Good afternoon everyone and welcome back to Broadfield Stadium for today's game against Crystal Palace

I know about the historic rivalry between Brighton and Crystal Palace and I'm sure it will generate a great atmosphere this afternoon. Palace have shown on a consistent basis their competitiveness, and when we played them in October we had to work hard for the three points. I expect the 90 minutes today to be just as tough.

It was important to get back to winning ways against Durham in the FA Cup on Wednesday. Obviously there was a late switch of venue to the American Express Elite Football Performance Centre, but it didn't affect our preparation too much and the players were ultra-professional.

We got a grip of the game with three goals in the first 25 minutes and controlled the match from then on. Credit to Durham, they had a good spell in the second half when we made quite a few changes and our intensity levels dropped a little, but there were lots of positives for us, not least that we were able to give more minutes to the likes of Dejana Stefanovic, Bex Rayner and Michelle Agyemang. It was also great to see Charlie Rule back in the matchday squad after a prolonged spell out with injury. Slowly but surely, we are getting back to having a full-strength

turning out to support the team in pretty miserable weather.

I am writing these notes following transfer deadline day. We have brought in Caitlin Hayes, a vastly experienced defender from Celtic who will give us more options. Caitlin has played in the WSL and Champions League, and I know she is desperate to make an impact here.

We also welcome Nadine Noordam, who arrived on transfer deadline day. She's coming to us at a good age and her profile is really good. We think she will bring a lot of mobility and quality to our midfield. Hopefully she will play a big part for the rest of the season and beyond.

Having more players available obviously increases competition for places and that can only be a good thing for our ongoing development.

There's no hiding from the fact that we underperformed in our last two WSL games. There were spells against both Liverpool and Manchester United when we looked a threat, but not long enough to affect the result. One of the good things about this group is their willingness to learn and improve. Those performances showed that when we don't give the best version of ourselves we are going to come up short, and that is frustrating for everyone. We will certainly need to be at our best today and your support from the stands can make a difference, so please be loud and get behind the girls.

The Croatian - who is women's head coach Dario Vidosic's father - joins the club after six years at Melbourne City, where he won silverware with the women's and men's squads.

Rado originally joined Melbourne City as academy technical director and women's head coach before taking over the head coach's position for the men's squad in their title-winning season.

He also had coaching and managerial experience at Brisbane Roar, Sydney FC, Melbourne Victory and Wellington Phoenix.

We extend a warm welcome to defender Caitlin Hayes, who has signed from Celtic, and midfielder Nadine Noordam from Ajax.

Hayes joins the Albion after four-and-a-half seasons with the Glasgow giants, having previously had spells at Manchester United, Manchester City and Everton at youth level. Following that, she played in America and Cyprus and has also spent a season with Championship side Lewes.

"We're delighted to welcome Caitlin to the club," said Dario Vidosic. "She's an experienced player who has competed at many levels in the game, including cup finals and the Champions League.

"She's progressed well in her time in Scotland and we're looking forward to seeing her compete in the WSL with Brighton."



During her time with Celtic, Hayes was part of a squad that won back-to-back Scottish Cups and the club's first SWPL league title last season.

At international level she made her Republic of Ireland debut aged 28 against Northern Ireland and has been capped 18 times.

Midfielder Noordam started her career in the Netherlands with Den Haag before joining Ajax in

She has been a regular for the Dutch giants, making 105 appearances in all competitions, scoring 18 goals and winning the Eredivisie title in the 2022/23 season, as well as two KNVB Women's Cups.

"We're really pleased to have Nadine at Brighton," added Vidosic. "She is a versatile and high-energy central midfielder who can create and score goals. She's got a lot of domestic experience in the Netherlands and in the Champions League, so has played at the highest level in club football.

"Nadine is keen to play in the WSL, and we think she can have a big impact for us in the short and long term. I'm looking forward to seeing her in a Brighton shirt and to being part of our squad."



