In a recent episode of "Crawfish Tales," Commissioner Mike Strain visited New Orleans to meet Ericka Lassair, the dynamic owner of Diva Dawg, a gourmet hot dog food truck, and Chef Diva Foods, known for its spices and sauces. Ericka Michelle Lassair, popularly known as "Chef Diva," is a proud native of New Orleans. She is a graduate of Southern University in Baton Rouge, LA, and Delgado's Culinary Arts School. Her business philosophy revolves around customer feedback, innovation, and delivering an exceptional culinary experience.

Chef Diva describes her current phase as "the stage of magic," one that is brimming with new opportunities in her sauces, spices, and catering business. Embracing international expansion, she is set to participate in trade shows in Japan, Morocco, Vietnam, and China, merging her love for travel with her business's global growth. She aspires to offer pre-packaged versions of her popular dishes,

such as crab boil dirty rice and seafood dirty rice, while pursuing private labeling, with the ultimate goal of achieving financial stability to travel and build a legacy for her family.

Her entrepreneurial journey began with the opening of a restaurant on Magazine Street, a cherished location from her childhood. Despite the restaurant's failure due to a lack of business knowledge and financial discipline, which led to a period of depression and working an overnight job while living with her parents, Chef Diva's resilience saw her through. She leveraged catering opportunities, saving \$14,000 from a consistent client, crucial for her next venture. Participation in the Urban League's Idea Village pitch program and winning a competition provided the funds to acquire her food truck, Diva Dawg. Chef Diva views past struggles as valuable lessons, essential for both personal and business growth which enables her to teach others.

> Chef Diva joined the Certified after Louisiana program discovering it at the Louisiana Restaurant Association (LRA) showcase. With guidance from John, a fellow entrepreneur and mentor from the Certified Louisiana community, joined the Southern United States Trade Association (SUSTA) program, which facilitates international trade opportunities. She values the partnerships and shared these knowledge from programs, particularly the guidance received from John.

Chef Diva Foods' product development is influenced by customer needs, focusing on versatile, inclusive, and flavorful offerings. Her red bean spice, inspired by her food truck's popular red beans on hot dogs, is pork-free, vegan, and vegetarian-friendly, with low sodium. The Creole Spice is lower in sodium than most conventional Creole seasonings while maintaining robust flavor. Her gumbo seasoning simplifies preparation, allowing users to focus on proteins and vegetables. The etouffee sauce, with its unique creamier base, was developed from a happy accident in her youth. The apple pie sauce, a versatile syrup from her apple pie bread pudding, can enhance desserts and even savory dishes. She emphasizes customer-centric innovation with dishes like "Cajun Surf and Turf" and crab meat grilled cheese, which were added to her regular menu due to overwhelming demand.

## **COMMISSIONER'S CORNER**

## Wildfires 101

As Louisiana faces increasing wildfire risks, understanding fire danger and preparedness has become crucial for residents throughout the state. Fire danger refers to the likelihood of a fire igniting, as well as its potential speed and intensity. Staying informed about fire danger levels can help decrease the occurrence of wildfires.

State and local authorities regularly assess conditions to determine when burn bans should be implemented to restrict open fires. Review state open burning rules and know that your local (city/parish) rules may be stricter, so consult your local government before open burning.

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) provides an up-to-date burn ban map for all parishes, helping residents stay informed about fire safety conditions. During heightened fire risk, local governments enforce burn bans, temporarily prohibiting open burning. Even when there aren't burn bans, it is recommended to routinely check fire conditions and practice safe burning practices.

#### **Open Burning Regulations**

Open burning involves the outdoor combustion of materials without containment or control. Regulations specify the permissible materials and locations for burning, along with guidelines for timing. When burn bans are lifted, only vegetation and ordinary yard waste, such as leaves and branches, are legally burnable in Louisiana.

