture, agribusiness, education and

advocacy, as well as from men and others in related fields who can offer perspectives on women's roles in agriculture.

The aim of the study is to better understand the experiences, leadership pathways and future needs of women in agriculture.

This study will help identify what's working, where there are gaps, and how to strengthen engagement and support systems across agriculture. Optional follow-up interviews and focus groups will provide deeper exploration of leadership, mentorship, barriers and opportunities.

"More than a million women play vital roles in U.S. agriculture, accounting for 36% of our country's farmers," said American Farm Bureau Federation President Zippy Duvall. "We want to make sure we're clearing barriers and providing opportunities for them and understanding their perspectives is crucial. I encourage all women in agriculture and related fields to participate in this study,

which will deepen understanding of their future needs."

Findings will be shared at the AFBF-hosted International Year of the Woman Farmer ACE Summit in Washington, D.C., in June 2026. Results will inform leadership development, outreach strategies and systems that strengthen support for women in agriculture nationwide.

The survey is open to individuals age 18 and older who are involved in or connected to agriculture, forestry or life sciences, including related industries such as aquaculture, horticulture, beekeeping and more. After completing the survey, participants may choose to sign up for a follow-up focus group or key informant interview. These sessions will allow for deeper exploration of themes and experiences. This study is sponsored by the American Farm Bureau Women's Leadership Committee and is funded by CoBank and JBS.

the product must be made, grown, manufactured, processed, produced, or substantially transformed in the state of Louisiana. The LDAF shall have sole discretion to determine whether an agricultural product or agritourism activity is eligible for labeling with one of the certified logos. In addition, a company must possess and be in compliance with all other applicable state and federal permits, licenses, and laws.

There is a \$25 non-refundable application fee. If approved, there is a \$30 registration fee per logo. All logos must be renewed every three years.



LERUTH'S PECAN PIE

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 stick butter
- 1/2 c sugar
- 1 c Karo Syrup (light)
- 3 extra large eggs

- 110-to-12 lb turkey

INSTRUCTIONS

INGREDIENTS

- 5 lbs Louisiana Sweet
 - Potatoes. washed
 - 2 c dark or light brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp ground cinnamon
- ½ c butter
- ¼ to ½ c orange juice
- ½ tsp Kosher salt

Trosp ground enmanner

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Place the yams in a stockpot, cover with water and boil for about 30 to 40 minutes until slightly tender.
- 2. Remove the yams from the pot and allow to cool.
- 3. When cool enough to handle, peel the yams and slice into $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch medallions on an angle, Set aside.
- 4. Measure the brown sugar and blend in about ½ teaspoon of kosher salt. Measure the ground cinnamon and the orange juice.
- 5. Slice the butter into approximate $\frac{1}{3}$ tablespoon pieces.
- 6. Place a single layer of Yams along the bottom of an 8 ½" X 11" baking dish. Slices should be touching or slightly overlapped, filling in the spaces so the bottom is completely covered.
- 7. Sprinkle about $\frac{1}{3}$ of the brown sugar equally over the medallions, then sprinkle about $\frac{1}{3}$ of the cinnamon lightly on top. Distribute about 8 pieces of the sliced butter on top of that layer.
- 8. Repeat this process two more times depending upon how much Yams you have. Make sure to finish the top with brown sugar, cinnamon and butter. Pour the orange juice evenly over the Yams and cover the baking dish with aluminum foil.
- 9. Bake in a preheated 375 degrees Fahrenheit oven for about 45 minutes.
- 10. Check to see if the Yams are soft. If so, remove the aluminum foil, increase the oven to 400-degree and return the baking dish to the oven (uncovered) for about 15 minutes or until the top begins to brown and the juices bubble around the edges.
- 11. Remove from the oven and allow to sit for 10 minutes before serving.

Southern SARE Producer Grant Call for **Proposals Released**

The Call for Proposals for the 2026 Producer Grant Program, intended for farmers/ ranchers and farmer/rancher organizations throughout the Southern region, is now available from the Southern Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education (SSARE) program.

Proposal submission deadline is December 5, 2025 at 12 p.m. (NOON) EST. Announcement of funded proposals will take place in late February 2026.

The maximum funding amount for a Producer Grant is \$20,000 for individual farmers/ranchers and \$25,000 for farmer/ rancher organizations, paid to a grantee as a reimbursement once invoices and receipts are submitted for allowable project expenses.

Producer Grants are used to conduct sustainable agriculture research projects that solve agricultural production challenges farmers face and to develop information on what works and what doesn't so that other farmers and ranchers facing those same challenges can benefit from the results of the funded project. The goal of the Producer Grant Program is simple: Empower farmers to test, on a small scale, a practice or technology to a production or marketing problem (either as an individual or as a group), evaluate whether the results sustainably address the problem, and share how those efforts can benefit other farmers. Successful projects can then be applied by the farmer applicant or by others on a larger

Proposed projects must focus on Southern SARE's program objectives in developing agriculture sustainable systems moving existing farming systems toward sustainability, as defined by Congress in the 1990 Farm Bill. Applicants specifically should be aware of this definition, as proposals will be reviewed with this legal definition in mind.

