# **12 Tribes of Israel Tree**

# **CRAFTORY!**

## Supplies:

- 12 dark green pipe cleaners
- 24 light green pipe cleaners
- 28 brown pipe cleaners
- 12 different colored large gems
- Hot glue gun

### Steps:

Step 1: To make the first leaf, fold a light green pipe cleaner in half, create a small loop at the folded end, and twist the loop three times to anchor it.
Step 2: Using the same looping and twisting method, continue forming loops, alternating which stem makes the loop until the pipe cleaner has about five loops in total.
Step 3: Repeat for all of the remaining light green pipe cleaners.
Step 4: Using the same method, make leaves out of all the dark green pipe cleaners. When completed, there should be twenty-four light green leaves and twelve dark green leaves.
Step 5: Begin gathering leaves to make the first branch. Each branch should have one dark green leaf and two light green leaves. Bundle together the three leaves with the dark green leaf on top.



8	Step 6: Wrap one brown pipe cleaner around the stems of all three leaves. Wrap until the leaves feel very secure, about four times.
	Step 7: Repeat this method to create twelve branches. Lay all twelve branches out with the dark green leaves on top.
	Step 8: Decorate the branched by carefully placing a dot of hot glue on the topmost loop of the dark leaves. Press a gem onto the glue for each branch.
	Step 9: Bundle the branches together like a flower bouquet.
	Step 10: Just below the green branches, twist the brown stems together a couple of times to hold everything in place.
	Step 11: Hold the bouquet upside down. Separate the brown stems into four groups of three to resemble a plus sign. Twist each group of three stems about three or four times to bind them together into a leg.

Step 12: Gather four new brown pipe cleaners and twist them tightly together around one leg of the tree.
Step 13: Continue twisting tightly all the way outward to the end of the pipe cleaners.
Step 14: Repeat for the remaining three legs of the tree.
Step 15: Twist all four of the long legs together, stopping about halfway down.
Step 16: Separate the four legs into a shape like a plus sign.
Step 17: Fold the end of each leg in half. Twist each folded leg tightly, forming four thick "feet" or "roots" to support the tree.
Step 18: Arrange the tree by spreading apart the dark leaves from the light leaves and making sure the gems are visible.