#### LOUISIANA SPECKLED TROUT AMANDINE

Submitted by Kinloch Pecan Oil www.pecanoil.com

#### **INGREDIENTS**

6 to 8 filets of Louisiana trout

- 2 Tbsp creole seasoning
- 2 c flour
- 2 c buttermilk

1/2 c unsalted butter

1/2 c blanched and sliced almonds

1 lemon, juiced

1 Tbsp freshly chopped parsley

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Add 1/2" of pecan oil to a cast iron or heavy-bottomed pan over medium heat. Season trout filets with salt, pepper, and creole seasoning.
   Dredge trout in flour and shake off excess.
   Place trout in buttermilk, and again in flour; shake off excess. Place fish in pan with hot oil and cook on both sides until completely brown, about 5 to 7 minutes per side. If trout filets are thick and not completely cooked throughout, finish them in preheated oven, cooking for a few minutes.
- 2. To another sauté pan over medium high heat, add butter and 1/2 cup of pecan oil. When butter has completely melted and begins to brown slightly on the sides, add almonds, lemon juice and parsley. Continue to move butter around in pan until almonds have browned, about 3 to 4 minutes. Season sauce with salt and remove from heat. Place each trout filet on a plate and spoon amandine sauce liberally over top.

# USDA and DOI Announce Bold Federal Reforms to Improve Nation's Wildfire Response System

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke L. Rollins recently issued a new memorandum to modernize and strengthen America's wildfire prevention and response system. This policy direction enacts common-sense reforms that modernize and streamline federal wildfire system. Concurrently, U.S. Secretary of the Interior Doug Burgum issued his own memorandum to streamline capabilities and strengthen federal, state, and local partnerships.

"Time and time again, we have witnessed the devastating consequences of wildfires caused by mismanagement and a lack of preparedness. Under President Trump's leadership, we are taking bold action to modernize wildfire response systems, streamline federal wildfire capabilities, and strengthen their effectiveness. We started this work in the spring and have continually updated our policies and programs to properly manage our forests through common-sense timber production and management, protecting our national forests and grasslands for generations to come," said Secretary Brooke Rollins. "Secretary Burgum and I are committed to leading a bold transformation of the federal wildfire system to help our communities, neighbors,

and partners better prepare for, respond to, and recover from wildfires."

"For too long, outdated and fragmented systems have slowed our ability to fight fires and protect lives. Under President Trump's leadership, we are cutting through the bureaucracy and building a unified, modern wildfire response system that works as fast and as fearlessly as the men and women on the front lines," said Secretary of the Interior Doug Burgum. "By streamlining federal capabilities and strengthening our partnerships with state, tribal and local teams, we will deliver the common-sense reforms needed to safeguard our communities, our lands and our future."

The memorandum marks a decisive shift away from outdated systems and fragmented responses that have too often hindered federal firefighting and wildfire response efforts. In response to President Trump's Executive Order 14308 - Empowering Commonsense Wildfire Prevention and Response, USDA will unify operations, strengthen partnerships with state, Tribal, and local governments, and modernize tools and training to better protect American communities from the escalating threat of wildfire.

A Unified Federal Effort

Through this plan, USDA and DOI will work in lockstep to unify federal wildland fire capabilities, eliminate fragmentation, and deliver a forward-looking, mission-ready system that prioritizes common sense, efficiency, and results.

## Wildfires 101

According to the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality, items NOT allowed to be burned include:

- Plastics and synthetic materials
- Tires and rubber products
- Paints and chemicals
- Asphalt shingles and heavy oils
- Paper products
- Buildings and mobile homes

#### **Agricultural Burning**

Agricultural burning is burning for the purposes of reducing crop residue, stimulating yield, controlling diseases and pests, or generally maintaining the productivity of agricultural lands, such as the burning of residue after harvesting rice and sugarcane.

#### Wildfire Preparedness

Residents are advised to take steps to protect their homes from wildfires by hardening their homes and creating defensible zones. The defensible space of a structure is the buffer between the structure and the surrounding grass, trees, shrubs, or other forms of wildland. This distance is required to slow or stop the spread of a wildfire and keep a building from catching fire, whether through flying embers, direct flame contact, or radiant heat from nearby burning plants and structures. Additionally, if it becomes necessary to protect property, having a defensible space will provide firefighters with a safe area in which to perform their duties.