MURRAY MAKES POIGNANT VIST

To commemorate the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau recently, Albion legend Glenn Murray and young BHAFC Foundation participant Edie Statton met with Holocaust survivor Joan Salter MBE

Marking Holocaust Memorial Day, Joan shared her story of survival, resilience and the importance of standing against hate during their meeting at Wembley Stadium.

Joan was just three months old when her native Belgium was invaded by the Nazis in 1940. Her family fled to France, where they were forced to report to the local police station every week.

In July 1942, a police officer warned Joan's mother that authorities were about to start deporting women and children to concentration camps and that Joan's family were on the list for the first transport.

Joan's mother quickly arranged their escape, and they were smuggled out of Paris in a laundry van in the dead of night. After travelling to Spain, Joan and her sister were put on a boat to the USA, before finally being reunited with their parents in London in 1947.

Joan shared her powerful story with Edie, 13, who plays at the BHAFC Foundation's free Premier League Kicks sessions in Worthing.

"Prejudice is a dangerous thing and it spreads like wildfire," Joan told Edie and Glenn. "It's so easy to make outcasts of a whole group of people.

"It's so important to see everyone as human beings. Whatever their background, whatever their ethnic group, they have a right to be treated with dignity."

The initiative came about in recognition of the fact that this may be one of the last major anniversaries where survivors can share their stories first-hand and pass them down to young people.

Chief executive of the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust. Olivia Marks-Woldman, said: "Football is a universal language of unity and friendship, perfectly reflecting the core message of Holocaust Memorial Day.

"Holocaust Memorial Day is more than a moment of reflection; it is a call to action. Like in football, we are all called to play our part in championing empathy and understanding."

Japan international forward Kiko Seike signed for the Seagulls from Urawa Reds last summer. She provides an insight into her first seven months playing in the Women's Super League...

Kiko, you joined Brighton last summer. Looking at your performances so far, how do you feel it's gone?

I got off to a really good start in the opening match, but I've realised how difficult it is to maintain that level consistently. Every game presents new challenges, and playing in an environment where both my teammates and opponents are completely different from what I was used to makes it even harder to make adjustments. But even though I'm struggling at times, I feel like I'm growing through the process.

This is your first time moving abroad. Were there any differences between what you expected and what you've actually experienced?

I expected everyone to be incredibly fast, but, surprisingly, it wasn't as overwhelming as I thought, and I felt like I could compete. However, in terms of physicality, the players are really strong. Even those who aren't particularly big fight hard in one-on-one battles and never give up

on the ball until the very end. That's a big difference compared to Japan.

Have you started doing anything new to compete with the physicality of your

I've slightly increased my training load, especially for my upper body. Back in Japan, I only did strength training during the offseason, but now I make sure to do it once or twice a week

Do you notice any differences in mindset between players in Japan and those in England?

The level of intensity and determination to win the ball is very different. In Japan, once you dribble past a defender, you usually have a clear path to shoot. But here, even after beating a defender, they'll pull you, push you, or slide in at the last second to stop you. That kind of defensive commitment is something I've had to adjust to.

How has life outside of football been for you? The biggest thing is that I've started to understand

English more. Other than that, I've been able to adapt well and haven't had any major issues in my daily life.

Brighton's men's team includes Kaoru Mitoma, who was a year below you at Tsukuba University. Do you interact with him much?

We don't meet up in private very often, but we see each other during team events and activities. Just yesterday, we did a media session together. We talk from time to time in those situations, sharing updates and discussing football.

He recently scored against Manchester United. How do you view his performances?

It's not just his goals – he makes a huge impact in every game. I think he's doing an amazing job and I definitely take inspiration from his play.

The Japan national team is looking ahead to the 2027 World Cup and the 2028 Olympics. What are your goals as a team?

Having experienced disappointment in past tournaments, my desire to succeed has grown even stronger over the past year or two. I want to win on the world stage as a member of the national team, and my ambition to become the best in the world keeps getting stronger. I want to be a key player in achieving that goal

Do you feel that your current environment is helping you move toward those goals?

Yes, definitely. Of course, playing in Japan has its own advantages, but until now, the only time I faced international opponents was during national-team matches. Now, being in this league and competing at a high level every week is helping me improve my speed, physicality and decision-making.