Producer grants are not designed to pay a farmer to farm; buy livestock, equipment, or land; make permanent farm improvements, or support private enterprises through capital investments. Southern SARE Producer Grants are competitive research grants, designed to take some of the financial risk away from trying a solution to an agricultural production issue.

Projects are funded for two years. Producer organizations should be comprised primarily of farmers/ranchers and must have a majority farmer representation on their governing board.

The Producer Grant Call for Proposals includes all the information needed to apply for a grant. It includes information on eligibility requirements, allowable project expenses, proposal submission instructions, how the proposal will be reviewed, and contact information. Be sure to carefully follow the information in the Call for Proposals when submitting your proposal. Failure to follow the submission guidelines will result in your proposal being rejected.

The Choctaw Cattle Company is redefining cattle farming in Louisiana



Choctaw Cattle Company is more than just picturesque pastures — it's a living laboratory of sustainable agriculture. Owned and operated by Dr. Angela Mayeux-Hebert, a retired orthopedic surgeon, and her husband, Roylee Hebert, a lifelong cattleman, the farm has become a model for progressive cattle farming practices and is partnering with the LSU AgCenter.

It was her love of horses the lead Mayeux-Hebert to cattle.

"I saw a small blurb in the Quarter Horse magazine. It was called Saving the Family Farm," Mayeux-Hebert said. "It was about rotational grazing and how expensive feed was. If you could save your grass, extend your growing season, you could save money and keep the family farm going."

She began rotational grazing in 1996, and when she married Hebert in 2002, the couple expanded the system by trenching water to smaller pastures.

"The more you rotate your cattle, the better things really are," she said.

Hebert's roots in cattle farming run deep.

"My family has been raising cattle since the 1930s," he said.

His grandfather managed thousands of head of cattle for a New Orleans doctor, stretching from Pecan Island to the Sabine River. Hebert's experience and ag degree complement his wife's scientific background, setting them up to be mostly self-sustaining.

"Vet bills are very rare around here because we doctor everything ourselves," Mayeux-Hebert said.

The couple raise mainly Brahman and F1 Braford cattle, breeds well suited to Louisiana's climate. They also have a few Angus Herefords.

"The best cattle are the cattle that fit your environment," she said.

Their cattle thrive on forage-based diets, with minimal concentrate use. Cattle producers



often supplement forage in the fall with a concentrate that includes high-energy and low-fiber ingredients.

"We want a ration that doesn't have any sugar in it. No hard grains, no molasses," she said.

Their feeding philosophy is backed by science. Working with LSU AgCenter cattle researcher Marcelo Vedovatto, they are exploring how gut microbiota in calves is shaped by their mothers' diets.

"If a calf is born from a cow consuming a highconcentrate diet, it will develop a community of bacteria specialized in digesting this type of feed, and that microbial profile may last throughout its life," Vedovatto said. "On the other hand, if a calf grows up in a foragebased system, it will likely become more efficient at digesting forage later in life."

This research is now being tested at the Dean Lee Research Station with plans to monitor offspring performance from birth to slaughter.

Recognizing the couple's commitment to sustainable practices, the LSU AgCenter designated Choctaw Cattle Company as a model farm.

"We use the model farm mainly to train extension agents, producers, and establish nutritional and management practices that are profitable and proven by science," Vedovatto said. "We want to show that it's possible to have a good quality feed system without relying on concentrate."

One of the farm's key innovations is creating their own baleage, a method of preserving high-quality forage.

"Most people feed low-quality hay in the fall and winter, which forces them to buy concentrate," Vedovatto said. "If you can produce high-quality feed, you don't need to buy a lot of things."

The couple is experimenting with native grasses and cutting techniques to optimize baleage.

"We're topping the grass at 10 to 12 inches to leave enough for regrowth," Hebert said. "That way, we increase the sugars that help with ensiling." Ensiling is the fermentation process that preserves forage.

The pair also uses chickens for pasture restoration, which has had multiple benefits on the cattle farm.

"They break up cow patties, eat the bugs and reduce parasite loads," Mayeux-Hebert said. "The eggs are just a side benefit."

The chickens even help control fire ants and invasive buttercup flowers. The couple moves the chickens daily.

Shade trees and rotational grazing also contribute to animal welfare.

"You choose a breed that's adaptable to your system, or you adapt the system," Vedovatto said. In their case, they do both.

The couple's approach to cattle production is rare in Louisiana, where overstocking cattle on land and reliance on feed stores are common. Their philosophy is simple — observe, adapt and improve.