House hardening involves using building materials and installation procedures that increase a home's resilience to the heat, flames, and embers commonly associated with wildfires. The method focuses on the areas of a house that are most vulnerable during a fire. Some of these steps and techniques include:

- Remove dry leaves, debris, and other combustible vegetation.
- Examine the roof's shingles or tiles, and fix or replace damaged pieces to prevent ember penetration.
- Use fire-resistant materials for repairs, renovations, or new construction around the property.
- Use non-combustible materials for fences, walls, and landscaping to act as a fire barrier.
- Install an outdoor water source and hose that can carry water to any part of the house.
- Shut off gas and electricity.
- Pack an emergency supply kit for every member of the household.
- Obtain insurance coverage for personal belongings, the house, and even automobiles. The insurance policy coverage should be adequate to replace all valuables.
- Install smoke alarms, fire extinguishers, and fire-resistant window coverings.
- Create an evacuation plan that should be practiced until every member of the household is familiar with it.

#### Wildfire Alerts and Warnings

The National Weather Service (NWS) issues alerts to warn the public about fire hazards, including:

- Red Flag Warning: Urges immediate precautions in high-risk areas.
- Fire Weather Watch: Signals potential for severe fire conditions.
- Extreme Fire Behavior: Warns of rapidly spreading fires.

The LDAF provides daily fire notices categorizing fire danger from low to extreme.

#### Post-Wildfire Recovery

After a wildfire, safety and rehabilitation are priorities. Residents should return home only when it's safe, avoid electrical hazards, and wear safety gear during cleanup. Protecting air quality by monitoring smoke exposure and keeping indoor air clean is also essential.

The LDAF has wildland firefighting professionals on standby and ready to respond to any wildfires that may arise in the state. For emergencies, contact the LDAF 24-Hour Emergency Hotline at 1-855-452-5323 or dial 911. The Office of the State Fire Marshal also maintains a database of fire departments throughout Louisiana. People who have cause to believe there is a wildfire should also contact their local fire department.

## USDA Issues Second Economic Assistance Payment to Agricultural Producers

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is issuing a second Emergency Commodity Assistance Program (ECAP) payment to eligible producers for the 2024 crop year. Of the authorized \$10 billion in ECAP assistance, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) has already provided over \$8 billion in payments to eligible producers to mitigate the impacts of increased input costs and falling commodity prices. U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke Rollins made the announcement yesterday at the Ag Outlook Forum in Kansas City.

"Initial ECAP payments were factored by 85% to ensure that total program payments did not exceed \$10 billion in available funding. Since additional funds remain, FSA is issuing a second payment," said Deputy Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation Brooke Appleton. "As producers continue to face market volatility, these payments along with the entire suite of supplemental disaster assistance programs, will help producers navigate market uncertainty, pay down debt for the 2024 crop year, and secure financing for the next crop year."

Payments will automatically be made to eligible producers with approved ECAP applications who received an initial payment. Any application approved after Sept. 25, 2025, will receive one lump sum payment. Authorized by the American Relief Act, 2025, these economic relief payments are based on planted and prevented planted crop acres for eligible commodities for the 2024 crop year.

#### **ECAP Payments**

FSA is issuing a second payment ECAP equal to 14% of the gross ECAP payment to eligible producers, making the final payment factor 99%.

ECAP assistance is calculated using a flat payment rate for the eligible commodity multiplied by the eligible reported acres. Payments are based on acreage and not production. For acres reported as prevented planted, ECAP assistance is calculated at 50%.

## Additional USDA Supplemental Disaster Assistance

In addition to the over \$8 billion in ECAP payments, USDA has issued more than \$1 billion in Emergency Livestock Relief Program (ELRP) assistance to livestock producers impacted by drought and federally managed lands wildfires in 2023 and 2024 with an additional \$1 billion in expected payments for livestock producers impacted by floods and non-federally managed land wildfires in 2023 and 2024 (ELRP 2023/2023 FW). Livestock producers have until Oct. 31, 2025, to apply for (ELRP 2023/2023 FW) assistance. Producers have also received over \$5.4 billion through Stage 1 of the Supplemental Disaster Relief Program for indemnified crop losses in 2023 and 2024. SDRP Stage 2 assistance for uncovered, quality, and shallow losses will be

USDA's disaster recovery programs complement recently announced state block grant agreements in Florida, North Carolina, and Virginia totaling \$958 million in assistance to help agricultural producers with disaster recovery needs. USDA is working with 14 states on block grant agreements.