More Japanese players are moving to England. Why do

This league is at the top level in both technical and physical aspects. Playing here helps us grow as players and, in turn, that benefits the future of Japanese women's football.

Your international teammate Saki Kumagai recently moved to London City Lionesses. What do you think about her move?

I'm really happy about it. Now that she's closer, we'll have more chances to meet up, which I'm looking forward to. Hopefully her team can get promoted next season.

There's still a big gap in transfer fees between men's and women's football. As a player, how do you feel about that?

There are differences in playing style, tradition and attendance, so I understand why the gap exists to some extent. But women's football has its own appeal, and in England there are matches that draw 20,000 to 30,000 fans. That cultural difference is something I've noticed. I think that by improving the quality of our play, we can help narrow the gap over time.

The Eagles have found their debut WSL season tough going as they look to pull away from the foot of the table in 2025...

Under the guidance of head coach Laura Kaminski, Palace gained promotion from the Championship as champions, having scored 55 goals and conceded just 22 last

term. Promotion was crowned with a final-day draw against Sunderland in front of a record 6,796 crowd at Selhurst Park. Ahead of the new campaign, Palace made a number of signings to

strengthen their squad, including Shae Yanez (Bristol City), Katrine Veje (Everton), Indiah-Paige Riley (PSV), Ashleigh Weerden (Ajax), Mille Gejl (North Carolina Courage), Josie Green (Leicester

City), My Cato (Norrkoping) and Katie Stengel (Gotham FC), who have all featured regularly this season.

With so many changes to the squad, likewise a more competitive

division, it was always going to take time for Kaminski's side to gel and their opening two WSL fixtures resulted in heavy losses to Tottenham Hotspur (0-4) and at home to Chelsea (0-7).

The side's only league win so far then came at Leicester City, where a second-half brace from Annabel Blanchard secured a 2-0 victory. A narrow 1-0 defeat against the Seagulls followed. while Palace's other WSL points both came against Merseyside opposition - a

a 1-1 home draw against The Eagles finished third in their Women's winners Tottenham and second-place Aston Villa, but the side will be looking to make further progress in the FA Cup, with a home draw fifth-round tie against Newcastle United to look forward to next week after Sheffield United were comfortably dispatched 6-1 in round four.

Nadine Noordam is delighted to be continuing her football adventure in England and to become the latest Dutchwoman to play for Albion in the WSL...

The 26-year-old joined us on transfer deadline day after making more than 70 league appearances for Ajax, for whom she won the Dutch league title and played in this season's Champions League.

She is treading a well-worn path. Two of her new teammates, Marisa Olislagers and Marit Auee, signed for the Albion last summer from FC Twente, and going back, compatriots Inessa Kaagman, Danigue Kerkdijk and Maxime Bennink played more than 100 games between them for the club before going back to Holland to continue their careers.

"I saw Mo (Olislagers) on the day I signed," said Nadine. "We were very happy to see each other and I'm very happy that she's here at the club already and doing really well this season. I have known her a long time and I'm sure she will help me out and help me settle in.

"It's the first time that I'm going to be living in another country so that could be a little tough to start with maybe. So, it will be nice to have Mo around and I can ask her other questions. But it's a squad with a lot of nationalities, which, when I think about it, is incredible, so I think I'm going to be okay settling in and getting to know my teammates."

Noordam has spent the last four seasons with Ajax, playing regularly in the Eredivisie, but

was ready for a new challenge in what she regards as the best domestic league in the world.

"It was a long few days before everything was agreed, so I was happy when it was all signed on Thursday," she said. "Now, I'm just excited to get going with the rest of the squad.

"I loved the culture from the first minute I came here. It was such a warm welcome and the people are so nice. I think that this is a good environment for me to improve and to grow as a player. And I'll be playing in the WSL as well, which is arguably the best league in the world."

Nadine describes herself as an energetic box-to-box midfielder, who can also contribute her fair share of goals. "I have lots of energy and I will give that energy to the team, and the Brighton fans will see this on the field.




