





NOTICE OF WORK

Purpose of Work:

Parkland is working on a multi-year initiative to reduce emissions and increase renewable fuel production in Canada. To meet these goals, the Refinery needs to build new dedicated infrastructure and upgrade existing infrastructure.

Work Activities:

- Site preparations (hydrovac)
- Demolition of existing infrastructure (e.g., tanks, piping)
- Bulk excavations and soil disposal
- Construction of two new fuel storage tanks
- Construction of a Tail Gas Treatment Unit (TGTU) that will reduce emissions of sulphur dioxide (SOx), and a sour water treatment unit.

Dates: Beginning November 2023 with anticipated major construction **completion** by December 2024.

Hours: General work will be conducted between 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday-Friday. Specialty work may be required outside of this schedule.

TREE REPLANTING STRATEGY

Overview

Not enough space within the Refinery for all 451 trees.

Develop and Manage (in collaboration with CoB)

Focus on ecological use (location, species, size, etc.)

Invasive species management

Priorities

- 1. Maintain the safe operation of the Refinery.
- 2. Retain and replant trees on-site as much as possible to maintain sight lines for our neighbours.
- 3. When removal of trees >20 cm dbh for strategic projects is required,
- replace trees to achieve a 1:10 ratio.
- 4. Open and transparent planning and follow-up with CAP, MST Nations, and other interested groups.

- # trees maintained (% of annual plan complete)
- # trees removed (% of annual plan complete)
- Timing of tree removals relative to bird nesting windows
- # tree replanted
- Timing of tree replacement planting relative to tree removal
- Replacement Ratio (potential)
- # trees inspected and cleared after 1 year
- Replacement Ratio (achieved)