"Every year is a step forward in something bigger," Mayeux-Hebert said. "We've sold some really expensive cattle, but if they won't breed and they get skinny on grass, what are we doing with it?"

With their blend of science, tradition and innovation, the Choctaw Cattle Company is raising cattle while also raising the bar for sustainable agriculture in Louisiana.

dry. The Fire Danger map, maintained by LDAF, shows high risk for a large portion of the state, and as of October 24, 2025, burn bans are in effect for parishes on the western border from Caddo down to Calcasieu.


Encouragingly, even though dry conditions are expected to continue, the Climate Prediction Center also forecasts cooler temperatures over the next 6 to 10 days. These lower temperatures can help alleviate drought conditions by:

• Reducing Evaporation: Cooler temperatures result in decreased evaporation

rates from soil, surface water, and plant leaves, aiding moisture conservation.

- Increasing Moisture: By minimizing water loss to the atmosphere, more moisture remains in the soil, which can help disrupt or slow the progression of drought.
- Slow Flash Drought: A blend of high temperatures and low rainfall can trigger a rapid "flash drought," but cooler temperatures can help mitigate this.

It's important for residents and agricultural producers in Louisiana to remain vigilant and informed during dry periods. To stay updated on the latest drought conditions and forecasts, visit droughtmonitor.unl.edu, and for information on burn bans and fire danger risk, visit www.ldaf.la.gov/land/fire/safety. In addition to monitoring drought conditions, it's crucial to be aware of fire safety measures, especially during periods of high fire risk. Residents should adhere to burn bans and take preventative actions to safeguard their homes and property from potential wildfires. Simple steps, like clearing dry brush and maintaining defensible space around structures, can significantly reduce the risk of fire damage.



How Current Weather Trends Are Shaping Global Grain Production

Kevin Marcus of Marcus Weather Consulting gives the areas to watch as harvest goes into the home stretch in the northern hemisphere and the growing season is shaping up in the southern hemisphere.

Looking at the U.S., South American and Chinese weather patterns, here are his takeaways on the impact and outlook of weather:

U.S. harvest season is a mirror of 2024 in many ways.

Marcus says for many in the Midwest, September and October are echoing patterns this time last year being warmer and dryer than average.

He notes two earlier weather patterns in the year are bringing attention to their impact on vields.

In the eastern corn belt, the prolonged heat may have dinged yields.

"We had lots of warm night sin July and August," he says. "For some, it was the highest numbers since 2010 and 2011."

When nighttime temperatures remain elevated, the respiration steals from grain development resulting in shallower kernels.

In the western corn belt, the focus is on the favorable conditions for disease—including the expansion of southern rust.

"We're seeing southern rust stealing 40 to 50 bu/acre in fields that were left untreated," Marcus says. "lowa was the epicenter of the problem, and if just 10% of the fields weren't sprayed properly at a 50 bu loss, that's 5 bu. off the state yield. And 1 bu. off the national yield."

La Nina is a factor.

Marcus is watching the development of La Nina, warmer waters in the eastern Indian ocean and systems and patterns developing in southeast Asia. He says it all adds up to polar jet getting invigorated.

As such, he sees "more of a slug" for the finishing weeks of corn harvest across the Midwest.

And this winter, especially compared to last year, he sees wet heavy snow across the northern plains starting in November.

Questionable start for the southern hemisphere.

As Brazil and Argentina's growing seasons get kicked off, there's cooler and less wet weather.

"This isn't typical. It usually rains every other day. Now it's only raining once a week. And temperatures are popping above 100 degree. Young crops are being stressed early," Marcus says.

Looking ahead, he notes there aren't any "red flags" for the weather dramatically effecting yields, but there is definitely risk in the forecast.

China's domestic production is a question mark.

Marcus says a developing story to watch are yields for the Chinese corn crop.

"We just came through seven weeks of exceptional rain in the north China plains," he says. "When corn can't be harvested, and you're getting rains every other day for seven weeks, you have an idea of what that quality will look like."

When a comparable weather pattern occurred in 2022, Marcus points to private estimates stating a loss of 30 million metric tons.

Higgins, Governor Landry, USDA Secretary Rollins, and Commissioner of Agriculture Mike Strain Hold Roundtable Discussion with Louisiana Farmers



Congressman Clay Higgins (R-LA), Governor Jeff Landry (R-LA), U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Brooke Rollins, and Louisiana Commissioner of Agriculture Mike Strain held a roundtable discussion with Louisiana farmers, cattlemen, and aquaculture reps, focused on strengthening the state's agricultural industry.