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is a program administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA) to conserve farmland for future generations while providing habitat for wildlife, reducing soil erosion, and improving water quality. Regular maintenance on CRP acres is needed to ensure the acreage continues to provide conservation benefits and remains in compliance with the CRP contract.

#### Regular Maintenance

Producers with CRP contracts are required to control all weeds, insects, pests, and other undesirable species to the extent necessary to ensure that the approved conservation cover is adequately protected and to ensure there is no adverse impact on surrounding land. Mowing is one of the allowable practices for weed control, but mowing for aesthetic purposes is never permitted. The Conservation Plan states the required weed control methods for each site.

Once a stand has been certified as fully established, participants are required to maintain plant diversity and stand density according to the Conservation Plan and offer (CRP-2) for the life of the contract. Stands that do not meet practice specific plant diversity or density requirements may be considered non-compliant. Refer to your conservation plan or contact FSA if you have any questions or concerns about the vegetative cover requirements.

Maintenance activities cannot occur during the primary nesting season for birds without written prior approval from the local county office. The primary nesting season in Louisiana is April 15 through July 15.

#### **Mid-Contract Management**

Regular maintenance for weed and pest control is separate from the Mid-Contract Management (MCM) requirement. MCM ensures plant diversity and wildlife benefits while ensuring protection of the soil and water resources. Such activities are site-specific and are for the purpose of enhancing the approved cover.

MCM must be completed between years four and six of a 10-year contract and between years seven and nine of a 15-year contract. The Conservation Plan will state what year MCM must take place.

#### Noncompliance with Maintenance Requirements

Failure to adequately maintain the stand may result in noncompliance with the terms and conditions of the CRP contract. Noncompliance can result in adverse actions up to and including termination of the CRP contract. Contracts that are out of compliance are ineligible to reenroll, unless the stand is brought back into compliance prior to the enrollment deadline.

## **Tips to Protect Farmers from Silent Killer Gases**

#### Know the hidden dangers in silos and manure

Farms contain hidden dangers from hazardous gases that can quickly become deadly for people and animals.

These gases collect in confined spaces such as silos, manure storages, anaerobic digesters, and grain bins where ventilation is poor. Common gases include nitrogen dioxide, hydrogen sulfide, methane, ammonia, carbon dioxide, and carbon monoxide.

Silo gas is mainly nitrogen dioxide (NO2), created during silage fermentation, especially in the first two weeks after corn harvest. This toxic, reddish-brown gas can settle in low areas and cause severe lung damage or death even after brief exposure. Nitrate buildup in droughtstressed corn followed by sudden rainfall increases risk.

Farmers can reduce danger by waiting five to seven days after rain before harvest, cutting corn higher to leave nitrate-rich stalks, and ensuring proper fermentation. Always ventilate silos and feed rooms before entering and sample silage for nitrate levels before feeding.

Hydrogen sulfide (H₂S) forms in low-oxygen manure storage and spikes during agitation. It smells like rotten eggs at low levels but becomes odorless at lethal concentrations.

Crusted manure, gypsum bedding, and sudden rain after dry weather can trigger dangerous gas releases. Concentrations above 500 ppm can cause unconsciousness within minutes. Farmers should work upwind, keep people and animals away from low areas, and avoid gypsum bedding to reduce risk.

Wearable gas monitors with alarms can detect hydrogen sulfide, methane, ammonia, carbon dioxide, and nitrogen dioxide. Proper signage, continuous ventilation, and strict entry precautions save lives.

If someone collapses from exposure, call 911 and never enter without protection.

Farm safety requires planning and patience. Understanding these gases and using detection tools protects families, workers, and livestock from sudden tragedy.