During the meeting, Congressman Higgins advocated on behalf of Louisiana's rice, crawfish, and shrimp producers. He discussed proposals to suspend imports on these commodities, expedite assistance through USDA's Commodity Credit Association, and pass H.R. 5710, the Bridge the Gap for Rural Communities Act. Congressman Higgins also outlined these requests in a delivered letter that he led with Louisiana Governor Jeff Landry, Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry Commissioner Mike Strain, and Louisiana Farm Bureau Federation President Richard Fontenot. Earlier this week, Congressman Higgins delivered a letter to President Trump urging

him to suspend all foreign shrimp imports due to public health concerns. Read that letter *here**. Congressman Higgins also delivered a letter urging President Trump to suspend rice imports in response to market volatility and unfair trade practices from foreign producers. Read that letter *here**.

Congressman Higgins said, "I appreciate Secretary Rollins visiting Louisiana and taking time to hear directly from farmers in our state. We're working closely with her and President Trump to support the agriculture industry and put American farmers first. Today's roundtable embodies the Trump administration's commitment to Louisiana's farmers, and my office will continue to advocate for agricultural and seafood industries."

Honeybees and the blueprint for Al development in agriculture

When it comes to building smart machines, engineers often turn to the human brain for inspiration. But a recent study published in eLife suggests we might do just as well by looking at the compound eyes of the humble honeybee.

Relatively speaking, bees have minuscule brains. But they still manage to perform incredibly elegant navigation, pattern recognition, and decision-making processes. One of their most impressive tricks? Recognizing symmetrical patterns and spatial relationships in flowers, a key part of their unmatched foraging behavior ... and a capability highly prized for the enhancement of artificial intelligence (AI).

A research team from the United Kingdom developed a neuromorphic model of bee vision, focusing on the visual processing area in the insect brain. By simulating the bee's spatiotemporal encoding (the way neurons respond not just to spatial patterns but also to how those patterns move across time) they created a system capable of mimicking how bees identify and discriminate between different visual cues.

Using a combination of behavioral experiments and biologically-inspired computer modeling, the team re-created how bees explore their environment visually. They found that this scanning behavior, paired with specific encoding strategies in the visual neurons, allowed bees to compress visual data into efficient representations. This means that bees can recognize a flower not by memorizing every pixel, but by distilling it down to its most informative features.

This bee-inspired pattern recognition was replicated using Al architecture that mimics

the timing of real neuronal firing. The result? A resource efficient visual recognition system that could identify patterns with a high degree of accuracy, without the need for complex computational resources.

These findings are massive because while current deep learning AI systems are powerful, they are computationally expensive and often brittle when faced with novel stimuli. In contrast, bees use minimal energy to achieve robust recognition across varying, adaptable conditions.

By borrowing concepts from this insect neurobiology, engineers could theoretically design future AI systems that are faster, more energy-efficient, and more adaptable. This could be especially useful for autonomous drones, micro-robots, and low-power vision systems where resources are limited.

Moreover, this work highlights the power of active perception: Instead of passively absorbing data, intelligent systems (biological or artificial) may benefit from strategically interacting with their environment to extract meaning.

Nature has spent millions of years refining vision systems for organisms with severe resource constraints. This study is a reminder that intelligent behavior doesn't require a massive brain — it just needs the right strategy. As we design the next generation of AI, looking to the smallest creatures among us may prove invaluable.

From hive to hardware, our honeybee friends may hold the blueprint for smarter, leaner machines.

Local mushroom farm supplies fresh fungi across southeast Louisiana

A mushroom farm is drawing a fungi following, supplying mushrooms to restaurants and homes throughout the capital area.

Maggie Long and Cyrus Lester are the wife and husband duo who have owned and operated Mushroom Maggie's Farm since 2018.

"We wanted to do farming, but we didn't have any money, we didn't have any land," Long said. "We didn't come from farming, so what do we do, you know? So, we looked at stuff to do indoors, we saw that no one was doing mushrooms at the time. It's become more than just a passion, it's become our lives now."

Every Monday, the crew at Mushroom Maggie's Farm packs blocks of a material made of ground sawdust and flakes of soybean hulls. Lester said they make over 600 blocks each week. The blocks are then injected with mushroom spawn and left to rest anywhere from 10 days to two months.

Once the mushrooms fruit, the different varieties are separated, sliced and sorted, ready to go to restaurants, the Red Stick Farmers Market and select grocery stores. 1,200 pounds of fresh mushrooms go out every week into the hands of mushroom enthusiasts.

"They're so incredible, not just for the food supply, but for health reasons too!" Long said.

Anything leftover, Long and Lester said, goes into a compost pile, which will eventually be sold off, too. The two added that they are excited to share their love of mushrooms with the community.

"We've been talking with the parish about doing a mushroom festival one day and having it in this region here out of St. Francisville. That will be exciting," Long said.

Lester said the mushroom farm's reach extends through St. Francisville, New Roads, Baton Rouge, New Orleans and the Northshore.
